New chief a familiar face

Melville has been with Oregon PD for 22 years

OREGON – Oregon has a new police chief, but he is certainly not new to the community.

Shawn Melville, who grew up in Oregon and has been with the Oregon Police Department for more than 20 years, was promoted to chief on March 31. The previous chief, Darin DeHann, was appointed city administrator.

Melville graduated from Oregon High School and started his career with the Mount Morris Police Department. He started with the Oregon department in 1998.

Melville has two children – Jordan, 26, and Jensen, 22 – and said he spends much of his off time with longtime girlfriend Tiffany Cravatta, owner of the Blackhawk Steakpit.

Melville sat down to answer some questions about himself and his profession.

Question: How did you first become interested in a career in law enforcement, and why this field?

Answer: Iam a very competitive person, having played football and baseball most of my life. And I think being competitive is a great asset in the law enforcement profession. To be a successful officer, you have to have a certain amount of the attitude that, there are bad people out there, who want to take advantage of, and harm, the more



vulnerable members of our society, and it's my job to stop them. This competitive aspect is what first drew me to this profession.

Q: What do you enjoy most about the job?

A: As a younger officer, I really enjoyed the excitement that this career could offer. However, at this point in my career, what I truly enjoy most is helping people, and making sure we have a safe community. I love to hear that our citizens feel safe walking around at night, and feel their children are safe playing in the yard or down the street at the park.

Q: What are the special challenges of being an officer in a smaller town like Oregon?

A: There are several things that make being an officer in a smaller community challenging. For one, when you are an officer in a small town there are no specialized units that handle different types of situations, you have to be an expert at everything. There is no burglary unit to handle a burglary call, there isn't a traffic unit to handle your accident reports, there isn't a domestic violence unit, you handle all of these cases by yourself. Another aspect that can make it tough is you are sometimes the only officer working at a given time. Although Oregon is a safe community, we are only 90 miles away from Chicago, and 30 miles away from Rockford, and these are two of the most violent communities in the country. The citizens that cause problems in those cities. sometimes come to and through Oregon, and this can put officers in dangerous situations, situations that they have to handle at times, by themselves.

Q: Can the community expect any changes now that you are the chief?

A: The community should not expect to see many changes with the Oregon Police Department.

Committee had to make the tough decision to cancel ByronFest for 2020," the statement said.

"The decision did not come lightly as we focused on the future of the festival, the safety of our community, the uncertainty of being permitted to host the event and coming to the time of the year we would begin to take on major expenditures."

The post went on to thank the festival's volunteers and sponsors, including resenting sponsor Byron Bank, community partners and vendors.

The post said the Steering Committee will now begin working on Byron-Fest 2021, set for July 9-11.

Number of initial claims slowly decreasing

SPRINGFIELD - The Illinois Department of Employment Security (IDES) recently released new statewide data showing the department processed 81,596 new initial unemployment claims for the week ending April 25 and has now processed more than 830,000 initial unemployment claims from March 1 through April 25.

This is 10 times the number of claims the department processed over the same period last year, when IDES processed just 69,000 initial unemployment claims.

Illinois is beginning to experience a slight decline in the number of new initial claims since its peak of more than 100,000 processed claims on March 21, 2020.

Statewide unemploy-

ment claims data, which reflects activity for the week prior, will be available on the IDES website every

Thursday afternoon. To manage the unprecedented demand, IDES worked quickly to overhaul its website infrastructure, expanded web and call center capacity, and secured third party vendor partnerships to further implement and streamline new programs that enhance filing capabilities.

The department is also standing up a virtual call center, that will nearly double current call center capacity with Illinois-based call center representatives.

IDES waived the waiting week for claimants. was one of the first states to implement the Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation (FPUC), which provides an additional \$600 each week in federally funded benefits to eligible Illinoisans, and recently implemented the Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation (PEUC), which provides up to 13 weeks' worth of federally funded benefits to individuals who have exhausted their regular state unemployment benefits.

The CARES Act also created Federal Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (FPUA), a new program for people who are not typically covered by the state's unemployment system. The department is contracting with Deloitte to launch this system the week of May 11.

Those with questions or in need of assistance with unemployment benefits at this time are encouraged to visit IDES.Illinois.gov.

All Rochelle Food workers tested; 123 were positive for COVID-19

The local health departments (LHDs) in the Northern Illinois Rockford Region have collaborated to address the outbreak of COVID-19 among workers at Rochelle

Through the cooperaton of Rochelle Foods, more than 800 employees were tested and 123 positive cases have been identified throughout the Northern Illinois Rockford region with a 14 percent positivity rate. The LHDs in the region have conducted contact tracing and isolated all positive cases to prevent further transmission in our communities.

Thank you to Rochelle Community Hospital and KSB Hospital Dixon who provided the testing.

Rochelle Foods has implemented recommendations to reduce the transmission of COVID-19 in their facility and plans to reopen on Saturday. We encourage all workers returning to stay healthy and take action to protect yourself, your co-workers, and your workplace. This protects your family and community.

All essential workers should take the following steps to help stay healthy and safe while at work:

- * Wear a face mask/face covering when out in public and you are unable to keep a 6 foot distance from others (when entering and exiting the building, when in hallways)
- * Do not rideshare with others who do not reside in your household.
- * Wear all personal protective equipment provided to you by your employer and notify them if the equipment needs to be replaced from tears and/or soil.
- * Remember to maintain social distancing of at least 6 feet including during lunch and breaks
- * Wash hands frequently with soap and water.
- * Notify your supervisor immediately if you become sick while on the job
- * Do not go into work if you are sick, follow your workplace policies



MOUNT MORRIS - Loaves & Fish Food Pantry alongside Northern Illinois Food Bank is hosting a Mobile Food Pantry on May 20.

The truck will be located at Mt. Morris Church of the Brethren (lower level), 409 West Brayton Road, Mt. Morris from 10-11:30 a.m.

This mobile pantry is open anyone in Ogle County. Every 1 in 7 people across Northern Illinois is food insecure, meaning that they aren't sure of where their next meal may come from. Northern Illinois Food Bank partners with over 800 feeding program partners across 13 counties to serve our neighbors needing food. However, even with the outstanding efforts of the Food Bank, there are individuals who can't make it out to those partners that provide nutritious food.

This is an "extra" food distribution. Loaves & Fish Pantry clients are still eligible to receive their normal monthly food allotment. The pantry is open on the 1st and 3rd Thursdays from 4:30-7 p.m. and 2nd and 4th Mondays from 2-4:30 p.m. Anyone in the Mt. Morris/Leaf River area experiencing food insecurity is eligible to receive food. You do not need to have a referral, and no proof of income is required.

People warned of phone scams during COVID-19 pandemic

ROCHELLE - With all the stress, fear and uncertainty spreading in the world today, many phone scammers are attempting to take advantage of unsuspecting individuals during these troubling times.

Since the COVID-19 pandemic started and the stay-at-home order went into effect, both residents and authorities have seen an increase in reports of scam phone calls. Nonprofit organization the Better Business Bureau, Rockford office, uses a scam tracker technology to locate these phone calls.

The technology used is linked to a national network of 100 different offices in the United States, Canada and Mexico, which track and identify the different types of calls. The technology is so accurate it can track calls down to the zip code in a certain state. The BBB has seen a drastic increase in scam calls

since the beginning of the pandemic.

"Since the advent of the pandemic, we have seen a ten-fold increase in the number of types of scams that are out there," said Dennis Horton, BBB director of the Rockford regional office. "The most prevalent types deal with the stimulus checks people are waiting to receive as well as filling out the 2020 Census. When you look at the pandemic, the census and stimulus check all happening at once, it almost creates the perfect storm for scammers.'

The information gathered is sent to local and state law enforcement agencies including the Illinois Attorney General's Office, The Federal Trade Commission and local police departments. Recent phone scams in Rochelle have reported somebody pretending to be calling from Consumer Collections at the U.S. Diagnostics Lab.

One Rochelle resident received this phone call earlier in the week. A lady

that sounded very official told the resident she had a bill for blood work, dating back to April of 2018. The lady on the phone told the resident she owed \$385.54 and a \$75 late fee could be waived if they came to an agreement on the phone.

The resident was smart and told the scammer that she would not pay anything until she researched it further. The scammer on the phone agreed and left 618-881-1117, as a number to reach her back at. The resident then looked deeper into the call and the suspicious bill and found out the entire thing was a scam.

"I called my insurance company and they called U.S. Diagnostics Lab, which is an official organization," said Barb Manning, Rochelle resident. "The lab said they had nothing on record for me at all and my insurance had absolutely no claim filed; we know it was a scam."

Since receiving the phone call, Manning has contacted the Rochelle Po-

lice Department, and after multiple attempts to call back the number, it has not answered. Scamphone calls are something that occurs all the time, especially when there are big headlines in the news scammers can use to bait their victims.

While these calls can be a real threat to anybody with a phone number, people can stay safe by being cautious and doing some research. The No. 1 way to stay safe is to never give out any personal or banking information over the phone, even if the person uses a real person or organizations name.

"Don't volunteer any personal information such as bank card information or social security number," said Eric Higby, Rochelle police chief. "Even if somebody calls and says they are from a local doctor's office, make sure to check into that. Anybody can look up a doctor's office online and say they are calling from that office."

tough, the festival committee reminds everybody things will get better and thanks the entire community for its continued support through the years.

"Our community and our city are a wonderful place and I appreciate every individual in this town," said Chrisco. "They have always looked forward the festival and come out to support it each year. Everything will get better and we pray for the best for everybody."



I think getting ready for work even when you are working from home is important. It helps me stay engaged and do my best job. Also, I can head out if needed at a moment's notice.



Beware of ticket scams to shows and sporting events

Dear Editor,

Buyer Beware! I am a senior, residing in Ogle County for over 30 years. With the exception of seeing a local band or two live at local establishments, I have not attended a "formal" concert at a large venue in 25+ years. The crowds, travel and costs of the shows have blown up since my last trip to Alpine Valley to see the Other Ones and their Further Tour.

In that light, I purchased, online, two tickets to see The Dead and Company Summer Tour 2020 at Wrigley Field on July 24. Due to the covid 19 situation the show have been cancelled – understandably.

I received notification from TICKETS.com that I would not be receiving a refund, but was going to get a credit from them for a future show.

That is not acceptable to me for several reasons; if it has been 25 years since my last concert, there is no guarantee that I am going to find something to my liking in the next 25-years. If I do, why pay their exorbitant prices when I may be able to buy from the direct venue or band? They are blaming their inability to refund on the fact that their "sellers have not all received"

their payments"! Not sure I understand this statement that I received during on a live-chat with German from Tickets.com. My credit card got billed immediately, so why do I have to wait on their sellers getting paid? Who should be paying their sellers, anyway?

When I went on-line to buy the tickets, their site came up first. I avoid on-line shopping as much as possible, so I logically went directly to them. Found my tickets and purchased them, at which I found out when I printed them at nearly 3X the face value of the event. Oh, by-the-way, does not

include the extra \$22.00 handling fee they tacked on-so instead of \$39.96 (face value) I paid \$130.

I printed the tickets only to find someone else's name on them, so I called the 800 number, which got me to The Chicago Cubs, who was the host of the event. They were the ones to inform me that I was buying from a reseller, which I had no access to their contact information. Sending an email back to them only got me an undeliverable message in return. The Cubs Office provided me with an 800 number directly for them, told me that they were not affiliated with the Cubs in any

way and there were still tickets available for the show for \$39.50/ea. That is shame on me, but the issue is TICKETS.com took my money immediately and have sat on it for several months and refuse to give me a refund when the show was cancelled for reasons beyond all of our control.

So, beware of reseller and particularly avoid TICKETS.com.

I am not a Cub Fan, but their customer service in all of this is the only redeeming factor I have found in this mess.





Some tips on how to control mosquitoes on your property

URBANA - Mosquitoes are already out in force this season. How can we protect ourselves and our families and still enjoy the outdoors?

"Humans are mosquito magnets," says University of Illinois Extension educator Chris Enroth. "Not only are forgotten plastic kiddie pools in the backyard good for mosquito breeding, we also attract mosquitoes simply by being living, breathing mammals."

Personal protection

What makes one person more attractive to mosquitoes than others? Enroth says mosquitoes can't resist the following:

- * Carbon dioxide: "Yes, every time you exhale, you draw those pesky little bloodsuckers closer," Enroth says.
- * Lactic acid: Humans produce lactic acid on our skin. Some produce more than
 - * High skin temperature
 - * Colognes and perfumes
 - * Dark-colored clothing
- * Warm days with low winds. "Mosquitoes are pretty lousy fliers, so cool days with high winds (over 10 mph) reduce their activity. Placing a fan facing an outdoor seating area will keep them at bay," Enroth says.
- * Studies have also indicated that some people are just more desirable than others. Due to the complexity of factors that can play into this, researchers are unsure why exactly this is.

The Illinois Department of Public Health recommends DEET as the most effective chemical to use to combat mosquitoes. Look for sprays with DEET at 40% or higher for an effective, long-lasting repellants Be sure to re-apply every 4-6 hours. DEET confuses the mosquito and blocks the females' ability to detect carbon dioxide, heat, moisture, and human sweat.

Avoidance is only part of the strategy. Controlling mosquito populations though habitat reduction and backyard treatments is another strategy to minimize bites.

Breeding sites

"Only female mosquitoes bite," Enroth says. This is because they need a blood meal (protein) for reproduction. Once she has fed, the female will search out a favorable site to lay her eggs. Anything that holds stagnant water is her target. Preventing her offspring from developing into adult mosquitoes is the most effective control. Enroth suggests the following strategies to eliminate breeding sites:

- * Remove any object on your property that may hold water. For example, tin cans, toys, flower pot saucers, stagnant pools, and the notorious old tire in the backyard.
 - * Change water in birdbaths weekly
- * Stock garden ponds with top-feeding minnows
- * Make sure covers are tight and free of holes over grills, cisterns, rain barrels, or anywhere water is stored
- * Clean your gutters. This is often the unseen area for mosquito development. Enroth recommends cleaning out gutters in the fall and spring.
- * If you can't remove the standing water, Enroth recommends treating it with Bti (Bacillus thuringiensis israelensis). Bti only targets the larva of mosquitoes and a few species of fly.

Controlling adult mosquitoes

Avoid using bug zappers to control flying adults," Enroth says. "About 90% of insects killed with bug zappers are not mosquitoes. In fact several are beneficial insects like the brown lacewing.

Mosquito foggers work for only a short period of time and are well-suited to being used prior to an outdoor event.

Community-wide control programs work best. "Everyone has a role to play in minimizing mosquito population," Enroth

To prevent getting bitten by female mosquitoes and to minimize the spread of West Nile Virus, Illinoisians should follow the recommendations above for reducing habitat and personal protection.

The key to having a perfect heart

Your heart is the most important part of you. It's not only a physical organ that keeps your blood pumping, but when the Bible refers to the heart, it's talking about who you really are. Each person has an inner and an outer life. There's the person we show to everybody around us and the part of us that only God can see, the part He really cares about.

The Bible tells us to have a perfect heart. Matthew 5:48 (NIV) says, "Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect." If you're a perfectionist, this is a scary verse, because it's a struggle to always try to be perfect. But this is not what it means to be perfect, according to Scripture.

The Amplified Bible translation of Matthew 5:48 says, "...Be perfect [growing into spiritual maturity both in mind and character, actively integrating godly values into your daily life], as your heavenly Father is perfect." A person with a perfect heart is someone who loves God and always wants to grow.

What God Is Really Looking For

2 Chronicles 16:9 (NIV) says, "For the eyes of the Lord range throughout the earth to strengthen those whose hearts are fully committed to him." This verse doesn't say that God can just work through those who are perfect but through those who are "fully committed to him."

Just as we don't have to make ourselves perfect before we come to Christ (which we couldn't do anyway), we don't need to behave perfectly in every area of our life before God will work in us and through us. When I first started teaching a home Bible study years ago, I wore short shorts and smoked while I taught the Word, sitting on my living room floor.

I had a lot of growing to do, but I really loved God and wanted to please Him. He met me right where I was and worked with me to get me where I needed to be. There's always room to grow in my walk with Christ, and I'm so thankful that God keeps working in me and through me on every level of my journey, every day of my life.

How Committed Are You?

A person with a perfect heart is someone who loves God with all their heart, soul, mind and strength, and who is fully committed to Him. The question is: What areas of your life have you been holding back from God? Have you been giving Him your time, praying and studying the Word? Do you give of yourself to others, helping to meet their needs as you're able? Are you managing your finances the way God wants you to, living within your means, saving, spending and giving as He puts it on your heart to do so?

It's important to remember that whatever God asks us to do, it's always for our good. Initially, it may feel sacrificial, giving up things we like or want. But as we obey God, we find later on that there was so much more we didn't even know about, and what God wanted was much better for us in the long run.

More than anything else, the Bible says God wants us to love Him (Luke 10:27), and love sacrifices and obeys. The more we love Jesus, the easier it is to obey and trust Him. Because when you really love someone, you want to please them and make them happy. What makes God happy is helping you do anything that will give you a better life.

Have a Meeting with Yourself

In Mark 7:15, Jesus says, "Nothing outside a person can defile them by going into them. Rather, it is what comes out of a person that defiles them. This verse makes it clear that it's what comes out of a person's heart that really matters.

We all need to have a meeting with ourselves once in a while to examine what's really in our hearts. It's easy to smile and act like we're good on the outside, while on the inside it's a different story. I remember times when I was in church, singing "I Surrender All" with my hands in the air, and thinking, "If Dave thinks I'm cooking something for him today, he's got another thing coming." It's possible to appear to be doing one thing while your heart is somewhere else.

My goal with this message is to help you make a committed decision to love God with all of your heart, and to fall in love with Him more and more every day. As you do, you'll discover how it's the key to having a heart that's more like His...a perfect heart.

five state championship competitions.



The course features large greens, an abundance of sand bunkers, multiple water hazards, and a lighted practice area. Elliot was considered to be Rockford's premier golf course prior to the opening of Aldeen Golf Club, and hosted the first three years of the Rockford Pro Am.

Ingersoll

Ingersoll Golf Course was designed by Thomas Bendelow, and named in honor of Lt. Clayton C. Ingersoll, an Army Air Corps pilot who died in a training exercise over France. Lt. Ingersoll's family donated money to purchase the land, and later to build the striking brick clubhouse.

Ingersoll is known for its narrow, tree-lined fairways, and gently undulating terrain. In 2001, Ingersoll Golf Course hosted the Tiger Woods Foundation golf clinic, proceeds of which funded the Ingersoll Learning Links 4-hole course where children and beginners can learn the game of golf.

Sandy Hollow





Illinois DCEO **COVID-19 Golf Guidelines**

ith the precautions and operational restrictions outlined below, golf shall be permitted as a recreational activity, effective 6 a.m. on May 1, 2020. In addition to the general social distancing standards set forth in the stay-at-home order, golf courses and golfers need to abide by the following controls.

Management

Require online or telephone bookings. Players shall be grouped in twosomes. There shall be 15 minutes between tee times: Average tee-times are roughly 12 minutes apart. Spreading out bookings would ensure people do not congregate at tee

Spacingouttheteetimes would also limit the number of people at the golf course. Signage describing operational changes including: no congregating, increased frequency of cleaning, no handshakes, and maintain social distancing between players No practice ranges, chipping greens, or putting greens to limit large gatherings of individuals.

No golf carts may be used on course (either owned by golf club or privately owned), except individuals with a physical disability or physical limitations that prevent them from walking the course may rent a cart from the golf club. Only privately-owned pull carts may be utilized, rental of pull carts from the course will not be allowed.

Elevate the "bottom" of the cup: This can be done by placing the cup upside down so that the new bottom is roughly an inch below the lip of the hole. Golfers could retrieve their ball without having to put their hand in the bottom of the regular cup. Alter-

natively, place Styrofoam in the bottom of the cup.

Flagscannotberemoved from the cup. Clubhouses, halfway houses, and pro shops shall remain closed. Beverage and snack carts are prohibited. Courses shall operate at a minimum basic operations level of staff to limit customer and staff contact; i.e. "starter", "course manager", "maintenance crew", "kitchen staff to prepare to-go only food service."

Remove drinking water jugs and prohibit use of water fountains that are permanently affixed with signage. Elimination of on-course and practice facility touchpoints (i.e. bag drop, benches, ball washes, bunker/sand trap rakes, rental equipment, and water coolers).


Hand sanitizer and soap in all restrooms, including those on the course. Restrooms shall be sanitized regularly. No indoor events or outside tournaments. Restaurants can remain open for takeout only; all tables and chairs removed or flipped upside down to prohibit use. Indoor facilities may be open for minimal operations for use by golf course workers to facilitate the outdoor recreation footprint and activity.

Players

Any players with any symptoms of COVID-19, should not play. In addition, any players from a household with someone with symptoms of COVID-19 should not play.

Golfers must walk and carry their own clubs. No caddies allowed. Bring your own supply of balls, tees, ball markers, and any other equipment needed to play golf.

Insist on social distancing on tees, greens, and throughout the round. Players shall maintain adequate physical distancing




Golfers should pick up their own balls, handle their own scorecards and bring their own water/ sports drinks, towels, and snacks. Do not use the public drinking fountain or ball cleaner.

Leave the flag in place

while putting. Sort out the sand in the bunker with a club. Put on your golf shoes at your vehicle.

Bring hand sanitizer with you and use during your round and at the end. No handshakes at the beginning of the round or after the 18th hole of the round.
