Concern, doubt, frustration about reopening

Rep. Dan Caulkins gives local business leaders a platform to talk about easing COVID restrictions

CLINTON — Rep. Dan Caulkins heard a mixture of concern, doubt and frustration as he and the Clinton Chamber of Commerce hosted an online town hall meeting on May 15 to let local business leaders talk about their experiences during the state stay-at-home order.

There were observations about what some businesses were doing to adapt to current conditions, while there also was some frustration expressed with state government.

“That’s going to be

tough to recover,” YMCA executive director Rennie Cluver said about potential lost Y programming. “And, when we start to reopen, now we’re going to have to have more staff that’s going to be in control of members going in and out of the facility and cleaning and disinfecting.”

He also said the Y wouldn’t be able to run its youth programs and summer camp the way it normally does.

“And, that generates a lot of revenue because, honestly, our operational costs ...they don’t get backed by our membership dues enough to pay for

staff and operations costs,” Cluver said. “We rely heavily on programming.”

Cluver said the Y’s PPP loan would take the organization through about the middle of June.

“And then, we’re going to be relying on operational revenue.”

guidelines so they know what to do.

Caulkins said the same applied to barber shops and cosmetology businesses. He also said there was an acute shortage of disposable products used by these businesses to help them be prepared for reopening.

Josh Shofner, of First National Bank & Trust, said the state stay-at-home order had encouraged some of its banking customers who weren’t users of the bank’s digital presence to begin online banking.

City asks governor for quicker reopening

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CLINTON — Mayor Roger Cyrulik reported on Monday the city worked with Sen. Chapin Rose to draft a letter to Gov. Pritzker recommending rural areas of the state be allowed to move faster to reopen. His comments came during a city council conference call meeting.

“We will forward that letter to Sen. Rose, which will go on to be submitted to the governor this week,” Cyrulik said. “Hoping to get some kind of voice in the “Restore Illinois” plan.”

Cyrulik said he felt this region of the state should be able to move faster “than what is being proposed,” he said.

The letter acknowledges the governor’s desire to protect Illinois residents during the COVID-19 pandemic but expresses concern over the pace of the planned reopening of business in the state. The letter addresses a fear that area residents and business owners will endure irrevocable economic hardships if the pace of reopening is too slow.

Jim Peck named CJHS principal

Board members socially distance while others attend via Zoom

CLINTON — In an unusual school board meeting Tuesday night, Clinton Junior High School assistant principal Jim Peck was promoted to principal for the upcoming school year.

Clinton school board members met at the CJHS library Tuesday night but stayed properly distanced to abide by the state’s order for social distancing. Guests were able to attend the meeting online via Zoom.

In addition to Peck’s promotion, Clinton school district business manager Drew Goebel was named assistant superintendent. Goebel, along with other support staff and district administration, were awarded a 3 percent pay increase.

The board also awarded Superintendent Curt Nettles with a new contract that will keep him at the helm of the district through 2024. Nettles said he plans to retire at the end of that school year.

In other action, the board approved the employment of Alissa Gruenewalk, PreK at Douglas; Heather Jones, CJHS cheer coach; and Treva Howard, CJHS kitchen staff. Karol Wilson will transfer from CJHS teacher’s aide to CJHS lead secretary.

"We've been really fortunate that we were more prepared to go to a remote workforce," Shofner said. "We were able to do everything that we would do as a lot of our employees work remotely."
He said the bank has been able to continue to work with its clients and help with PPP loans.
"We've done a lot of that in a remote environment," he said. "At our single location, we've done over 60 PPP loans."
He said those loans have helped about 660 employees stay in place.
Shofner said he expected some of the bank's customers to continue to use many of the new practices they've adopted during the virus restrictions.
"I think a lot of people will continue to use those methods."
He said he wondered if it would take months or even years for residents and businesses to recover this unusual period.
Shofner added, the banking business was

fortunate in not having to rely on only being able to serve customers across a counter or serve someone a meal.
"It just looks different and is more challenging in the interim," he said.
Caulkins said he felt changes brought about by the restrictions would increase the use of technology.
"Hopefully, we're going to want to choose to continue to exercise and stay healthy and do the things that we need to do," he said.
Warner Hospital & Health Services CEP Paul Skowron talked about measures the hospital had taken due to the statewide restrictions, including suspension of surgeries. He talked also about new infection control procedures adopted by the facility.
"So, I just want the people in the community to know that we are ready when you are ready to come back and see your healthcare provider," Skowron said.

Joe Sartie, owner of Snappers, offered a dire prediction as he criticized the state's handling of the crisis.
"There's not much time left for businesses like mine," he said. "I've got two businesses closed, and one I'm running at 30 percent."
Sartie said his business was able to continue to sell its most expensive item, food, but food prices were going up.
"So, until we open fully, the downward spiral is going to continue," he said.
He said his business was fortunate to have been in a pretty good position, but expressed concern about businesses that couldn't pay their rents. He expected some of those businesses to close.
"Ask anyone in the business, if you're doing 20 percent, you're doing bad; if you're doing 40 percent, you're doing

good.
Local photography business owner Ed Cicenias asked Caulkins how much communications was happening between states.
Cicenias's son is a scout. He said a trip for local scouts to Wisconsin was scheduled this year, and their summer camp and Exelon merit badge fair were canceled.
Caulkins said state legislators in Illinois were in regular contact with one another.
"State-to-state is allegedly occurring at the state level," Caulkins said. So, I really don't have a contact that I talk to over in Indiana or Iowa."
Caulkins said there was an effort among lawmakers to get the governor to move up the plan for reopening the state for business.
"This has turned into a struggle," Caulkins said. "We try to be constructive when we talk to the governor ...urging him to take care of our residents."

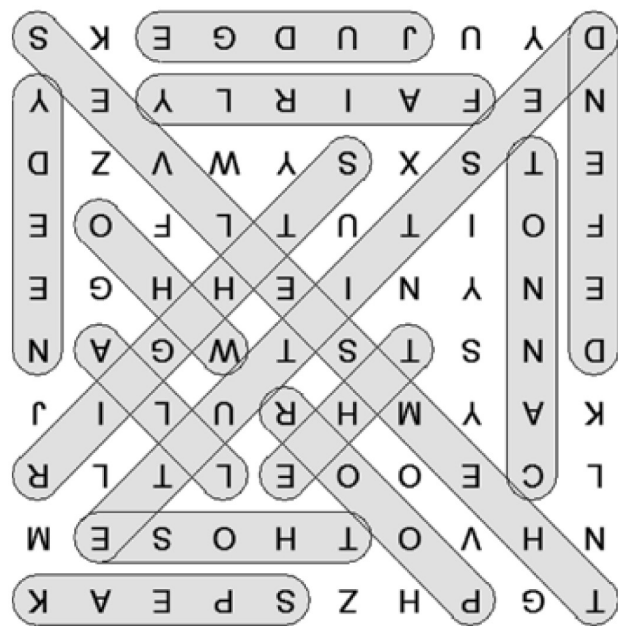

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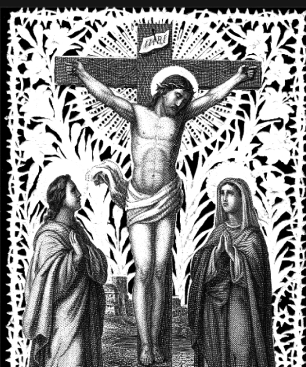

Selecting a personal cookbook

Welcome to my little corner of culinary delights. It is true I wish to teach cooking versus merely giving recipes. Therefore, you must choose the cookbook best for your needs.



The Culinary Corner

Cookbooks are high volume sellers. Some are simplistic for the beginner. Meals produced from simplistic cookbooks generally provide little for which to brag. It might have you combine a can of condensed soup in with a can of green beans over chunks of potato that you heat on the stove or in the oven. Casseroles are very common in these elementary cookbooks since they require very little expertise outside of throwing ingredients together and baking them. This is not to say that chefs avoid casserole making. In your quality cookbooks, casseroles can be intricate. There are some very good casseroles out there.

Upper level cookbooks go beyond just opening cans and using their high sodium content. You might need to work with fresh vegetables and use fresh herbs. You might even need to sauté or bake raw vegetable, such as parsnips and carrots, to the caramelized stage. You might glaze your vegetables or sweat them. It boils down to how far you are willing to go for a quality meal dependent upon your level of expertise.

As a teenager, I began with my mother’s new Betty Crocker Cookbook, 1950, first edition. That cookbook was a general type of cookbook that requires little

cooking experience. Be that as it may, it had a very good scope including appetizers, entrees, side dishes, breads and desserts. It does show you some preparatory steps and that was most helpful. I would call it a low to middle level well rounded cookbook which is good for beginners and the average cook. I baked lots of breads from it, pies, cookies, etc.

In my humble opinion, a better well-rounded cookbook for household use having detailed methodology is “Joy of Cooking” by Rombauer. I have several copies. It is middle to upper levels of cooking. I highly recommend it for general use. It also has some very good specialty items and information.

You can have specialty cookbooks such as one devoted to hors d’oeuvres. Another one devoted to garde manger. Other specialty cookbooks can be just for baking cookies, or for stir fry. And then there are ethnic cookbooks such as Spanish cooking, or Greek cooking, or Italian cooking and many more.

Then we have the professional cookbooks. For these, one needs a background in cooking methodology and developed skills. My first professional cookbook was titled “Food Preparation for Hotels, Restaurants, and Cafeterias” by Robert Haines. It served also as a professional’s textbook for cooking. The Culinary Institute of America’s cookbook titled “The Professional Chef” is basically a spinoff from the one listed above. The Culinary Institute also puts out a good one that is titled, “Baking & Pastry”.

My recommendation is simple; purchase the cookbook that works best for you; that matches your expertise.

Getting around canceled events

Life might be slowly getting back to normal, but a number of things we anticipated won’t be happening now.

The expired prescription-drug drop off: Once a year in my area, the drug store turns its parking lot over to an organization that collects and destroys old drugs. Not this year; it’s already been canceled. A thought: Some local police departments have a collection bin in their facility, usually in the lobby. Call to inquire if your police department has one, or if they’re planning a drug event of their own.

The shredding events: Twice a year the bank and the senior center hire a company to bring in their shredding truck and accept all paper items to be shredded: old tax records, bills, documents with personal information on them. This is a very valuable service, and unfortunately, around here those have been canceled. One way to get around this is to have your own shredder. They can be ordered online, typically for less than \$40. Learn the difference between strip cut, cross cut and confetti cut. Pictures can be deceptive, so read the specs for the machine. Some will only shred small receipts.

Plays and dinners: Once you hear that an event you’d paid for is being canceled, start right away to get your money back. The group might ask that you let them keep your money for their expenses, saying you can claim it as a donation on your taxes. You might consider it, but don’t assume you can get a credit for the same event next year. Better to get your money in hand now.

There are so many other events -- senior games and fitness clinics, summer banquet and dance, the legal help event, monthly tech help -- all likely canceled for the foreseeable future.

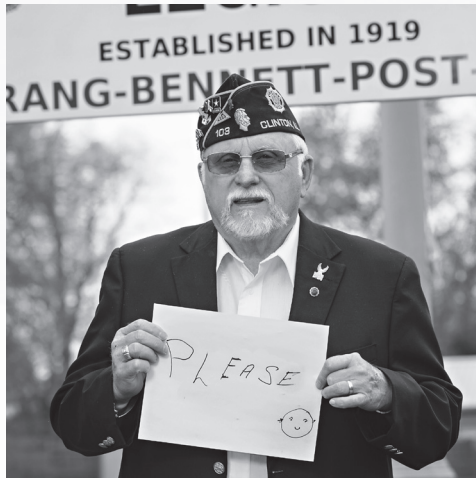
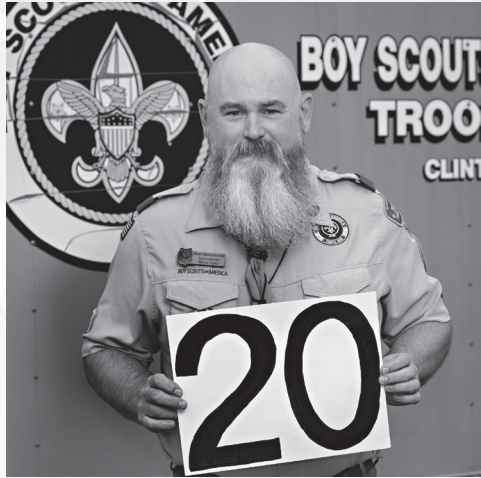
Tip: Call the organization anyway. They might have found a way to safely hold their events.

The American’s Creed

I therefore, believe it is my duty to my country to love it; to support its constitution; to obey its laws; to respect its flag and to defend it against all enemies.

Lincoln’s Gettysburg Address

The The Gettysburg Address full text delivered by President Abraham Lincoln at the dedication of the Soldier’s National Cemetery at the scene of the Battle Of Gettysburg of the American Civil War on November 19, 1863.

“Four score and seven years ago our fathers brought forth on this continent, a new nation, conceived in Liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal.

Now we are engaged in a great civil war, testing whether that nation, or any nation so conceived and dedicated, can long endure. We are met on a great battle-field of that war. We have come to dedicate a portion of that field, as a final resting place for those who here gave their lives that the nation might live. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this.

But, in a larger sense, we can not dedicate — we can not consecrate — we can not hallow — this ground. The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here, have consecrated it, far above our poor power to add or detract. The world will little note, nor long remember what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here. It is for us the living, rather, to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced.

It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us — that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion — that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain — that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom — and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth.”

General Order No. 11

Gen. John A. Logan

Headquarters, Grand Army of the Republic
Washington, D.C., May 5, 1868

The 30th day of May, 1868, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village, and hamlet churchyard in the land. In this observance no form or ceremony is prescribed, but posts and comrades will in their own way arrange such fitting services and testimonials of respect as circumstances may permit.

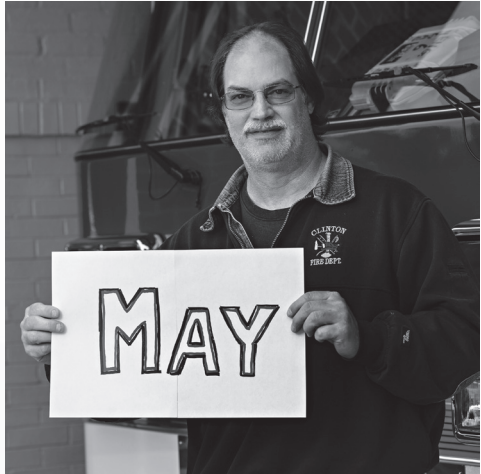
We are organized, comrades, as our regulations tell us, for the purpose, among other things, “of preserving and strengthening those kind and fraternal feelings which have bound together the soldiers, sailors, and marines who united to suppress the late rebellion.”

What can aid more to assure this result than by cherishing tenderly the memory of our heroic dead, who made their breasts a barricade between our country and its foes?

Their soldier lives were the reveille of freedom to a race in chains, and their death a tattoo of rebellious tyranny in arms. We should guard their graves with sacred vigilance.

All that the consecrated wealth and taste of the Nation can add to their adornment and security is but a fitting tribute to the memory of her slain defenders. Let no wanton foot tread rudely on such hallowed grounds.

Let pleasant paths invite the coming and going of reverent visitors and fond mourners. Let no vandalism of avarice or neglect, no ravages of time, testify to the present or to the coming generations that we have forgotten, as a people, the cost of free and undivided republic.



If other eyes grow dull and other hands slack, and other hearts cold in the solemn trust, ours shall keep it well as long as the light and warmth of life remain in us.

Let us, then, at the time appointed, gather around their sacred remains and garland the passionless mounds above them with choicest flowers of springtime; let us raise above them the dear old flag they saved from dishonor; let us in this solemn presence renew our pledges to aid and assist those whom they have left among us as sacred charges upon the Nation’s gratitude,—the soldier’s and sailor’s widow and orphan.

It is the purpose of the Commander-in-Chief to inaugurate this observance with the hope it will be kept up from year to year, while a survivor of the war remains to honor the memory of his departed comrades.

He earnestly desires the public press to call attention to this Order, and lend its friendly aid in bringing it to the notice of comrades in all parts of the country in time for simultaneous compliance therewith.

III. Department commanders will use every effort to make this order effective.

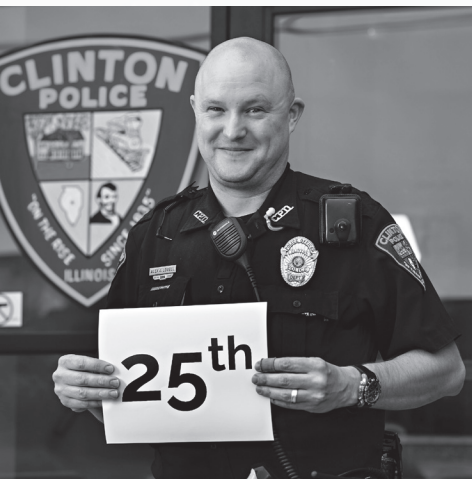
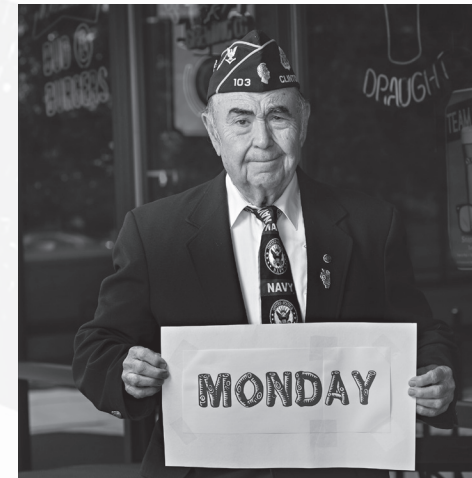
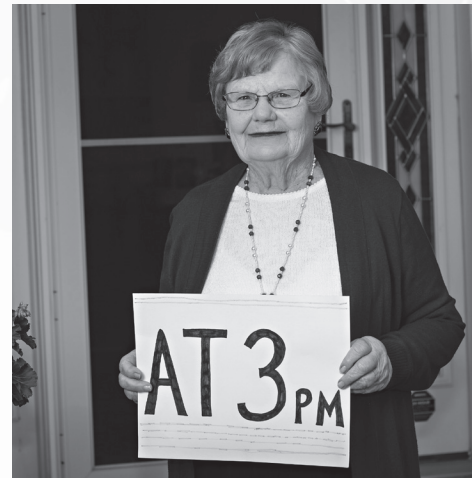

The establishment of Memorial Day

Originally called Decoration Day, when Americans took time to decorate the graves of soldiers who gave their lives in the Civil War, today's national holiday of Memorial Day honors all American soldiers who died in defense of the nation. While several towns claim to be the site of the first Memorial Day celebration, one man, John A. Logan, deserves much of the credit for the establishment of Memorial Day as a national holiday.

John A. Logan, was born 9 February 1826 in Jackson County, Illinois. He served as an officer with the 1st Illinois Volunteer Infantry during the Mexican War but did not see any combat. Upon his return home to Illinois, he became involved in state politics and was elected to the US House of Representatives as a Democrat in November 1858. A powerful orator, he staunchly defended the Union during the months leading up to the Civil War despite representing an area of Illinois that harbored secessionist sentiments. In fact, his oratorical skills swayed many of his constituents to change their views and support the Union.

Upon the outbreak of hostilities in 1861,

Logan volunteered his services as a soldier and served with a Michigan regiment at the Battle of First Bull Run on 21 July 1861. After the battle, he returned home to Illinois to recruit a regiment, the 31st Illinois, and was named the regiment's colonel. Nicknamed "Black Jack" for his black hair and dark eyes and complexion, Logan led his regiment into combat for the first time at Belmont in November 1861. He proved to be a natural military leader and later fought with distinction at Fort Donelson, Corinth, and Vicksburg, and rose to the rank of major general of volunteers. During the Atlanta campaign, he commanded XV Corps, was wounded, and then temporarily commanded the Army of the Tennessee. He was replaced as corps commander by Major General O.O. Howard, a decision made by Major General William T. Sherman because of Sherman's mistrust of "political" generals, not because of Logan's fighting abilities. The decision led Logan to despise professional soldiers, especially West Pointers, for the rest of his life. Logan, however, dutifully served under Sherman for the rest of the war until the surrender of Confederate General Joseph

E. Johnston in April 1865 in North Carolina. Many historians consider Logan the best of the Union Army's political generals.

Following the Civil War, Logan was instrumental in the founding of the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR), a veterans group comprised of former Union Army soldiers, and served as the GAR's second elected national commander; General Stephen Hurlburt was the first commander in chief of the GAR. On 3 March 1868, Logan issued General Order No. 11, which called for a national day of remembrance for Civil War dead. This order served as the basis for what became the national holiday of Memorial Day.

Logan also returned to politics after the war as a Republican and served in both the House and Senate. He was on the 1884 Republican ticket as vice president with presidential candidate James Blaine. Logan died on 26 December 1886 and is buried at the United States Soldiers' & Airmen's Home National Cemetery in Washington, DC.

At least a dozen farms were completely devastated, with another 40 damaged to some degree. 3 people were killed, and 28 injured, along the tornado's 16 mile track.

Using personal protective equipment and maintaining social distancing could make it possible for local, rural businesses to open sooner, according to the letter.

Warner Hospital & Health Services CEO Paul Skowron addressed the council Monday about the hospital's current situation during the shelter-in-place order.

Skowron said the triage tent set up by the fire department at the being of the state order now has been removed.

"For eight weeks, we reduced the volume by half so we could prepare for the coronavirus," Skowron said. "We prepared, but there were hardly any coronavirus patients."

Skowron said hospital administration and staff "learned a lot" during the period.

"We revamped all of the procedures and the processes in the hospital for any patients that come through to have enhanced infection control procedures."

He said everyone will be required to continue wearing masks.

"But, we are encouraging patients to come back," he said. "We are ready and very glad to have the patients start to return."

Hospitals in Illinois, including Warner, are now allowed to resume performing surgical procedures.

"We had two days of surgery last week, and we performed surgeries today, so that was good to get back to normal in that regard," Skowron said. "The emergency room has always been open, so we're been taking care of the community in that regard throughout the coronavirus stay-at-home time period."

He added they also are encouraging patients to return to using the Family Medicine office.

Additional business

The council voted to appoint Patty Nelson to the Warner Hospital board, approved a four-year agreement with Mutual Medical Plans, Inc., and approved a bid from Illinois Valley Paving for the Center Street rehabilitation project for \$1,252,583.10.

The Celebrate Clinton organization reported it had made the difficult decision to cancel this year's July 4 activities and fireworks display. Because of the cost and loss of volunteers and because of business closures from the COVID-19 restrictions, the group felt it, "would be inappropriate to pursue our fundraising efforts," according a media release.

The group said it hoped to resume activities in 2021.

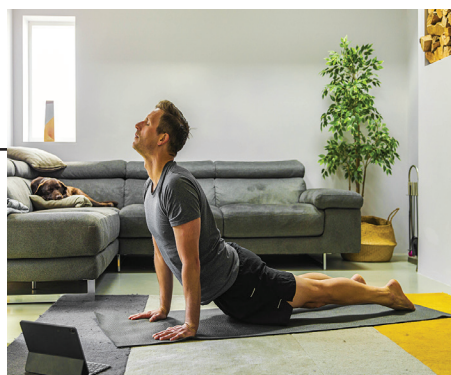

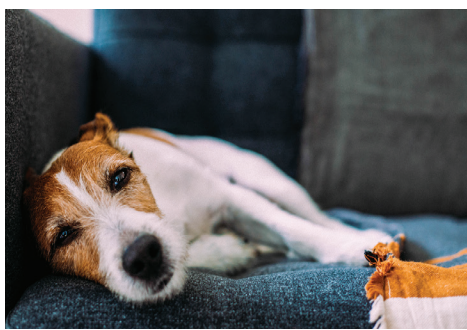

- Play treat-hide-and-seek with your pup or create a canine obstacle course in your home or backyard.
- Stay active together with plenty of walks, keeping a safe social distance from passersby.

- Consider fostering or adopting a pet while you have extra time at home to help your new companion acclimate. Before adopting a pet, determine if you will have adequate time to care for him or her when you return to your regular post-pandemic schedule.

According to the CDC and other health organizations, there is no evidence that companion animals can spread COVID-19 to people. Humans should always wash their hands after touching any animal or pet food, and avoid kissing pets or sharing food, to prevent the spread of any illness. It is also advisable that people infected with COVID-19 limit close contact with their pets.

West opens 3♠ and eventually South becomes Declarer in 6♥. West's opening lead is the ♠K, won by Declarer's Ace. Looking just at the N-S hands, Declarer can count four side-suits tricks, with a fifth available if the ♠K is with East. That means that he will need to score 7 or 8 trump tricks if he is to make his slam. And with East sure to be out of Spades by now, any Spade ruffs will have to be high. How do you make 12 tricks?

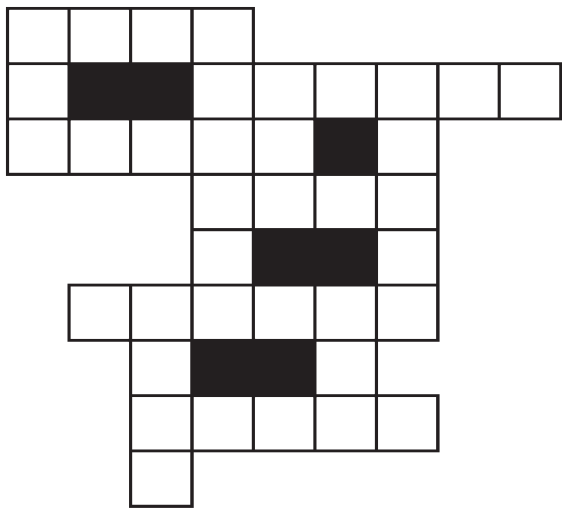
One possibility is to hope for 2-2 trumps and for East to have the ♠K. In that case, trumps are drawn, and Declarer gets up to 12 with five trumps in his hand, five side-suit tricks and two Spade ruffs on the board. That's not a good plan ... firstly, as West has extreme Spade length, he is likely to have less than his share of the Hearts ... secondly, this line requires the ♠K with East, and those readers who have peeked at the E-W hands can see that this is not the case.

Better, but still not good enough, is to arrange for two high Spade ruffs, and to pick up trumps by finessing against East's Ten. That caters for the 3-1 trumps, but it's down one when the ♠K is offside. The route to success is to ruff *three* Spades high in Dummy: win the ♠A, cross to the ♠A, finesse the Heart Nine, ruff a Spade, cash ♠AK (pitching a Club from hand), and then merrily cross-ruff the hand. That well-timed line of play works against most distributions, requiring only that East has the ♥T. *That's* the key card on this deal, not the ♠K!
