District 272 Board OKs tentative budget; in-person school still on target

AMBOY - A tentative budget and several personnel items were discussed by the Amboy District 272 Board of Education during an Aug. 6 Finance Committee meeting.

The board approved a tentative budget for the 2020-2021 school year and also scheduled a budget hearing, which will take place at 7 p.m. on Thursday, Sept. 17 at Central School.

A resolution in support of the proposed Eldena Solar Farm project was also approved

In personnel matters, the board accepted the resignation of Denise Clothier as a paraprofessional. They also hired several staff members for the 2020-2021 school year: Belinda Lewis as library aide/cafeteria cashier at Amboy Junior High, Emily Goff as Library Aide at Central School, Rebecca Kaufman as paraprofessional at Central School, Kristy Willstead as paraprofessional at Central School, Kelsey Smothers as paraprofessional at Central School, and Erica Boyle as reading paraprofessional at Central School.

School Reopening Plan

So far, no changes have been made to Amboy's fall 2020 Reopening Plan. Families were given two options, either in-person instruction or remote learning. The choice of options will require a one-month commitment. School will begin on Monday, Aug. 17.

A traditional grading scale will be used for both options and all students will be required The entire school reopening plan is available at amboy.net

to adhere to specified due dates. Remote learning students will need to participate in daily activities assigned to be marked as present.

 In-Person Instruction: Students will attend a six-hour day from 8:10 a.m.-2:20 p.m. Face coverings are required for all students and staff, social distancing must be maintained and no more that 50 people can be gathered in one space. Symptom screening and temperature checks will be conducted prior to entering a school building or boarding a bus.

· Remote Learning: Students are encouraged to participate in any classroom discussions that are available through a district-approved platform throughout the day. Teachers will be available from 2:20-3:20 p.m. to answer questions and upload any videos. Parents will be responsible to pick up remote learning materials from the schools.

Superintendent Joshua Nichols said he is closely monitoring the sharp increase in positive COVID-19 cases in some nearby areas and if a similar situation occurred in Amboy, the plan for starting school could change.

Aid for struggling small businesses to start flowing

□ \$636M in 'Business Interruption Grants' to help small Illinois firms hit by COVID-19

SPRINGFIELD - Financial aid is about to start flowing for Illinois businesses that have been affected by the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity published emergency rules this week to implement the Business Interruption Grant program, or BIG. Those rules took effect July 21 when they were submitted to the secretary of state's

State lawmakers authorized the program in the budget they approved during their special session in May. It will make \$636 million in federal CARES Act money available to small businesses that have been forced to close or that have seen a substantial loss of customer activity due to COVID-19.

Pritzker's comprehensive response to COVID-19 and the economic distress it's caused for Illinois businesses and communities," DCEO spokeswoman Lauren Huffman said in an email. "This historic \$636 million program will provide immediate relief for small businesses which have experienced significant revenue losses as a result of the ongoing pandemic and focuses on businesses and communities hit hardest by the crisis."

The bill also provides that at least 30 percent of the money must go to businesses located in "disproportionately impacted areas," or DIAs, which are ZIP codes where there are high concentrations of low-income households and high rates of COVID-19.

Huffman also said that at least \$159 million in grants will go to entities located outside Chicago and the surrounding collar counties.

Although the application window for the first round of grants totaling \$60 million has already closed, the new rules enable the agency to begin processing those applications and awarding grants.

During the first round, priority is being given to small businesses located in DIAs. Specifically, \$20 million will be distributed to small businesses located in DIAs where there was property damage during recent civil unrest. Another \$20 million is set

aside for bars and restaurants; \$10 million for barbershops and salons; and \$10 million for gyms and fitness centers.

Those businesses must have had certain amounts of income during 2019. They also must have been in business for at least three months prior to March 2020 and have incurred at least \$10,000 in qualifying expenditures since March 21.

The BIG program also sets aside \$270 million for licensed day care centers. An initial round of those grants are to be awarded by Sept. 30. Those grants are being administered by

More COVID-19 cases reported in Lee County

LEE COUNTY — The Lee County Health Department announced on Aug. 6, that there were 13 new cases of COVID-19, eight of which are from the Jack Mabley Center. Since Aug. 6, the Lee

County Health Department has reported eight new cases: one in his or her teens, three in his or her 20s, two in his or her 40s, and two in his or her 50s

This brings the total cases to 169 as of Aug. 9. The Lee County Health Department reports that 133 of the 169 positive cases have recovered thus far.

Please continue, or if you haven't been, start, to follow the recommendations. It's easy to remember as the 3 Ws: wash your hands; watch your distance; and wear your mask. The health department does not want to backtrack from the great work our community has done. Everyone has to do their part.

Also, the health department would like to mention the process of contact tracing. If your local health department tries to contact you, please answer or return their call. Some people may feel distrustful or afraid of the term "contact tracing." This is actually a strategy used for many years in public health to reduce the spread of infectious disease. Contact tracing is a critical piece of our mitigation efforts against COVID-19. What to do if you think you have or have been exposed to COVID-19

During the COVID-19 pandemic, individuals with symptoms should not go to health care facilities such as hospitals, clinics, and urgent care centers without calling first. Instead, they can seek care by using one of the

following options:

Testing

Anyone with COVID-19 like symptoms (cough, shortness of breath, muscle pain, chills, sudden loss of taste and or smell and fever) or who have a risk factor, such as contact with someone confirmed to have COVID-19, a compromised immune system or a serious chronic medical condition can get a test, even without a doctor's order. And now the following people can be tested with or without symptoms.

- Work in health care facility
- · Work in correctional facilities, such as jails or
 - Serve as first responders, such as paramedics, emergency medical technicians, law enforcement officers, or
 - Support critical infrastructure, such as workers in grocery stores, pharmacies. restaurants, gas stations, public utilities, factories, childcare and sanitation.

Powell was last seen in the area of Progress Drive and Dutch Road in Dixon, Lee County. Powell has an active, nationwide warrant

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

Evidence of Powell's route of avoiding custody was located and indications are that he may have made his way to a nearby roadway, gaining some form of transportation.

20 weeks of extended regular state benefits now available

SPRINGFIELD-The Illinois Department of Employment Security (IDES) announced 20 weeks of state extended benefits (EB) are now available to those who exhaust the allotted 26 weeks of regular state unemployment and the additional 13 weeks of federal Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation (PEUC) benefits. Illinois law provides for 20 weeks of EB during times of "high unemployment," as defined in the law, instead of the 13 weeks of EB that was available in Illinois since May.

Currently, there are 30 states providing 13 weeks of EB, and 19 states, including Illinois, providing 20 weeks of EB. South Dakota is the only state not currently providing any number of EB weeks.

Those with questions or in need of assistance with unemployment benefits at this time are encouraged to visit IDES. Illinois.gov.

How do you deal with uncertainty?

"Uncertainty," what an interesting word. We have heard it used so many times in these past few months. Most people think that it was Benjamin Franklin who expressed this sentiment, "In this world, nothing is certain except death and taxes," when in fact it was Christopher Bullock in 1719 who is credited with that quote. Franklin used at the time of the signing of our Constitution. He said, "Our new Constitution is now established, and has an appearance that promises permanency; but in this world nothing can be said to be certain, except death and taxes." Well, it has lasted 244 years, but sadly of late, it is being challenged by some. But as responsible citizens, we need to be vigilant and stand for what is right. The Golden Thread

Kassia St. Clair's "The Golden Thread: How Fabric Changed History" opens with the discovery of "the oldest fibers known to have been used and produced by humans." The researchers did not expect such a find in their investigation of Dzudzuana cave in the Caucasus Mountains in western Georgia. "Radiocarbon dating suggests that modern humans first pressed timid, wandering feet into its floor as early as 34,500 years ago," St. Clair reports.

Well over a thousand microscopic fibers were found in the clay that had slowly accumulated on the floor of the cave. "More confounding still was that many of the fibers appeared to have been dyed...Although the majority of the threads were gray, black, and turquoise, there were also yellow, red, blue violet, green, khaki, and even pink ones, suggesting a sophisticated knowledge and use of local dye-plants and other colorants." St. Clair concludes that "The industry of fabric is older than pottery or metallurgy and perhaps even than agriculture and stock-breeding. Cloth is the

original technology.' From there, St. Clair moves on to Egypt. "In ancient Egypt, linen was revered...the very act of mummification and the wrapping of the body with specially prepared cloths, as well as those that had been passed down through generations, transfigured ordinary human remains into something divine." Next is China and the many myths surrounding silk: "It is said that silk production began

with that most Chinese of things: a cup of tea." Another popular legend is about how the long-guarded secrets of silk-making escaped from China, breaking their 5,000year monopoly.

Starting with the sheep, St. Clair describes how the Vikings, using woolen sails, managed to range across the seas, including to Newfoundland some 400 years before Columbus. Later on, silk became all the rage in Europe, as did lace, and in the nineteenth century, accounts cover the shabby clothes slaves were forced to wear and how King Cotton powered the Industrial Revolution, causing the slave population to explode so that by 1860, the Southern states had 819,000 white male farmers, set against a slave population of 3.2 million.

St. Clair emphasizes the centrality, and disparagement, of women in the production of textiles. In China, a popular proverb decreed that while "Men plough; women weave." In ancient Greece, all women - from goddesses to queens and slaves - were involved in spinning or weaving. Over a million women and children were employed in spinning in England alone by the mid-eighteenth century. And 200 years later, women workers at the Playtex Company were making the spacesuits for the Apollo 11 astronauts. Michael Collins joked, "The 'paper-thin bladder' of his favorite suit, which 'kept my 3.7 psi oxygen from escaping into the zero psi infinity surrounding me,' was 'glued together with consummate care by some nice ladies in Worcester."
