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Plant loss would hurt economy

700 jobs, tax money, donations would be lost

BYRON - If the Byron Generating Station does close in September 2021, it will mean more than a loss of about 700 jobs.

It will also mean the loss of millions of dollars in taxes locally.

Exelon Generation announced on Aug. 27 that it intends to retire its Byron Generating Station and Dresden Generating Station in fall 2021. Byron will close in September 2021.

Paul Dempsey, Communications Manager of the Byron station, said that the station's 2017 tax bill was more than \$38 million. The taxes went to a variety of taxing bodies, including the Byron School District, Ogle County and the Byron Museum and Library



District.

There are also the charitable donations giving by the station, which Dempsey said amount to about \$250,000. Donations have gone to Rock River Center in Oregon, Pinecrest Community in Mount Morris,

Hub City Senior Center and many others.

In July, the station donated \$9,000 to libraries in Ogle County. And in June it donated \$35,000 to local food banks.

Second property tax payment is due on Sept. 11

Ogle County Collector Linda Beck wants to remind property owners that the second installment of their property tax bill is due Sept. 11.

Payment methods include cash or check (payable to Ogle County Collector). In-person payments can be made at the Treasurer's office located in the "old" Courthouse at 105 S. 5th Street, Suite 114, Oregon or at any bank in Ogle County. Current restrictions will be wearing a mask in any county building and to keep six-foot distance from others. Office hours are 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Monday-Friday excluding holidays. A secure drop box is located at the 5th Street address for taxpayers to drop off check payments after hours or on the weekends. The mailing address is Ogle County Collector, P.O. Box 40, Oregon, IL 61061. Mailed payments must be postmarked by the due date to be considered timely.

Late payments will incur a fee of 1.5 percent per month or part of a month after the due date and must be remitted by mail or at the Collector's office.

Beck's office is also offering the option of online credit card payments. You may get to this site by going directly to www.oglecountytreasurer.org or through www.oglecounty.org and then selecting the Treasurer's department. Choose the Online Tax Payments link and click the Pay Now button. Fill in the information as prompted. Be sure to receive a payment confirmation for your records. Please note that this service carries a fee; review the convenience fees prior to making payment.

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

Sarah Downs, executive director of the Byron Chamber of Commerce, said that the community has been well aware that Exelon has been sounding the alarm for years that its zero-carbon Byron and Dresden plants are uneconomic to operate and would likely shut down early to prevent further financial

"We need Byron Station in our community," she said. "It provides 700 good-paying jobs, over \$38 million in taxes, and supports our local schools, fire departments, forest preserves, and park districts. It's a key source of business for our local retailers and restaurants. It also provides clean, carbon-free energy to 2.3 million homes and businesses in our area.

"We implore state leaders to take action to save Byron Station from early retirement next year.'

The Byron Forest Preserve District received \$2.3 million in tax money from the Byron Station last year.

"The Exelon Generation Byron Station is obviously an important part of the greater Byron/Oregon community," said Todd Tucker, Executive Director of the Forest Preserve District. "The Byron Forest Preserve District alone receives nearly 75 cents of every property tax operating dollar from the Byron Nuclear Plant."

Tucker pointed out that the money the district has received over the past 35 years has made it possible

for it to preserve more than 2,300 acres of natural land for nine preserves, develop the PrairieView Golf Club, Jarrett Prairie Center, Keller Education Center and our the PrairieFire Golf facility.

"Their support has made it possible each year to offer education programs and recreation opportunities for thousands of school aged children, individuals and families in the Rockford Region and beyond,"Tucker said. "We currently employ 22 full time staff who operate top-notch facilities thanks to this tax support."

And while the news of the proposed closure is clearly causing concern in the region. Tucker said now is not the time to panic.

"We are hopeful that there is still time for our legislators in Springfield to work out some sort of agreement with Exelon to lessen the impact both for our organization and the entire Northern Illinois Region," he said.

The Oregon Park District received \$2.7 million in taxes

in 2019, with 78 percent of that coming from taxes paid by Exelon. Park District Executive Director Erin Folk said the plant closure will significantly impact the people employed by the Oregon Park District, the residents it serves and the services it provides.

"The District has made many decisions over the past 10 years in preparation for a potential reduction in taxes, but the plant closure will be devastating to our District, the other taxing bodies and Ogle County," she said. "We are hopeful the State of Illinois will address potential legislative needs to aid in keeping the plant open. Many decisions will need to be made over the course of the coming months and we will continue to act in the best interest of the District as we navigate through this difficult

And many of the 700 employees at the plant live in and pay taxes in the county. Dempsey said as of February 2019,130 employees lived in Byron, 55 in Oregon, 36 in Stillman and at least 10 each in Davis Junction, Mount Morris and Rochelle. The others live in cities including Rockford and Dixon.

"No words can describe the loss that would be deeply felt if the decision to shut down the Byron Nuclear plant can't be changed," said Oregon Chamber of Commerce Executive Director Liz Vos. "Exelon consistently gives back to our communities. So many communities are literally and figuratively powered by this company.'

Burning refuse not allowed in county

Recently the Ogle County Solid Waste Management Department (OCSWMD) has been receiving inquiries and complaints regarding the open burning of waste material from around Ogle County.

The OCSWMD reminds residents and businesses that the open burning of refuse is prohibited in Ogle County and statewide. The Illinois Environmental Protection Act, as well as county and local ordinances, prohibit the open burning of garbage, plastic, construction and demolition debris (wood included), furniture, mattresses, cabinets, carpet, and all

The dangers of open burning are enhanced due to the current situation with the COVID-19 pandemic, as local resources need to be preserved for more dire emergencies and the enhanced risk factors of residents with respiratory problems, such as asthma and chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), who may be more at risk to respiratory infections and bothered by nuisance smoke conditions from open burning.

As summer winds down and autumn approaches, please consider alternatives to the open burning of

landscape waste. The OCSWMD discourages all open burning and recommends other means to dispose naturally of landscape waste, such as mulching, chipping, and composting, or, if available, hauled away by your local waste hauler for composting.

If you live in a city or village, check your local open burning ordinances prior to any burning of landscape waste. In rural areas of Ogle County, landscape waste generated on that property may be burned under certain conditions. It is a good idea to notify the local fire department or the

Sheriff's Office prior to any larger landscape waste fire or prescribed burning of grasslands. Landscape waste from other properties is not allowed to be hauled away and burned elsewhere.

If you are going to burn your landscape waste, be sure that the material is dry enough to burn and not smolder, and conduct the burn during conditions that smoke will not become a nuisance for your neighbors. Have a water source nearby and be sure that the fire is at least 50 feet from any buildings or other areas that you do not want the fire to spread to. The material

should burn quickly with little to no smoke to avoid creating nuisance or health problems for your neighbors. Other refuse, such as garbage, plastic, tires, furniture, cabinets, demolition debris, and mattresses are prohibited from being burned anywhere in Illinois.

Please contact the OCSWMD at 815-732-4020 for the regulations regarding the open burning of landscape waste, or for advice on better alternatives to open burning. Notify the OCSWMD or Ogle County Sheriff's Office as well if you observe illegal open burning of waste in Ogle County.

Residents urged to do individual sweeps of Rock River

Oregon Area Rock River Sweep coordinators are encouraging local residents, paddlers, fishermen, boaters, and other users of the Rock River to do "Individual Sweeps" of the river during the month of September this year instead of having a large group

This is a great opportunity for anyone who wants to help the local environment by picking up litter in or along the river or the

Organizers are asking people to go out on their own terms to areas that they like to visit on the river and to collect as much litter and junk as they can and to dispose or recycle it with their regular home curbside trash pickup. For tires or other larger items removed from the river, contact Steve Rypkema, at the Ogle County Solid Waste Management Department for disposal arrangements. Sweepers should be safe when cleaning up the river by wearing safety vests, lifejackets, rubber gloves, and working in pairs in a COVID-19 safe manner.

Participants are encouraged to take pictures of themselves and their "haul" and post them to the Rock River Sweep.org Facebook page to share what they have collected and to encourage others to do the same.

The Oregon Area Rock River Sweep coordinators thank those who do their part to protect and preserve the beautiful Rock River. They hope to resume the annual Rock River Sweep next September.



events. June was diabetic, unless there was dessert or fresh bread on the table. She had a pretty full life.



BYRON - The Byron Forest Preserve District is offering a new Family and Friends Custom Field Trip Experience for groups of up to 10 people at their outdoor preserves.


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Group celebrates anniversary of 19th Amendment

On Sunday, Aug. 16, members of the Rochelle DAR, as well as the Flagg Township Museum director, dressed up as suffragists to celebrate 100 years of women having the right to vote. The women dressed up in both traditional suffragist attire of long skirts and big hats from the 1920s as well as what they are calling modern suffragists with T-shirts spelling out suffragist.

While dressed up, the women held

up signs and walked around different parts of the community to spread the word. The group started outside the museum downtown, walked around the block, along Route 251 and in front of City Hall before finishing back at the museum.

"While we didn't get as many community members out at the museum as we would have liked, we did have a lot of people along the roads honking and acknowledging our cause," said Lydia Roberts, member of the Rochelle DAR.

Along with the celebration that was held last Sunday, the Flagg Township Museum has two PowerPoints and a new exhibit focusing solely on women's suffrage. The exhibit is titled "Cabinet of Curiosities" and displays a collection of hats and suffragist clothing as well as other memorabilia that was typical of the time period.

The exhibit will be on display at the museum through the end of August and can be viewed during museum business hours (Monday through Thursday from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m.) Everybody who participated in the event was honored to celebrate a monumental moment in history that began a lasting movement

"This was a very important movement that has had lasting ramifications for women," Roberts said. "Whether that is women going into politics or other nontraditional roles that women weren't normally expected to. There is a lot of long-term ripple effects that all stem from the passing of women's

LEAD (Leaders Encouraging Abstinence from Drugs) will both serve at-risk youth within the Ogle County community and are eager for the 2020-2021 school year to start. The Youth WORKS program provides youth with an evidence-based curriculum called "Too Good for Violence" and presentations on violence-related topics such as bullying, suicide, and social media awareness. Project LEAD focuses its efforts mainly in the middle school also providing an evidence-based curriculum called "Too Good for Drugs."

Project LEAD and Youth WORKS hope to continue their services at Oregon High

School with their youth committees. This school year will look different, as many schools are starting off with a combination of on-site and remote learning. Youth WORKS and Project LEAD will accommodate each school individually with what is mutually determined as safe. Despite these changes, Horst and Tompkins are dedicated to working with the schools within Ogle County to find ways to best serve the students and their needs in relation to violence and substance abuse. As a Prevention Team, Covid-19 has them to be more creative in the way they interact with the communities and students they serve.

The programs are currently in the process of offering schools several alternative options and are focusing efforts on how to transition curriculum lessons to accommodate e-learning. To all the youth in Ogle County, this school year might be different, but Project LEAD and Youth WORKS look forward to being together again while incorporating some of the new techniques that staff have learned during this time. 

Science can help us survive the 21st century

Dear Editor,

What ever happened to Science? Haven't the scientific professions always attracted some of the brightest and most inquisitive minds? Aren't scientists less biased than politicians who rely on the vested interests of big business?

Some of the problem lies in the very nature of scientific research, especially human research. Scientists can't lock humans up in cages like tiny rodents and control every aspect of their environment, thank goodness.

Most of the problem, however, lies with us, not with science. We humans find it very difficult, if not impossible, to change. Nutrition scientists have told us that vegetables, fruits and whole grains are better for us than cheeseburgers, donuts and soda pop, but few of us change something as ingrained as our

diet. Scientists at the CDC have told us that masks and social distancing help prevent the spread of Covid; but we are so accustomed to standing 2 or 3 feet from people, well within "spraying distance." We certainly haven't worn masks unless we were robbers.

We might consent to wearing masks and distancing ourselves for a short while, but for months? At that point we start blaming someone for encroaching on our rights. After all, isn't this a democracy? Yes, but even in a democracy we are not allowed to drive 70 mph in a business district. Someone could get killed! Wearing face coverings is no different. An asymptomatic person who unknowingly carries the Covid virus could kill gramma and grandpa, or a younger person whose health is compromised.

The Myers-Briggs personality inventory

(MBTI) divides the population into two categories, Sensors and Intuitives. Sensors base decisions mostly on evidence they can see or feel. Intuitives rely on the possibilities provided by their own intuition and what they read and hear from others. Sensors sometimes view Intuitives as impractical dreamers. Intuitives view Sensors as too concerned with details and tangible material items, unable to see the abstract overall picture. Both types have their place in society and can perform certain tasks very well.

Sensors are less likely to accept global warming because they don't personally have the evidence of hundreds of thermometers placed around the globe, or have a record of past readings. They don't live where glaciers are melting, nor can they see carbon dioxide building in the atmosphere. Besides, wasn't

"Our organization has started schools, given scholarships so kids can attend a local school and started four orphanages," Starkey said. "I didn't mean to start the organization, I just could not help it. Our motto is a Bible verse and it says, 'Do not withhold good from those who deserve it when it is in your power to act.'

One of the orphanages started by Touch the Nations is named after Bonnie Edwards, who passed away. As a way to honor Starkey and wish her and her grandmother a happy birthday, the children at the orphanage video called and sang them the Happy Birthday song.

"Just talking about it chokes me up because we are just regular people and this is so humbling," Starkey said. "If you just do a little something or just think outside yourself, regular people can really make a big difference. We are also so appreciative for all of the support from the surrounding community. This is a birthday that will be unforgettable."
