Tentative multiplier announced

State sets the 2020 property assessment factor for County

SPRINGFIELD – Ogle County has been issued a tentative property assessment equalization factor of 1.0000, according to David Harris, Director of the Illinois Department of Revenue.

The property assessment equalization factor, often called the "multiplier," is the method used to achieve uniform property assessments among counties, as required by law. This equalization is particularly important because some of the state's 6,600 local taxing districts overlap into two or more counties (e.g. school districts, junior college districts, fire protection districts). If there were no equalization among counties, substantial inequities among taxpayers with comparable

properties would result.

State law requires property in Illinois to be assessed at one-third (1/3) of its market value. Farm property is assessed differently, with farm homesites and dwellings subject to regular assessing and equalization procedures, but with farmland and farm buildings assessed according to standards based on productivity.

The equalization factor is determined annually for each county by comparing the sales price of individual properties sold over the past three years to the assessed value placed on those properties by the county supervisor of assessments/county assessor.

If this three-year average level of assessment is one-third of market value, the equalization factor will be one (1). If the average level of assessment is greater than one-third of market value, the equalization factor will be less than one (1). And if the average level of assessment is less than one-third of market value, the equalization factor will be greater than one (1).

Assessments in Ogle County are at 33.23 percent of market value, based on sales of properties in 2017, 2018, and 2019.

The equalization factor currently being assigned is for 2020 taxes, payable in 2021.

The tentative factor is subject to change (1) if the County Board of Review takes actions which significantly affect the county assessments or (2) if local officials or others can present data showing that the Department of Revenue's estimates of the average level of assessments in the county should be adjusted. A public hearing on the tentative multiplier will be held between 20 and 30 days after the tentative factor is published in a newspaper of general circulation within the county.

A change in the equalization factor does not mean total property tax bills will increase or decrease. Tax bills are determined by local taxing bodies when they request money each year to provide services to local citizens. If the amount requested by local taxing districts is not greater than the amount received in the previous year, then total property taxes will not increase even if assessments may

The assessed value of an individual property determines what portion of the tax burden a specific taxpayer will assume. That individual's portion of tax responsibility is not changed by the multiplier.

Christmas Day apartment fire displaces people

ROCHELLE - A Christmas day fire in Rochelle left nearly 10 people displaced by the time firefighters cleared the scene.

No one suffered any injuries in the fire located at 128 North Main Street - a building known as the De Los and Ogle Hotel and Apartments.

Flames were noticed at approximately 2 p.m. when firefighters were called to the scene. Upon arrival, heavy smoke was evident from the second floor and attic area on the south side of the building.

The fire was located between the walls and in the ceiling area. Crews worked to remove siding to extinguish the flames before the fire was able to spread to the attic area of the building.

The exact cause is yet to be determined; however, it could be electrical or an overheated heating system. Two apartments located in the building suffered fire

and water damage. Departments responding to the scene included Ro-

chelle, Steward, Flagg Center, Hillcrest, Creston, DeKalb, Stillman Valley, Lynn-Scott-Rock, Malta and Ashton.

The Red Cross was called to assist residents displaced by the fire.





Instinct vs. reality: The hidden unity in American political life

Joe Biden says he wants to unite America. It'll be a tough job, if the commonly accepted thinking is right about us being more divided than ever. But there's more and less – to our political polarization than meets the

We all seem to need, or at least want, an enemy. Social psychologist Henri Tajfel demonstrated this in a series of experiments. His subjects ended up discriminating against each other over trivialities like their preference for one painting over another, or just the toss of a coin.

Divisiveness is in our genes, says Nicholas Christakis in his recent book, "Blueprint: The Evolutionary Origins of a Good Society." Hostility toward outsiders enabled our human

and pre-human ancestors to stick together in the struggle for survival. Even now, this deeply rooted instinct tends to overwhelm our more advanced reasoning powers.

This shows up in the way Republicans and Democrats see each other today. Researchers with the civic organization More in Common recently created statements based on what over 2,000 participants from both parties said they believed. Then they asked them to estimate how many people from the other side would agree with them.

Most Republicans and Democrats predicted that their political opponents would disagree with the statements they generated, while in almost every case a majority actually agreed with them. They were also way off the mark in estimating how many people from the opposite side held "extreme" views (55 percent vs the true figure of 30 percent).

The more politically involved the participants were, the more likely they were to make these errors. Also, the more information they consumed from the news and social media, the less realistic they were about the other side. Users of the most liberal and conservative news outlets - think Rush Limbaugh and Sean Hannity on the right and Slate and the Huffington Post on the left - displayed the biggest gaps between perception and reality.

Our misunderstandings about each other take a toll at a personal level. The more inaccurate people in the study were at predicting the true beliefs of their opponents, the more likely they were to describe them as "hateful," ignorant," and "bigoted." It shows in the demonization and spite that often dominate headlines, airwaves, and saddest of all, relationships among family and friends.

That's the bad news.

The good news is that, as the More in Common study shows, we're more united than we think we are.

Opinion polls expose a solid core of Americans who consider themselves to be moderates. A 2019 survey by the New Center reported that this group is larger than either liberals or conservatives. They reject extreme positions from the left and right on abortion, guns, and religion. The poll also found widespread agreement on issues such as health care, free speech and foreign affairs.

We can strengthen and build on this broad political center. We can, for example, weaken the influence that the right and left wings exert over their respective parties through reforms such as open primaries, ranked choice voting, and non-partisan redistricting. These and other measures will require us to look beyond the issues of the day, and focus more on what makes for a healthy

We can also tune out news sources that promote hostility and division. Most important, we can work to keep our political disagreements in perspective. Divisiveness is a powerful but untrustworthy instinct. The values and beliefs that we share are greater and more important than our differences.
