2020 Lee County Fair and Junior Show canceled

LEE COUNTY — The Lee County Fair Association voted to cancel the 2020 Lee Count Fair and Junior Show at their June meeting. The fair was scheduled for July 23-26 at the Lee County 4-H Center and Fairgrounds.

The board of directors released a statement explaining they sought guidance from multiple sources included the Lee County Health Department, the Bureau of County Fairs at the Illinois Department of Agriculture, the Lee County 4-H program and vendors and volunteers.

"In the end we had to abide by the phased Restore Illinois plan and we couldn't find a way around that," said Fair Association president Adam Henkel.

The board had been meeting virtually since March to discuss the future of the fair. Members considered ways to modify the junior show and fair activities by asking fair vendors to share how they would handle guidelines and restrictions in place because of COVID-19.

"Every person we talked to indicated they would do their best to abide by rules and make changes," said Henkel. "We are grateful for the support."

Because the fair is also the annual 4-H show, members were in contact with the Lee County 4-H program coordinator and Extension office as well. On June 1 University of Illinois Extension-Champaign Urbana announced that all July 4-H shows and activities would be conducted virtually. 4-H members will receive information about registering for the virtual 4-H show from their leaders and Extension staff.

The Fair Association will be contacting all fair vendors, volunteers, and partners to share their decision and begin planning for the 2021 fair scheduled for July 22-25, 2021.





Before getting the meeting started, Prusator said he wanted to move the conversation to the board room instead of his office. Schrock did not think too much of the switch until she walked in and saw her daughter, husband, mother and mother-in-law sitting in the room. At first, she thought it might have something to do with her retirement.

"Then they started a virtual presentation with the regional superintendent - I had no idea it was for Teacher of the Year for three counties," she recalled. "I was so blindsided. I feel very overwhelmed."

A born teacher, Schrock knew from an early age what she wanted to do. Growing up in Amboy, she was inspired by her junior high band director, Greg Knutson.

"That's when I decided on my career," she said. "I loved the feeling of empowerment, the feeling you have as a musician and I wanted others to feel it, too. Music is a vehicle that can help kids learn how to be the person they want to be, how to channel their emotions, how to validate themselves, to know they are worthy, important, smart and that they matter. I wanted to use music to help kids do that."

As a high school student, Schrock's goal was to go to the University of Illinois. In fact, she was so determined that the only college she applied to was U of I. Fortunately, she was accepted. While in college, she had the opportunity to intern with Mr. Baile at MHS, which proved to be very beneficial to her education and career. and this would be a chance to help grow the program again.

Working with Mr. Benson, we did great work and we had fun - there was energy and growth," she recalled. "My first students at MHS were the ones I had taught at Northbrook and that first class had lots of very talented students. They were great performers, very talented and the level and expectations got better and better. It was great to be the visionary behind that. I always wanted something more, better and I was never afraid to try something new. Kids have no fear. It was nice to evolve in that way."

As the years passed and times changed, that evolution continued. During an interview in early March, just prior to the scheduled opening of the spring musical, Schrock was asked what types of lessons students might learn from being in a play - a big question to answer on the spot. But after pausing for just a moment, she answered. "It's a laundry list - confidence, learning how to work hard, being accountable to your teammates, holding up your end because the show is the greatest when the weakest person is at their best, being responsible, being prepared and they've done it," she said of the students who were to appear in the play.

As Schrock continued her answer that day, she had no idea how timely her words would become.

"Working through the struggle. How do you press on? We're in a society that throws in the towel way them, but it has become more about things other than the music," she said. "In recent years, I always had kids at my door wanting help of some kind, kids that have a lot of baggage that is out of their control."

Schrock said some of her students were forced to rise above some really difficult situations but they were resilient.

"It has been heartbreaking and fulfilling at the same time," she explained. "The needs of the kids changed in the last decade and I probably got better at what I did. Kids were at my door for help, comfort, reassurance. I gave them gas money and money for groceries when they were going through a tough time."

But through all the changes, Schrock never lost her love of teaching. "I have worked hard but I never considered it a 'job,' and I never said I didn't want to go to work."

Looking back through the past 26 years, Schrock said one thing has remained the same.

"The music has connected us, helped us understand and to teach kids how to do the right thing, to be kind," she said. "We had a lot of group discussions about how to treat people and be a leader. I'm proud of the culture that we have built and the people I've worked with. It's being selfless, using the gift of music to make people feel better."

During the shut down, Schrock told her students that music and the arts are a time stamp and she encouraged them to journal what they observe because literature, poetry and music will be written about this time in history. After receiving the Teacher of the Year Award, Schrock said she was asked to share some of her favorite moments as a teacher but her answer went in another direction. "It wasn't 'favorite moments,' it was all the little moments," she explained. "Watching students find that joy. Those are the moments. Every year was full of them. The energy - that happened every week - the magic we do because of the art form we do." What's next? Schrock plans to spend some time working as a substitute teacher in Mendota or Amboy, but she definitely intends to spend more time with

her husband, children and grandchildren.

"With this job, family has been a sacrifice," she said. "Yes, I chose this field but I never had summers off and family gatherings were difficult to plan with my schedule."

Schrock also hopes to do some traveling, take up yard work as a hobby and just enjoy her home.

After announcing her upcoming retirement three years ago, Schrock had made many plans for the end of this year. Of course, as with most everything else this spring, those plans all changed. On the day of what would have been her final concert at MHS, she admitted that she cried most of the day. But despite all the disappointments, she decided to write a letter to her students.

"There was no closure, not for them and not for me," she said. "It took me hours to write and it was hard. So many things were canceled including our show choir tour this summer."

But mostly, Schrock said she felt bad for her students. Not only did they miss out on many special events they had worked so hard for, but they will have two new teachers in the fine arts department next year.

"But I'm so proud to leave the new director with the students we have now," she emphasized. "This group of students is prepared for what is to come and everyone will find creative ways to make it work. I just don't know how, and I am worried for the kids and the teachers."

Her first teaching job was at Paw Paw, where she spent three years instructing all grade levels in band and choir.

"It was a great learning opportunity - exhausting - but I respected what the job gave to me about teaching and what's important," she noted.

Schrock spent the 1989-90 school year filling in at Northbrook in Mendota during the regular instructor's maternity leave. That year, she had 180 band students in grades 5-8.

The next year, she taught in Amboy but because of her experience at Northbrook and the relationships she had formed in Mendota, she was asked by Rex Benson to apply for the choir director job at MHS, which had opened up. Schrock said there had been quite a bit of turnover in the music program at the time too easy," she said. "How do you overcome your own self doubt and get past fear of judgement? There's all the social stuff, too. They may have to be in an ensemble with somebody they don't really care for but have to learn how to work with them. They're still kids and there are still lessons to be learned. You have to be accountable. We talk about those things. How do you be a person? If you don't want people to talk about you in a negative way, what do you need to do differently? Teenagers don't always think about that. We discuss those things a lot and we have the hard conversations with students.'

Two months later, with so much having changed for everyone, Schrock said she had really noticed a change in the needs of students over the last 8 to 10 years. "You worry about your students and wonder how you can help After years of teaching important life lessons to students, Schrock said she has heard from many of her former students who made her feel that it was all worthwhile.

"Kids have sent texts - one said if not for me, he wouldn't have made it through high school," she said. "That is what matters. He said I always made him feel like somebody. And I got another text today thanking me, and this was a kid who I thought hated me."

Schrock said throughout her teaching career she always remembered something Mr. Baile told her early on.

"He said you may think kids aren't listening but they hear you," she recalled. "At the end of the day, they'll do the right thing."

June 8 Update: Lee County records 2 additional positive cases

LEE COUNTY — There were 4 new positive tests in Lee County on June 5 and 2 positive cases on June 8, bringing the total to 92. The new cases are in three individuals between the ages of 10-19; and one in his or her 30's, 40's and 60's. Seventy-eight of the 92 positive cases in Lee County have recovered and been lifted off isolation.

As we continue through Phase 3 of the Restore Illinois plan, we remind residents that when in public and unable to

maintain social distancing of at least 6 feet, please wear a mask or face covering. Some residents may not feel a risk to themselves, but people can be carriers of the virus and spread it to others even if they show no symptoms. Think of wearing a mask or face covering as a way to protect others; some of whom may be vulnerable due to their age or an underlying health condition.

IDPH announced that a pet cat recently tested positive for COVID-19 after becoming sick in mid-May. The cat was in a home with people who had tested positive. This is the first animal to test positive for the virus in Illinois. There is no evidence COVID-19 is transmitted from animal to humans. However, if you are sick, you should distance yourself from pets as well as people.

What to do if you think you have COVID-19: Individuals with symptoms SHOULD NOT GO to health care facilities such as hospitals, clinics, and urgent care centers without CALLING FIRST. Instead, they can seek care by using one of the following options:

• Use the "KSB Care Anywhere" virtual care app (https:// ksbhospital.zipnosis.com/) for a free 5 question screening in order to help differentiate your symptoms between the virus and other seasonal maladies. While a credit card is required for a more involved assessment, no charges will be applied if a COVID-19 testing referral is made.

• KSB is offering a Coronavirus HOTLINE, by which symptoms can be evaluated against federal screening guidelines, and if appropriate, a referral is made to their Drive-Thru Screening site. The screening site is available ONLY through the hotline and between 9:00 am and 5:00 pm on weekdays by calling 815-285-7777. • Residents with a Primary Care Practitioner can also CALL their office for advice. Again, CALL FIRST before going to the office.

Let Us Thank God For The Unfathomable Gift Of The Holy Eucharist

o one degree or another, each of us has felt the weight of Christ's Cross during the coronavirus pandemic. The restrictions resulting from this pandemic have impacted every aspect of our lives, including the free exercise of religion. As a Catholic priest, I can say with certainty that one of the deepest sufferings of Catholic Christians during this pandemic has been the inability to attend Mass and receive the Holy Eucharist in Holy Communion. With the shelter-in-place order having recently come to an end in our state, many places of worship are gradually reopening. How providential that this gradual reopening overlaps with this Sunday's celebration of Corpus Christi, the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ!

In the Gospel for this Sunday, Jesus says: "I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world" (Jn 6:51).

The Gospel of St. John tells us that when Our Lord spoke these words about the Eucharist, the "Jews quarreled among themselves, saying, 'How can this man give us his flesh to eat?'" (Jn 6:52) In response to this quarreling, Christ declared all the more strongly and solemnly: "Amen, amen, I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life and I will raise him on the last day. For my flesh is true food and my blood is true drink" (Jn 6:53-55).

Christ truly affirmed that his flesh was true food and his blood true drink food and drink that he would later give to his Apostles at the Last Supper and entrust to his Church until his second coming in glory. In his First Letter to the Corinthians, St. Paul writes: "I received from the Lord what I also handed on to vou, that the Lord Jesus, on the night he was handed over, took bread, and, after he had given thanks, broke it and said, 'This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me.' In the same way also the cup, after supper, saying, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.' For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the death of the Lord until he comes" (1 Cor 11:23-26). To celebrate the Mass is to "do this in remembrance" of him.

Christ's revelation about the Eucharist being truly, really, and substantially his body and blood was the faith of the first Christians. Again, in his First Letter to the Corinthians, St. Paul rhetorically asks the Church in Corinth: "The cup of blessing that we bless, is it not a participation in the blood of Christ? The bread that we break, is it not a participation in the body of Christ?" (1 Cor 10:16)

Twenty centuries later, Catholic Christians believe the same thing. We believe and profess that the Holy Eucharist is the body, blood, soul, and divinity of Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. By attending Mass and receiving the Holy Eucharist in Holy Communion, we receive here and now the graces that Christ won for us on the Cross.

This grace unites us more closely to Christ and, through Christ, to all the members of his mystical body, the Church. Hence, St. Paul says: "Because the loaf of bread is one, we, though many, are one body, for we all partake of the one loaf" (1 Cor 10:17). Amidst so much illness and death, how consoling it is to hear Jesus tell us that "whoever eats this bread will live forever" (Jn 6:58)!

On this Corpus Christi weekend, let us thank God for the unfathomable gift of the Holy Eucharist and for the ability to begin to celebrate and receive this gift once more.



The Book Nook

In this time of a monstrous pandemic with its astronomical numbers of sickness and death, reading Tessa Hadley's novel "Late in the Day" (2019) is like a friend advising you to take time out. It is an elegy for a time when people, in this instance, the upright, English middle class, still paid attention to their feelings. As one character laments: "Our bourgeois sensibility. All our sadness and our subtlety, our complicated arrangements. Our privilege of subtlety and irony is at an end. What's in that Polish poem Alex quotes? Something about how the barbarians don't object to irony. They just grind it up and use it as their salt."

Set in the affluent world of London art dealers, erstwhile poets, and artists, "Late in the Day" tells the story of two couples in their fifties who have been best friends since college days. The novel opens with the sudden death of Zachary Samuel, who, as Isobel, the daughter of one of the couples, explains to her date: "He was my dad's best friend, my best friend's father, Mum's best friend's husband." Or as Isobel's mother Christine mourns, "Of all of us, he's the one we couldn't afford to lose."

In language that is fluid and assured, Hadley proceeds to depict the demise of the thirty-year friendships with revealing set-pieces from the past. It begins when best friends Lydia and Christine first meet their French instructor, the patronizing, married Czech-born poet Alexandr Klimec. Lydia, voluptuous, theatrical, decides she must have him. She insinuates herself into his life, and sets up Christine with Alex's best friend Zachary. But Alex chooses Christine and the very rich Zach marries Lydia.

Alex, who is the sort of man who "never lets himself be caught out in admiring wonder," abandons poetry to teach grade school. Christine, who is the heart of this story, becomes a fine narrative artist, viewed by Alex as nothing more than a housewife's hobby. Lydia, who had the "gift of reeling the men in and throwing them out at the same time," devotes herself idleness, and Zach, generous and full of life, sustains the group. By his death, "the shape of all their lives was shaken loose now," and the disaster is not long in coming.

The women in their youth enjoyed "the golden good fortune of being chosen," but as their lives begin to fall apart, Christine wonders, if the "questioning of impervious male knowledge had always come to women at a certain age, in their prime, as they grew out of the illusions of girlhood. Or was it a new thing coming about in history, because of cultural change?" In Hadley's telling, it is Christine's personal history that liberates her, Christine's coming-of age late in the day.

Rage is boiling over and we have to ask ourselves why?

s I've been watching racial tensions escalate, my mind has wandered into **Guest Column** the realm of poetry.

To be precise, I've been thinking of the prose of the great African American poet Langston Hughes. The lyricist from Lincoln, Ill. wrote: What happens to a dream deferred?

Does it dry up like a raisin in the sun? Or fester like a sore-And then run? Does it stink like rotten meat? Or crust and sugar overlike a syrupy sweet?

Maybe it just sags like a heavy load.

Or does it explode?

The words are as applicable today as when they were written in 1951. Racial discrimination remains all too real in our society.

During my more than three decades in journalism, I've become all too aware of this.

I remember my first full-time newspaper job at the Galveston Daily News. I was only a few weeks out of graduate school when I was sent to cover a shooting.

The victim was still bleeding on the dirt when I got there and the smell of gunpowder enveloped the air. I talked to witnesses, police officers and others. I worked the scene hard, just like I'd learned in journalism school.

I hurried back to the newsroom and began pounding out my story. I pitched it for prominent play to the managing editor. He asked one question: "Is the victim black or white?"

When I told him the victim was black, he replied in his syrupy East Texas drawl, "Well just make it a brief and we'll play it inside."

Black lives matter. Unfortunately, for some they don't matter much.

I'd been on the job for all of two or three weeks and he was the top editor in the newsroom. I left the newsroom that day feeling dirty and compromised. I remember calling home to Illinois and asking my Dad: Should I quit?

His response was "No." He said no one wants to hire someone who quit their first job after only two weeks. He added: work hard and get hired by a better newspaper after you've put in at least a year there.

It may have been good personal advice, but its lousy guidance for how to improve a society. If good people won't stand up to racism, who will?

This is why I support the Black Lives Matter movement.

Peaceful protest is always an appropriate way to seek a redress of grievances from government.

When he ran for president, Donald Trump condemned professional athletes for taking a knee during the National Anthem. They harmed no one. But were disparaged for quietly protesting injustice.

It made people uncomfortable. Good. Comfort the afflicted afflict the comfortable.

What happened to George Floyd in Minneapolis was shameful and wrong. And sadly, this type of conduct has been tolerated in police departments for far too long.

It is unfortunate, but not surprising, that urban violence has followed in the wake of this tragedy.

The answer isn't tear gas. It isn't rubber bullets. It isn't glib comments from a politician hunkered behind a wrought iron fence.

Rage is boiling over. We have to ask ourselves: why?


The Minneapolis officer charged with third-degree murder in Floyd's death had a long history of excessive force complaints. And, yet, he remained employed.

Over the years, I have written on police misconduct issues In many cities it is difficult to fire a bad cop.

Much of this has to do with labor union rules and the arbitration process, which all too often protects incompetent abusive officers.

We need to do a better job of policing the police. After all, if good people won't stand up, who will?
