

City well returning to good as new

Unexpected repairs cost \$50,000, but it could have been worse

CLINTON – A problem with the city's No. 10 water well will end up costing the city more than officials had hoped for, but, ultimately, the well will be returned to new operating condition.

"We got the report back on what all was wrong," commissioner John Wise reported to the city council on Monday. "It wasn't as bad, but it's still nothing good because it's going to be a lot of money."

City well No. 10, located behind Clinton YMCA, went down earlier in October.

A company from St. Louis arrived the next day and discovered that the shaft that operates the pump broke. The pump was taken back to St. Louis to be rebuilt.

Personnel were scheduled to inspect the well and perform necessary maintenance.

Wise said the bill for removing the broken shaft and motor and rebuilding the motor will be about \$14,000.

The St. Louis company will replace necessary parts, install all new stainless steel rod and put everything back together with new couplings and new joints. "It's been in operation since about 2014 and has had nothing gone wrong," Wise said. "So, knock on wood, it will last a long time."

CLINTON Four challengers to the DeWitt County Board were elected on Tuesday.

The candidates, all endorsed by DeWitt County Residents Against Wind Turbines, won the three available seats in District A, while in District 435.

The challengers were on opposite sides of the current Alta Farms II wind energy project issue. The incumbents supported the project, while the challengers do not.

In District C, Megan Myers, supported by the anti-wind group, won election with 1129 votes. Incumbent and current board chairman David Newberg won reelection with 1048 votes, while incumbent Frederick "Jay" Wickenhauser also won reelection with 1117. Incumbent Scott Nimmo lost his reelection bid with 631 votes. Newberg, Wickenhauser and Nimmo all are supporters of the wind energy project. DeWitt County Residents

Against Wind Turbines recently filed a lawsuit against project developer Tradewind and DeWitt County. The Village of Wapella also has filed a similar suit.

In voting activity, 74.2 percent of registered voters in DeWitt County voted on Tuesday. In an election when mail votes constituted an unusually high proportion of ballots across the country, about 15 percent of DeWitt County ballots were mailin votes. Early voting made up 24.5 percent of Tuesday's ballots, with county voters casting 8,053 ballots. County voters cast 4,861 ballot in person, making up 60.4 percent.





Now the National Records Archives and Administration has digitized declassified Navy and Coast Guard deck logs (aka ship or captain's logs) from

1956-1978 and put them online to make it easier for veterans to validate their claims. This includes the hospital ship USS Sanctuary.

Honoring the 'King of Chefs'

'elcome to my little corner culinary of delights. There is a need to recognize the dedicated chefs.

In a small French village Villeneuve Loubet of near Nice was born George Auguste Escoffier in October of the year 1846. Because of his admiration of beautiful things around him, one would have thought he would pursue an artist's life. After all, this was during a time period of great artists. However, his grandmother, in whose kitchen he often played, must have had a strong influence on his final decision.

At the age of thirteen (1859),the young Escoffier was taken to Nice to work as an apprentice in his uncle's restaurant. To be an apprentice in those days, one not only paid for the privilege but had to work really hard. None of it was glamorous. Wood had to be chopped for the cook stoves and carried in along with the water. Although Escoffier suffered under his uncle's strict discipline and hard demands, he saw this as an advantage in later life. It taught him self-discipline for success. His hard work paid off. At only the age of nineteen (1865) Escoffier was recognized by the owner of the most fashionable restaurant in all of Paris, the Le Petit Moulin Rouge. He was asked to join-up with them. No doubt many seeking employment there were turned down. But Escoffier was sought after. That was an honor beyond compare.



The Franco-Prussian War broke out in about 1870. This necessitated Escoffier to join the army. He applied his experience in cooking with army life. He saw a need for canning techniques for preserving food. By the time food got to the army on horse drawn wagons, much of it was spoiled. After he returned to the Le Petit Moulin Rouge restaurant, be experimented with canning different kinds

of meats, vegetables and sauces.

True to form, he was dedicated to his profession. He became head chef at the restaurant but moved on in 1878 to manage the Maison Chevet at the Palais Royal where he gained experience in doing up big dinners and official banquets. Following this, he worked at many different restaurants to learn from them. One of his titles was the Directeur de Cuisine at the Grand Hotel in Monte Carlo and at the Hotel National in Lucerne Switzerland. It was there he met Cesar Ritz and the two formed the Hotel Ritz in Paris.

It was for the Ritz that Escoffier invented the famous brigade system. It is now in use worldwide.

Escoffier's greatness was recognized by Kaiser Wilhelm with these words; "I am the Emperor of Germany, but you are the Emperor of chefs." Escoffier created over 10,000 recipes, changed French cuisine traditions and created the brigade system. This earned him the lasting title of "king of chefs, chef of kings". He retired as a chef at age 70. He died in 1935 leaving a great legacy behind to the benefit of all.

A common method of defense against a suit contract is to try to shorten declarer's trumps by forcing him to ruff. This is most likely to be effective when declarer and dummy together have only eight (or fewer) trumps.

Here is a typical case. South ruffed the second round of hearts, led a low spade to the king and finessed the jack on the return, losing to West's queen. West led another heart, and declarer ruffed again. He was now down to the lone ace of spades in his hand, having led trumps twice and ruffed twice.

After drawing West's last trump, declarer crossed to the club ace, led the ten of diamonds and finessed. West won with the king and cashed two hearts to defeat the contract two tricks. The repeated heart leads had exhausted South's trumps and brought about his downfall.

But analysis shows that South did not handle the situation in the best manner. He could have made his game by exercising better trump control. After ruffing the heart at trick two, he should have played a club to the ace and finessed the ten of diamonds before tackling the trump suit.

If the finesse wins, the contract is virtually assured. If the finesse loses, South is in a much better position to deal with the heart return. He ruffs and still has the A-J-6 of spades as well as the established diamonds.

A low trump to the king is followed by a trump to the ace, deliberately rejecting the finesse. When West follows suit, the contract becomes a certainty, even though the trump queen is still outstanding. Declarer simply runs his tricks in the side suits, losing only a trump whenever West (or East, if he has the queen) elects to ruff.

In effect, South plays for a normal 3-2 trump division instead of yielding to the temptation of winning a trump finesse. Percentagewise, this offers him the best chance of success.

Take stock

The first step is taking stock of how your garden fared this year. Do a walk through and take notes on plant location and performance, says Martha Smith, University of Illinois Extension horticulture educator.

"You should sketch out your vegetable garden," Smith says. "Crop rotation is very important when it comes to vegetable diseases. In the spring, you can refer to your sketch rather than rely on your memory and plant vegetables in different locations."

Perennials and annuals should also receive a year-end review. Note whether this season's plants met expectations or if different plants and varieties are needed for next year. Perhaps choosing a different location for certain varieties will help their performance. Do any perennials need to be divided? Do it now or make a list for next spring.

Landscape clean up

Diseased plants should be completely removed. Healthy plant debris can be added to your compost pile. If any perennials have been seriously and routinely plagued with disease, fall is the time to discard them before they spread problems to other plants.

After the first frost, remove annuals and cut back tops of tall herbaceous perennials. Many gardeners prefer to leave most of their perennials as they are, cutting them back in the spring. Tall perennials more than 3 feet tall will flop over under the weight of snow or ice and create environments for rodents and other wildlife; many may reseed ..

"I always cut seed heads off of Northern Sea Oats (Chasmanthium latifolium) and Blackberry Lily (Belamcanda chinensis) before they spread," Smith says. "But if you want more, let them be."

Fall bulbs

Dig up tender bulbs such as gladioli, dahlia, and canna lilies. Dry them, and

Leaves in the landscape

Rake leaves and add them to your compost pile or locate them near the garden so they are handy to add as mulch next spring and summer.

Don't let fallen leaves accumulate and mat down over your desirable turf. After the heat of summer, grass is actively growing in the fall. Leaves smother the grass and prevent photosynthesis which is the plants ability to produce food. Consider using fallen leaves as winter mulch around tender plants.

Container plants

Container plants should be pulled and added to your compost pile. Saving potting mix to replant for next year is difficult. Roots are not going to disappear over winter and you will have to deal with them sooner or later. Potting mixes will also lose their organic matter content since it breaks down through the growing season.

Throw roots and media in the compost pile if this is the case and clean out the container with a mild bleach solution of 10-parts water, one-part bleach.

If saving the soil for next year, store it in a dry area or cover it with plastic to keep out debris and prevent it from getting waterlogged.

"Now, you can begin to put away your garden tools," Smith says. "But while you're at it, remember to clean the tools, wipe the metal blades with oil, and store them under cover so they too are ready for next year."

"Our new electronic SSN verification service helps reduce synthetic identity fraud by comparing agency records with data provided electronically by approved participants," said Andrew Saul, Commissioner of Social Security. "This is an important online service that helps us provide participants and their customers fast, secure, and more efficient SSN verifications." Social Security created eCBSV, a feebased electronic SSN verification service, to allow select financial institutions and service providers, called "permitted entities" and including subsidiaries, affiliates, agents, subcontractors, or assignees of a financial institution, to verify if a person's SSN, name, and date of birth combination matches Social Security records. Social Security needs the person's written consent and will accept an electronic signature in order to disclose the SSN verification





News Of Schools

What Kids Care About: Education And The Coronavirus

(NAPS)—The debate over schools reopening during the pandemic has included a great deal of feedback from educators and parents. But what about the students themselves: How are they feeling? Are they worried about catching the virus—and what do they think about safety measures and about remote learning or coming back to the classroom?

To find answers, the EdChoice Public Opinion Tracker and Morning Consult asked teens about their schooling, the pandemic and other hot topics.

What Students Want

Spoiler alert: Young people are just as uncertain as grownups. When asked for three words that describe going back to school, "nervous," "excited" and "confused" were the most common responses.

In all 76 percent of the students and older and minority teens in particular—are concerned about the pandemic.

The top two things students are worried about are infecting a family member (81 percent) or getting the virus (70 percent) but they're also worried about not being able to see their friends, missing classes and taking classes online. A significant number of teens—25 percent—say they're worried about not having access to the food they normally get at school. Nearly 70 percent think other students would take wearing masks seriously, but less than half believe their peers will socially distance and refrain from sharing objects with each other.

As for returning to school, 64 percent said they'd prefer online only or with a mix of online and in-person learning. Just over three-quarters reported having Internet access at home to do their

online class work. What Students Think

The two most important issues on teens' minds are the coronavirus outbreak (61 percent) and Black Lives Matter movement (60 percent). LGBTQ rights, police/criminal justice reform, climate change and this year's presidential election werent nearly as important to the students. Falling to between 26 percent and 27 percent.

Teens reported being most comfortable discussing current events and social issues with their friends (84 percent), and parents or guardians (78 percent). They were less comfortable with teachers (56 prcent) and least comfortable with their friends' parents or guardians (39 percent).

As schools have reopened in varying degrees, it will be interesting to find out how American teens' opinions and behaviors change throughout the remainder of this year and into the future.

URBANA, Ill. – Nature is a place for children to explore, learn and grow and the new virtual Wee Naturalists program allows for just that.

University of Illinois Extension is once again offering nature-loving children, families and educators the opportunity to explore a different nature theme monthly starting in November until May 2021 through provided lessons and videos.

The Wee Naturalists program began in 2019 in Northern Illinois led by Peggy Doty, Extension Energy and Environmental Stewardship Educator. Now, the course is being offered virtually to families with children ages 4 to 7 and pre-K to 2nd grade educators around the state and beyond.

"Learning through nature-related stories, a lesson and even virtual hikes will give children a view of nature they don't always see or hear," Doty says. "The lessons introduce science vocabulary, build knowledge, and help children understand relationships in our ecosystems." The monthly program starts November 7 and continues through May 2021. November's topic is "What is a Habitat?" and will use a story about a boy who finds a salamander to help children understand what all living things need to live well. Register online at go.il-

Register online at go.illinois.edu/WeeNaturalist for one or all of the sessions. The cost to participate is \$5 for a household or classroom per month. The pre-recorded hourlong program will be available the first Saturday of the month and can be accessed and viewed any time after.

Other monthly topics are: December 5 Animal Tracks, Animals and People in Winter, January 9; Dirt is Misplaced Soil, February 6; Spring has Sprung, March 6; Earth Gifts, April 3; and Roots Slurp, May 1.
