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White Pines Resort closing

Owner holding going out of business sale this week

After 31 years of operating White Pines resort, Beth George announced in a Facebook post on May 13 that she is filing for bankruptcy and closing down.

"I want to just tell you that I never thought I would be saying these words," she said in a sometimes emotional video. "For 31 years I've run the resort and put my heart and soul in it."

But ultimately, with the prolonged closure of the resort due to the COVID-19 pandemic, George said the numbers moving forward just won't work for her business.

"I am going to be one of the statistics that don't make it," she said.

On May 18-20 from 10 a.m.- 6 p.m., White Pines will be having a going out of business sale at the gift shop. George asked that people consider stopping by to purchases a memento to help her pay back those who have planned events at the resort

She said she has been following

the directives from the state in order to keep people safe. But when Gov. Pritzker recently announced the phased re-opening plan, she said she knew that was the, "nail in the coffin."

She said as a business that relies on large events like weddings and retreats, keeping the numbers to 50 people or less would not be possible. Not being able to fully open would mean the resort could not survive.

"I've poured my heart and soul into this place and I'm a mess trying to save it," she said.

She said she was worried about discussing her concerns because she would be accused of not caring about others and only her bottom line.

We can't talk about it publicly because we will be chastised for it," she said.

George said that she will "miss everyone terribly," but she will



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

County organizations receive grant funds from United Way

ROCKFORD - United Way of Rock River Valley (UWRRV) in collaboration with the 815 Community Response Team, has awarded nearly \$250,000 in the second round of grants from its COVID-19 Emerging Needs Fund to 27 non-profit organizations in Boone, Ogle, Stephenson and Winnebago

United Way of Rock River Valley distributed \$250,000 in this second round thanks to contributions from local companies, organizations, foundations and individuals who have generously donated to its COVID-19 Emerging Needs Fund. The quick response from the community has allowed United Way and the 815 Community Response Team to get funds to local agencies quickly and efficiently.

"We established the CO-VID-19 Emerging Needs Fund in late March with an anonymous \$10,000 donation and it has quickly grown to more than \$550,000 thanks to the generosity of our community," said Paul Logli, United Way of Rock River Valley president and CEO. "From our beginning 100 years ago, we've been able to meet the critical needs of our region because of the community support. We've received individual donations from \$10 to \$10,000 and every amount makes a tremendous impact."

Ogle County recipients Chana Education Center, \$1,500, purchase 30 food gift cards for at-risk students;

Farmwork & Landscape Advocacy Project, \$17,000, provide crucial monetary support and information to low income Latino families in Ogle and Winnebago counties who are experiencing financial hardships;

Immanuel Lutheran Good Samaritan Food Pantry, \$500, purchase items for food pantry;

Rochelle Christian Food Pantry, \$5,000, purchase items for food pantry;

Shining Star Children's Advocacy Center, \$10,000, grant will be used for mental health services and forensic medical exams for child abuse victims.

Brodzik retires after 30 years

She had been a deputy in Ogle County since 1990

The Ogle County Sheriff's Department said farewell to one of its finest deputy sheriffs who served the community for nearly 30 years.

Cheri Brodzik had been an Ogle County deputy sheriff since 1990, and she held multiple titles throughout her career with the department. As she approached her 30th year on the force, she recently made the emotional decision to retire.

"I have really enjoyed being a police officer for 30 years and at the school for the last two, but it just seemed like good timing for me," Brodzik said. "It is bittersweet for sure, I am going to miss all of my students, teachers and staff at the high school and the group of guys that I work with on the force.'

Brodzik said she knew from a young age she wanted to become a police officer and help other people. She was hit by a car when she was 8 years old, and it was the police officer who responded to help her who inspired her to become a police officer herself.

"I was crossing the street with my brother and I got hit by a car," Brodzik said. "The officer that showed up to help me was Jack Wells and I was just in awe of him. He stayed with me in the ambulance and came to see me in the hospital. That's when I decided I wanted to become a police officer and help people like that."

Brodzik graduated from Rochelle Township High School in 1985 and went to Kishwaukee College to begin her journey toward becoming a police officer. She graduated from Kishwaukee College and received her associate's degree in criminal justice

She then started her first law enforcement position at the Ogle County Sheriff's Department in 1990. During her time at the department, she held many different positions and achieved many accomplishments. She worked as a juvenile officer before becoming a D.A.R.E. officer in all the county schools for 13 years.

Additionally, she served as court security at the Ogle County courthouse and was the school resource officer at Rochelle Township High School for the last two years before her retirement.

Out of her many accomplishments in her 30 vears of service, one of her most memorable was returning to Kishwaukee College to teach students enrolled in the criminal justice program.

"I was an adjunct instructor at Kishwaukee

College, meaning I was a career person out in the field that would teach the criminal justice classes as well," Brodzik said. "I love to teach, so going back to the community college that I learned at to teach was very special.

Fellow officers have said Brodzik was a model deputy sheriff with exceptionally good communication skills. Mel Messer, former Ogle County sheriff of 16 years, personally worked with Brodzik during his time at the department. He saw what a great officer she was and thanks her for her years of service.

"She had a good capability of communicating with people, especially working well with young people,' Messer said. "It's hard to get people that can communicate with the public and get the job done well like she could. I wish her good luck and a good retirement."

Brodzik has plans to relax and spend time with her family, including her new grandson, during her retirement. While there have been many challenges along the way, she said trying to separate her line of work from being a mother at home was most challenging.

"I saw some pretty horrific things in my career," said Brodzik. "Then, to have to come home, shift gears and leave everything back at work, that was my biggest struggle."

Brodzik left a mark at the sheriff's department that will be remembered long after her retirement. Current Ogle County Sheriff Brian VanVickle knows it will be hard to find an officer like her and hopes that new deputies have learned a thing or two from her.

'When a long-term employee retires, it's hard to fill those shoes with that knowledge you lose when they walk out the door," VanVickle said. "We continue to have the senior officers share that knowledge and experience to our newer officers."

Exelon plants complete refueling

WARRENVILLE-Four of Exelon Generation's six Illinois nuclear plants safely completed refueling outages during the COVID-19 pandemic, setting new operational records at each facility.

Braidwood, Byron, LaSalle and Quad Cities all delivered record outages while implementing proactive measures to keep workers safe and virus-free

"The essential workers who operate, maintain and refuel Exelon's Illinois nuclear stations delivered a heroic performance this spring," said Bryan Hanson, Exelon Generation, president and chief nuclear officer. "Not only did they perform the required outage work safely and effectively, but they did it in record time while preventing the spread of COVID-19.

Nuclear refueling outages, which are conducted every 18 to 24 months, require a minimum of 1,500 to 2,000 employees and contractors to perform the required inspections, maintenance tasks and tests. Many of the contractors are skilled craft workers from local union halls who specialize in nuclear

maintenance and refueling.

"Exelon Generation went above and beyond to protect everyone who came onsite during an outage so our workers could complete critical maintenance work," said Terry Mc-Goldrick, president of IBEW Local 15. "Our folks worked hard to support these essential refueling while protecting each other and the community, and we're proud of them."

Exelon Generation's average outage duration in Illinois this spring was 17 days, a full two weeks shorter than the national average. This efficiency alone generated carbon-free power for an additional 4.6 million homes, hospitals and other essential businesses during a critical time. Exelon Generation continues to make its nuclear facilities even safer, more effective and cost-efficient than ever before, reinforcing nuclear's enormous value

Each Illinois station set a plant record during this spring outage season: •LaSalle had its shortest-ever refueling outage at 18 days.

Quad Cities completed the site's

longest continuous run of 722 days and achieved a new station record for

outage duration at 16 days. * Byron and Braidwood both completed their sixth consecutive continuous cycle of operations, known in the industry as a "breaker-to-breaker" run, which equates to 10 years of non-stop safe and reliable operation.

In addition to following all CDC guidelines and recommended precautions to slow the transmission of CO-VID-19, Exelon Generation's nuclear plants implemented their pandemic plans and tailored them to bolster health and safety. Exelon Generation recorded only a few confirmed cases of COVID-19 during the outage season, despite the thousands of workers supporting outages.

Each refueling site took proactive health measures, including:

* Pre-entry screenings and body temperature checks

Enhanced cleaning and sanitizing of work areas, break rooms and



Mobile food pantry May 20

MOUNT MORRIS – Loaves & Fish Food Pantry alongside Northern Illinois Food Bank is hosting a Mobile Food Pantry on May 20.

The truck will be located at Mt. Morris Church of the Brethren (lower level), 409 West Brayton Road, Mt. Morris from 10-11:30 a.m.

This mobile pantry is open anyone in Ogle County. Every 1 in 7 people across Northern Illinois is food insecure, meaning that they aren't sure of where their next meal may come from. Northern Illinois Food Bank partners with over 800 feeding program partners across 13 counties to serve our neighbors needing food. However, even with the outstanding efforts of the Food Bank, there are individuals who

can't make it out to those partners that provide nutritious food.

This is an "extra" food distribution. Loaves & Fish Pantry clients are still eligible to receive their normal monthly food allotment. The pantry is open on the 1st and 3rd Thursdays from 4:30-7 p.m. and 2nd and 4th Mondays from 2-4:30 p.m. Anyone in the Mt. Morris/Leaf River area experiencing food insecurity is eligible to receive food.

You do not need to have a referral, and no proof of income is required.

Byron Rotary helps with hand sanitizer shortage

BYRON – When Rotary Club of Byron was forced to cancel its annual Pot of Gold fundraiser due to the COVID-19 pandemic, every single one of their sponsors told it to keep their sponsorship money so they could continue doing good things in the community.

Rotary's first effort was to donate 500 pounds of sugar to Grant View Distillery for use in making hand sanitizer for first responders.

"We wanted to do something meaningful and we wanted to do it fast," Byron Rotary President Kay King said. "The sanitizer shortage was so pronounced, and we knew that Grant View Distillery was offering its resources and its expertise, so it was a perfect fit."

When the COVID-19 pandemic hit the U.S. in March, hand sanitizer was among the first items to

disappear from store shelves. Online, sanitizer has been offered for as much as \$300 an ounce. Currently, most companies that offer sanitizer are listing a wait time of several weeks; a product that sold for pennies an ounce prior to the pandemic is now routinely being offered at roughly the price of filet mignon.

Grant View, a Rockford Distillery, has been producing up to 50 gallons of sanitizer a day, using donated sugar and beer in the fermenting process. They are producing sanitizers from the processes of whiskey, beer and vodka. Distillers nationwide are using donated raw materials and a "recipe" from the World Health Organization for the ethanol-based antiseptic, adding glycerin and aloe, to produce a spray that exceeds the 65 percent recommended level to kill germs.

While some area distillers are selling their product. Grant View is donating sanitizer to first responders in Winnebago, Ogle, Boone and Stephenson counties.





- Use credit and debit cards for purchasesIf cash is used, do not expect change
- Do not pick up any products or produce at vendor stands, ask staff to help youlf you prefer a reusable bag, you will need to place purchases in your bag yourself. It will not be filled by vendors. At home, regularly wash your reusable bags.
- If you sneeze or cough, do so only into a tissue (and immediately dispose of it) or into the crease of your elbow
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth.
- Thoroughly wash your hands often with soap for at least 20 seconds according to the CDC Guidelines
- If hand washing is not available, use a CDC approved hand sanitizer, either 60% ethanol or 70% isopropanol.

Glad I made the decision I did in 1986

I remember the moment that I had to make the choice very well.

I had been out of the Air Force for less than two years, and I was 24. I was working a menial job in San Diego, Calif., and playing in a band that was good but doing nothing.

Did I want this to be my life? Scraping to get by while chasing a dream that seemed far out of reach? Or maybe it was time to head back to Arizona and start college?

I was undecided until I saw a guy working in the local Guitar Center I knew from a band on the local scene. His band was popular locally, and even went up to Los Angeles from time to time to play on the Sunset Strip. This 1986, so the Strip was pretty hot at that time.

I heard this guy talking. He was 38, had a wife and a couple of kids but was sure this time he was going to "make it." Did I want to be this guy?

No, I didn't. I went back home, went to college and here we are. Yes, I still write and play music and have for decades. But I also have a roof over my head and food on the table.

The reason I bring this up

is because many musicians are back to starving these days. Sure, those of us on the local scene have seen our gigs cancelled, and we do miss getting out there and playing music.

We mostly do it for fun. Actually, we only do it for fun. But for many people, playing live music is their livelihood and they are hurting pretty bad right now.

Sure, that does include some local musicians. Playing in an area band that covers popular music can certainly put money in your pocket. It is not enough to make you rich or even very comfortable, but along with a "real" job it can be a nice supplement to your income. And it can help pay for the

thousands of dollars worth of gear that it takes - guitars, drums, amplifiers, sound systems, lights - it is not cheap.

But I am talking about national artists here as well. It used to be that you were signed to a large record label and that label funded recording and touring. Once the band made money, they paid the label back. And artists made money from selling actual music as records, tapes or compact discs.

But the Internet has pretty much destroyed that businesses plan. People sharing music for free on the Internet has killed many bands and artists. The days of making real money off of your art are almost gone. Sure, some pop stars still do well, but not every musician wants to be a pop star. They probably don't even care about being rich. But making a living is even hard to do these days.

But there is always touring. Going out and playing, selling T-shirts, having fans pay a little bit to meet their favorite musicians, that is money in the pocket for many artists. It keeps them alive and doing what they

Right now all of that is

on hold, and some musicians who have been writing, recording, and touring for years - even decades - are in bad shape. These are people who lost thousands of dollars a week in income because they simply can't go out and do their job.

And the people I am talking about include many bands and artists you love. It is tough with no road work for artists right now. This is another story of COVID-19 killing off a sector of the economy. In this case, live music is dead, and that is costing artists and venues millions.

I know, many people are currently affected by this virus in the same way. I am not saying these people are any different or special. But we often don't think about people like this who are almost always out on the road, entertaining people in a different city night after night.

I could have been one of those people if I had chosen a different path back in 1986. I am glad I didn't, but I also hope all of these musicians can get back to playing their music live soon. I know I am ready for some live music.

From the history of Buffalo Township

The Polo Library opened on December 21, 1871 for two evenings and on Saturday afternoon and evening. Miss E. Franc Barber was the librarian and teaching school in the daytime. Miss Barber told in her history sketch that "we were the first Public Library to have open shelves; that is, where people could select books from the shelves rather than from catalogues." Also from her history sketch, I quote "This was the first public library west of Chicago, and two years older than Chicago's, which did not exist until after the great fire of 1871 (then Queen sent them a large consignment of books). So we were pioneers in this work.

In the Tri-County Press, April 22, 1971, a quote, "Despite previous historical writings, the Library is the 23rd oldest in Illinois." - Karen Scholl, Librarian

It seems today that most people believe they have to wait for their circumstances to change before they can enjoy life. But the truth is you can make the decision to enjoy your ordinary life and make it extraordinary, regardless of your circumstances.

Doing Life with God

One of the ways you can take ordinary life and make it extraordinary is to learn to do every single thing you do with and for God. We make a mistake when we separate our sacred life from our secular life. We can be just as close to God in the grocery store as we are at church. And He wants us to do everything we need to do WITH Him.

It actually adds an edge of excitement when we let God be involved in everything we do. He's everywhere, all the time, and He's just as interested in the routine, mundane tasks of our lives as He is in the more "spiritual" things we do.

It's amazing to realize that God wants to have fellowship with us—He wants to spend each day with us. Don't just settle for seeking Him once a week at church or when you're in a desperate situation. Decide that you are going to enjoy your everyday relationship with God!

The Truth About Real Joy

The abundant life Christ offers goes deeper in our hearts than the way we feel about things. It's an amazing thing when we learn how to have the peace and joy only God can give in every area of our lives, instead of the type of enjoyment that's just based on emotional excitement.

The joy of the Lord is much greater than simply feeling happy. It brings peace and contentment to your soul, even when your circumstances are difficult and don't make any sense. Nehemiah 8:10 says, "The joy of the Lord is your strength."

This kind of joy makes the Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday routine enjoyable. And since most of life is Monday through Friday, we need to enjoy it!

The World Can't Give It to You

In John 15:11, Jesus says, "I have told you this so that my joy may be in you and that your joy may be complete." The Amplified translation says "that your joy and gladness may be of full measure and complete and overflowing." In the ten verses leading up to this one, Jesus is talking about abiding in Him, because that's the key to living with His

Abiding means "to live, dwell and remain in"; it's not just visiting once a week at church. It's having a personal relationship with Christ, being one with Him and doing life together. The truth is apart from Jesus, we can do nothing of real value, but with Him, we can bear much good fruit (John 15:5).

God wants to abide with you every day, all throughout the day. He doesn't just want you to seek Him when you go to church or when you're desperate. His desire is to have a personal relationship with you, so you can experience His presence in everything you do. That's when your everyday life is really enjoyable!
