Red Brick Church adding large new building

STILLMAN VALLEY - The Red Brick Church in Stillman Valley has broken ground for a new 7,000 square foot multi-purpose building at an estimated cost of \$1.5 mil-

he building will feature a large open space as well as a kitchen and classrooms.

"Prior to the pandemic, our children's ministry in particular was bursting at the said lead pastor Rev. Dr. Chris Brauns. "In recent years it is not uncommon for our Vacation Bible School or AWANA programs to serve more than one hundred children at a time. And we simply don't have the space in our basement for that much energy. The new space will give us the opportunity to share the good news of Christ with more people of all ages."

"The 'pandemic pause' has made us more aware than ever that we live in a broken world and people are tired and weighed down by the demands of life," he said. "We can't wait to be in this new space and to be able to share Christ's words: 'Come to me all you who are weary and heavy burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn for I am gentle and humble in heart and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is heavy and my burden is light (Matthew 11:28-30).' I am privileged to serve at a church where so many people are motivated to share in the adventure of telling others about Christ."

In addition to adding space, improved accessibility was also a major goal.

"Though we already added a ramp onto

grade and we are limited in how much we can do to make it accessible. The new building will be entirely accessible," Brauns said.

A conservative financial approach was a central priority.

We have known for a number of years that we need additional ministry space," Brauns said. "But it is important to our congregation that we incur minimal longterm debt. We did not conduct a capital campaign until we had paid off the debt for the additional houses purchased for the building site. In the capital campaign, our congregation pledged \$1.55 million dollars over a three-year period, the approximate price of the new construction. One year into our campaign, we are thankful to have received 60 percent of our pledges.'

The Red Brick Church worked with Saavedra Gehlhausen Architects (Rockford) to design the new space.

"Our architects did a beautiful job designing a facility that fits with our existing building," he said. "Even though the buildings will not be connected, it was important for us for the new structure to aesthetically fit with our existing building.'

Brooke Adams, Brad Baker, Pastor Chris Brauns, Terri Carby, Clyde Gelderloos, Dan Houston, Matt Rhodes, and Randy Stukenberg all served on the Master Plan Committee.

Brad Baker and Dan Houston co-chaired the Brick by Brick Capital Campaign. Rebekah Anderson, Jamie Brauns, Deb Bonne,

Phil Guske, Clayton Midtsem, and Tom Stahl also served in leadership roles.

An independent evangelical church, The Red Brick Church (theredbrickchurch.org) is one of the most historic churches in Ogle County. The church was officially formed May 5, 1858. The main building was constructed in 1892. An addition was constructed on the west side of the original building in

1958. In 2008 the church moved offices out of the original building into the house that had functioned as the church parsonage. Pastor Chris Brauns has served as the lead pastor since 2005. Pastor David Bogner began as associate pastor in the spring of this year.

Schmeling Construction is the general contractor for the project. The goal is for the facility to be completed in January of 2021.



Will Washington's football team ever change its name?

If the owners of Aunt Jemima syrup can phase out a brand that's been around since 1889 because it's racist, certainly the Washington NFL team can get rid of the racist R-word that has only been around since 1933.

Quaker Oats Company, which is in turn owned by PepsiCo, decided to abandon the familiar trademark even though it's been around for generations because, in the company's words, it is "based on a racial stereotype." To put it bluntly, that stereotype is the black slave "Mammy," who lovingly raised her white owners' children. Now Aunt Jemima will soon become a part of the nation's sordid past.

And presumably so will Uncle Ben, of Uncle Ben's rice products. Mars, which now owns the brand, announced that it will "evolve," i.e., slowly disappear. It's been around since 1946.

Earlier this year, Land O'Lakes announced that it would get rid of the Native American woman who had symbolized its products since the 1920s. And other prominent brand owners are examining their trademarks.

But the Washington professional football team and owner Dan Snyder have no apparent misgivings about slurring the country's first population. Snyder is on record telling USA Today: "We'll never change the name. It's that simple. NEVER. You can use caps."

Well then, Dan, you're a BIGOT. It's as simple as that. The definition of the R-word almost always has the word "offensive" attached to it. Why would a sports franchise want to use an offensive term as a brand? How could minority players be willing to play on the team, when at the same time they are decrying the prejudice against people of color that saturates the United States?

Millions of blacks and whites marched in so many cities in the wake of the video of George Floyd's murder at the hand of white cops in Minneapolis. President Donald Trump was quick to say that they were being manipulated by the leftist terrorists Antifa. He offered no evidence, and in fact there is none. But he has said nothing about extreme rightists, and there is plenty of evidence against them. These are heavily armed militia groups, some even dedicated to starting a civil war. The Trumpster doesn't condemn them, because they make up an important faction of his base.

So yes, let's search out and get rid of as many symbols of racism as we can - Aunt Jemima, demeaning names of sports teams, Confederate flags, other bigoted trademarks.



So, we assumed she was paying it off in payments. Then she quit paying the bill with \$80 remaining on it, which we just found out this past week.

Last week, our mini Schnauzer was sick. So I called the clinic and made an appointment. We were very happy when they said they had an opening, because our regular clinic in Dixon was booked. About 10 minutes later, they called and said we had an outstanding bill of \$80 and they wouldn't see him unless the bill was paid! If she started paying Cody's bill, why didn't they bill her? She had accepted the responsibility of owing the bill. We feel Cody was held hostage for \$80 that was not our responsibility! This is so wrong on every level. Joy and Don Groenhagen, Oregon



OREGON - Registration for Oregon Jr. Tackle Football 2020 will be conducted at the high school Sunday, July 19.


This date may change depending on the State of Illinois's current COVID-19 status and the status of the IHSA's stance on high school football.
