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Working for local businesses

Oregon Chamber director says creative ideas, support help during uncertain times

OREGON – It is no secret that the last couple of months have been hard on businesses, especially small businesses.

But in Oregon, the city and the Chamber of Commerce have worked hard to help local businesses stay afloat and ready to thrive as the state begins to slowly re-open.

Oregon Chamber Director Liz Vos sat down to answer some questions about how Oregon businesses faired, and what's next.

Question: What has been the most difficult part of this lock down period?

Answer: When you live and work in a small community like Oregon, Illinois you get to know everyone really well. The

most difficult part of this Covid-19 shut down, for me, was watching all of my business owner friends' hearts and dreams shattered. We were all gaining momentum for our area. Our town was full of visitors from ShamROCK the Town. Then the coronavirus came out of nowhere and we all had to close our doors and stay home. We went from "full steam ahead" to an "all stop" and that was absolutely jarring. Oregon Farmer's Market opens soon with new guidelines

OREGON - The Oregon Farmers Market managed by the Oregon Park District will be open starting July 7.

Guidelines will be different this summer due to coronavirus restrictions. In previous years the Market was not only about buying local and fresh, but it was also somewhat of a social gathering. Shopping at the Market in 2020 will still be fun, but we have had to modify operations and are looking at the Oregon Market this year as an Inand-Out Market following CDC and social distancing guidelines.

The market is moving to a new location this summer. Stop by on Tuesday evenings, between 5:30-7:30 p.m. at the old bank drive through between the Post Office and Chili Pepper (418 W. Washington Street). Masks are required (per state guidelines) for those visiting the market but please stay home if you are feeling sick. We ask that you practice social distancing with only one customer at a time at a booth. Sanitary practices will also be in effect with vendor areas sanitized and hand sanitizer available for customers.

Use touchless payments if possible or when using cash, change will not be offered. Products will be in the back of the booth and shoppers will not be able to touch what they buy no touching or squeezing to find the perfect tomato. Shoppers can point to what they would like, and the vendor will bag the items and set them on a table at the front of the booth. Vendors will assist customers with their choices. For additional safety measures, customers are encouraged to wash all products before use or cooking.

It will be a new shopping experience, but a great alternative so customers can still get fresh and locally grown

or hand made items. Not only do the local growers and crafters appreciate the support, but those buying can also feel good about purchasing local and fresh and feel safe knowing that the items are sold in an open-air environment and that the produce available exchanged fewer hands to get to the consumer.

Enjoy shopping for fresh produce, baked goods, honey, plants, art, handmade craft items and more. Make Tuesday evenings a fun night out with a nice walk around town or through one of our beautiful parks, stopping at the market to grab your items, and then enjoy dinner or a beverage at one of the many Oregon restaurants or bars offering outdoor seating.

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
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Plant employees raise money to help area food pantries

BYRON - Employees at Exelon Generation's Byron Generating Station recently set a goal to raise \$25,000 for local food pantries to help families affected by the coronavirus pandemic.

The nuclear plant's workers eclipsed that goal, raising more than \$35,000 for nearly two dozen area food banks. About half of the amount raised went to Northern Illinois

and a weakening economy, our employees wanted to do something positive for the region and beyond," said Mark Kanavos, site vice president at Byron Generating Station. 

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Multiple crews battle grain bin fire in Creston

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

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MOMENTS IN TIME

- * On July 9, 1877, the All England Croquet and Lawn Tennis Club begins its first lawn tennis tournament at Wimbledon, then an outer-suburb of London. Twenty-one amateurs showed up to compete in the Gentlemen's Singles tournament, the only event at the first Wimbledon. The winner was to take home a 25-guinea trophy.
- * On July 10, 1887, a dam breaks in Zug, Switzerland, killing 70 people. The resulting wall of water was so powerful that rescue boats were ineffective, as they capsized in the roiling waters.
- * On July 7, 1917, Britain establishes the British Women's Auxiliary Army Corps (WAAC), authorizing female volunteers to serve alongside their male counterparts in France during World War I. Some 80,000 women enlisted to perform labors such as cookery, mechanical and clerical work, and other tasks.
- * On July 6, 1944, in Hartford, Connecticut, a fire breaks out under the big top of the Ringling Bros. and Barnum Bailey Circus, killing 167 people and injuring 682. An investigation revealed that the tent had been treated with flammable paraffin thinned with three parts of gasoline to make it waterproof.
- * On July 8, 1959, Maj. Dale Buis and Master Sgt. Chester Ovnand become the first Americans killed in the U.S. phase of the Vietnam War when guerrillas strike a Military Assistance Advisory Group compound in Saigon.
- * On July 11, 1979, parts of Skylab, America's first space station, come crashing down on Australia and into the Indian Ocean five years after the last manned Skylab mission ended. Skylab weighed 77 tons.
- * On July 12, 1995, a heat advisory is issued in Chicago, warning of an impending record-breaking heat wave. When the heat broke a week later, nearly 1,000 people were dead in Illinois and Wisconsin. The temperature in the city hit 106 F with a heat index of 120 F.



Leaving Afghanistan in the shadow of Vietnam

It was my bad luck to be drafted and to serve in Vietnam. It was my good luck to be there in 1971 and early 1972. American troops, under an agreement with North Vietnam, were gradually withdrawing from the country and were less intensively engaged than before.

Nevertheless, events in another far away country are bringing up memories of those days, and what happened there after I left.

Afghanistan differs from Vietnam in many ways, but it seems to be headed for a similar fate. That likelihood brings to light something else that the two countries have in common: In each case, we took on a responsibility toward its people that we've been unable to

fulfill or even to fully acknowledge.

That failure came home to me in 1975 with the South's collapse under North Vietnam's final onslaught. Watching the news of the Communist advance southward from the Demilitarized Zone, or DMZ, that

had marked the boundary between the two countries was an unreal and eerie experience. First to fall were the small and remote firebases Alpha 4 and Alpha 2, where I had spent the first half of my tour. Then it was Dong Ha, a more substantial combat base farther south: then Quang Tri; then Hue; then Phu Bai; then Da Nang, falling like dominoes.

The farther each was from the DMZ, the more secure it had seemed to me when I was there – and the more incomprehensible its downfall. The most disturbing scenes on television were of demoralized and frightened South Vietnamese soldiers in chaotic retreat and of desperate civilians at the embassy gates.

Headlines about our

recent agreement with our enemy the Taliban in Afghanistan bring those scenes to mind. The plan will drastically reduce our military presence by mid-July and completely eliminate it by May of next year.

Meanwhile the Afghan government's sway has shrunk to the point that it fully controls less than half of its population and only a third of its districts, according to a May 31 article from Radio Free Europe. It's hard then to see our agreement with the Taliban as anything other than providing a way, in the words of a Taliban field commander, for American forces to "dust off their buttocks and depart." (New York Times, Mujib Mashal, May 27)


As noted above, there

are many important differences between Afghanistan and Vietnam. What they seem to have in common at this point is the way we leave, in each case with a face-saving agreement that leaves our ally to its fate. I find myself wondering how many Vietnams and Afghanistans—and Iraqs for that matter - it'll take for us to abandon the vanity and illusions that end in watching former allies from afar in scenes of fear, despair, and collapse.

It seems to me that part of the answer lies in admitting that we're not politically capable of sustaining lengthy wars in far-away places. Another is found in something Secretary of State Colin Powell said to President Bush when he was planning to invade Iraq: "You break it, you own it. You are going to be the proud owner of 25 million people. You will own all their hopes, aspirations, and problems. You'll own it all."

He was surely thinking of his own combat experience in Vietnam. I know I did when I read those insightful and prophetic words, and I think of them now as we prepare to take our leave of Afghanistan and its people.

In April 1832, a member of the Sauk nation named Black Hawk led a group of 1,000 Native Americans across the Mississippi into Illinois. Black Hawk claimed his people had not been properly represented at treaty negotiations with the U.S. Government, and thus they retained rights to their ancestral lands. The Governor of Illinois reacted to Black Hawk's return as if it was an act of war. The battles over the next three months would become the last in the state, a climactic time in the story of Indian removal in Illinois. In this program we will take an overview of the "Indian problem," from first interaction with the French voyageurs, attempts at assimilation and coexistence, and finally treaties and government promises broken. We look at the Trail of Tears, the final war dance in 1835 Chicago, and the emergence of Native American casinos in the epic clash of cultures.
