### Harvest time

## Haunted hayrides with limits OK, haunted houses aren't

The Center Square SPRINGFIELD – In a matter of hours, Illinois Gov. J.B. Pritzker's administration changed its guidance on hayrides amid concerns over COVID-19, but haunted houses are still prohibited. A state representative says the decision is not based on science and data.

An updated document on Sept. 24 had initially said: "Amusement rides such as train rides, hay rides, and inflatables must remain closed."

The guidance document was updated late Sept. 25 with different language that



said hayrides and haunted hayrides were permitted with capacity limits.

"Hayrides/haunted can operate at 50% capacity, with parties spaced at least six feet apart and wearing masks, with the best practice to limit hayrides to members of the same household." the

update said.

The Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity didn't immediately respond to why the guidelines changed.

State Rep. Charlie Meier, R-Okawville, is a hay farmer. He said hayrides are a big tradition.

"There's some big families, there's some small families, what if one person brings a friend," Meier said. "Hopefully there's some wiggle room there."

Meier is also in Region 4 where the governor for weeks

## Secretary of State White extends driver's license and ID expiration dates

□ Online license plate sticker renewals increase

Capitol News Illinois SPRINGFIELD-Expiration dates on Illinois driver's licenses and state ID cards will be extended another three months, said Secretary of State Jesse White.

White announced expirations for licenses and IDs will be extended until Feb. 1, 2021, so the cards will remain valid throughout that span. The extension applies to those who have October, November, December and January expiration dates.

"Extending expiration dates until Feb. 1 means people with an expired driver's license and ID card do not need to visit a driver services facility immediately," White said.

License plate stickers remain extended until Nov. 1, 2020, as they can be renewed online. White encouraged those who have business with the secretary of state to consider using online services instead of visiting a facility when possible.

Online services at www. cyberdriveillinois.com can be used to renew license plate stickers, obtain a duplicate driver's license or ID card, obtain a driving record abstract or renew a standard driver's license through the Safe Driver renewal program.

tinue to rise, according to White's office, with online license plate sticker renewals increasing 84 percent compared to the same period in 2019. From June 1 through Sept. 20, more than 1.2 million such renewals have been conducted online, compared to 654,596 during the same period a year ago.

White recently extended by one year the driver's license expiration date for drivers age 75 and older. The new expiration date is their birthday in 2021.

## State-regulated utilities extend shutoff moratorium to winter 2021

SPRINGFIELD — Several state-regulated utilities have voluntarily extended a moratorium on disconnections into next year after requests from the Illinois Commerce Commission.

The ICC announced that Nicor Gas and Liberty Utilities have agreed to halt shutoffs due to missed or late payments for all residential customers until March 31, 2021.

Ameren Illinois, Aqua Illinois, Illinois American Water, Commonwealth Edison, Peoples Gas/North Shore Gas and Utility Services of Illinois have agreed to delay disconnections to the same



date for residential customers who qualify for Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program, or LIHEAP, and those financially impacted by COVID-19.

MidAmerican has extended its moratorium on shutoffs for LIHEAP-qualified residential customers until March 31, 2021 as well, and is considering other options, according to ICC.

To qualify for LIHEAP, residential customers' combined household income for the 30 days prior to submitting an application must be at or below 200 percent of the federal poverty level for their family size. A spokesperson for the ICC said it is strongly encouraging all residential customers of the participatThis action will ensure a continuation of utility service. According to an ICC press release, residential customers who have been impacted financially by the COVID-19 pandemic and cannot pay their utility bill do not need to fill out any forms or provide paperwork to qualify for the moratorium. They just need to "make the phone call and verbalize" their situation to receive a delay on shutoffs if their state-regulated utility is participating in COVID-19 related moratoriums.

"This action will ensure a continuation of utility service. Deferred payment arrangements are also available for both residential and small business customers needing help managing their utility bill obligation during these difficult times," according to the release.

On June 18, the ICC approved a COVID-19 utility agreement with state-regulated utilities that included the first moratorium on shutoffs that some utilities have since voluntarily ex-

## Mendota student a member of academic record-setting class at University of Iowa

IOWA CITY, Iowa - Wyatt Hindle of Mendota is a member of the incoming undergraduate class at the University of Iowa. This class, which has topped previous records in achievement, has a higher average high school grade-point average (3.78) than any previous class. The average high school GPA for the classes of 2023 and 2022 were 3.76 and 3.71, respectively.

Hindle is classified as an Undergraduate - Third Year and a student in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences.

"These newest Hawkeyes are going to bring so much to our campus through their individual talents and perspectives, not to mention the incredible determination and tenacity they have demonstrated over these last months," says Kevin Kregel, interim executive vice president and provost. "We look forward to making sure they have the breadth and depth of opportunities they deserve and the support they need to achieve their academic goals."

The Class of 2024 is composed of 4,530 students,

456 fewer than last year. A decrease in enrollment was anticipated due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

About 21 percent of the class (971) are first-generation students, and about 21 percent (961) identify as African American, American Indian, Native Hawaiian or other Pacific Islander, Asian, Latinx/a/o, or two or more ethnicities.

Despite the challenges brought forth by the pandemic, Sarah Hansen, vice president for student life, says the Hawkeye spirit is strong and resilient.

"Just as we have overcome adversity in the past, we will overcome the considerable challenges we face with COVID-19. This year's incoming class is as accomplished and diverse as ever, and I know that they will make their mark on the University of Iowa," she says. "The Class of 2024 has already shown their resiliency as their senior year in high school was disrupted. We are so grateful to have them here on campus, and I

## Illinois farmland values remain stable, slight decline in 2021 cash rents

CHAMPAIGN – Stability is the key word on what's happening with farmland values and interest rates with only a slight decline expected in 2021 cash rents. This is the information coming from a webinar hosted today by the University of Illinois and the Illinois Society of Professional Farm Managers and Rural Appraisers.

The webinar, "Expectations for 2020 Farmland Prices and 2021 Cash Rents" was an offshoot of the Mid-Year Snapshot Survey on land values typically done by the Society and released at the Farm Progress Show. Making the presentation were University of Illinois professors Gary Schnitkey, Ph.D., and Bruce Sherrick, Ph.D., and Luke Worrell, AFM, ALC, chair of the Society's 2021 Land Values and Lease Trends Conference. Survey respondents were Society members along with others allied to the industry. It was conducted in late August.

In opening the webinar, Worrell noted here has been very little change in farmland prices across the state since Jan. 1 While slight increases of as much as 3 percent were noted in the northeast and west central parts of the state, values across the rest of Illinois have remained static. The average price for Excellent Quality farmland across the state was \$10,313.

The same trend was true with Good Quality land with some increases as much as 2.2 percent across the northern half of the state and decreases as low as 2.1 percent across the southern counties. The exception was the east central area which saw an increase of 4.5 percent since the first of the year. The average paid for Good farmland was \$8,233.

Across the state prices paid for Average Quality land was very "stable," with the overall average being \$6,350 per acre.

The trend on who's buying and selling has also remained very much along historic lines with estate and post-estate settlement accounting for 59 percent of the farmland being brought onto the market while Other Farmers are the primary purchasers buying 61 percent of the land that comes on the market. The stability aspect also comes into play with expectations for interest rates and for farmland prices for the balance of the year.

### Slight Decline in Cash Rents

In a comparison with neighboring states, it was noted that as of 2016, 50 percent of Illinois farmland is rented compared to 45 percent in Indiana, 41 percent in Iowa, and 37 percent in Ohio.

Those responding to the survey indicated an expectation of a 2.5 percent decline in cash rents for professionally managed Excellent farmland going into 2021. This drops the average rate from \$305 per acre to \$297.

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

For Good farmland the rate is projected to drop from \$270 to \$253. For Average land the rate is expected to go from \$224 per acre to \$212, and \$173 to \$160 for Fair quality land.

The expectation is for the price of corn to be \$3.25 per bushel on the 2021 crop. Projecting into the 2022 crop year the expected price for soybeans is \$9.09 per bushel with \$3.77 being paid for corn. The group expects low amounts of inflation looking 2 years out with only modest increase in interest rates. Looking 5 years into the future, 55 percent of those responding to the survey expect prices paid for farmland to be 1 to 10 percent higher. Basically, though, prices are expected to remain 'stable.' The same is true with cash rents with only 35 percent expecting rent rates will go up by as much as 10 percent over the next 5 years. Stable is again the word to describe the trends.







tended. The agreement also included consumer protections aimed at protecting utility customers during the coronavirus pandemic, such as deferred payment agreements, temporary waivers for reconnection fees and new deposit requirements.

"Illinois citizens are facing extraordinary challenges due to the pandemic. Low income families and those impacted by COVID-19 should not have to fear losing basic services like electricity, heat, or fresh water," Carrie Zalewski, ICC Chairman, said in a news release. "The voluntary actions by these utilities will provide our most vulnerable citizens with some peace of mind, especially as cold weather approaches."

has had mitigation measures in place prohibiting restaurants and bars from having indoor service until the state reported regional COVID-19 positivity rate declines.

The governor has put different levels of mitigations on different regions of the state unevenly, like the difference in Region 4 and Region 7 mitigation measures the governor said was an "unintended mistake."

"We've seen a lot of changes in the past, and they're not always science and data," Meier said. "After Region 4 was given that one week extension to try to get things under control, that wasn't science and data, that was because a lot of people from his same [Democratic] party were asking him.

"Maybe his daughter wants to go on hayrides and that's what's happened," Meier said. "She's been allowed to go out of state and go to her horse competitions, so maybe she wants to go on a hayride in Illinois and that's why we're going to have them, but at least some people are going to enjoy havrides and for that I'm happy."

Pritzker recently criticized people bringing his daughter's activities into the conversation, saying she's competing in approved sporting events. Both of last week's updated DCEO guidance says haunted houses should remain closed at this time.

## **Governor Pritzker closes door** on high school football this fall

## □ Says doctors and epidemiologists are leading the way

SPRINGFIELD - It appears high school football will remain a spring sport as the pandemic continues.

Gov. J.B. Pritzker said Sept. 25 that he has not been talking with the Illinois High School Association about moving football up to this fall, but it is the state public health officials who made the call, not him.

"It is doctors and epidemiologists that are leading the way here," Pritzker said. "It is what I have done all along in this pandemic. I think it's one of the reasons we have one of the lowest positivity rates in the Midwest."

Illinois High School Association executive director Craig Anderson sent the governor's office a letter requesting permission to allow the IHSA to govern its sports and a timetable



to return.

"With support from the IHSA Board of Directors, I issued a letter on Sept. 10 to Governor Pritzker and Deputy Governor Ruiz, that seeks permission for the IHSA and its Sports Medicine Advisory Committee to resume control over determining the resumption of IHSA sports and activities," Anderson said in an IHSA statement.

There have been several "Let Us Play" rallies around the state, as coaches, parents and players try to persuade the governor to change his mind. A large crowd showed up before the Chicago Bears home opener. Some high school athletes who are trying to impress college coaches on the football field left Illinois and are playing in states such as Texas and Florida.

Pritzker said it is no accident that states that allow football have higher cases of the coronavirus.

"If you look at just football, for example, many of the states that do not allow football today are the states with the lowest positivity rates," Pritzker said.

Minnesota recently voted to restart football, making Illinois the only state in the Midwest that won't have high school football this fall.

## Two former Illinois governors, now out of prison, have advice for House Speaker Michael Madigan

The Center Square SPRINGFIELD - Two former Illinois governors who served time in federal prison have some unsolicited advice for Illinois House Speaker Michael Madigan.

Former Gov. George Ryan, who served prison time for federal corruption charges, was the Speaker of the House before Madigan was elected speaker in 1983.

"I always got along with Mike and we worked together pretty much to get things done for the state and we worked together when I was speaker and when I was governor," Ryan said in an interview. "Mike's got his hands full, I think.'

Ryan, a Republican, is doing interviews promoting his book, "Until I Could Be Sure," which focuses on his steps to stop the death penalty in Illinois in 1999 before being convicted and sentenced to prison for corruption in 2006.

The 86-year-old Ryan had

they're going to prosecute you, they're only about 92 percent effective," Ryan said. "They're probably the most effective agency in government."

"That's always the best advice, be open and above board about everything," Ryan said.

In late July on his podcast for WLS radio, former Gov. Rod Blagojevich said Madigan should be honest.

"If you're not going to fight back and deny this stuff and tell the people who look to you as a major public official that not only did you not doing anything wrong but 'I'm going to take the questions and answer specific allegations and I've got nothing to hide,' unless you do that then you're telling me you're guilty,"

Blagojevich said.

Blagojevich, a Democrat who calls himself a "Trumpocrat," maintains his innocence of federal corruption charges despite serving years in prison, only to have his sentence commuted by President Donald Trump earlier this year.

The Speaker needs to come clean with the people of Illinois, Blagojevich said.

"We don't have a government of the people, by the people and for the people," Blagojevich said. "It is instead government of Mike Madigan, by Mike Madigan and for Mike Madigan."

Last week, Madigan declined to voluntarily testify in front of a House committee. A scheduled House hearing in Springfield on Sept. 29 won't have any witnesses, according to chairman state Rep. Chris Welch, D-Hillside. It's unclear if the committee will move to subpoena Madigan to testify. Madigan said last week that he won't appear before the committee.



## City of Mendota burn ordinance

MENDOTA - It is unlawful to burn any materials other than small and dried quantities of branches, leaves, weeds or grass at any time. The burning of any material such as rubber, tires, leather, tar paper, old batteries or any material that emits an offensive odor when burned is unlawful within the city limits of Mendota.

Limited amounts of yard waste material may be burned provided the material is dry and does not create an offensive odor, nuisance or

yard waste material may be kindled from 10 a.m. through 4 p.m. on Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays only. All fires must be constantly tended by a competent person, until such fire is properly extinguished. The continued smoldering of slow-burning combustible yard waste after 4 p.m. is a nuisance and anyone kindling such a fire that will emit obnoxious odors after 4 p.m. will be considered performing an unlawful act. Burning on Sunday by commercial establishments shall be considered an unlawful act.

## Enough with endorsements

SPRINGFIELD - A friend who is an old newspaperman contacted me the other day and wanted to know what I thought of the local newspaper no longer endorsing political candidates.

My response: it's about time.

Back in 2016, 243 daily newspapers endorsed Hillary Clinton compared to 20 that endorsed Donald Trump.

Media journalist Jim Rutenberg wrote in October 2016 that endorsements in the presidential election were distinguished by "blunt condemnation" of Trump combined with a "save the Republic" tone.

Despite that, we all know who won the presidency. That says to me that most folks don't care what their local newspaper has to say about who to vote for.

The other thing is most readers - and many politicians - don't understand the role of endorsements. What appears on the editorial page shouldn't influence day-to-day news coverage. And in ethical, well-run newsrooms, it doesn't.

An endorsement is the institutional voice of the newspaper saying who it supports. It's not a statement that they will bias their news coverage to help a particular candidate.

Unfortunately, not everyone understands or believes this.

I remember covering a U.S. Senate race when I worked for the Las Vegas Sun. Sen. John Ensign wouldn't talk to me because the newspaper had endorsed his opponent.

Try as I might, I couldn't convince him that I had no agenda other than to be fair. I knew he wasn't offended by something I wrote because I had just moved to Nevada from the Midwest.

Still, he wanted nothing to do with anyone from the Sun.


It's time for candidate endorsements to go by the wavside.

This isn't an original thought. Decades ago, Al Neuharth, the founder of USA Today, prohibited candidate endorsements because he believed it tainted news coverage and was elitist for a newspaper to tell readers how to vote.

Elitist journalists? Surely, he jested.

It's much better for newspapers to find out where candidates for various offices stand on the issues and let readers decide for themselves.

That said, there was entertainment value in candidates marching into newsrooms vying for endorsements



## **Dedicating the new Baptist Church – 1950**

(The following is from Jessica Nashold's Backtracks & Sidetracks column reprinted from Sept. 27, 2000.) By Jessica Nashold

It was a joyous time for the congregation of the First Baptist Church when work was completed on a new building to replace the church destroyed by fire in 1942. For eight years they had been meeting in the second floor Masonic Hall on Washington Street, led by Rev. Kenneth Sollitt.

Starting on Sept. 10, 1950, services were held in the new church and the official dedication was held on the evening of Sept. 17. The Mendota Ministerial Association joined the Rev. Sollitt on this milestone occasion. The Rev. Wilbert Hare, Presbyterian, presided. Other members of the clergy taking part were the Rev. W.Z. Dial, Advent Christian; the Rev. J.R. Drees, Methodist; the Rev. W.A. Giese, Evangelical United Brethren; and the Rev. Stroble, pastor of the LaMoille Baptist Church.

Following the service, those who had not yet toured the new church were given an opportunity to do so.

The 1950 football season at MTHS was one of the memorable ones. Coached by Ted Lewis, the Trojans started out with two away games. The first, in Amboy, was a 29-0 Trojan victory. Larry Lau scored four touchdowns behind "terrific blocking" by Jim Mc-Cormick, Benny Durand, Bill Phalen and Dale Danekas. It was conceded that the Mendota team was "bigger and faster." The second game, in Morris, resulted in another shutout - Trojans 31, Morris Redskins 0. The season record showed only one loss and one tie.



twins, Sandra and Madra. A juke box dance topped the evening. For the big dance following the game, Alec Wylie's "newly organized band" would provide the music.

In other Kanteen news, it was reported that Mrs. Richard Phalen had agreed to take charge of the Kanteen Bowling League, with sign-up to begin Sept. 29, 1950.

Mendota Athletic Boosters opened a bank account to receive funds being raised for new bleachers at the football field. Membership in MABS was \$1.

Music director Earnest Schlick called a meeting of band parents at Lincoln School on Sept. 26, 1950. Objective was to acquaint parents with options for instruction on band instruments and plans for a grade school band.

Milo Jordan closed his East Side grocery store when his lease expired. He was relocating in Bloomington. • At Sam's Steak House, Henry Orr Bobby Jacob and Janet Wright. Judges were Mr. and Mrs. Blake Chilton, sonin-law and daughter of Superintendent M.E. Steele. Both the Chiltons held college degrees in art.

The Mendota Accordion Band announced it would be holding dances at Odd Fellow Hall every two weeks during the winter months.

In a freak accident, an airborne stone shattered glass in the window of Edward Baker's law office at 804 Jefferson St. It startled Charles Hendrick, who happened to be sitting near the winder. Hendrick said "it sounded like gunfire."

Mr. and Mrs. Ed Lorack were among 150 car dealers in Illinois and Indiana honored by the Chicago Motor Club at a banquet in the Edgewater Beach Hotel. They received a framed certificate recording their cooperation in the high school driver's training program.

The MTHS Building Trades boys started a second house on the southwest corner of 16th Street and Augustine Avenue. There were 16 students enrolled in the course. Eight would be completing work on the first house, started under Joe Rollins. The other eight would be starting work on the second house under Merrill Mann.

I remember a Davenport, Iowa, City Council candidate saying he would reduce the city workforce through "nutrition." I guess he planned to starve them to death.

Or there was the time a certain state senator was asked about his riverboat gambling stock holdings and his companion stood up and challenged the editorial board: "You want to settle this down in the parking lot, right now?"

Charles Wheeler III, a longtime statehouse reporter and retired journalism professor at the University of Illinois-Springfield, says he is hard pressed to think of any statewide race in the last 50 years where a newspaper endorsement made the difference.

"In 1964, there wasn't agreement on legislative districts so the entire Illinois House ran at-large," he said. "Of course, that was the year (Barry) Goldwater led the Republican ticket. The only House Republicans who won that year were the ones endorsed by the Chicago newspapers."

Wheeler said that is the last race he can remember endorsements playing such a significant role.

And he too struggled to get politicians to believe there isn't a connection between endorsements and news coverage.

"I'd just tell them if you own a newspaper, you can endorse anyone you want on the editorial page. But reporters don't have anything to do with that. We're just here to report the news."

## **Constitutional revolution**

Constitutional revolution is going mainstream.

If the Republican Senate confirms a Trump appointee to fill Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg's Supreme Court seat right before or after the election, progressives say Democrats, if they sweep in November, should retaliate by packing the Supreme Court.

None of this comes out of the blue. The left is disenchanted with our country, and especially its governing institutions, which it believes are shot through with racism and deeply undemocratic. Democrats have gone from assuming a few years ago that they have a permanent majority to assuming that they can't possibly win under such a rigged system.

They no longer want to live under a government that checks majoritarian passions, recognizes the importance of states in our federal system and features a Supreme Court that is supposed to render independent judgments based on the law and the Constitution. All of this, once a matter of basic civics, is now for suckers.

Before its new fashion, court-packing used to be notorious, the ill-considered move that President Franklin Roosevelt couldn't see through even at the height of his power.

For good reason. To add a bunch of new seats to the Supreme Court explicitly so a Democratic president could fill them would radically diminish the Court's standing. It would invite Republicans to counter with their own bout of court-packing when they again return to power. The Court would become merely a partisan plaything and essentially an adjunct to the legislative branch -- all that would stay the same would be the black robes.

And for what? To compensate for a duly elected Republican Senate acting on its prerogatives to block one Supreme Court nominee (Obama nominee Merrick Garland) and potentially

confirm another (Trump's nominee to fill the RBG seat).

The Senate itself is now an affront because small states get equal representation with large states. Never mind that this arrangement was at the center of the deal that gave us the Constitution. Never mind that the Constitution stipulates that this provision is unamendable. Never mind that prior to 2014 the Democrats controlled the Senate and didn't seem overly concerned about the body's alleged lack of legitimacy.

It's not a failing of our constitutional design that Democrats have made themselves so hateful to rural voters that they despair of reliably holding the Senate going forward. As a corrective, they are threatening to eliminate the filibuster to allow them to add Washington, D.C., and Puerto Rico as states to boost their number of senators, a maneuver that smacks of pre-Civil War era power politics.

All of this talk is an awkward fit for Joe Biden's candidacy. We are told that Biden is an inoffensive institutionalist and committed moderate, but if Republicans defy his wishes on the RBG seat, he will respond by blessing outlandish changes to our system passed by narrow majorities.

And, by the way, Biden better win. Shadi Hamid of The Atlantic wrote a piece expressing his worry "that Trump will win reelection and Democrats and others on the left will be unwilling, even unable, to accept the result." He raises the possibility of "mass unrest and political violence across American cities."

Accepting the result of an election is a pretty important norm -- unless you've convinced yourself you live under a hideously undemocratic regime with no legitimacy.

River Weaving art installation walking tour Oct. 3 & 11

DEKALB - The River Weaving walking tour has been rescheduled for two dates, Saturday, Oct. 3 and Sunday, Oct. 11. Both will be held at 2 p.m. and attendees can pre-register for free at go.niu.edu/riverweaving.

The walking tour and discussion will begin at the "River Weaving" site near the College Street bridge on the east side of the NIU Music Building in DeKalb.

Thirty-four years ago, John Siblik was an NIU art student drawing up a concept for an environmental sculpture to be placed in the Kishwaukee River where it flows past the lagoon and Music Building. Now, Siblik is standing in that river, in that same spot with a team of students and alumni installing the very same artwork.

Siblik is an associate professor in the School of Art and Design where he earned his Bachelor of Fine Arts and Bachelor of Science in Art Education. This is the sixth time he's created and installed a version of this project, the second time in Illinois. The first was in Lockport's I&M canal in 2014. But this current version is particularly special. "River Weaving" is part of NIU's 125th Anniversary year-long celebration and a chance for Siblik to complete the vision he first had in 1986.

"The project commemorates the Kishwaukee River



as an important feature of the landscape that helped influence state officials to select DeKalb as the site for NIU prior to its founding in 1895," Siblik says. "Earl W. Hayter, in his history of Northern Illinois University 'Education in Transition' tells a wonderful mythic tale of the residents of DeKalb going without water for two days so that the city's water supply could be diverted into the Kish and have it appear to the commissioners that the Kish was in fact a mighty river. For those of us that are alumni of NIU, it's been stated that if you dip your toe in the Kish you will never leave, at least in our hearts."

The installation features 90 elements made of willow, steel and stone. Each is six to eight feet in length and placed onto a base that is four feet wide and two to four feet tall. The design is flexible and portable to adapt to different rivers and strong enough to hold up to flooding and currents.

"The most basic way to think about this piece of environmental art is that it is weaving as sculpture," Siblik said. "The environmental significance is that the piece reminds the viewer that we cannot think of the environmentas disconnected from ourselves...all aspects of nature and society are connected.

"As the water level in the river rises, "River Weaving" is activated and serves as a filter collecting litter and debris. Some of the items collected so far include a mattress, tire, shoe, fishing pole, COVID-19 mask, as well as several bags, wrappers, bottles, and cans., It starts as a beautiful, elegant sculpture. Then, after a heavy rain, River Weaving reveals that we dump too much trash into the water."

But while installing the sculpture in the Kishwaukee

River, Siblik said he was encouraged. "The water quality appears to be improving, and we found delicate arrowroot plants, crayfish and mussels, signs of a healthy waterway."

His team includes Myel Simmons, an NIU art student and illustrator who is serving as the project manager, Jose Vazquez, an environmental science major, and business student Jared Norton.

Three alumni are also helping. Arin Whitmore, a 2020 BFA drawing graduate, Mark Mattson, who earned his bachelor's and master's in English from NIU is business development manager at Creative Therapeutics in DeKalb, and Ken Olson holds a degree in physical therapy from NIU and is a physical therapist and principal partner with Northern Rehab in DeKalb.

Support for the project is from the NIU 125th Anniversary Committee, as well as material support from local businesses. Dimco Steel and Metal in DeKalb donated over 3,000 pounds of rebar. Wagner Aggregate provided over 14,000 pounds of locally sourced limestone from a quarry in Fairdale used to weigh down the sculptures, and R&B Services in DeKalb hauled and delivered the stone.

Siblik estimates the sculpture installation will be in place until Oct. 15, depending on weather.





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## Illinois Monarch action plan takes flight

SPRINGFIELD — The Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR), Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT), Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) and Illinois Department of Agriculture (IDOA) solidified their commitment to protecting monarch butterflies and other pollinators by signing the Illinois Monarch Action Plan at Conservation World on the Illinois State Fairgrounds on Sept. 24.

"Though small, pollinators play an extremely important role in our survival here in Illinois and the world," said IDNR Director Colleen Callahan. "Today's signing not only moves us as a state from plan to action, but also reaffirms our commitment as public servants to doing our part in ensuring pollinators' survival."

"Monarch butterflies capture the hearts of people across Illinois, from school children to mayors, in cities and across rural areas. The Illinois Monarch Project and this action plan harness this enthusiasm to empower others to take steps to help monarchs and other pollinators," said Iris Caldwell, University of Illinois Chicago and state coordinator for Illinois Monarch Project. "We're excited to launch the implementation of the action plan through a series of virtual events beginning in October."

Tasked with bolstering the population of monarchs and other pollinators by protecting habitat and adding food sources, the project brings together public agencies, private organizations and residents of the state in a collaborative and coordinated effort to ensure the survival and successful migration of monarchs.

As part of a regional effort to add 1.3 billion stems of new milkweed to the central U.S. to support migrating monarchs, Illinois is tasked with adding 150,000,000 stems of new milkweed embedded in diverse nectar sources by 2038. As one of the largest landowners in the state, IDOT is in a unique position to contribute resources to this goal.

"We hold a special commitment at IDOT for the environment and the role pollinators play in the Illinois ecosystem and economy," said Acting Illinois Transportation Secretary Omer Osman. "From mowing schedules and restricting the use of pesticides to planting only certain species along our roadsides, IDOT has embraced many changes in policies and practices over the years to protect pollinators. This plan only serves to strengthen those efforts going forward."

Prior to the project's beginning in October 2016, efforts to protect pollinators already were in place at state agencies and organizations. Those plans, as well as new initiatives, and have been included in the state's action plan to maximize efforts.

"The Illinois EPA works to provide a healthy environment and reduce threats to essential components of the ecosystem like the Monarch butterfly and other pollinators," said Illinois EPA Director John Kim. "We applaud the efforts of the Agencies and organizations involved with the development of the Illinois Monarch Project Action Plan."

"Illinois leads the nation in soybean production and is number two in corn, so our state's farmers are well aware of the importance of pollinators," said IDOAActing Director Jerry Costello II. "Understanding their importance to all Illinois crops, IDOA has executed a multi-year pollinator habitat establishment at our fairgrounds in Springfield and DuQuoin. This multi-year plan, which is in its second year, will convert approximately 25-30 acres of land when fully completed."

## IHSA Board expands golf & cross country state series

## Both sports will culminate with sectional

BLOOMINGTON The Illinois High School Association (IHSA) Board of Directors announced on Sept. 23 that they have voted to expand the IHSA State Series in two fall sports, adding a second round of postseason play in boys and girls golf and boys and girls cross country. There will be no additional fee to compete in the sectional round. The vote took place during a special meeting that was called to specifically address sectionals for the two sports.


"Despite the challenges of this school year, our Board has remained committed to providing the most rewarding postseason experiences possible," said IHSA Executive Director Craig Anderson. "Given the relative success we have had safely conducting cross country and golf this fall, the Board asked our staff during the September Board

meeting (Sept. 14) to explore the possibility of expanding beyond regionals to conduct sectionals as well."

Both sports were each initially scheduled to culminate their respective seasons after IHSA regional meets, but will now conclude their respective seasons after the sectional round. In golf, the top two teams and top four individuals in each regional will advance to sectional play. Cross country will advance five teams from each regional to sectionals, with no changes in the individual

qualifier field. IHSA staff attempted to maintain COVID regions and keep participant levels as low as possible when making assignments, but in some cases, generally those involving schools on or near a COVID border, schools were assigned to a tournament outside of their COVID region.

'Given the timing, our greatest challenge will be finding hosts, especially in cross country," said Anderson. "We have been granted exemptions to compete outside the COVID Regions



The Board also created an exemption to the season limitation rule to allow for participation in the cross country sectionals, while temporarily

modifying Terms & Conditions for both sports to allow greater flexibility in scheduling the respective meets. Golf sectionals are slated for the week of Oct. 12-17, while cross country sectionals are expected to unfold Oct. 29-31. Host sites and meet dates will be announced on IHSA. org soon.

There were no changes made to the postseason structure for IHSA girls' tennis and girls' swimming & diving, which both begin postseason competition at the sectional level.

## Illinois Dept. of Natural Resources updates Spring wild turkey permit application process

□ First lottery applications will be accepted October 6-December 1

SPRINGFIELD — The Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) announced updates to the process for hunters who wish to enter the lottery for Spring Wild Turkey permits. The new application procedure, adopted earlier this year, will streamline the lotteries for turkey hunters, making it easier to obtain all three of their permits online rather than a combination of online and over-the-counter.

We hope this new process will be simpler and more straightforward for our hunters," said Luke Garver, manager, Wild Turkey Project, IDNR. "Resident hunters can now apply in all three lotteries, whereas previously they would only be able to apply in the first and third. Hunters also will have the opportunity to get more permits for their favorite public land spots via the lottery."

Changes to the lottery process include:

• First Lottery: Only resident hunters may apply for one turkey hunting permit. This excludes hunters who have received or will receive a landowner property-only hunting turkey permit for the spring season. Applications for First Lottery are accepted beginning Oct. 6 through Dec. 1.

· Second Lottery: All hunters are eligible to apply for one turkey hunting permit, but hunters who have not already been awarded a permit will receive preference. Applications are accepted through the first working day after Jan. 10.

• Third Lottery: All hunters are eligible to apply. Hunters may apply for up to three permits during this period, except that no one may exceed the limit of three permits in total for spring turkey hunting. The three-permit total includes lottery-drawn, landowner, youth, and OTC permits. Applications are accepted through the first working day after Feb. 8.

## Help yourself with every word you speak

I started smoking when I was nine years old and smoked for many years. I liked it! So, when I decided to stop, it was really difficult for me.

Every time I tried to quit, I'd last a few hours and then I'd be running around, digging cigarette butts out of the trash or looking for cigarettes in my coat pockets – anywhere I could think to look for them!

I didn't have success until I got a revelation: I was burying myself in defeat with negative thoughts and words. I had to stop talking

myself out of my victory. Thankfully, I finally realized that I was causing myself to fail through the negative things I was saying about myself. For a long time I would say, "I just know I could never quit smoking. And if I did, I'd probably gain a lot of weight."

But God was able to get through to me eventually and help me see that if I didn't change the way I was talking, I wouldn't change. Then, He began

to put a desire in my heart to start speaking what I wanted, not what I had.

I started saying things like, "I can't stand to smoke! These things stink and they're expensive. I don't smoke anymore!"

At first, I felt silly doing this because I would make these declarations while I was smoking. However, within about a week of changing my confession, I realized I now had the grace of God to quit smoking.

What I learned from this experience is I cannot rise above my own confession. And I discovered it takes two things to get the mouth under control: a lot of help from God and discipline and self-control.

God taught me to talk like Him.

Proverbs 18:21 says, "Death and life are in the power of the tongue..." And Hebrews 4:14 says that Jesus is our great High Priest and we should "hold fast our confession [of faith and cling tenaciously to our absolute trust in Him as Savior]" (AMPC).

The word confession means "to say the same thing as." As the High Priest of our confession, Jesus can only do what we're saying that agrees with His Word. So it's vital for us as Christians to learn how to speak the Word of God and not just



say things based on our feelings or what other people have said about us.

Now, I believe we'll have greater success with this if we concentrate on what we should be doing with our mouth, rather than focusing on all the things we shouldn't say. It's self-defeating to go around saying things like, "I shouldn't do that... I'd better not do this..."

I want to encourage you to really listen to yourself and locate yourself. Where's your heart? The Bible says out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaks (see Luke 6:45). We need to stop saying, "Oh, I didn't mean that. I was just kidding." And we need to start being accountable for the words we speak.

The truth is, the things we say come from something that is formed in our heart. So you can determine where your heart is by listening to yourself. You can hear bitterness and jealousy...insecurity and unhappiness.

Think about how you talk when you're going through a hard time. Or when you don't get what you want. Remember that what you say reveals the real you!

Changing the way you talk will change your heart.

Do you need a change of heart? All of us do. We all have room to grow in our relationship with God. And the way to make progress is to speak His language. When you do, you'll...

Bless everything you can possibly bless. The Bible says we have the power to bless or curse with the words of our mouth. (See James 3:8-10.)

Be thankful and say so! (See Psalm 100:4.) Don't just think about how much you appreciate someone – tell them!

Be an encourager. Make an effort to give someone an encouraging word every day.

Tell the truth! Speak the Word of

God. Recite and memorize verses that deal with things you want to change or overcome, such as anger, unforgiveness, insecurity...

Stop talking too much. Be quick to hear and slow to speak. (See James 1:19.)

God wants you to pray and ask Him to help you

use your mouth to say the right things. When you do, it will change your life!
