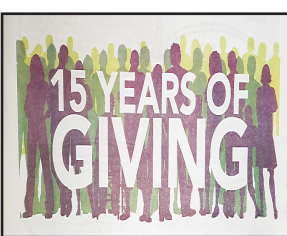

Going remote

At-home learning begins Nov. 30

ROCHELLE — Parents of students in the Rochelle Elementary District and Rochelle Township High School were notified Friday afternoon of plans for both districts to transition to fully remote learning following the Thanksgiving break.

In a letter sent out by Rochelle Superintendent of Schools Jason Harper, plans were outlined for students beginning Nov. 30 and continuing through Jan. 19.

“On Nov. 3, the Ogle County Health Department recommended that all Ogle County schools transition to remote learn-



ing from Nov. 30 through Jan. 18 to help stop the spread of COVID-19 and decrease the strain on our regional health care system. Since receiving the recommendation, we have been in close contact with the representatives from the OCHD, IEMA

and regional hospitals to understand external community trends. We have also been in communication with the board of education, union leadership, parents and superintendents of other districts.”

Tree sales begin Nov. 27

ROCHELLE – The Friday after Thanksgiving is not just for holiday shopping but the first day to purchase a live Christmas tree from the Knights of Columbus in Rochelle.

Beginning Friday, Nov. 27 at noon, the Saint Patrick Church Knights of Columbus will sell Balsam Fir trees and wreaths for the sixth year.

Trees sales are held at the St. Patrick's Education Center, 903 Caron Road. Sizes vary, ranging from 6-to-7 feet, 7-to-8 feet, and 8-to-9 feet with prices ranging from \$45 to \$55 respectively. Wreaths cost \$30 each.

A total of 110 trees and 25 wreaths are available this year and area available

until Sunday, Dec. 20 or until sold out. Sale hours are Thursdays and Fridays from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m., Saturdays from 12 p.m. to 7 p.m. and Sundays from 12 p.m. to 5 p.m.

“Last year we had the same amount and sold out in two or three weeks,” said Kirk Reinhart, financial secretary and sale organizer.

The trees were delivered on Thursday, Nov. 19 from the McCluskey Tree Farm in northern Wisconsin.

All of the funds earned through the sale of the wreaths and trees will be put back into the Knights of Columbus and used for future local events and fundraisers.

Virus cases on the rise

County health administrator:
COVID numbers 'concerning'

OREGON – COVID-19 cases are up in Ogle County and there is no immediate end in sight, the county's public health administrator told the county board.

Kyle Auman told the board at its regular meeting on Nov. 17, that there were 47 new cases that day.

“We're seeing roughly 50 cases if not more, coming into Ogle County every single day,” he said. Auman said that the cases in Illinois are the highest they have been since the start of the pandemic earlier this year.

In Illinois, there has been a total of nearly 600,000 COVID-19 cases and more than 11,000 deaths. Nationally, there has been more than 11 million cases and nearly 250,000 deaths.

In Region 1, which includes Ogle County, the overall positivity rate is about 20 percent. In Ogle County, it is 17 percent. But Auman said those numbers are “definitely concerning.”

Deaths are also up in the county, he said. There were two additional deaths in Ogle County reported on Nov. 17. As of Nov. 19, the total was 18.

“The death rate is definitely continuing to grow in Ogle County,” Auman said.

Auman said the positivity rate means that one in five people you come in contact with daily could potentially have COVID-19.

And the holidays could make that worse, he said, with traditional family

gatherings, students back from college going out into social settings and possible holiday shopping.

“We only believe this is going to grow though the holiday season,” Auman said.

He said during the holidays people must wear their masks, keep socially distanced, limit contact with others and wash their hands regularly.

Auman said that all of Illinois was moving to Tier 3 Coronavirus protections on Friday, Nov. 20. That means – among other things – that there will be no inside service for bars and restaurants, casinos will close and capacity at businesses will be limited.

Auman said one problem is that as the virus situation has continued, people are being less and less compliant with the contact tracing program. That is making it difficult to track and contain the virus.

He said hospitalizations due to COVID-19 are up locally and across the state. Auman also said his department is currently working on outbreaks in places like schools and long-term care facilities.

Board member Skip Kenney asked Auman how much faith he has in the national COVID numbers, inferring they might not be as high as reported.

Auman said he is confident the numbers are solid, as all health departments report the numbers in the same way.

“I have no reason to believe the national numbers are not accurate,” Auman said.

The transaction created new economies of scale for the city and provided infrastructure needed by large manufacturers to expand or establish a presence in the region.

“Supporting each other is what Rochelle is all about,” said mayor John Bearrows. “I am so pleased we could come to an agreement that benefits the community as a whole.”

In addition to the contribution to the Rochelle Area Community Foundation, ComEd also contributed Community Development

dollars to assist in economic growth. Those funds were utilized to establish the small business grant programs to assist owners through the closures related to COVID-19.

Don't let your guard down, keep your mask up

Rochelle Community Hospital participating in statewide public education campaign

ROCHELLE—With COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations surging in our region, Rochelle Community Hospital, a member of the Illinois Health and Hospital Association, is participating in a new statewide public education campaign—“Don't let your guard down. Keep your mask up—to communicate the importance of taking reasonable precautions to curb the spread of the deadly coronavirus.

“In our region, we are seeing hospitalizations reach new highs just before the holiday season when friends and families look forward to getting together,” RCH chief executive officer Gregg Olson said. “Just this week, COVID hospitalizations in this area surpassed the previous peak from the spring. RCH is seeing a surge in COVID testing and increased hospitalizations as well. We can rein in this virus, but all of us must act now and take the following effective steps to protect our families, our communities and ourselves.”

Steps

Wear your mask.
Watch your distance—stay at least 6 feet from others.
Wash your hands frequently.

Avoid travel or having people in your homes who have traveled.

“COVID fatigue and a desire to return to normalcy are certainly understandable, especially eight months into the pandemic,” added Olson. “But letting our guard down will help fuel the increase in cases and hospitalizations, and will result in lives lost. Let's redouble our efforts together.”

Doctors, nurses and healthcare providers on the front lines are asking all Illinois residents to help stop the spread. “We know this is particularly challenging as we approach the holidays,” added Olson. “We all want to celebrate with family and friends, but we need to carefully consider our choices. The decisions we make now will help us get control of this second surge, protecting the health of our families, ourselves and our friends.”

Olson also urged everyone to get a flu shot.

“While a flu shot will not protect you against COVID-19, avoiding the flu will help you keep your lungs and immune system healthier during this pandemic. It's about keeping your body's defenses as prepared as possible to fight the virus,” Olson said. “If

Ribbon cutting for new jail in Oregon Dec. 3

OREGON — The Judicial Center annex, the name for the new Ogle County jail, will have a ribbon cutting and open house on Dec. 3 at 12:30 p.m.

The 154-bed facility will house both male and female inmates. The building, which broke ground in April 2019, is about 41,000 square feet. It is located on Sixth Street and Illinois Route 64.

The project cost is projected to be \$23 million, which is under budget, according to Don Griffin, chairman of the Long Range Planning Committee and an Ogle

County Board member.

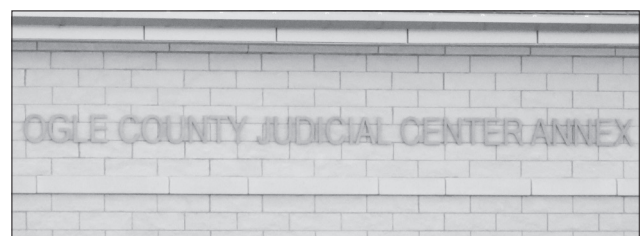
He said there could still be further savings as the project wraps up. The facility is expected to be up and operational by the middle of December.

The project includes a Sally port that will connect the new jail with the Judicial Center, allowing for the safe transportation of inmates. That feature led to tension between the City of Oregon and the county, as the city of Oregon had to agree to close a portion of Sixth Street for the project.

Byron Museum District receives \$232,000 state grant

SPRINGFIELD — Gov. JB Pritzker today announced 43 Illinois museums that attract more than 16 million visitors annually will receive \$22.8 million in state capital investments to improve their facilities and develop new exhibits.

The investments are through the Illinois Public Museum Capital Grants Program, funded through Gov. Pritzker's Rebuild Illinois multi-year state capital program.

The Byron Museum District got \$232,000 for its Underground Railroad Station.

"Our public museums take tell the story of Illinois, from the founding and cultural heritage of

local communities, to our place in the world today," Pritzker said. "This grant program is making investments in local museums that will allow them to attract more visitors, to foster important research, and to tell important stories for generations to come."

The Illinois Public Museum Capital Grants Program, administered by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR), is open to any museum operated by local government or located on municipally-owned land.

The maximum grant award for the projects announced today was \$750,000 and matching

funds are required in many cases based on museum attendance levels.

"Museums located throughout Illinois receiving funding through this program are in-

vesting in exciting new exhibits and facilities improvements that will help them meet the interests of Illinois citizens and

visitors of all ages," said IDNR Director Colleen Callahan. "The museums will provide opportunities to experience the art,

anthropology, history, culture, and natural history of their communities, as well as our state and nation."

Insight sought on first responder post-retirement career choices

ELGIN — Firefighting and law enforcement professionals typically retire at a younger age than those in other lines of work, and a new survey is attempting to gather more information on the topic to assist future retirees.

The Illinois Public Pension Fund Association (IPPFA) is asking retired police and fire personnel to visit www.ippfa.org and take the survey before Jan. 4, 2021. The organization hopes the survey will help to better determine how many of these public safety employees work following their police or

fire retirements, the types of jobs these retirees take, and how long they keep their post-retirement employment.

"Because fire and police retirement ages are justifiably younger than workers in other pension plans, greater opportunity exists for these individuals to work full or part time during the early years of retirement," said IPPFA President James McNamée. "The survey goal is to put together an information piece and training material to assist future retirees."

The IPPFA will incor-

porate the survey data into future training sessions and modules in its Psfiteducational program.

There are more than 12,000 retired firefighters and 21,000 retired law enforcement professionals in Illinois.

The IPPFA was founded in 1985 as a not-for-profit organization whose mandate was to educate public pension fund trustees. In 2009 the IPPFA became the primary education provider for public pension fund trustees in the state of Illinois, and its members manage more than \$18 billion in pension assets.

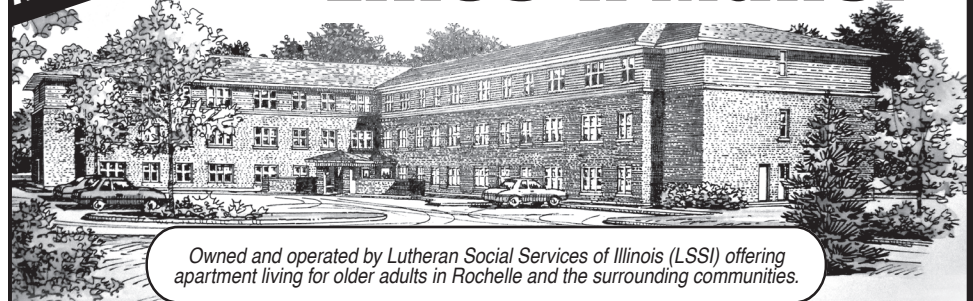

"Through all these conversations it is clear: the spread of COVID19, the strain on our regional healthcare system, our students and COVID19-related absences, and other valuable local and regional data points are all

increasing. I feel that we have a responsibility to our students, employees, and community to ensure we are also doing our part to implement COVID19 mitigation strategies — including adhering to the OCHD's recommendation.

The Rochelle schools will be following the OCHD recommendation to move to all remote learning from Monday, Nov. 30 through Monday, Jan. 18. We will reopen schools on Tuesday, Jan. 19 unless we cannot do so safely or there is a directive we cannot do so.

Tuesday, Nov. 24 will be our last day of in-person instruction. We plan to return to school on Tuesday, Jan. 19. Before Nov. 24, the school district will:

Communicate a finalized remote learning plan for each grade level and building. Specific classroom schedules and Zoom/Google links will be distributed by teachers, and

Focus on preparing your student(s) to be successful in remote learning by re-

viewing critical learning expectations and technology skills, as well as getting necessary learning materials home.

Between now and Monday, Nov. 30, we are asking parents to:

Secure childcare for your student(s),

Plan for increased meals in the household for your student(s),

Secure a consistent connection to the internet, and

Confirm your phone number(s) and email address(es) are accurate with building secretaries.

We will communicate additional details about our transition to remote learning, including drive through meal pick up and wifi bus schedules, through text message, email, district website, and Facebook. Many important communication pieces will be coming out in the coming days."

Parents are asked to contact building principals directly for specific information about logistics that will impact specific students.

Keep momentum going - Shop Small Business Saturday

IT'S easy to forget, but small business optimism was historically strong heading into 2020.

COVID-19, of course, changed things. Social distancing meant retailers and restaurants had to change how they did business. Some had little choice but to close temporarily, and some of those businesses will never reopen.

That's why we need to shop local on Small Business Saturday and throughout the holiday season.

Small Business Saturday, the Saturday after Thanksgiving, was created 10 years ago in response to another crisis, the Great Recession. The goal was to get people to bypass the national chains on the first weekend of the shopping season and support locally-owned stores and restaurants.

And it worked. Last year, Americans spent a record \$19.6 billion on Small Business Saturday, according to a survey from American Express and my association, the National Federation of Independent Business.

We need to try to keep the momentum going.

Small business owners are doing everything they can to get through this, but it won't be easy. NFIB surveyed its members nationwide last month and found that 19 percent of them think they'll have to close in seven months to a year unless the local economy improves; 15 percent said three to six months, while 3 percent warned they might be able to last only a month or two.

And when we asked how long they thought their businesses could survive under current economic conditions, 19 percent said seven months to a year, while 15 percent said three to six months and 3 percent said they might have to close in a month or two.

We can't afford to let that happen.

Small business is the heart and soul of Illinois's economy, accounting for 99.6 percent of all businesses in the state and a net increase of 20,410 jobs statewide in 2019, according to the Small Business Administration.

We need small businesses, and small businesses need us.

NFIB is asking Congress to approve additional financial assistance for small businesses, but there are little things you and I can do that can make a big difference:

We can shop local and shop small – in person, by phone, or online – and take advantage of local delivery or curbside pickup.

We can also buy gift cards for local businesses. Supporting them now helps them stay in business so we can use the cards later.

Supporting local shops and restaurants throughout the holiday season and beyond will lessen the financial impact this outbreak is having on our communities. Small business is the engine that drives our economy, so, when we help small businesses, we help everyone.

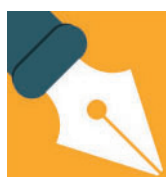

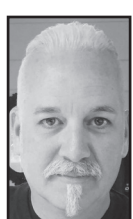



VFW offering free Thanksgiving meals

ROCHELLE — Just like many things this year, the Rochelle VFW Post 3878 Thanksgiving dinner will be a little different.

For more than 50 years post members have been serving members of the community who either need a place to go for Thanksgiving or have no way of making one for themselves or their family at home. This year, dinner will be served as carryout or delivery. Deliveries will begin around 10 a.m. and carryouts will be available until approximately 1 p.m. on Thanksgiving day.

“We won’t be offering

in-house dining this year but will still be providing meals for carryout and delivery,” Post Commander Bill Bumgarner said.

The meals will include all of the aspects of a traditional Thanksgiving dinner — turkey and ham, mashed potatoes and gravy, a vegetable, stuffing, dinner rolls and a dessert.

The VFW typically serves more than 200 guests each year with the majority being deliveries.

“We will still be welcoming volunteers to help prepare the meals,” Bumgarner said. “Volunteers will need to have their temperature taken and provide their name and phone number in case

we need to contact them later.”

There is no cost to anyone for dinner.

All of the food for the meals is provided by the City of Rochelle and organizations within the community.

Bumgarner explained that when meals are delivered, the volunteer making the deliver will ring the doorbell [or knock] and make sure that someone is at the door before placing the meal(s) on the porch and backing away.

“We want to limit contact as much as possible,” he said.

While the dinners are provided to anyone in need for free, the Rochelle VFW Post 3878



is always accepting donations of any amount. Anyone who would like to donate can do so by stopping in to the VFW

post located at 318 4th Ave. in Rochelle.

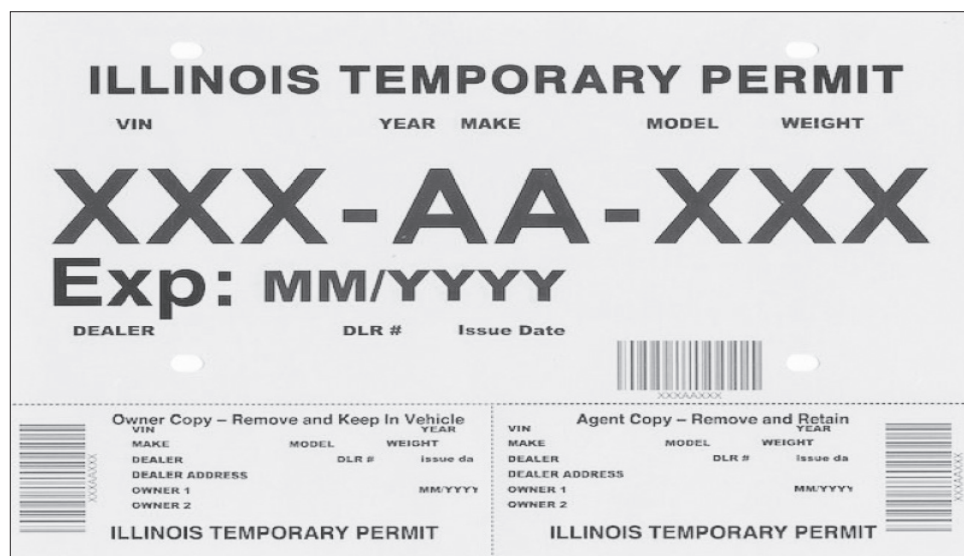

Secretary White upgrades temporary license plates

SPRINGFIELD — New temporary license plates more durable and provide more information to law enforcement.

Illinois Secretary of State Jesse White announced that his office has upgraded temporary license plates (also known as TRPs or temporary registration permits), making them more durable and providing more information to law enforcement in an effort to continue to combat fraud and criminal activity.

“This newly designed temporary license plate continues to give law enforcement the tools to quickly and accurately identify the owner of a vehicle,” said White. “Ill-



inois was the first state in the nation to connect temporary license plates with LEADS (Law Enforcement Agency Data System), and we continue to make upgrades to our program and to the

temporary license plate itself.”

The newly designed temporary license plate features a more durable material that is thicker and will better withstand car washes and inclement

weather, ensuring that the information on the temporary license plate is easily visible to law enforcement. The new temporary license plates also include a bar code and enlarged expiration

date, as well as identification including the vehicle’s VIN, year, make and model and the name of the automobile dealer that issued the temporary license plate. Like the old temporary license plates, the new ones will be affixed to the rear back license plate holder.

In addition, the issuance process of temporary license plates has been upgraded to require that applications for title and registration are completed before an automobile dealer may issue a temporary license plate. This change improves consumer protection and helps combat fraud, ensuring automobile dealers and remitters apply for title and registration be-

fore a temporary license plate can be printed. This step guarantees that ownership of the vehicle will be properly transferred in a timely fashion to the purchaser.

The newly designed temporary license plates — which are being issued statewide at all Driver Services facilities as well as the 10,048 automobile dealers, currency exchanges and remitters — continue to give law enforcement the ability to access vehicle information immediately through LEADS.

Approximately 500,000 temporary license plates are issued each year. There are more than 10.2 million vehicles in Illinois.

Importance of shopping local

THE importance of shopping locally has been emphasized with increasing urgency in recent years. 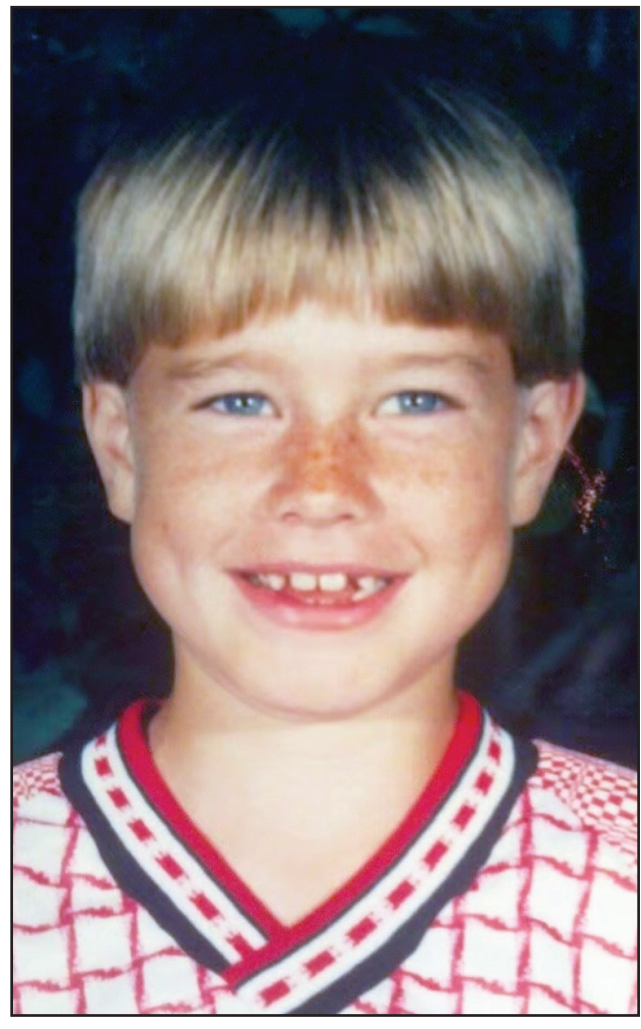

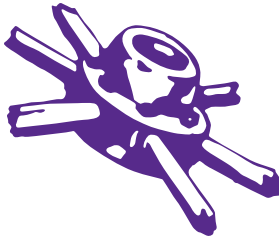

Huskies remain winless after loss to Ball State

Bowers throws for 300 yards, Collins scores twice for NIU

MUNCIE, Ind. — Tailback Erin Collins scored a pair of touchdowns and quarterback Ross Bowers threw for 300 yards on 27-of-40 passing as the Northern Illinois University Huskies put together their best performance of the season, but it was not enough to reclaim the Bronze Stalk Trophy as NIU fell to Ball State, 31-25, Wednesday night at Scheumann Stadium.

Ball State (2-1) used back-to-back scores in the second half to break a 14-14 tie and take a 28-14 lead, and got a boost from

its defense, which scored on a 71-yard interception return in the second quarter. The Huskies (0-3) twice led by seven points in the first half, but could not overcome a 14-point fourth-quarter deficit.

"We are fighting to get better," said NIU head coach Thomas Hammock. "Credit to Ball State, they are a veteran team. They have 23 seniors and we had six or seven true freshmen playing on defense most of the night. I liked the effort, I liked the energy, we gave ourselves a chance. I thought the defense con-

tained [Ball State] for the most part. We have to come up with a critical stop when we need it, and we can't give anybody anything. We have to figure out a way when you get up by seven points to find a way to go up by 14 or 10. We've got to find those moments."

Bowers' 300-yard game was the second of his NIU career and his 27 completions marked a career-high at NIU. Tyrice Richie recorded his second 100-yard receiving game of the season with a career high 11 catches for 108 yards. Freshman Harrison Way-

lee led NIU with 63 rushing yards on 17 carries.

Defensively, Jordan Gandy led the Huskies with 11 tackles while freshman Devin Lafayette's 10 stops were the Georgia native's career high. NIU had five tackles for loss and three sacks in the game.

Ball State looked to take its first lead of the game on the opening possession of the second half but were thwarted when NIU junior Dillon Thomas intercepted Drew Plitt in the end zone. The interception came after the Cardinals drove

to the NIU three-yard line. The Huskie offense, though, could not make anything happen and Ball State started from its 41 with 9:43 left in the third quarter. They proceeded to drive 59 yards in nine plays, with most of the yards coming via the rush. Caleb Huntley carried six times on the possession and scored from three yards out. He finished the game with 103 yards on 23 carries. A bad snap on the PAT left Ball State with a 20-14 lead with 5:12 on the clock.

After an exchange of punts, Ball State extended the lead to 28-14 with a five-play, 80-yard drive. The Cardinals used a big play — a 64-yard pass from Plitt to Yo'Heinz Tyler, who earned most of the yardage after the catch to put BSU on the NIU 13-yard line. Two plays later, Plitt hit Tyler for the seven-yard score and his two-yard PAT pass to Antwan Davis was good.

As they did all night, NIU answered. Bowers drove the Huskies down the field.

After an exchange of

A Bowers to Daniel Crawford completion gave the Huskies a conversion on third and 10, and he hit Trayvon Rudolph with a six-yard pass on fourth and three to give NIU

The Huskies were not done, though. Bowers completed passes to Cole Tucker and Richie before connecting with Rudolph for 25 yards to the Ball State 23. After a five-yard rush, Hammock elected to go for the field goal and John Richard-

son’s field goal was good from 41 yards out to pull the Huskies within six points.

Richardson got a nice bounce on his ensuing onside kick, but it fell into the hands of Ball State’s Chris Albright and the Cardinals ran out the clock.

NIU scored on its first possession of the game for the first time this season, driving 75 yards in seven plays and 2:56 to take a 7-0 lead. Bowers hit Richie for 17 yards to the corner of the end zone for the score, Richie’s first of the season. Waylee recorded a 28-yard rush on the second play of the drive.

Ball State drove to the NIU 26 on its ensuing possession, where the Huskie defense held and Knight’s 42-yard field goal was missed wide right.

The teams traded punts, with Matt Ferrence’s effort pinning Ball State on its four-yard line, where the NIU defense forced a three-and-out. The Huskies could not get anything going and returned the ball to BSU with 2:02 left in the quarter.

On second and 15 from the Ball State 45 after Pierce Oppong and Miles Baggett combined on a sack, BSU’s Tye Evans broke free for a 46-yard run to the NIU nine-yard line. Two plays later, Plitt hit Davis for a five-yard touchdown and the PAT tied the game at seven with 14:40 left in the half.

The Huskies responded with a six-play, 74-yard drive to take a 14-7 lead with 11:39 to play before half. A short pass to Rudolph turned into a 47-yard play and Bowers hit Daniel Crawford on a 21-yard reception to the 21. Erin Collins rushed for 11 yards on third and two from the 19 and scored from two yards out two plays later.

NIU got the ball back after the NIU defense came up with a big fourth down stop after BSU drove to the NIU 40-yard line. James Ester and Rashein Thomas combined on the fourth down tackle for loss and NIU took over with 8:15 left in the half.

After picking up a couple of first downs, including one when backup quarterback Andrew Haidet converted on fourth and one, Bowers was picked off by BSU’s Amechi Uzodinma, who returned the ball 71 yards for the score and a 14-14 halftime tie.

The Huskies drove to the Ball State 27 at the end of the half, but Richardson’s 45-yard field goal was wide left. NIU next faces Western Michigan on Saturday, Nov. 28 at 11 a.m. The game will be broadcast on ESPN+.

Graduation rate success continues

DEKALB — Eight Northern Illinois University athletics programs earned a perfect 100 percent Graduation Success Rate and 10 Huskie teams posted a GSR that ranked above the national average for their sport according to the GSR Report released Tuesday by the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA). GSR is the academic assessment tool used by the NCAA to measure a school’s ability to graduate student-athletes.

NIU’s overall GSR of 87 percent for freshmen who entered school between 2010-11 and 2013-14 continues a string of seven straight years when the Huskies’ GSR has averaged between 86-89 percent.



“To have this kind of sustained success in one of the most important metrics of academic success shows the commitment that our entire department has to graduating student-athletes,” said NIU Associate Vice-President and Director of Athletics Sean T. Frazier. “Our student-athletes are to be commended, as well as the coaches and staff, especially those in our Student-Athlete Academic Support Services (SAASS) unit. I also want to thank our donors. Their support enables us to provide NIU student-athletes

with the resources needed to succeed academically as well as athletically.”

The Huskie gymnastics team achieved a 100 percent GSR for the 13th consecutive season, the NIU women’s golf team had a 100 percent GSR for the 12th consecutive year while the Huskie women’s soccer and volleyball programs each both met the 100 percent mark for the seventh straight year. Women’s basketball earned its third straight perfect score, while men’s tennis and men’s golf have posted back-to-back 100 percent years. Women’s tennis saw its GSR improve by 11 points to reach 100 percent for the first time in five years and the eighth time overall.

In addition to women’s tennis, softball and women’s cross country/track & field saw their graduation success rates improve from a year ago. Overall, 96 percent of women student-athletes who entered Northern Illinois University between 2010-11 and 2013-14 have earned their degrees.

The Huskie football team’s GSR of 84 percent for the 2013 cohort is five points above the national average for football and four points higher than the FBS average. NIU Football’s Graduation Success Rate has topped 83 percent for nine straight years.

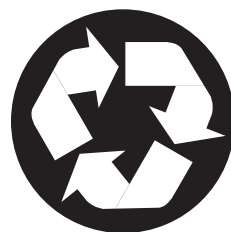

IHSA temporarily pauses sports and activities

Board of Directors to reconvene during update discussion next month

BLOOMINGTON — The Illinois High School Association (IHSA) Board of Directors met for a special virtual meeting on Thursday, Nov. 19, 2020, where the board provided an update on winter sports. To maintain compliance with the most recent mitigations issued by Gov. J.B. Pritzker that take effect on Nov. 20, the IHSA board issued guidance to pause all IHSA winter sports and activities by Nov. 20.

"All IHSA sports and activities will cease by Nov. 20 for what we hope is a short-term pause," said IHSA Executive Director Craig Anderson. "Given the rising COVID-19 cases in our state and region, we support the governor's mitigations and believe it is imperative for everyone in the state to do their part in following them so

that we can return to high school sports participation as soon as possible."

The board will revisit the status of winter sports at their update discussion on Dec. 2, and again at their regularly scheduled meeting on Dec. 14 if necessary.

"Taking into account the current state mitigations, the board believes that early to mid-December will be the most reasonable target to review the status of winter IHSA sports and activities," said Anderson. "The board is sensitive to the scheduling difficulties these delays create for athletic directors and coaches. However, our experiences this summer and fall lead us to believe that setting arbitrary start dates hinders the process even more. We realize it may seem redundant, but we have to preach patience

as we await more data and direction from the state. Despite the obstacles this unprecedented school year has presented, the board's vision to provide participation opportunities in all IHSA sports has not wavered."

The board was steadfast in their desire to remind all athletes and athletic programs that adhering to the mitigations is vital to the hopes of safely playing high school sports in Illinois as soon as possible.

"I believe there is a misconception that IHSA and non-school athletic programs have an adversarial relationship," said Anderson. "In my time at the IHSA, I have not found that to be the case at all. More so, I think there is a mutual respect for the opportunities that each provide for athletes. IHSA schools have been

exemplary in adhering to state regulations throughout this pandemic and we are calling upon non-school programs to hold themselves to that same standard. As school and non-school sports temporarily cease in Illinois, and throughout the Midwest, it is a great reminder that putting the health and safety of our fellow citizens at the forefront in the short-term will allow all levels of athletics to thrive in the long-term."

The board provided the following participation clarifications to member schools:

Start Date

Given the timing of the Governor's new mitigations, Nov. 16 will not be recognized as the start date of the winter season, regardless of whether winter sport teams conducted

any official tryouts or practices. A new start date will be established for each sport once winter sports can be conducted again.

Training

Conditioning and weight training before and after school are paused. Local schools will decide if conditioning and weight training programs that are a part of their academic curriculums continue or are ceased.

Open Gyms

Are paused and cannot be conducted at this time.

Outdoor Workouts: Outdoor workouts may be conducted in any sport in groups of 10 or less with masks and social distancing. Coaches are counted toward the 10. Use of sport-specific equipment is allowable with proper sanitizing practices.

Skill Work

Per Tier 3 Resurgence Mitigations and with school approval, one-on-one skill work between a coach and student-athlete is permitted for winter sports only, but is limited to one coach and one student-athlete per facility.

Activities

Practices and competitions may only be conducted virtually.

Non-School

Participation

All sports organizations in the state, school or non-school, have been directed to abide by the Governor's mitigations. IHSA coaches cannot organize non-school participation in any fashion. IHSA by-law 3.100 will be in effect once winter sport seasons begin following this pause.
