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County sees vaccine dose drop More needed in order to continue giving first shot

OREGON - The amount of COVID-19 vaccine on hand in Ogle County has dropped, Ogle County Health Department Administrator Kyle Auman told the Ogle County Board at its Feb. 16 meeting.

department has remained on vaccinations, but they have had to reschedule some vaccine clinics due to a shortage of vaccine.

remain for the next couple of weeks. He told the board that his department was down to about 20 doses of the vaccine at that time.

So Auman said the focus for now will be on getting the vaccine to people who are in need of their second dose. That means, for now, the county is holding off on making appointments for first doses.


In total, Auman said about 3.41 percent of the county's population has been vaccinated.

Overall, he told the board the regional positivity rate for the virus was a 3.4 percent.

In Ogle County, the positivity rate was 1.8 percent.

"Really seeing some positive activity and trends there," he said. Board Member Ben Youman asked Auman if the county will have to revaccinate primary care workers eventually or use a booster.

Auman said there has been some discussion on booster shots, but nothing concrete has been set. He said it is not clear yet if the current vaccine is good for the variants of the virus that are popping up, or how long the vaccine will be effective.

Board Member Tom Smith asked if the county has any timeframe for when people under the age of 65 will receive the vaccination.

Auman said there is currently no timeframe for that. He said the current list of those over 65 who still need the vaccine is about 8,000 people. He said the county needs more doses to continue to move forward with its vaccine plan.

Auman said the county could potentially vaccinate 3,000 people a week if it had the vaccine doses it needed.

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State Police release monthly activity

STERLING – Illinois State Police District 1 Commander, Captain Matthew Hodgdon, has announced District 1 enforcement figures and activity for January. Illinois State Police District 1 Troop

Illinois State Police District 1 Troopers issued 389 citations, 437 written warnings, and made 10 criminal arrests during the month of January. Forest Preserve District sets lecture on Chicago Portage

The Byron Forest Preserve District will offer Archaeology of the Chicago Portage National Historic Site via Zoom lecture on Sunday, Feb. 28 at 2 p.m.

Join staff archaeologist Paula Bryant of the Illinois State Archaeological Survey to learn about the Chicago Portage, a low and short divide between the Great Lakes and the Mississippi River systems. Following the lead of generations of Native Americans, explorers Marquette and Joliet first crossed the Chicago Portage in 1673. One of the most important travel routes of the mid-continent, the portage was a significant factor in the development of the United States interior. During early European exploration, natural waterways were often the easiest route across the North American landscape and places where canoes and trade goods could easily be

carried around barriers or across multiple rivers were critically important. Along with the opening of the Illinois and Michigan Canal in 1848, the portage became the transportation link that spurred the growth of the City of Chicago.

One of a handful of National Historic Sites in Illinois, the Chicago Portage is considered by some as Chicago's "Plymouth Rock." The presentation will address the unique features this landscape offered to early travelers, in addition to archaeological sites associated with the area.

Recycling event cancelled






Our nation must have accountability

The No-Cry Challenge: Tears are shed for many a reason. Unbridled joy. A particularly raucous round of laughter. Heartbreak. The ache of loss. And humans are a curious lot. There are times when we'll go into absolute denial to avoid tears, but other times we rush right in. Case in point: tearjerkers. Some movies come at you right from the start (the entire first 10 minutes of "Up") and some wait for the end to twist the knife (when Miguel sings with his great-grandmother "Coco").

Either way, here are a collection of tearjerker moments in film for when you just need a little catharsis. Get a box of tissues and (potential spoilers ahead) have yourself a good cry.

"My Girl" -- The death of a child is no easy thing, but in this story of a girl named Vada Sultenfuss, living with her single dad in a funeral home, it's heartbreaking. If you can get through the scene where Vada loses it at Thomas J's funeral because he doesn't have his glasses, I am not sure you are human.

"Inside Out" -- A quintet of emotions interact inside the mind of 11-year-old Riley in this Pixar classic. But it's Riley's forgotten imaginary friend Bing Bong who steals the heart in a loving act of sacrifice that will have you weeping buckets of candy tears.

"Steel Magnolias" -- In this touching story about a group of strong Southern women, there is more than one poignant moment, but for millions of ugly criers, it's the scene where M'Lynn delivers her monologue in the graveyard, bemoaning daughter Shelby's lifelong ill health.



"Selena" -- The Tejano superstar captured the hearts of a nation. Her tragic story is told with Jennifer Lopez in the lead role, and when she doesn't catch the white rose thrown to her on stage at the end, you'll never hear "Dreaming of You" the same way.

"Marley & Me" (and for that matter "A

Dog's Purpose" and "A Dog's Journey") -- Whenever an animal is involved, you're already in a position of weakness, but these films take it to the next level. When Marley is put down, it's gut-wrenching.

"Life Is Beautiful" -- A Jewish-Italian
