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Study shows importance of Byron Generating Station to the region's economy

BYRON-The scheduled closing of the Byron Generating Station would certainly hurt Byron and the Byron Community School District #226.

But it would also hurt the economy in all of Ogle County, as well as Lee and Winnebago counties, an economic impact study completed by Northern Illinois University found.

"It's difficult to understand the depth of the impact," said Eric Folk, executive director of the Oregon park District, referring to the Byron Station.

She said it will have an impact in not only Byron, but in Oregon and other townships – they will be

countywide. "The reach is much farther than people realize," she said. Exelon Generation has announced that it would be closing the Byron Station in September 2021.

The Byron CUSD #226 paid for the economic impact study, and Buster Barton, superintendent of the district, said that about 74 percent of the district's revenue comes from the Byron Station.

"Right now, our energy is being focused on trying to keep it here," he said of the station.

And that means showing people the wide-ranging positive economic impacts it makes on the region.

There are the direct impacts. That would mean the loss of the 717 people who work at the station daily. The

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indirect impacts, like the 891 people who provide services to the station. And there are the induced impacts, which are based off of the spending of the direct and indirect employees at the station. This means the places they

go for lunch, or buy goods, or purchase homes.

These are all impacts that will be felt in Ogle County and beyond. In total, the study shows that 2,305 jobs would be affected by the loss of the station. Those jobs could come from a number of businesses which would be impacted by the loss of the station, including doctors, restaurants, stores and financial institutions.

The transportation industry would also take a hit in the millions of dollars.

"We want to make sure people are informed of that," Barton said.

The study shows that the Byron Station's direct contribution to the regional economy (GDP) is estimated to be more than \$288 million. That is 1.6 percent of the total GDP of the region. For the Ogle County, Byron Station's total contribution to the economy is estimated to be \$338 million; 17 percent of the county's total GDP.

Barton said the Byron Station Response Committee he is a part of has been speaking with area civic organizations and trying to

get the word out on how vital the station is to the region. Folk, too, said that edu-

cating the community is vital.

"We are working to really educate our residents, our taxpayers," she said.

She said the Oregon Park District has been preparing for the eventuality of the station closing, having already trimmed the size of the staff over the years. But with 78 percent of the district's tax base coming from the Byron Station, she said services would be "significantly cut."

But by getting the word out on the impacts, and working with elected leaders, both Barton and Folk are optimistic.

State Rep. Tom Demmer is one of those mobilizing forces in Springfield to help

save the Byron and Dresden plants. Dresden is scheduled to close in November 2021.

Folk said things are starting to line up for some positive movement in the Spring legislative session. She said school boards, parks and recreation associations and organized labor are all working together to save the stations.

Barton said people who

wish to support saving the station can go to Demmer's website, www.savebyron. com. His committee also has a site, www.saveilnuclearpower.com. The economic impact study can be found at that site.

He also encouraged people to simply put up a yard sign supporting the Byron Station, which can be found on the committee's site.

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Meridian district moving to remote learning

STILLMAN VALLEY – The Meridian CUSD 223 has decided o follow guidance of Ogle County Health Department and move to remote learning after the Thanksgiving holiday.

On Nov. 3, the Ogle County Health Department recommended that all Ogle County schools transition to remote learning from Nov. 30 through Jan. 18 to help stop the spread of COVID-19 and decrease the strain on our regional health care system. Since receiving the recommendation, MCUSD administration has been in close contact with the representatives from the OCHD, IEMA, and regional hospitals to understand external community trends. We have also been in communication with the Board of Education, union leadership, parents, and superintendents of other regional districts.

Through all these conversations it is clear: the spread of COVID-19, the strain on our regional healthcare system, our students and COVID-19-related absences, our number of positive cases, and other valuable regional data points are all increasing. While we have been incredibly fortunate to not experience spread in our schools up to this point, as the conditions have worsened, we are continuing to place an increased risk on our students, staff, and community.

A few key data points we have considered:

* Nearly one percent of all inperson learners currently with an active COVID infection.

* About 10 percent of all staff and students quarantined presently, including 17 percent of in-person learners in one building.

* As of Nov. 19, the district's zip codes 7-day positivity rate is over 25 percent and 14-day is over 22 percent.

* CDC guidance says that any positivity rate over 10 percent leads to the highest risk for possible transmission of the virus in schools.

* As of that same date, othe district's zip codes number of new cases per 100k is over 1,350.

* CDC guidance says that when this number is over 200 it leads to the highest risk for possible trans-

mission of the virus in schools.

* The Ogle County Health Department is relying more on the school to track and follow students that present with mild symptoms in order to focus on probable or confirmed cases. This switch has caused significantly more burden on nurses and other school resources.

* The inability to continue to operate in a sustainable manner. We have been a single employee absence away from shutting down multiple buildings and/or departments within the past two weeks.

Judicial Center to close due to COVID-19 outbreak

OREGON – Due to a CO-VID-19 breakout within the Ogle County State's Attorney's Office and the Ogle County Probation Office, Ogle County Health Director Kyle Auman has recommending a two week pause of operation of the Ogle County Judicial Center to ensure we control the spread and that the public is not exposed to the virus by Ogle County/court employees.

All cases falling within that time frame will be notified of a future court date. The Ogle County Judicial Center will reopen on

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Monday, Dec. 7, at 8:30 a.m.

Limited staff will be available for criminal bond hearings, emergency matters regarding emergency petitions for order of protection, emergency orders for stalking/no contact, emergency juvenile matters and bonafide emergency child support and parenting time/decision making disputes. Determination of a bonafide emergency child support or parenting time/decision making dispute issue shall be determined by the Judge before whom the case is pending.



* On Dec. 18, 1777, the new United States celebrates its first national day of thanksgiving, commemorating the American victory at the Battle of Saratoga after the surrender of Gen. John Burgoyne and 5,000 British troops in October 1777.

Key members of Congress accused Clinton of using the air strikes to divert attention from ongoing impeachment proceedings against him.

* On Dec. 17, 2003, "The Lord of the Rings: The Return of the King," the final film in the trilogy based on the best-selling fantasy novels by J.R.R. Tolkien, opens in theaters.

State agencies encourage people to prepare for winter

SPRINGFIELD – While the official start of winter is not for several weeks, those in Illinois know that winter weather is inevitable.

Knowing what to do before a winter storm strikes can provide peace of mind and ultimately impact how well we respond and recover from any winter storm. To help Illinois residents be prepared for winter weather, the Illinois Emergency Management Agency (IEMA) and National Weather Service (NWS) developed a Winter Weather Preparedness Guide to help families prepare for extreme cold, snow and ice.

"Being unprepared for winter weather is not only inconvenient, but it can be dangerous," said IEMA Director Alicia Tate-Nadeau. "We are encouraging all Illinoisans to take a few minutes to put together your home and vehicle emergency supply kits and review the steps you should take to stay safe during hazardous winter weather."

A study published in 2020 by the University of Illinois Chicago found that nearly 95-percent of temperature related deaths in Illinois were due to cold weather. According to the NWS, the coldest temperature on record occurred on January 31, 2019 when the mercury dropped to negative 38 degrees near Mt. Carroll in Carroll County. The previous record of negative 36 degrees was set in 1999.

Being in the cold too long can cause serious health problems. Hypothermia, or a drop in the body's core temperature, does not require sub-arctic temperatures and can set in when you are indoors and outdoors. Hypothermia is especially dangerous and can be fatal if not detected promptly and treated properly. Frostbite occurs when your extremities (fingers, toes, nose, and ears) are exposed to cold weather. The skin may become stiff and numb leading to severe tissue damage. Frostbite can permanently damage the body, and severe cases can lead to amputation.

Take precautions when working outside

"Many Illinois workers, such as first-responders, public works crews and construction workers, will have to brave the outdoor elements this winter to do their jobs." said Illinois Department of Labor Director Michael Kleinik. "It is vital for these workers to prepare ahead for severe conditions. Proper clothing is a must but making sure your body is ready for the added stress is also important."

Hospital emergency rooms see an increase in cardiac incidents each winter. The frigid cold causes your body to go into protection mode, narrowing blood vessels. That can increase strain on the heart for those doing hard physical labor. Preventative maintenance is a good idea. Medical professionals encourage people who must work outside regularly in the winter weather consider scheduling a physical exam before that winter work begins.

Common sense and self-awareness are the keys to winter weather safety. Workers should know the signs of hypothermia, not push their bodies to an extreme, layer clothing and make sure they have plenty of fluids to avoid dehydration.

Recognize home heating dangers

Every year, more than 400 people die in the U.S. from accidental carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning. CO is found in fumes produced any time you burn fuel in cars or trucks, small engines, stoves, lanterns, grills, fireplaces, gas ranges, or furnaces. CO can build up indoors and poison people and animals who breathe it.

"Heating equipment is one of the leading causes of home fire deaths with half of home heating fires occurring during the months of December, January and February. That is why it's so important to have your furnace, wood burning stoves, fireplaces and chimneys inspected and cleaned by licensed professionals every year. Test all smoke and CO alarms in the homes monthly and replace expired or broken alarms. Having these heating devices checked and serviced will help prevent fires and tragedies from occurring in our communities this winter," said State Fire Marshal Matt Perez.

Ice and snow, take it slow

Preparing for winter also means adjusting your driving habits. Snowy or ice-coated roads and reduced visibility due to fog or blowing snow results in thousands of motor vehicle crashes every year in Illinois. Many of these crashes can be avoided by slowing down on city streets, rural roads and highways. Traffic studies have shown that many times, minor accumulations of snow or ice on roads can be just as dangerous for motorists as major snowstorms.

"As we head into winter, the preparations and planning you do today can save your life in the months ahead," said Acting Illinois Transportation Secretary Omer Osman. "Pack an emergency kit to store in your vehicle. Build extra time in your schedules if you are driving this winter. Give our plows and workers room to do their jobs. And always be asking yourself when the forecast calls for snow and ice: Is this trip really necessary?"

Keep in mind, being prepared for winter doesn't have to cost a lot of money or take a lot of time. It could be as simple as making sure your vehicle is in good winter driving condition, adding a winter survival kit to your car, changing your furnace filter at home and stocking or updating your family's emergency supply kit. Take time now to prepare your family, home, vehicles and driving habits for everything from a dusting of snow to a major winter storm.




Pastor retires

All necessary forms are included in the candidate's election packet available at the library.

The filing period is December 14th through December 21st. Packets returned after December 21 will not be considered for candidacy.

Packets may be obtained and filed during library hours: Monday – Thursday from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m., Friday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., and Saturday from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.
