Demmer tells County Board talks on the issue have started in springfield

OREGON – State Rep. Tom Demmer told the Ogle County Board that people are mobilizing to try to save the Byron Generating Station, which Exelon Generation said it would be closing in September 2021.

At its Oct. 21 meeting, Demmertold board members that he and other legislators on both sides of the aisle are looking for ways to change state policies that could save the Byron and Dresden plants. Dresden, in Morris, is scheduled to close in November 2021.

Demmer said that making changes to save the plant is "not an impossibility."

He said Exelon has been active in Springfield over the last couple of years and has talked about the importance of it nuclear plants and the carbon free electricity they produce, and how they should factor into the state's overall electric power policy.

The company has also said that plants like the Byron Station could close if changes weren't made.

"It's been talked about for several years, but recently became a lot more real," Demmer said.


But even after the talk, he said the announcement to close the plants released on Aug. 27, "...was a shock to a lot of us."

Demmer said Gov. JB Pritzker has set up a power policy group, and Demmer said some people from Byron will be testifying in front of that group on the importance of the plant to the local economy and the region.

Signs like this one can be seen in yards around Byron and other parts of Ogle County. (Brad Jennings photo)





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

"There's a discussion happening in the governor's office," Demmer said, adding that this discussion will be happening for "several months.

Local officials have also come together to try to save the plant. The group put together an economic impact report on the plant, which is available at savebvron.com.

The loss of the Byron plant would mean the loss of more than 700 jobs. The plant also spreads plenty of tax money around the county. Paul Dempsey, Communications Manager of the Byron station, said that the station's 2017 tax bill was more than \$38 million. The taxes went to a variety of taxing bodies, including the Byron School District, Ogle County and the Byron Museum and Library District.

Terry McGoldrick, president of Local IBEW 15, told the board that they are looking for a long-term agreement so they don't have to do this again in a couple of years.

"This is very serious, and it will close if we don't get something done," said McGoldrick who lives in Stillman Valley

For its part, the County Board did approve a resolution in support of the Byron plant

It read, in part: "...be it resolved, by the County of Ogle, that we urge the State of Illinois to support polices to preserved Illinois' nuclear energy plants, because of their support for our local economy by creating thousands of jobs, strengthening the commitment to a pollution and carbon-free environment and ensuring a more reliable electric grid for consumers and businesses; while creating a sustainable energy future for generations...?

Helen Henry Spencer, formerly of Oregon, passed away on Oct. 13, 2020, in Lake Geneva, Wis. Born June 17, 1925 in Woodson, Ill., to the late Frank A. and Mary Emma Lena (Culp) Henry, she graduated from Jacksonville High School in 1943. She married William E. Spencer on Dec.27, 1947.

A real-life "Rosie the Riveter," Helen worked at Caterpillar Tractor in Peoria during World War II, and later worked for nine years at Family Circle Magazine. She also served as the matron of Ogle County Jail during her husband's tenure as Ogle County Sheriff from 1963-1966. For over 35 years, Helen worked as a bookkeeper for Sinnissippi Farms until her retirement in 2001. Leaf River man is killed in Oregon crash

OREGON-ALeaf River man was killed in two-vehicle crash in Oregon at about 8:35 p.m. on Tuesday, Oct. 13.

Andrew Long, 37, was killed in the crash that happened in the 1700 block of W. Washington Street.

The initial investigation indicated that a 2016 Dodge truck traveling westbound and driven by Scott L. Disher, 33, Mount Morris, crossed over the center line, into the path of an eastbound 2007 Saturn driven by Long, Oregon Police said in a release. Long was pronounced deceased at the scene due to injuries sustained from the accident.

Disher was transported by Oregon Fire/ Ambulance to KSB Hospital for minor injuries, where he was treated and released. Disher was arrested for Aggravated Driving Under the Influence of Alcohol and was transported to the Ogle County jail. Disher was also issued citations for Driving Under the Influence of Alcohol, Driving Under the Influence of Alcohol with Blood Alcohol Content Greater than .08, Improper Lane Usage, and Failure to Reduce Speed to Avoid an Accident.

The Ogle County Sheriff's Office assisted at the scene and performed accident reconstruction duties. This traffic crash remains under investigation.

The Oregon Police Department continues to consult with the Ogle County State's Attorney regarding potential additional charges.



The Graduated Income Tax Amendment is an important step toward righting the State's finances. Illinois is one of only eleven states that does not have a graduated income tax, a much fairer system to tax citizens compared to a flat rate. There are several misconceptions about the proposed amendment.

It will not empower the Legislature to raise taxes. They already have this power. Some believe that this amendment opens the door to taxing retirement income and/or increasing taxes in inheritance/ estates. The amendment does neither, the Legislature already has this authority too. Certainly, if the amendment does not pass, taxing retirement income may be more likely to be considered because of the need for revenue. On the public side, the State's financial situation and revenue problem is not the result of over-generous public pension benefits. The normal cost and level of benefits provided by Illinois' public pension systems for teachers, college and university employees, police, fire, and other State workers are generally just average compared to other states.

In fact, legislative decisions to underfund the State pension systems helped subsidize lower income taxes for decades. Some are concerned about family farms being hurt by the graduated income tax. Only corporate farms pay the corporate tax.

Local governments rely heavily on property taxes to meet their public service obligations. Illinois imposes sales taxes on fewer items than most states. The State's financial picture was challenging before Covid-19 and the pandemic will result in new shortfalls that must be addressed. A graduated income tax is a fair and balanced way to fulfill Illinois' fiscal responsibilities.

Please vote "Yes" for the proposed amendment of Section 3, Article IX of the Illinois Constitution.

Ogle Jolly holds first meeting of 2020


The Ogle Jolly 4-H club held its first meeting of the 2020-2021 year on Sept. 14 at the Davis Junction park.




Byron boys third in conference
