# Thirty-five remote students return to school

Nettles: Not perfect, but going well

CLINTON — At a socially-distanced school board meeting in the Clinton High School commons Tuesday night, Superintendent Curt Nettles said 35 students have returned to school from remote learning.

The district offered a "grace period" until Sept. 4 for students and their families to decide if they wanted to continue remote learning or return to inperson classes.

"We're glad to have them back," Nettles said. He estimated the number

of remote learners to be "a shade under 300," which is about 20 percent of the student population.

"I won't say everything is perfect (with the remote learning) because it's not, but it's going pretty well," said Nettles.

In other action, the board: Recognized the district nurses for their efforts this school year.

## Hospital erects tent for COVID-19 testing

Testing at Warner requires an order from a physician

CLINTON — Warner Hospital has erected a tent for the second time this year in response to the novel coronavirus.

Last spring a tent was erected in preparation for Covid-19 testing but it was "never needed because everyone stayed home," said Warner Hospital Chief Executive Officer Paul Skowron. "Now it's different. People are out and about."

Since schools opened a few weeks ago, the hospital has seen "an influx each day from family members with children with symptoms," Skowron said.

Warner Hospital's physical size could not accommodate the influx of people and still maintain proper social distancing, Skowron explained, and people were being asked to wait in their cars or outside



on the benches.

"This (virus) is probably not going away in a couple weeks," Skowron said. In addition to school children, nursing home resident testing has also increased.

Much of the increase, he explained, is due to Warner Hospital providing sameday results. Public and free testing sites are

running three to seven days for results.

"Word has gotten around," Skowron said, "and we're getting some spillage from outside the county. Some people are coming from a good distance away."

Warner Hospital staff is doing their best to manage the increase in both testing and people. A patient flow manager was recently hired to intercept people at the hospital entrance for better direction to the services they need and to keep the traffic flow moving in one direction.

"I hope we don't have to use it," Skowron said of the tent, but the hospital has possession of it from its Region 6 Emergency Management Group for two months. "If we need it longer, we'll request it."

The 20' x 40' tent will open Sept. 21 and will provide Covid-19 testing for people with doctors' orders only. Free testing will not be available at this site. The hours will be 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday with a half hour break from 12-12:30 p.m. No appointments are needed.

# Wapella Wall of Honor dedication Sunday

WAPELLA — Friends of Wapella Veterans will dedicate its Wall of Honor on Sunday at Wapella Park. Project coordinator Bryan Atwood gave some details to trustees during Tuesday's Village board meeting.

"The electrician will be finished tomorrow; the graphic designer will be finished on Thursday," Atwood said. "That leaves us Friday and Saturday to spruce up the grounds."

Atwood said he expected 300-400 people to attend the ceremony, which he estimated would take about an hour.

Fundraising and planning for the memorial began early in 2019 with preliminary work on the site completed later that year.

Memorial unveiling is scheduled for 1 p.m. on Sunday, Sept. 20. Signs will direct people to available parking.

In other board business, trustees approved a plan to set up a separate workspace inside village hall for the village's FOIA officer.

Since August 3, the village has provided FOIA requests submitted by a single person totaling 1,656 pages, according to Maxine Swartz, the village's FOIA officer. The most recent request totaled just over 500 pages in length.

The workspace will include the purchase of a new computer and desk expected to cost well under \$1,500.

## State reviewing questions before marijuana license lottery date

SPRINGFIELD — The Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation announced Tuesday that it continues to "review questions" and has still not set a date for a lottery to distribute 75 marijuana dispensary licenses.

After IDFPR announced earlier this month that just 21 applicants qualified for the first 75 social equity licenses, lawmakers and stakeholders immediately raised concerns with Gov. JB Pritzker, asking his administration to temporarily stop the process.

The licenses were originally scheduled to be distributed in May, but the

process was delayed amid the COVID-19 pandemic. On Sept. 3, an IDFPR spokesperson said the lottery would be scheduled in "late September." But IDFPR said Tuesday there is still no scheduled lottery date.


"The final date for the lottery for adult-use cannabis licenses had not been set as of today," an IDFPR spokesperson wrote in an email. "As we continue to review questions that have been raised, our goal is to provide time to ensure that the process is fair and equitable. A date for the lottery will be announced by IDFPR."

## IESA board holds regular fall meeting via Zoom

The Illinois Elementary School Association (IESA) Board of Directors held its regularly scheduled fall meeting via a zoom conference call on Friday, September 11.

meeting, abusy several were items discussed including the announcement that Steve Endsley will retire as the Executive Director of the IESA at the conclusion of the 2020-21 school year. His last day is scheduled for June 30, 2021. Nicole Schaefbauer, the current Executive Director, has been named as Endsley's replacement and will take over the duties of Executive Director effective July 1,

The Alternative Plan for the Return to Play of IESA activities was revised. Specific dates have now been set for regional play in the activities of boys basketball, girls volleyball, and girls basketball.

"When we approved the IESA plan for 2020-21 in July, we indicated the plan for the activities would be fluid," said Steve Endsley, IESA Executive Director. "As we reviewed the plan for these three sports, it became apparent that we needed to add an additional week for regional play to accommodate the 8th grade level. The new plan now details the starting dates for regional play at both the 7th grader and 8th grade level."

In addition to setting the regional playing dates, there were two other adjustments to the IESA

Contact Days---Coaches will now be able to (for the 20-21 school year only) have 15 contact days with their players. These contact days may begin on November 2 and must end on December 18. Practices must be held in accordance with the All Sports policy regarding the wearing of masks and social distancing. Number of Contests---In an ordinary year, basketball and volleyball teams are limited to 24 games. Given that the seasons are shorter this year, that number has been reduced to 15. However, the limitation on the number of contests per week has been lifted. Whereas there was a limit of two games per week for baseball and softball (3 if one of the dates was a doubleheader), that limitation has been removed. Schools can play 15 games in the five-week season. If that means that four games are played in a given week, that would be acceptable. Schools cannot exceed a total of 15

In addition to the above mentioned items, the Board tied up other loose ends at the meeting. The following is a summary of the meeting:

Board Appointments: Mrs. Renee Marski, Principal at Shorewood Troy and Dr. Allen Duncan, Principal at Edwardsville Liberty were appointed to serve as Board Members for Divisions D and O respectively.

Audit: The Board approved the annual audit of the Association by Striegel Knobloch & Company, LLC of Bloomington. The principal of a member school may request that a copy of the audit be mailed to the school.

State Cross Country Site: The Board approved accepting proposals for an entity to serve as the state cross country host stating in 2021. Those bid specifications will be released shortly on the IESA website.

Treasurer's Report: The Board accepted the August, 2020 treasurer's report and received a five year comparison of income and expenditures through FY 20.

FY 21 Budget: The Board approved the FY 21 budget and discussed the financial future of the Association. The budget approved by the Board has expected income of \$154,279. This amount is 1.6 million less than what was approved for FY20. Conversely, expenses for FY 21 are projected at \$855,140.

"The financial impact that COVID-19 has on the finances of the Association are devastating," said Endsley. "Our athletic tournament receipts for 19-20 were down over \$450,000 from the previous year. That has taken its toll financially on the Association. We generate almost 60 percent of our total revenue from tournaments and given that we were no able to host our state wrestling, volleyball, and track and field finals this past winter and spring, we are now facing some real financial struggles. Our Finance Committee will be meeting in the early fall to review all financial aspects of the Association to determine the best course of action so that we can continue to keep our doors open and continue to operate."

Workshops/Division Meeting: The annual athletic director, speech and scholastic bowl workshops have been cancelled. The Division Meeting will be posted online the week of September 14. Each member school is required to view the Division Meeting online before December 18.

Board Elections: Information was shared with the Board concerning the timeline for the upcoming elections. The Board members who are up for election are: Tim Haupt (Division A); Jeff Owens (Division D); Danette Young (Division L); Tod Davis (Division M); and Pat Drees (Division N).

2021 Cheerleading Competition: The Board approved a staff recommendation that the January 23, 2021 competition be postponed until there is approval from the Governor's Office, ISBE, and DCEO to hold such an event. If there is approval given at a later date to host a competitive cheer event and assuming schools will have adequate time to safely prepare for the competition, it is the intent of the IESA to hold the competition.

Division Reports


At each meeting of the Board of Directors time is devoted for each board member to report on communication with and requests from the member schools in the member's division. In addition, Board members may make observations regarding the operation the Association. Following is a report of those from the September 11 meeting:

Division A; Mr. Haupt was contacted concerning refunds of activity fees if schools were not able to participate due to COVID-19. The issue of refunds/credit toward future participation will be discussed by the Finance Committee when they meet

Division M: Mr. Davis was contacted by several schools in his area regarding portable pitching mounds. After discussion, the Board approved that portable pitching mounds may be used in regional play for the 2020 baseball regionals.

Several members commented that they had received positive feedback from schools in their divisions for moving forward with the activities of golf, softball, baseball, and cross country.

## Unions form nonprofit to push green jobs, help for nuclear plants

(The Center Square) – A new unionsponsored push for green energy said the future of Illinois' nuclear power plants is a priority, but will it be enough to convince corruption-wary lawmakers and Gov. J.B. Pritzker to sign off on what critics call yet another ratepayer bailout for one of Illinois' utilities?

Climate Jobs Illinois, a collaborative nonprofit run by leaders in organized labor, announced the formation Monday.

Climate Jobs Illinois list the Illinois AFL-CIO, Chicago Federation of Labor, Chicago & Cook County Building & Construction Trades Council, Chicago Regional Council of Carpenters, International Association of Bridge Structural Ornamental and Reinforcing Iron Workers Union, International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers State Council, International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Local 134,

International Union of Operating Engineers Local 150, Laborers International Union of North America Great Lakes Region, Laborers International Union of North America Midwest Region,

Service Employees International Union Local 1, and the United Auto Workers Region 4 as member unions.

Executive Director Nikki Budzinski, who recently left the Pritzker administration, said the nonprofit will unveil new policy initiatives not only in the energy sector but also infrastructure and other policy areas in the coming months.

"There is a lot of rightful anxiety right now as it relates to a lot of these topics," she said Monday. "That's why we formed this coalition. We really want to make sure that those concerns of working families are elevated in this debate."

The labor unions behind the organization represent thousands employed in Exelon's nuclear fleet, two of which are slated to close in 2021 and two more at risk of closure without state action on the Clean Energy Jobs Act. The bill would allow the Illinois Power Authority to create a state-regulated wholesale energy market for Exelon to sell their nuclear-generated

riectricity.

The power company said the separate market is necessary for the survival of their nuclear fleet in Illinois but the business community argues it amounts to another bailout of a profitable company since the secondary market would inevitably remove some competition they faced on the PJM Interconnection auction.

The market also represents the third piece of hallmark legislation that would send billions of additional dollars in revenue to a company that has admitted to participating in a years-long patronage scheme allegedly involving House Speaker Michael Madigan.

"Our current nuclear fleet in Illinois

that is zero-carbon, is critical to maintain Illinois' base-load energy needs in order for us to make the full transition to a 100 percent clean energy economy," Budzinski said.

A spokesman for CJI stressed their organization is entirely independent of the state's utility corporations.


Gov. J.B. Pritzker unveiled an eightpoint green energy agenda in August that hints about taking the secondary market off the table. He has said he supports CJI.

"Union jobs have built Illinois for decades and opened the door to the middle class for many families," he said. "We will need thousands more to tackle climate change and combat inequality — so I welcome Climate Jobs Illinois to the effort to create a cleaner future for our state."

The group also has the endorsement of Illinois Sen. Sue Rezin, a Morris Republican whose district contains one of the plants slated for closure in 2021.

"We don't have to choose between a cleaner future and hundreds of middle-class jobs for families," Rezin said. "In my district, we've delivered both for decades at the Dresden nuclear plant. Having Climate Jobs Illinois around will keep middle-class jobs at the center of the debate as our state looks to build a cleaner and better future."

Rezin has begun a grassroots effort to keep the two nuclear open.

In a letter sent to Pritzker on Sept. 4, the Illinois Legislative Black Caucus listed five requests they wanted resolved before the licenses are awarded. The members of that caucus want to see a detailed rubric of how applicants were graded, the publication of some application information on the IDFPR website, and information on how KPMG – a firm that provides professional services such as auditing - received a \$4.2 million no-bid contract from the state to score dispensary applicants. The ILBC also asked for the ethnic and racial makeup of KPMG's board and the team behind scoring applicants.

Two rejected applicants are also suing the state to stop the licenses from being awarded, alleging the 21 winners received perfect scores due to political connections, and that at least one had hired a manager tied to KPMG.

"KPMG stands by our work to objectively score

applications based criteria set by the state. We brought a diverse and experienced team together to do this work quickly and accurately, and are proud of our team's performance," A KPMG spokesperson said in an

The firm said it "built a diverse, national team, comprised of employees from many offices."

"The team scoring the applications would have no knowledge of the names or affiliations of applicants. A separate team scored certain aspects of the application, such as social equity," the spokesperson added.

## Let's emulsify something

elcome to my little corner of culinary delights. To make a proper vinaigrette will not work if one is unsure of even the slightest detail.

As you have learned, it is not a simple matter throwing things together. Certainly no one can invent or modify the recipe unless they are very practiced and knowledgeable on the matter. It is imperative for us to fully understand emulsification. Important matters will be reiterated.

There must be a balance of all flavors in order to fit a primary need in the structure. For example, the primary need for mustard or egg yolk is to be that needed emulsifier. However, one not ignore the fact that emulsifiers also provide a flavor all of their own.

Such flavors must then be compensated for and blend harmoniously with all other ingredients by correcting the proportions for that balance. Besides that, they must all evenly dispersed throughout the mixture.

The mechanical part of making the vinaigrette would be whipping the oil in with the liquid. As a reminder, this requires a most careful control of the amount of oil flow. One must begin by whipping in a thin stream of oil into the continuous phase (liquid).

Once it appears to be emulsifying, then the oil can be added more quickly; all the while whipping like crazy. Although I like the traditional form, others might prefer the easier method. An easier method would be to use a mixer with a whip attachment or even a blender or food processer.

At this point, fresh herbs can be added to give it that fresh hint of flavor and color. As evident by



simmering, herbs are delicate and the flavor corrupted or weakened. In the case of vinaigrettes, herbs should not be added too early. To do so, the vinegar can start to discolor the herbs and damage the flavor intended. You need the vinaigrettes to have a lively fresh tasting flavor. The thinning of the continuous by the dispersed portion prevents this discoloring and flavor

Garnishes compliments can now be added. Fresh or dried herbs make for good compliments. Fruits or vegetable pieces make for good garnishes. Even cheese particles. I often prefer putting in a sprig of thyme, dill weed, oregano, rosemary or even a clove of garlic after the vinaigrette is mixed. This helps to identify the type of vinaigrette.

When choosing your garnish and compliments, always keep in mind that it must agree with the established flavors. As I said earlier, making vinaigrettes is a true test of a true chef; even a challenge. And yet this is not all. We still have other sauces and dressings to

consider. Is culinary not wonderful? Not only does it increase one's knowledge for producing wonderful eating experiences, but there is no limit to what all can be learned and done. It also embraces other talented needs such as art and design. It encourages the inventive mind.



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



## Riot responses

Have you noticed responses of City State governments to riots protesting the police in this country?

Police officers are trained to channel and control They protest marches.

understand that the public has the Constitutional right to protest and have a demonstration. It is when the protest becomes violent that police officers physically push back and seek to disperse the protest march. That is basic law enforcement 101 if you will.

Unfortunately what we have seen is that many city administrations are choosing to support the protest, regardless of the violence, and then heap the blame on their local police forces. Portland, Ore. is a prime example of this mindset. For what the administration perceives as a political advantage to them, they will allow protests to escalate and tell the police officers to stand down. The results are entirely predictable.

Demonstrations escalate into riots. The city authorities then prohibit the police from responding to quell the riot. The riots then take on a life of their own and chaos ensues. The police are essentially emasculated in this situation. The rioters are enabled by the government to simply continue with their behavior. Enabled rioter become emboldened rioters and thugs. They believe they are entitled to their destructive behavior. Then it becomes we can hunt down the cops and execute them. Look at the news this past week for stories of police being stalked and shot.

There is certainly a place for discussion regarding race relations and that discussion needs to take place. The ballot box is also a primary example of how disputes can be resolved peacefully. Responsible citizens work out their disputes. There is no reasoning with a rioter. That individual, or group, has foregone reasonable dialogue and is using force to get his way. A polite term for this is mob action. At that moment they have the physical power and they are going to implement their will on everyone else. The laws of physics come into play and there must be a force equal to or greater than that force of riot to stop the chaos.

We can empathize with those who are aggrieved, but we cannot acquiesce to those who rampage in anger. The only response that works to ensure the greater good is to respond with greater force than what is being used against you. Discussion can be achieved only after peace is restored. If we fail to take back the city, then the mob will control and that will result in more deaths and mayhem.

There have been a couple of positive city responses of late. The Detroit police chief responded with controlled

force in his city and said he would not back down to rioters. Detroit has been mostly peaceful. Lancaster, Pa. had a police shooting after what is described as a mentally ill individual coming at a police officer with a knife. There was a public demonstration protesting the shooting that escalated into a riot. The police arrested eight individuals and a judge set their bail at a million

While, I would normally agree that that amount was excessive, this time it was very appropriate. Bail is to assure that the defendant will appear at a court hearing and to help assure that the events alleged do not occur again. Bail has been set very low in many cities and the thugs are back on the street in hours. This judge sent a message to the community. Demonstrate peacefully and there is no problem. Break the law and you will be incarcerated, most probably until your trial date. That approach makes people think before they decide to riot.

It is time that this nation allows its trained law enforcement personnel to do their jobs and not have their hands tied by a bunch of political hacks. It is also time that we have those discussions on race relations, but those discussions can only be held if there is a peaceful forum to hold them.

Nobel Peace Prize: You may have missed this as it was not heavily reported in the national press. President Trump was nominated, not once, but twice for the Nobel Peace Prize. The President and his executive offices had been working behind the scenes to achieve and formalize relationships between Israel and some Arab nations.

That occurred this week with what appears to be normalizations of international relations between Bahrain and the UAE with Israel. That is a major step forward for peace in the Middle East. The last President who actually got Israel and an Arab state to talk together publicly was Jimmy Carter--- and that was a long time ago. Carter was given some well deserved media credit for his efforts.

Trump was mainly criticized by the press for not having attendees at the press conference wear masks, with little attention given to a major international accomplishment. Somehow, whether it is riot control or international relations we need to get a dose of common sense into our nation's newsrooms.

Bahrain and UAE (United Arab Editor's Note: Emirates) have never actually been at war with Israel and, in fact, have shared intelligence and technology with one another for several years. The two countries are wealthy Gulf monarchies. The ceremony presided over by President Trump was a photo opportunity highlighting cooperation that began before Mr. Trump was President.

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

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

#### Farmers' Almanac reveals winter forecast for Illinois

If you are a believer in the Farmers' Almanac winter predictions, you may not want to hear its prediction for Illinois.

The publication, founded in 1818, is calling it the "Winter of the Great Divide," forecasting cold and snow in the north, drought in the west, and wild weather in the south. Illinois is included in the cold and snowy section of the country.

Managing editor Sandi Duncan said a lot of factors are considered when the almanac arrives at its weather predictions.

"A long term outlook that is actually based on a mathematical and astronomical formula," Duncan said. "The formula was actually devised back in 1818 by our founding editor who correlated different things like sunspot activity, position of the planets and other factors."

More widely accepted in the scientific community is the forecast from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. This year, NOAA is forecasting average temperatures for Illinois, but more

precipitation than normal from December to February. If this winter will be anything like the winter of 2014 in Illinois,

the Department of Transportation's

budget may get stretched thin again. The department's yearly budget is just over \$5 billion, but during that winter, the agency asked for an additional \$47 million to cover overtime costs, the temporary drivers who assist with snow removal, and funds to cover the cost of additional road salt.

As for predicting the weather, Duncan said the Farmers' Almanac has a pretty good track record.

"We do kind of give an overview of how we did especially for the winter because that seems to be the allimportant season ahead, and people who follow our forecast say we are about 80 to 85 percent accurate," Duncan said.



#### A REVEALING AUCTION

The delicate N-S auction was designed to determine whether they belonged in 3NT or 5♣. Eventually they chose 3NT but along the way they generously donated all sorts of useful information to their opponents.

West mulled over the auction, always a good idea before making the opening lead. What did North's 2♦ mean? It was inconceivable that N-S would play in a Diamond contract, so West concluded that North was bidding out his pattern, which appeared likely to be 4=1=3=5. By so doing, North was indirectly saying to Partner (and to the opponents) "I am short in Hearts, if your Hearts are weak then perhaps we belong in Clubs rather than 3NT".


As for South, he had bid Hearts, after which he would not have bid No Trump without something in the unbid Diamond suit. For his third bid he raised Clubs, at which point there didn't seem to be much room for a whole lot of Spades in his hand, maybe two but quite possibly only one.

After that riveting and revealing auction, what would you lead? Not a Heart, nor a Club, those can hardly be right. A Diamond lead doesn't seem so appealing, either, with North and South both indirectly showing something in the suit. That leaves a Spade. Which one? Yes, West must lead the King, protecting against South having a singleton Queen or Jack. Nicely done, Mr. West, the ♠K is the killing lead! And, of course, West will be sure to follow up with the ♠T at Trick 2.

A more Neanderthal North would simply have raised 1NT to 3NT. Now West has fewer clues. He might lead a top-of-nothing Diamond, he might lead a Spade, but even if he chooses the latter there won't be a compelling reason to lead the spectacular King.

## Protecting Your Assets

#### **Get Ready: 10 Tips To Help Home And Business Owners Prepare Ahead Of Storms, Hurricanes And Floods**

(NAPS)—The preparations you make now, ahead of storms, floods or hurricanes, can help you recover faster and stay safe during cleanup. The Outdoor Power Equipment Institute (OPEI), an international trade association representing manufacturers and suppliers of power equipment, small engines and battery power, utility and personal transport vehicles, and golf cars, reminds home and business owners to get ready before a storm strikes and make preparations now.

"Weather can be unpredictable, so itís important to always keep your equipment in working order, to have the right fuel on hand and to know where your safety gear is. This is doubly true during storm season, as the weather can change quickly," said Kris Kiser, president and CEO of OPEI. "You also want to know how to use your equipment safely and use caution when cleaning up."

These tips can help homeowners and businesses plan ahead for storm cleanup:

- · Take stock of your outdoor power equipment. Make sure it's in good working order. If needed, take the equipment to an authorized service center for maintenance or repair. If you need to buy a new piece of equipment, get it before the storm and learn how to use it.
- Find your safety gear. Avoid the scramble for sturdy shoes, safety goggles, hard hats, reflective clothing and work gloves, which should be stored in an accessible area with your equipment.
- · Review the owner's manuals. Read product manuals to ensure you know how to operate your equipment safely.
- Have the right fuel on hand. Fuel stations may be closed after a storm. Store your fuel in an approved container. Use the type of fuel recommended by the equipment manufacturer. It's illegal to use any fuel with more than 10% ethanol in outdoor power equipment (for more information on proper fueling visit www.LookBeforeYouPump.com).
- Charge batteries. Collect the batteries for your outdoor power equipment and fully charge them ahead of the storm.




Get your outdoor equipment ready now to be safe and prepared when bad weather hits.

- Use safety precautions. Be aware of fundamental dangers that can occur. For instance, chainsaw kickback may happen when the moving chain at the tip of the guide bar touches an object or when the wood closes in and pinches the saw chain in the cut. Always stand with your weight on both feet, and adjust your stance so you're angled away from the blade. Hold the chainsaw with both hands. Never over-reach or cut anything above your shoulder height. Have a planned retreat path if something falls.
- Ensure portable generators have plenty of ventilation. Generators should never be used in an enclosed area or inside a home or garage, even if the windows or doors are open. Place the generator outside and away from windows, doors and vents that could allow carbon monoxide inside. Keep the generator dry. Do not use it in rainy or wet conditions. Before refueling, turn the generator off and let it cool down.
- Drive Utility Type Vehicles (UTVs) with caution. Keep the vehicle stable and drive slowly. Do not turn the vehicle mid-slope or while on a hill.
- Be aware of others. Keep bystanders, children and animals out of your work area. Don't let other people near outdoor power equipment when starting or using it.
- Pay attention to your health. Storm cleanup can be taxing on the body and the spirit. Don't operate power equipment when you're fatigued. Drink plenty of water and take regular breaks.

Keep this advice in mind and you may be better prepared to weather any storm.

#### As Temperatures Drop, **Check Tire Pressure More Often**

(NAPS)-You may notice, when the weather turns colder, the tire pressure monitoring system (TPMS) light on your dashboard lights up more frequently. The Car Care Council recommends checking your tire pressure regularly during the winter to help keep the TPMS light off and your vehicle safe.

"It's typical at this time of year for motorists to get TPMS warnings and then get worried about their tires," said Rich White, executive director, Car Care Council. "Often drivers will see this in the morning when it's coldest. If the temperature warms, the light could turn off but it's likely that tires will still be a few pounds per square inch (PSI) under-inflated. This is why it's important to check tire pressure regularly."

According to the U.S. Tire Manufacturers Association, for every 10 degree drop in temperature, tire pressure decreases one to two PSI. Checking the tire pressure is important for vehicle safety, tire life and gas mileage.

Incorrect tire pressure can lower gas mileage by 0.3 percent for every one PSI drop in pressure of all four tires and improve fuel efficiency by up to 3.3 percent when the correct tire pressure is maintained.

'Tire pressure should be checked at least monthly. It is important to note that newer cars with tire pressure monitoring systems may not alert you until the tire is significantly under-inflated, so you may want to check it more fre-

quently," said White. "It is important to check tire pressure whenever there is a significant weather change and more often during the winter months."
