When the last shut down happened in early October, Ajvazi decided it was time to add a drive through window to the Oregon restaurant. So now, it is Spring Valley Restaurant and Drive Thru.

"During the second shut down the drive through system kind of went hand in hand and it just made sense to try something like that," he said.

For a young man who grew up working at the business, Ajvazi seems to have approached this year with the resolve of a seasoned veteran. He started by taking the advice of those tasked with keeping the community safe.

"I've been in constant communication with the Ogle County Health Department, just trying to figure out the new mitigations and what the rules are and what we should be doing as restaurant owners," he said.

# Oregon restaurant adds drive through service By Brad Jennings part of his business.


OREGON – It has been quite a year for Matt Ajvazi.

The 2013 Oregon High School graduate took over the family business, Spring Valley Restaurant, in January of this year. Two months later, the pandemic hit, and the restaurant has been closed six months out of those 12.

"It's been challenging, of course," Ajvazi said during a recent interview inside the restaurant. "I feel like every industry has been impacted with the pandemic. The restaurant and bar industry got hit really hard."

Instead of letting the pandemic dictate what happens to his business, Ajvazi – whose family has owned the restaurant since 1999 – has instead innovated. He started by adding a pickup window during the first shut down. And when the restaurant was open for limited inside dining, takeout orders because a regular

There has been resistance from some, of course. But Ajvazi said he has placed the focus on keeping the restaurant clean, adding plexiglass when there was dine-in service and making sure people wore masks.

Some didn't like that and went elsewhere. Ajvazi said he is not one to tell people what to do but feels like he has done what is right for his business.

"We are in December, and I am proud to say that we have been doing the right thing since the pandemic hit," he said. And the new drive through, which had a soft opening on Dec. 2, has been a hit with customers. Ajvazi said the drive through for now is focused on a broasted chicken dinner. He said wait times for dinner have been a bit longer, but the product is worth it and people have been patient.

"We're just really happy to have the support from the community," he said. "It's very reassuring and just makes us feel good about doing the right thing.

Ajvazi - who played soccer in Eastern Europe for years after high schoolsaid the plan is to keep the drive through even when the pandemic is over, and to expand the menu soon.

And as 2021 looms, there is hope that a vaccine will make 2021 a much better year for his business and others.

"With the vaccine coming out, it gives us the reassurance that if you do the right thing and follow the rules and really believe in yourself then there will always be light at the end of the tunnel," he said.

# Plant employees raised \$10,000 for mission

**BYRON** – The top priority for employees in the recently completed refueling outage at Exelon Generation's Byron Station was to safely refuel the Unit 2 reactor and perform maintenance to ensure an uninterrupted run through the coming winter months and beyond.

A second goal for employees was to raise money for a deserving non-profit organization during the station's final refueling outage.

"For our final refueling outage our employees wanted to make a big splash for a very deserving organization," said Cory Lance, an engineer at the plant and president of the "Goodwill Committee" at the Byron nuclear facility. "Selling outage T-shirts and donating the proceeds to charity is an honored tradition at the plant. We chose the Rockford Rescue Mission to benefit from our fundraising because we know many in the community have been hit hard by the pandemic."

Rockford Rescue Mission is recognized as the region's primary provider of assistance to the homeless, near homeless, addicted and working poor in the Rock River Valley. Rockford Rescue Mission CEO Sherry Pitney said the donation comes at a time when help is needed most.

"We are so blessed by this compassion and generosity. It is evident that the employees at Byron Station and the company itself care for the hurting, hungry and homeless in the Rock River Valley," Pitney said.

"It's a great feeling to know that we can count on our community to wrap their hearts and arms around us during this challenging time."

Byron Station Site Vice President Mark Kanavos said while the company continues to highlight for stakeholders and the public the importance of carbonfree, reliable nuclear energy, charitable giving continues to play a vital role in the community.

"Our employees live in these communities, raise families, join clubs and organizations, spend money at local businesses and give their time to charitable efforts," Kanavos said.

"Though our carbon-free power is important for the region and state, our sense of community and goodwill is vital to many organizations in the area."

Exelon announced in August that it would prematurely retire Byron Station and Dresden Station in Morris in the fall of 2021 due to ongoing economic challenges.

Byron Generating Station is in Ogle County. With both units at full power, the site produces almost 2,500 megawatts, enough electricity to power more than 2 million average American homes.





Vehicles must be parked on that side of the street where oddnumbered building or house would be located between the hours of 7:00 a.m. that day and 7:00 a.m. of the following day on odd calendar days.

Any person who violates this paragraph J,1,c shall be fined per the fine schedule.

This ordinance is based on 1 inch of snowfall, not on whether the snowplows are out yet.



Doty received an Individual Extension Excellence Award in recognition of the research-based natural resource education she consistently delivers to youth of all ages throughout the state.





\* On Jan. 3, 1952, Sgt. Joe Friday's police drama "Dragnet" comes to television. A popular radio series, it became one of the first TV series filmed in Hollywood, instead of New York, and began a long line of crime and police dramas.

\* On Dec. 31, 1972, Roberto Clemente, future Hall of Fame baseball player, is killed when the cargo plane in which he is traveling crashes off Puerto Rico. Clemente was on his way to deliver relief supplies to Nicaragua following a devastating earthquake.

\* On Jan. 2, 1981, the so-called Yorkshire Ripper, Peter Sutcliffe, is finally caught by British police. For five years, investigators had pursued the serial killer who terrorized Northern England. Sutcliffe had been interviewed nine times but always convinced detectives that he wasn't involved. He finally confessed when confronted with evidence.

I have been watching the new jail go up in Oregon since the ground-breaking in April of 2019.

I wrote quite a few stories about the new facility before that event more than a year and a half ago even took place. Stories about how bad the current jail was. Stories about why the new jail was needed. Stories about the County Board approving the project. Stories about the City of Oregon fighting the project (well, a road closure). Public meetings, public disagreements, threats of lawsuits.

There were many stories. But earlier this month, there was a ribbon cutting at the new jail, officially called the Judicial Center Annex. It is right there, smack dab in the middle of town – just what certain council members feared.

The building itself, however, is certainly not an eyesore. In fact, I think it fits quite well with its surroundings. It is obviously perfect with its partner, the Judicial Center.

No, I wouldn't want to live right behind it, but the

county is buying up those homes so they can be razed.

As I toured the new facility, I thought of one person – Kim Gouker. Kim was the County Board Chairman who championed the new jail more than anyone, in my estimation. He was there at the ground-breaking, shoveling dirt with other officials. I thought he earned that moment, because he was the one who faced some pretty angry crowds before the jail was built.

I remember a meeting in Oregon, when Kim was pelted with angry questions from people about the proposed building. Yes, some people were polite, but there were some unhinged moments, I thought. But Kim just calmly answered the questions. He had an answer for everything and knew the facts down to the smallest detail. You could argue with him, but you could not stump him.

Sadly, Kim was not at the ribbon cutting, having died suddenly on Sept. 10, 2019. As I wrote in this space the week after his death, I always liked Kim because he was available for questions, did not dodge tough ones and was no blowhard. He cared about public service and Ogle County.

I admired that. I can tell you I have covered many, many officials on the local, state and federal level. Many of them only care about themselves and a few rich constituents. Seriously.

Kim was mentioned in passing at the ribbon cutting, but I think he deserved more than a few remarks. He was a real champion of the project – the face of the project, really – at a time of very heated opposition. Some of you may not remember how rough it got, but I read the letters of opposition to the new jail that ran in this fine newspaper. They were plentiful and pretty personal at times.

But Kim didn't let is phase him that I saw. Maybe it did in private, but not in public. That takes a lot of guts – something we need in our elected officials.

It seems to me there should be a plaque somewhere on or in the new annex with Gouker's name. No, he didn't pay for it – the taxpayers of Ogle County did. Well, Kim was one of those so I suppose he did pay for some of it.

But he, and other County Board members, did the work of getting this controversial and much-needed building built. For better or worse, during those very difficult months before the project go off the ground, Kim was the general leading the county's charge for the new jail. That should be remembered.

# Some tips to stay safe driving during the winter months

SPRINGFIELD – As bitter cold creeps into Illinois, the state's frontline weather responders remind motorists that preparation can help take the bite out of winter this season.

The Illinois Department of Transportation, Illinois State Police and the Illinois Tollway encourage motorists to prepare for wintry driving conditions and remember: "Winter Weather - Get it Together." "Winter weather can be unpredictable in Illinois, but preparation today will make a safer tomorrow," said Illinois Transportation Secretary Randy Blankenhorn. "Drivers should start easing into those winter driving behaviors now. Our snowand-ice teams are ready, as always, to make this a safe, successful winter driving season."

Throughout the winter, especially during adverse conditions, motorists should practice basic winter driving skills and build extra time into their schedules. As part of the "Winter Weather – Get it Together" campaign, all travelers are encouraged to follow these simple rules and tips during the coming months:

• Always wear a seat belt. It's the law in Illinois.

• Slow down. Slower speeds, slower acceleration, slower steering and slower

braking all are required in winter driving conditions.

Drop it and drive. Put down the handheld devices – it, too, is the law in Illinois.
Don't crowd the plow. A snowplow operator's field of vision is restricted. You may see them, but they may not see you.

• Avoid using cruise control in snow and ice.

• Watch out for black ice on roads that appear clear but can be treacherous.

• Be especially careful approaching intersections, ramps, bridges and shady areas. All are prone to icing.

• Do not travel during bad weather unless absolutely necessary. If you do have to make a trip, check the forecast and make sure someone is aware of your travel route. Consider taking public transportation if it is an option.

• Prepare an emergency kit that contains jumper cables, flares or reflectors, windshield washer fluid, a small ice scraper, traction material, blankets, non-perishable food and a first-aid kit.

• Carry a cell phone and a car charger in case of emergency.

• Follow Scott's Law. Slow down and move over for stopped emergency, construction and maintenance vehicles. • For a list of suggested maintenance for your car, visit the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration's winter driving website.

"Winter weather causes extremely dangerous driving with black ice and white out conditions," said ISP Director Leo P. Schmitz. "Plan ahead by checking your windshield wipers, vehicle fluid levels, proper tire inflation and tread depth. Remember to avoid unnecessary lane changes and as always, reduce your speed and increase following distances. Don't crowd the plow. Give them room to work. A snowplow operator's field of vision is restricted. You may see them, but they may not see you."

Before leaving the house, drivers are encouraged to check GettingAroundIIlinois.com for continually updated information on winter road conditions, weather radars, road and bridge closures and other traffic-related information. The site was recently redesigned in a mobile-friendly format providing a more convenient way to access important information quickly. The winter road conditions map gives travelers the ability to zoom in to their location, travel route or destination and get realtime road conditions. At any time, motorists can check travel conditions by calling 1-800-452-IDOT (4368) or 1-800-TOLL-FYI.

# State encourages people to prepare for winter weather

SPRINGFIELD - While the official start of winter is not for several weeks, those in Illinois know that winter weather is inevitable.

Knowing what to do before a winter storm strikes can provide peace of mind and ultimately impact how well we respond and recover from any winter storm. To help Illinois residents be prepared for winter weather, the Illinois Emergency Management Agency (IEMA) and National Weather Service (NWS) developed a Winter Weather Preparedness Guide to help families prepare for extreme cold, snow and ice.


"Being unprepared for winter weather is not only inconvenient, but it can be dangerous," said IEMA Director Alicia Tate-Nadeau. "We are encouraging all Illinoisans to take a few minutes to put together your home and vehicle emergency supply kits and review the steps you should take to stay safe during hazardous winter weather.

A study published in 2020 by the University of Illinois Chicago found that nearly 95-percent of temperature related deaths in Illinois were due to cold weather. According to the NWS, the coldest temperature on record occurred on January 31, 2019 when the mercury dropped to negative 38 degrees near Mt.



Carroll in Carroll County. The previous record of negative 36 degrees was set in 1999

long can cause serious health problems. Hypothermia, or a drop in the body's core temperature, does not require sub-arctic temperatures and can set in

when you are indoors and outdoors. Hypothermia is especially dangerous and can be fatal if not detected promptly and treated properly. Frostbite occurs when your extremities (fingers, toes, nose, and ears) are exposed to cold weather. The skin may become stiff and numb leading to severe tissue damage. Frostbite can permanently damage the body, and severe cases can lead to amputation.


Take precautions when working outside

'Many Illinois workers, such as first-responders, public works crews and construction workers, will have to brave the outdoor elements this winter to do their jobs." said Illinois Department of Labor Director Michael Kleinik. "It is vital for these workers to prepare ahead for severe conditions. Proper clothing is a must but making sure your body is ready for the added stress is also important."

Hospital emergency rooms see an increase in cardiac incidents each winter. The frigid cold causes your body to go into protection mode, narrowing blood vessels. That can increase strain on the heart for those doing hard physical labor. Preventative maintenance is a good idea. Medical professionals encourage people who must work outside regularly in the winter weather consider scheduling a physical exam before that winter

work begins.

Common sense and self-awareness are the keys to winter weather safety. Workers should know the signs of hypothermia, not push their bodies to an extreme, layer clothing and make sure they have plenty of fluids to avoid dehydra-

tion. Recognize home heating dangers

Every year, more than 400 people die in the U.S. from accidental carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning. CO is found in fumes produced any time you burn fuel in cars or trucks, small engines, stoves, lanterns, grills, fireplaces, gas ranges, or furnaces. CO can build up indoors and poison people and animals who breathe it.

"Heating equipment is one of the leading causes of home fire deaths with half of home heating fires occurring during the months of December, January and February. That is why it's so important to have your furnace, wood burning stoves, fireplaces and chimneys inspected and cleaned by licensed professionals every year. Test all smoke and CO alarms in the homes monthly and replace expired or broken alarms. Having these heating devices checked and serviced will help prevent fires and tragedies from occurring in our communities this winter," said State Fire Marshal Matt Perez.

Ice and snow, take it slow Preparing for winter also means adjusting your driving habits. Snowy or ice-coated roads and reduced visibility due to fog or blowing snow results in thousands of motor vehicle crashes every year in Illinois. Many of these crashes can be avoided by slowing down on city streets, rural roads and highways. Traffic studies have shown that many times, minor accumulations of snow or ice on roads can be just as dangerous for motorists as major snowstorms.

"As we head into winter, the preparations and planning you do today can save your life in the months ahead," said Acting Illinois Transportation Secretary Omer Osman. "Pack an emergency kit to store in your vehicle. Build extra time in your schedules if you are driving this winter. Give our plows and workers room to do their jobs. And always be asking yourself when the forecast calls for snow and ice: Is this trip really necessary?"

# Make sure to shovel snow safely this winter

The beauty of freshly fallen snow is undeniable. Such beauty compels millions of people across the globe to ski and snowboard each winter, while millions more enjoy simply looking out their windows at snowcovered landscapes.

If it was as convenient as it is beautiful, snow would likely be welcomed with open arms whenever the local weatherperson includes it in his or her forecast. But heavy snowfall can be inconvenient, making it difficult to travel and even creating more work for individuals responsible for shoveling their driveways and walkways.

Shoveling snow can increase a person's risk for injury, and some may be surprised to learn just how frequently such injuries happen. The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission notes that, in 2018, more than 137,000 people needed medical assistance for injuries that happened while shoveling snow or using snowblowers.

Sprains and strains in the back and shoulders are the most common injuries when shoveling snow. But people also can suffer lacerations and injuries related to below-freezing temperatures when shoveling snow. The American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons recommends people keep these safety precautions in mind when shoveling snow this winter.

• Stretch before shoveling. Just like you would do before exercising in a gym, stretch prior to picking up your snow shovel. Warm up your muscles with some light exercise for 10 minutes to reduce your risk of sprains, strains and muscle tears.

• Stay hydrated and take frequent breaks. The AAOS notes that snow shoveling and snow blowing are aerobic activities. Such activities require participants to be hydrated. In addition, taking frequent breaks can help prevent injuries.

• Avoid shoveling snow if you're at risk for heart attack. Some people should avoid shoveling snow entirely. According to the Harvard Medical School, researchers correlated hospital admissions and deaths due to heart attack the day after it snowed in Canada between 1981 and 2014. Researchers found that the deeper the snow, the more men died of heart attacks. In fact, researchers found that there was a 34 percent increase in heart attack deaths the day after an eight-inch snowfall, and those rates increased when snowfall increased. Most deaths were men, but both men and women who are at risk of heart attack should avoid shoveling snow, particularly after heavy snowfall. Adults who are unsure of their heart health should consult with their physicians prior to shoveling snow.

• Use the right equipment. Ergonomic snow shovels can make shoveling less taxing, reducing your risk for sprains and strains. Spacing hands on the tool grip can increase leverage, making shoveling easier and less likely to lead to injury.

• Pushing snow instead of lifting it. The AAOS recommends pushing rather than lifting snow when possible. If snow must be lifted, squat with your legs, knees bent and back straight. When lifting, lift with your legs and do not bend at the waist. Scoop small amounts of snow at a time and walk to where you want to dump. The AAOS warns against holding shovels full of snow with arms outstretched, as doing so puts too much weight on the spine. Snow should not be thrown over the shoulder, as such a technique requires a twisting motion that puts stress on the back. In addition, the AAOS notes that heavy wet snow should be removed in pieces and not all at once.

Anyone can get injured while shoveling snow. Such injuries are preventable when certain safety measures are taken.

# Prep your vehicle for winter

Winter weather causes many people to retreat indoors until the spring thaw. However, for those who embrace the cooler temperatures or find that life must go on despite snow and ice, taking inventory of their vehicles is a must before the first snowflakes start to fall.

Tire care is an especially important area of vehicle maintenance. The tire experts at Michelin say that regular tires may be ineffective for winter driving. Summer tires are made from materials that are optimized for warm conditions. When the mercury drops, these same materials can harden, reducing their ability to grip the road. That lack of traction can be compounded by the presence of snow or ice. Even all-season tires, which are designed to be driven year-round, can be insufficient in severe weather conditions. Winter tires can help drivers safely navigate winter roadways.

Bridgestone Tires says that having the right snow tires matters when driving in winter weather conditions. It's important to look for tires that can disperse water sufficiently and also grip the road. Snow tires are designed to remain softer and more flexible to conform to the road better in cold conditions. Some winter tires are even studded to provide better traction.

Unfortunately, even the best winter tires cannot provide perfect traction on slippery roadways. That is why it is essential — in conjunction with the use of winter tires or snow chains — to modify driving techniques to navigate safely.

• Drive slowly. Slow down on winter roads. Allow a greater distance for stopping than for dry conditions. Slippery conditions can make it more challenging to stop, and excessive speeds can make the situation worse.

• Shift into low gear. On hills, rely on low gears to maximize traction to travel up and down hills. This can minimize skids or sliding.

• Get the vehicle a tuneup. In addition to tires, be sure the braking system, battery and other major components of the vehicle are in good working order.

• Replace windshield wipers. Reduced visibility can compromise the safety of drivers and their passengers.
