# Amboy Lions to host virtual Drawdown Amboy Lions Club

AMBOY — COVID has had a tremendous impact on our local economy, especially our small town business owners, with not able to open, limited capacity, and social distancing. All these have been difficult to manage and stressed our economy. No Lions Easter Egg Hunt, no Depot Days, no Lions Depot Days Parade.

"This has also challenged the Amboy Lions with our annual Draw Down fundraiser," said Amboy Lions Club President Dave Kemp. "So we are thinking outside the box. We cannot have a gathering of more than 50 people, serving a meal is just as challenging."

The Draw Down is one of the main fundraisers the Amboy Lions has. This year the Amboy Lions wants to help the businesses in the community. Many of these same businesses make generous donations to help assure the Lions'

fundraisers success.

"This year we are not asking for business donations, but instead \$30 of the \$60 ticket will be given back to these businesses, totaling \$6,000 back into our community," Kemp said. "This also allows the Amboy Lions to continue to offer their scholarships to several high school students with the remaining money.'

#### IDPH launches travel map are designated as "higher risk"

**SPRINGFIELD** – The Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) today launched its new coronavirus disease (COVID-19) travel map to help inform residents of potential risks associated with traveling during the pandemic. The map indicates countries and U.S. states with increased risk of COVID-19 based on case rates.

"Travel may increase the chance of becoming infected and spreading COVID-19," said IDPH Director Dr. Ngozi Ezike. "To help inform residents where they might be at greater risk of being exposed to COVID-19 when they travel, IDPH has launched a map that clearly shows states and other countries where case rates are elevated. While staying home is the best way to protect yourself and others from COVID-19, we know that it may not be possible to avoid all travel. We encourage people who are traveling, whether for work or otherwise, to check out the map before making plans."

Locations that have an average daily case rate of 15 cases per 100,000 or greater

on the map, which can be found here http://www.dph. illinois.gov/covid19/travel.

Airports, bus stations, train stations, and rest stops are all places travelers can be exposed to the virus in the air and on surfaces. The more people you come into contact with, for longer periods of time, the greater your risk of infection if you are exposed to someone with COVID-19.

Do not travel when you are sick or with someone who is sick. When traveling, it is especially important to wear your mask, to keep 6 feet of distance between you and others you are not traveling with, and wash your hands frequently or use hand sanitizer if soap and water are not available.

When considering travel, think about the destination. It is also important to think about needed precautions for moving through bus, train, or airport terminals, check-in and security lines, as well as the actual bus, train, or plane ride.

# **Amboy Fire awarded** two grants

**AMBOY** — The Amboy Fire Protection District has been awarded two grants.

The first is a \$19,969.63 grant which is an assistance to firefighters grant funding for the purchase of PPE related to COVID-19 response.

The second grant is a \$120,762 Rural EMS Training Grant. This grant will help the department train more EMTs and upgrade four additional paramedics. It will also provide for tools for virtual learning, and training in responding to opiate and mental health related calls.

#### **Sheriff continues** search for wanted man

LEE COUNTY — Lee is searching for a wanted Donald Powell, 34, is wanted on the charges of

possession of a firearm by a felon, aggravated fleeing to elude, aggravated battery, possession of stolen vehicle, and leaving the scene of a personal injury accident. According to the Lee County Sheriff's Depart-

ment, on Aug. 6, Powell stole his uncle's white Dodge Charger from Aurora, Colo. after shooting the family's dog in the head. Powell was in possession of a stolen .40 caliber semi-automatic handgun from Indiana and fled to Illinois.

On Aug. 7, Rock Falls Po-County Sheriff's Department lice Department pulled Powell over on a traffic stop for an equipment violation. After Powell was identified and the vehicle was confirmed as stolen, Powell drove off in the vehicle and was pursued into Lee County. Powell shot at officers during the pursuit. Powell's vehicle struck an occupied Lee County Sheriff squad car as the deputy was attempting to set up stop sticks to end the pursuit. The Deputy was transported to hospital and later released. Powell escaped into a nearby field following the vehicle collision.

## Lee County

LEE COUNTY — The Lee County Health Department announced on Aug. 17, that for the week of Aug. 2-8, Lee County's positivity rate and new case rate have increased again for the week.

For the week July 26 -Aug. 1, Lee County was higher than the state's target for new cases per 100,000. The target is 50; and Lee County had 58 positive cases for the week of July 26-Aug. 1. Lee County's positivity rate has also increased. During that same week, July 26 – Aug. 1, Lee County's positivity rate was 6.3 percent. The state target is 8 percent or less.

Since Aug. 11, the Lee County Health Department has reported 25 new cases: two in his or her teens, 9 in his or her 20s, 2 in his or her

30s, 3 in his or her 40s, 4 in his or her 50s, 1 in his or her 60s, 2 in his or her 70s, and 2 in his or her 80s. This brings the total cases

to 197 as of Aug. 17. The Lee County Health Department reports that 152 of the 197 positive cases have recovered thus far. Please continue, or if you

haven't been-start, to follow the recommendations. It's easy to remember as the 3 W's: Wash your hands; Watch your distance; and Wear your mask.

**Contact Tracing** 

If your local health department tries to contact you, please answer or return their call. Some people may feel distrustful or afraid of the term "contact tracing." This is actually a strategy

What to do if you think you have or have been exposed to COVID-19

Anyone with COVID-19







#### Murder By Alligator

t seems to me that a crucial element of a vigilante justice thriller is that it must be an inexorable act of retribution so that when it finally happens, triumph and relief carry the day. Dot Hutchison's "Deadly Waters" lacks that element, but her opening chapter is first rate. An unidentified female vigilante coolly describes a murder by alligator. She is unmoved by her victim's screams as the alligators brutally drag him into the water. "More growls and a few bellows join the chorus of Jordan's screams before a sickening thump and squelch silence the screaming." Before she rides off on her folding bike, she can't resist telling us, "Fun fact: alligators can bite, but they can't chew. They rely on decomposition in water to soften their food enough that they can bite off chunks and swallow.

Whereupon Hutchison introduces Rebecca Sorley, a journalism major at the University of Florida in Gainesville. She is level-headed, studies hard, scarcely drinks, and a bit on the dull side. She shares a suite with six female students. Kacey, the seventh suitemate, who was "good and kind, the best of us," lies in a coma in a care facility after an attack so vicious she was left for dead. The trauma colors everything in the friends' lives, especially in Ellie's, who was closest to Kacey.

Ellie cannot cope, she drinks, skips classes, and openly detests every male she comes across. When the vigilante murders begin to pile up, she is so openly gleeful, the police begin to suspect her. As do Rebecca and her best friend Hafsah. Their interminable debates about Ellie's aggression and the possibility that she could be the vigilante badly bog down the narrative, especially since they are carried out at the level of a sophomore criminal justice course. Naturally, Rebecca does all the talking, so that the reader may be forgiven for looking forward to the next murder.

It is another murder by alligator. At the moment of truth, the drunk frat boy turns to our heroine: "Who are you?' he asks, eyes wide and face pale. Spooked, but not scared. Not really. Not yet. 'Someone who's tired of letting boys be boys, when the girls never get to be anything." It neatly sums up the principle of the Me Too movement. Rebecca thinks hard about the silence of the abused women, their pessimism about legal justice: "You don't get justice from guys like him. They join the Supreme Court or get elected president." But as with the Me Too movement, scores of young women begin to talk to Rebecca about the sexual harassment and abuse they have endured at the university. She listens to them through a long night and then tells their stories in an article that garners a national audience when the Washington Post publishes it.



# Authority and arrogance often go hand in hand

f it can happen to Art Turner, it can happen to just But it sure is a lot more likely to occur if you happen

powerful African American in the Illinois House, was handcuffed and hauled to jail while driving

just two blocks from his own Chicago home. Well, that's just it. He did nothing wrong.

All the same he ended up locked in a jail cell, stripped of his shoes, belt and more than a bit of his dignity.

Here's what happened:

The 69-year-old was driving his BMW to a car dealer to trade it in for a truck. Two Chicago police officers pulled him over and said his car was missing a front license plate. He explained it had just fallen off and he hadn't bothered to put it back on because he was trading it that day. But he produced his title, registration, driver's license and all the other pertinent paperwork. The police officers ran his driver's license and then said he

was wanted for failure to appear in court on a traffic offense. Turner explained they must be mistaken because he knew he wasn't wanted. He added, "Art Turner" is a common name.

Could they double check their information? They refused.

He was then patted down, handcuffed and loaded in the back of a patrol car.

"I kept telling the police officer that the handcuffs were on too tight. That they were really hurting my wrists. I explained to her that I represented the area for 30 years in the legislature

The officer didn't respond.

Authority and arrogance often go hand in hand. And let's be honest, some folks can't see past the color of a person's skin. For such individuals, reasoning, accomplishments, em-From my time covering police departments, I

can tell you a whole lot of bigots end up in law enforcement. And, no, not all cops are this way. But enough are that fear of law enforcement is pervasive in black communities. In the wake of George Floyd's death in

Minneapolis and Black Lives Matter demonstrations throughout the nation, one might think these officers would be extra careful in how they treat people. That apparently wasn't the case with the pair who Turner encountered. They could have requested more information

on the wanted individual but didn't. In case you're wondering about Rep. Turner, he has a gentlemanly demeanor and stands a rather unimposing 5 feet, eight inches tall. During his time in the legislature, Turner was known as quiet and cerebral. He wasn't a grandstander. He was a budget nerd.

"I started out in college as a math major and then switched to business. Working on the state budget just seemed like a good fit," he said.

When a handcuffed Turner arrived at the police station, he hollered that he was a former state representative and demanded to see the watch commander. A sergeant heard his voice echoing down the hallway and sought out the commander. The commander knew him and immediately released him.




