Dem chair delays further hearings in Madigan probe

Republicans accuse Democrats of protecting speaker at all costs

SPRINGFIELD - The

chairman of the Special Investigating Committee probing Illinois House

Speaker Michael Madigan's alleged role in a bribery scheme said Tuesday that he will delay any further meetings of that panel until after the Nov. 3 general election.

"The committee will meet again in person on Nov. 5 in Springfield –

without the backdrop of a political campaign," Rep. Emanuel "Chris" Welch, D-Hillside, said in

That statement, which came exactly four weeks before the Nov. 3 general election. infuriated Republicans on the panel who accused Welch of stonewalling investigation in order to protect the powerful Democratic speaker.

"Chairman Welch's decision is an utter insult to the people of Illinois who want and deserve the truth," Rep. Deanne Mazzochi, R-Elmhurst, said during a virtual news conference later in the day. "Chairman Welch has now become Chairman Squelch."

Madigan, a Chicago Democrat who has served as speaker of the House for all but two years since 1983, was implicated in a bribery scheme in July when officials at Commonwealth Edison, the state's largest electric utility, admitted to federal prosecutors that over a period of nine years, they handed out no-work jobs and lobbying contracts to close associates of Madigan as part of a concerted effort to curry his favor for legislation benefitted that company.

Madigan has not been charged and has denied any wrongdoing, saying that all he did was recommend people for jobs.

Mayor urges using guidelines during **Trick or Treat**

CLINTON - Trick or Treat, much like many other things, will be different this year because of COVID restrictions. But, the annual kids' activity is still on for this year in Clinton, and mayor Roger Cyrulik everyone to stay safe.

The Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) issued guidelines communities follow this year when observing Halloween. Mayor Cyrulik covered those guidelines during Monday's city council meeting and recommended residents follow them.

"We've had some questions on Trick or Treating this year," Cyrulik said. "The Illinois Department of Public Health has sent out some guidelines, and we'll post these on our website."

Cyrulik pointed out that the coronavirus was continuing to spread.

"So, we need to follow the basic '3 Ws'," he said. "Wash your hands, watch your distance, and wear a mask."

Cyrulik covered the guidelines distributed by the IDPH.

From the IDPH

If you think you could have COVID-19 or have been exposed to someone who has COVID-19, do not participate in any

in-person Halloween activities.

Trick-or-treating

Anyone participating in trick-or-treating, including those passing out candy, should maintain six feet of social distance and wear proper face coverings.

Consider leaving individually wrapped candy (spaced apart) on a table in driveways or in front of walkways, sidewalks, outdoor space where six feet of distance can be maintained.

A Halloween costume mask is not a substitute for a cloth mask. Ensure that breathing is not impaired if a cloth mask is worn under a costume mask. If so, discard the costume mask.

Trick-or-treat in groups with household members

Candy collected during trick-or-treating should not be eaten until after handwashing.

An alternative traditional trick-ortreating is to set up in a large parking lot or other outdoor setting with tables with individually wrapped candy (spaced apart) where participants with a parent/guardian can parade past while still keeping six feet of distance and wearing a face covering. It's suggested to offer reserved time slots to limit everyone showing up at once.



Other guidelines included in IDPH recommendations:

Adult costume parties, social gatherings, Halloween parties at bars Gatherings of more than 50 people or 50 percent or more of a building's maximum occupancy are prohibited. (Lower limits may apply for regions in additional mitigation.)

The more time you spend at a gathering, the closer the contact, the more people, the higher your risk of exposure to COVID-19.

Follow small social gathering safety tips from IDPH.

Pumpkin patches and

orchards

Cloth face coverings and social distancing should be enforced.

Use hand sanitizer before handling pumpkins, apples, and other produce.

Hayrides

Hayrides should not exceed 50 percent parties capacity with spaced at least six feet apart.

Wear face coverings at all times when around people not from your household.

After participating in any of the above activities, if you think that you may have been exposed during your celebration, take

extra precautions for 14 days after the event to help protect others. You should:

Stay home as much as possible.

Avoid being around people at increased risk for severe illness from COVID-19.

Consider getting tested COVID-19.

Regardless, Republicans in the House, led by Minority Leader Jim Durkin of Western Springs, filed a petition to launch a disciplinary process on the grounds that Madigan may have engaged in "conduct unbecoming to a legislator or which constitutes a breach of public trust." Under House rules, that charge could lead to disciplinary action, up to and including expulsion from the House.

The special committee last met on Tuesday, Sept. 29, and heard testimony from ComEd Executive Vice President of Compliance and Audit David Glockner who said he could not specifically confirm whether company's actions had, in fact, influenced Madigan or whether Madigan was even aware of its intent to influence him.

during meeting, Republicans on the panel sought to issue subpoenas to multiple

testify voluntarily, including Madigan. Welch, however, ruled that request out of order, calling it "premature."

Since then, Democrats and Republicans have engaged in back-and-forth criticism of one another, with Welch accusing Republicans of trying to use the hearings for "political theater," while Republicans have accused Welch of stonewalling the process in order to protect the speaker politically.

"At every step of this process, our cooperation has been accompanied with the proviso that we will not allow this committee to be used as a stage for political theater an admonishment our Republican colleagues appear to have taken more as a challenge than as a reflection of this committee's serious work," Welch said in a statement.

Asked via email how he distinguishes between political theater and a legitimate request for relevant information, Welch replied: "The (Special Investigating Committee) convening on Nov. 5, 2020 in the Capitol, after the election, removes this process from the backdrop of an election where two members of the committee are in the middle of contested political campaigns."

That was a reference to

two of the GOP committee members, Mazzochi and Rep. Grant Wehrli, of Naperville. Earlier Tuesday, Rep.

Tom Demmer, R-Dixon, the ranking Republican on the special committee, released a statement noting that Welch, in lieu of issuing subpoenas for testimony, had sent a letter to ComEd seeking what Demmer called a "data dump" of all communications over the last decade between ComEd, its parent company Exelon, "and any staff member, employee, contractor, or consultant" of former Govs. Pat Quinn and Bruce Rauner, current Gov. JB Pritzker, former Senate President John Cullerton, current Senate President Don Harmon, Speaker Madigan and other current and former Republican state lawmakers.

"This request involves hundreds of people and could take months for ComEd respond," Demmer said in the statement.

Now, more than ever, get your flu shot

A sincere wish just came true: This year's high-dose senior version of the flu shot will contain all four vaccines. In past by Matilda Charles years, the senior shot (for

those over age 65) contained only three of the vaccines, two A and one B. Most years I would write a snarly note to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and ask about the reason for the false economy. Of course I never got a reply, but now ... finally, we seniors will have a flu shot with all four vaccines.

And what a shot it will be. The four vaccines are names we haven't heard in a while, if ever: A/Guangdong-Maonan (H1N1), A/Hong Kong (H3N2), B/Washington and B/Phuket. To help us kick start our immune system, the senior version will contain four times the amount that younger folks get. The standard trivalent (three-way) will have two A and one B, while the standard quadrivalent (four-way) has all four.

If your doctor says you should have a flu shot, don't delay. When I called my pharmacy (where I get my flu shots each year), the first appointment was many days out, and they had been swamped with requests for the shot. Yes, they will be resupplied when they run out, but no, they didn't know how quickly that would be.

By getting a flu shot, should you get sick later this season, it will be a good bet that it's not the regular flu, which will save much time in getting a diagnosis.

To find flu shots, call your doctor, local pharmacies, grocery stores or go to vaccinefinder.org. If you have a Medicare or insurance card, you won't have to pay anything.

Horsing around with horseradish

Welcome to my little corner of culinary delights. Horseradish is a highly aromatic root. Peeling it can bring tears to your eyes faster than onions. It is robust as a plant and easy to grow. Replant a part of its root or its upper part for regeneration. Use what is left of the root in your food. It has a delicate nature in how it is used and stored notwithstanding. It is rarely found in a cookbook as an ingredient and generally unpopular for culinary use. It is sold as prepared relish in grocery stores. I have not seen it sold fresh in root form nor do I recall seeing it or using it in culinary school at all. Be that as it may, it is worth every serious cook's attention.

First off, I recommend that every serious culinarian grow at least one plant in their garden. That is about the only way of getting fresh horseradish. One very good reason it is not sold fresh in stores is its short shelf life. It dries out quickly if not wrapped in plastic and refrigerated. Even at that, it must be used within a few days; no longer than a week. Grate the root only when it is to be used and only the amount needed. You cannot dry horseradish to store it. It will completely lose its taste and potency. About the only way to keep grated horseradish is to mix a little bit of distilled vinegar or lemon juice with it, sealed in a container and keep it

Many who cook for a small group and chop only a few onions for a meal, often have tears from the onions. Those of us who often chop ten to twenty pounds of onions at a time become impervious to the stringent onion fumes in the air. Be that as it may, it is unlikely anyone can become impervious

to horseradish fumes. I found wearing swimming goggles works well for me. Although many refer to it as "ground horseradish", the correct procedure is to grate it.

The following regarding horseradish is important to remember. About a year or more past, I wrote an article on simmering chili and sauces. I hope instructions recalled regarding herbs in simmering. The more that herbs are simmered, the more they lose their potency and flavor. This is especially true of horseradish. If you cook horseradish, you might as well not have it. The taste and potency of horseradish is completely lost. This is what I meant when I said horseradish is delicate. It is delicate in cooking.

About the only way horseradish root can be used is in cold dishes such as salads or applied in food after the food has been cooked. It is most commonly used in sauces, relishes and condiments. Any sauces that require cooking must have the horseradish applied only after the sauce cools down. Until next time, peace to

all.

How does a PASS help someone return to work?

- We base SSI eligibility and payment amounts on income and resources (things of value that the individual owns).
- PASS lets a disabled individual set aside money and things he or she owns to pay for items or services needed to achieve a specific work goal.
- The objective of the PASS is to help disabled individuals find employment that reduces or eliminates SSI or SSDI benefits.



No, Democrats won't pack the court

For many progressive opinionmakers, the only way to save the Supreme Court is to destroy it.


They believe the best response to the Republican-held Senate confirming a Trump nominee to fill Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg's seat on the Supreme Court is to pack the Court if Democrats win in November. Holding out the courtpacking threat, they argue, also might give Republicans second thoughts about filling the vacancy.

For the Democrats, court-packing would be a murder-suicide. It would end the Supreme Court as we know it, and almost certainly bring a swift and decisive end to Democratic congressional majorities. There's a reason Republicans aren't taking the threat seriously in their calculations.

No matter how infuriated a party is, the rules of political gravity still apply. A president is at the high point of his power at the outset, steadily losing juice over time.

Would Biden spend precious capital on court-packing early in his presidency? If so, voting, green energy and health care legislation would take a back seat.

If, instead, all of that legislation went first, then court-packing would be pushed toward the back of the line, when Biden would have diminished clout for the political fight of a lifetime.



The question of timing would enter in another way. If Democrats managed to add Court seats in the second year of a Biden presidency, how much time and political capital would they have left to fill them before the midterms? If Republicans took back the Senate, they certainly wouldn't fill them.

And, of course, when Republicans hold the presidency and Congress again, they'd add their own seats or subtract the Democratic ones,

rule, big changes happen in our system when a party makes a sustained public case for them prior to an election. Very few elected Democrats are willing to come out in favor of packing the court, and Biden the other day pointedly refused to endorse it.

Making court-packing the major initiative of his presidency would be an awkward fit for Biden. It would validate the critique of him as weak and prone to getting pushed

around by the left. It would blow up his hope to bring some normality back to Washington. It would inexorably make the destruction of the legitimacy of the Supreme Court part of his legacy, when he imagines himself an institutionalist.

The argument that Republicans have already "packed the court" is a false equivalence. Yes, Republicans have used hardball tactics to keep open, or now to try to fill, vacancies. But these seats opened up in the natural course of events. They weren't conjured out of nowhere in a fit of pique or vengeance.

It easy to pound the table and demand an incredibly momentous change to our system when you don't have power and don't have to cope with the consequences. It's another to act in the face of vigorous opposition and with nervous officeholders in marginal districts or states looking for a way out.

VA scams in Florida

The prescriptions, submitted to the VA, netted the criminal over \$3 million, and he's been sentenced to four years in the federal penitentiary.

Then, on the east coast of Florida, a former VA employee was nabbed for threatening to kill another employee and that employee's family. Not too bright, leaving threatening messages on somebody's cellphone ... more than once. This fool could get a year in the federal pen and a \$100,000 fine.


West leads a low Diamond to East's Ace, a Diamond is returned to West's King, and the ◆J is ruffed by Declarer. Things are looking pretty bleak! For starters, Declarer will need the Club finesse to work. And then there is the small matter of the trump suit, where Declarer can afford only two losers. Doesn't that require the suit to be 3-3? Not necessarily!

After ruffing the Diamond, Declarer cashes the ♣A and exits a low Spade, West following with the Jack and then winning the second round with the King. West exits with a Heart won by Dummy's Ace, then the ♥J is overtaken by the King. Declarer could now exit with a Spade, making his contract if Spades are 3-3. Is that a good idea? No, West has shown up with ♦KJ and ♠KJ and needs to have the ♣K if the contract is to make. That's 11 HCP, so West cannot also have the ♠Q, that would give him an opening bid. To have a chance, Declarer must assume that West started with ♠KJ doubleton and East with ♠Q983. But if that is the case, doesn't East have two trump tricks coming? Not necessarily!

Leaving East's ♠Q9 at large, Declarer finesses the ♠Q, ruffs a Diamond, cashes a third Heart (playing East to be 4=3=4=2), and crosses to the ♣A (no need to repeat the Club finesse). Declarer has carefully arranged to get the lead in Heart. Dummy leads a Club and, whether East ruffs high or ruffs low, one of his two Spade "winners" vanishes! It's called a Coup en Passant.
