Former Heyworth woman publishes book

The story of Chippie and the family that loved him

ALTA, Iowa — A former Heyworth resident has turned the saga of a family pet into a book.

Nancy Beveridge, 87, of Alta, Iowa, wrote the story of "Chippie," the parakeet, published through Covenant Books.

Beveridge said her daughter wanted "a pet she could hold." Beveridge's aunt had once purchased a parakeet for her cousin. But, Heyworth didn't have

a pet store, so she traveled to Bloomington, where the local Woolworth store in Eastland Mall sold birds and pet supplies for birds.

"My daughter assumed the responsibility of caring for Chippie and teaching him to talk," Beveridge wrote. "If birds have a personality, he had a good one, and everyone in the family made him a part of their lives."

bought just one bird because they were aware Chippie would then be more likely to talk. Parakeets are less likely to talk if they are with other birds or even if they are able to see their own reflections.

"Chippie was always

ready to climb onto your finger when you touched his chest," Beveridge wrote. "He actually seemed to enjoy being stroked over his head and down his back. I was amazed at the length of the sentences he learned when he said, 'Chippie come over here so I can get you'."

She said her husband was clever in the things he would say to Chippie.

Beveridge attended a country grade school and graduated with a bachelor of science degree from Illinois State Normal University (ISNU), Normal, in 1955. She taught home economics at Reed Custer High School, Braidwood, Ill. and

later became a hospital dietician.

Beveridge later returned to school to become an elementary school teacher and taught for 23 years, 18 years teaching 5th grade students. She lived in Heyworth for more than 60 years.

She now lives in an assisted living facility in Alta, Iowa, located near her daughter. She suffers from macular degeneration, a disease of the eyes, so she said she won't be able to write any more books.

Hospital helping with coronavirus vaccination clinics

Hospital, county health department, high school coordinating effort

CLINTON — Warner Hospital & Health Services, DeWitt/Piatt Bi-County Health Department and Clinton High School have been cooperating in the local vaccine drive, hospital CEO Paul Skowron reported Monday.

"It's been a good partnership," Skowron told city council members during the council's regular meeting.

Skowron said the hospital was able to supply some staff to help with the recent vaccine clinic sponsored by the health department and hosted by the high school. Money the hospital received through the coronavirus relief bill, the CARES Act, helped pay for hospital support of the clinic.

More vaccine clinic dates are planned. Skowron said if space is not available at the high school for future vaccine clinics, the hospital was prepared to again erect the tent used for COVID testing as a location for vaccinations.

Residents should periodically check the health department website and Sign-up Genius for

future vaccine clinic schedules.

Commissioner Ken Buchanan asked residents to be patient and try to keep their vehicles off snow routes and side streets as city snow plows come through this week. Buchanan reported during the council meeting as a winter storm covering 25 states moved through DeWitt County Monday night.

In additional business, commissioner Tom Edmunds reported that, while city sales tax was down about \$8,500 toward the end of 2020, so far, year-to-date, the city was ahead in sales tax about \$34,000.

"So, it's good so far, we just took a little bit of a hit," he said.

Gov. issues disaster proclamation amid winter storms

Forecasters expect severe cold weather to persist in coming days

SPRINGFIELD — Dangerous sub-zero temperatures and massive snow accumulation across Illinois prompted Gov. JB Pritzker to issue a disaster proclamation for the entire state on Tuesday.

"I have directed my administration to use all resources at our disposal to keep our communities safe amid dangerous and ongoing winter weather," Pritzker said in the news release. "I urge all Illinoisans to take this extreme weather seriously, avoid all unnecessary travel and check in on your neighbors."

Chicago and the surrounding suburbs were hit especially hard, with some areas receiving as much as 12 inches of snow in the past 24 hours, on top of several inches of existing snowfall.

Northern regions of the state have faced significant snow accumulation, as persistent freezing temperatures have kept

snow from melting.

Current forecasts indicate that portions of northern and west central Illinois will continue to experience subzero temperatures in the coming days.

Central and southern Illinois, including the Metro East region near St. Louis, were hit with between four and eight inches of snow in the past 24 hours, along with single-digit temperatures, according to the National Weather Service.

Pritzker said in the release

that his administration is communicating with local governments "to ensure they have the support they need in disaster response and recovery operations."

He also cautioned residents that freezing temperatures have resulted in frozen wells in key natural gas producing states, such as Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas. This has caused an increase in demand for natural gas with a decrease in supply, leading to a spike in the price of natural gas, according to the release.



Internet access for veterans

Fifteen percent veterans do not have an internet connection, limiting their access to Department of Veterans Affairs video telehealth services. But no longer. The VA's new Digital Divide Consult has geared up to help over 12,000 eligible veterans so far.

If you're a veteran living in a rural area, have limited broadband service, don't have a device with video, have a serious medical condition or are in temporary housing, you can get help with internet access and devices.

But there's more:

If you're part of a HUD-VA program, you can receive a smartphone to reach telehealth.

If you use TracFone SafeLink, T-Mobile (was Sprint) or Verizon, you can hook up with VA Video Connect health care without incurring data charges on your bill. Go to mobile.va.gov/app/vavideo-connect for details. The VA will even do a test call before your visit to check your connection.

If you're in a rural area or don't have broadband at home, the VA has coordinated with various groups and businesses to create locations for you to use for talking privately to your health care providers. The American Legion, VFW and certain Walmarts

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
Long way to a shortcut

elcome to my little corner culinary delights.

At times, one runs across recipes that clearly do not follow professional methods. One example is a recipe that instructs you to break an egg into a cup's worth of milk and mix for use in breading or as a pastry wash. Thoroughly mixing is very difficult unless willing to dirty a blender or mixer. A homogeneous coating for an even application is unlikely. To do it properly, whisk only your egg until completely homogenous. Then whisk in the milk little at a time. Warm milk works best. Try it both ways and see for yourself.

I have watched people skin and seed tomatoes. Even though fresh is best, it is no wonder that many prefer canned tomatoes. I have watched them take a paring knife to remove the stem end first where the vine was attached. Some even try removing the skin with a paring knife. Then they cut it into wedges and take their thumb to push the seeds and membrane out of the cavity. Then they return with the paring knife to remove the rib. There is a much simpler

Make a shallow criss cross cut at the blossom end of the tomatoes. Dip them into boiling water until the skin at the incisions begin to curl. That should take only half a minute. Remove from boiling water and shock in cold water to arrest any residual cooking action. Peel off the skin with your fingers. Slice into wedges. Take a paring knife and begin cutting off the ribs starting at the bloom end. Once you reach the stem end,



cut it off. In one stroke. you have removed the rib. seeds, seed membrane and stem end. You now have fresh uncooked tomatoes for salads, salsas, coulis and cold sauces as well as garnish.

When I was taking my culinary course. CA150, we were taught to carefully ladle the butter fat out leaving the sediment of milk particles on the bottom undisturbed. This is tedious, time consuming and wasteful. I later learned a much better way. Take the melted butter and pour it through three layers of cheese cloth. The unwanted milk particles cling to the cheese cloth. Another way is to allow the butter to solidify. Then unmold it. The milk particles can now be scraped off of the bottom.

Once the butter is clarified, you can store it in the refrigerator. However, a chunk of cold clarified butter becomes too hard to conveniently measure. I therefore premeasure it, using a ladle and ice cube tray, into half ounce cubes before refrigerating it. A half ounce is equivalent to a tablespoon's worth. It makes handling and measuring much easier. I can then use them as I need them. I will also store some as larger chunks. I use this for breaking off pieces for sautéing when the amount is not critical. This also works for other

To address this, his administration is working with "federal partners to pursue federal assistance to help communities recover and to do what we can to protect ratepayers from soaring utility bills," according to the release.

Illinois Emergency Management Agency Director Alicia Tate-Nadeau said in the release that residents who use an alternative heating source should take proper safety

"Proper home heating is a critical issue during the winter months, and over time has proven deadly for many families," Tate-Nadeau said in the release. "If using an alternative heating source during this extreme weather, take a moment to ensure that your carbon monoxide detector is working

properly. The proper safety precautions can save lives during extreme weather."

The Illinois Emergency Management Agency residents urged follow tips to conserve energy that include insulating walls and attics; weatherizing doors and windows; hanging blankets over windows at night but letting the sunshine in during the day; and covering cracks around doors with rugs or similar materials.

Additional tips conserving energy home and staying safe in the winter storm available online at the Winter Weather Guide, Preparedness which was developed by IEMA and the National Weather Service.

Another COVID scam

You know it's getting bad when local police chiefs go on the nightly news to warn against scams. That's what is happening in my area, and possibly in yours. Scammers are going all out to steal your information, money and identity, and they're using the COVID vaccine as

A few weeks ago, the scammers' tactic was to claim we were eligible for a special COVID Medicare card. The card doesn't exist. So many of us might have said that in response to the frequent phone calls that the scammers changed tactics. Now they claim to have an appointment for you to get the COVID vaccine.

Here's how it works: A scammer will claim to be calling from your doctor's office, without actually naming the doctor. All they need from you, they say, is your Medicare card number and possibly your bank account or Social Security number "for identification." Your best bet is to just hang up. But if you ask for the name of the doctor, they won't know it. It's the same with hospitals and clinics.

If you're not sure whether the call is fake, hang up and call your doctor, the hospital or clinic, and ask if they've tried to contact you.

Scammers also are using different tactics: telling you they can fit you into a quick appointment, saying they're from Medicare or your insurance provider, sending you an email that indicates you can get a fast appointment reservation by calling their special phone number, offering you the vaccine at a "reduced cost" (the vaccines are free). Some of them actually offer to mail the vaccine to you.

Don't fall for any of these scams. If you need help signing up online for an appointment, call your doctor's office or the senior center. Don't scammers any information, not even your name.

Tax season approaching, replacing your annual Benefit Statement never been easier. Benefit Statement, also known as the SSA-1099 or the SSA-1042S, is a tax form we mail each year in January to people who receive Social Security benefits. It shows the total amount of benefits you received from us in the previous year so you know how much Social Security income to report to the Internal Revenue Service on your tax return.

If you live in the United States and you need a replacement form SSA-1099 or SSA-1042S, simply go online and get an instant, printable replacement form using your personal my Social Security account at www. ssa.gov/myaccount. replacement SSA-1099 or SSA-1042S is available for the previous tax year after February 1.

Snow and ice and frostbite ...Oh my!

It can be relaxing and peaceful to enjoy the snow if you are able to look at it from inside the warmth of your own home. But in most cases, we need to venture out at some point – and it has been especially frigid recently in the Midwest.

Going out into wintery weather means cold hands and clearing paths to be able to walk and drive safely. However, too much time spent outside when it's cold or not taking proper safety measures when outside can result in serious, even lifethreatening, illness and injury to your hands and upper extremities.

"We have three main categories of injuries that we worry about in the hand and upper extremity. Number one is the appearance of snow blower injuries when we have large accumulations of snow, number two is the appearance of slip and fall injuries causing fractures in the hand when we have ice or snow on the ground, and the third one comes with extreme cold in the form of frostbite injuries," says Ramsey Ellis, M.D., fellowship-trained hand surgeon, OSF HealthCare.

In fact, the Consumer **Products** Safety Commission estimates that 3,000 people are treated in emergency rooms in the United States for snow blower injuries each year.

"It's so important when using a snow blower to never reach your hand into the auger, or the spinning mechanism that helps disrupt and throw the snow – because even if you have your snow blower turned off, there are instances in which there is stored energy and the auger can still spin. So if you reach in and dislodge the obstruction and that residual energy fires off, you can sustain a severe hand injury that results in amputated fingers, lacerated fingers, and severe fractures," cautions Dr. Ellis.

While outside snow blowing your driveway or clearing a path to your car or front porch, another thing to be cautious of is slipping and falling on ice. Dr. Ellis sees "slip and fall" hand and wrist

injuries quite often during the winter.

"One of the most common injuries we see in the winter is a slip and a fall onto outstretched hands/wrists, or what we call a FOOSH. People fall onto their wrists and hands and they sustain radius fractures that require operative intervention. So one of the really important safety measures to try to avoid those types of injuries in the winter is to wear really good footwear that has appropriate tread and to, on your own property, shovel and salt or sand in order to avoid the buildup of slippery surfaces on your sidewalk, your front walk, and on your path to your vehicle," explains Dr. Ellis

result Another extremely cold conditions that can cause damage to your hands is frostbite. Signs and symptoms of frostbite include white or grayish-yellow skin area, skin that feels firm or waxy, and numbness. Dr. Ellis warns that the effects of frostbite can range from minor to very severe.

"At the minimum it can cause just redness, soreness, and swelling and at the maximum it can cause loss of digits and loss of hands from necrosis. That is extremely unusual since most people realize before that stage, but you can get small fingertip ulcerations quite easily and that's something we do see."

Additionally, hypothermia most often occurs at very cold temperatures, the CDC warns that it can occur even at cool temperatures above 40°F. Signs and symptoms of hypothermia shivering, include confusion, memory loss, slurred speech, fumbling hands, and drowsiness.

The best way to avoid both hypothermia and frostbite is to preventative measures to protect yourself when outdoors during the winter months.

"The key things are to limit the duration of exposure and to make sure to have excellent protective gear if you're going to be doing prolonged work in cold environments. So having a really good set of mittens and gloves and wearing silk liners and taking frequent breaks," Dr. Ellis advises.

If you experience any of the three major winter hand injuries and you are unable to treat it at home, call 911 or go to the closest urgent care center to seek professional medical attention.



Thank you, David Remmert

(Please note: Due to a printing schedule change this column did not make the print edition, it did make the electronic edition, it is being printed this week with an update on the impeachment.)

Every once in a while the public needs to recognize public officials and just tell them thanks and that their efforts are appreciated. David Remmert is the administrator of DeWitt-Piatt County Health Department. We should all be thankful for his efforts over the past several months. Usually health departments themselves concern with food inspections, septic inspections and locally supplementing the traditional medical community for those in need. Then COVID-19 reared its head and bit this nation.

Piatt and DeWitt are small rural counties. They share staff for financial efficiency. **Bi-County** Health is cost and benefit effective for what they were designed for. They were certainly competent to attend to a normal flu outbreak or cases of food poisoning arising from a local eatery. Bi-County Health has neither the respond in-house to a pandemic. BUT that is exactly what Remmert and

his agency have responded to. The federal and state governments determined local health departments would be the first line of vaccination defense against COVID. Dave Remmert wasn't asked if he had the facilities, equipment, or staff to vaccinate the counties. He was just told to do it. To add insult to injury the state and feds couldn't even tell him the quantity of the vaccine he would receive. He was simply told to vaccinate the populace with a priority listing that he had no control over. Then the state tells the public to call the health department for appointments by your priority. No one stops to think that this small agency is not a phone bank with numerous operators. Their entire phone system got slammed.

Dave Remmert could have simply said the task was beyond the capabilities of his small agency. Fortunately for all of us, Mr. Remmert rolled up his sleeves and developed a plan where no plan was before. He contacted the schools to obtain a facility with enough square footage to conduct a vaccine clinic. staff nor the facilities to The schools graciously allowed the use of their facilities to conduct the vaccine clinic. The use of



that property was a major contribution and was done in the spirit of community cooperation. Remmert contacted hospital and other medical providers to obtain staffing for the clinics, which will take several months. He got some paid and a lot of volunteers to provide assistance to the vaccine clinics in DeWitt and Piatt counties.

The logistics of pulling the vaccine clinics off during a pandemic are worthy of a graduate thesis. Dave Remmert had to pull this off while still having to meet the demands of his agency's other obligations. Dave Remmert, his staff, and the community that came to his call for assistance need to be told that the residents of DeWitt and Piatt counties truly appreciate their time and effort to the community at large. The next time you see Dave Remmert, his staff members, and the numerous volunteers who are assisting in the vaccine clinics, tell them







Weather History

February 20

 2014: A powerful late winter storm brought severe weather to parts of the Midwest. Over central and southern Illinois, 11 tornadoes were reported, mainly between the I-72 and I70 corridors, although hone occurred as far south as Murphysboro. The strongest one touched down near Nokomis, and moved northeast past Pana to north of Tower Hill. It was on the ground for 22 miles, and was rated at EF-2 intensity with a peak wind of 115 mph. Even behind the storms, wind gusts of 45 to 65 mph

persisted well into the evening, and the gust of 64 mph at Springfield set its February record. February 21

 1997: A storm system moving through the central U.S. brought copious rainfall to parts of northern and central Illinois on the 20th and 21st. A large area of the state from Quincy to Chicago reported in excess of 3 inches of rain, with local amounts to near 4 inches. Peoria reported a two-day rainfall total of 3.58 inches, which is about 2-1/2 times the normal for the entire month of February.




E-W appear well-matched, because East bids most conservatively (he didn't open and he didn't compete to 3♠) whereas West seems to bid a lot (witness his 14 call).

The ◆J opening lead was taken by East's Ace, and the ◆Q played to Declarer's King. Trumps were drawn in three rounds, and with a Club and a Diamond still to be lost, Declarer concluded that a successful Spade guess was required to bring this one home. She'd just finished reading Lawrence's "Counting at Bridge", so she put her new-found technique to work. East had shown up with ◆AQ and ♥J, added to which he might also have a Club honor. With all that, and the ♠A, surely East would have opened the bidding instead of passing in first seat. So, with a high degree of confidence, she led a Spade to the King and East's surprising Ace. Down one.

It was unfortunate that Declarer's bedtime reading had not been "End-Plays for the Improving Player". In that case, after drawing trumps, she would have cashed the *K and led a Club to the Ten and East's Jack. East could cash the ♦T, but then had no safe exit ... a Spade return would spare Declarer the guess . and a Club return would allow Declarer to pitch a Spade on the fourth round of Clubs. Making 9 tricks.

It's true that playing on Clubs was not a sure thing. West might have held ♣QJx, in which case he would split his honors and win the third round of the suit. Now West will lead a low Spade and Declarer can revert to her counting activities (without a happy ending, as it happens).
