SSI recipients to receive Economic Impact Payments

Automatic payments set for early May

WASHINGTON, D.C. – The Social Security Administration announced that Supplemental Security Income (SSI) recipients will receive automatic Economic Impact Payments directly from the Treasury Department. Treasury anticipates these automatic payments no later than early May.

SSI recipients with no qualifying children do not need to take any action in order to receive their \$1,200 economic impact payment. The payments will be automatic.

SSI recipients who have qualifying children under age 17, however, should not wait for their automatic \$1,200 individual payment. They should now go to the IRS's webpage at www.irs.gov/coronavirus/non-filers-enter-payment-info-here and visit the Non-Filers: Enter Your Payment Info section to provide their information. By taking proactive steps to enter information on the IRS website about them and their qualifying children, they will also receive the \$500 per dependent child payment in addition to their \$1,200 individual payment. If SSI beneficiaries in this group do not provide their information to the IRS soon, they will have to wait until later to receive their \$500 per qualifying child.



"This is great news for SSI recipients, and I want to remind recipients with qualifying children to go to IRS.gov soon so that you will receive the full amount of the Economic Impact Payments you and your family are eligible for," said Andrew Saul, Commissioner of Social Security. "I also want to thank the dedicated employees of the Treasury Department, the Social Security Administration, and the Internal Revenue Service for making this happen and working non-stop on this issue."

Social Security retirement, survivors, and disability insurance beneficiaries (who don't normally file taxes) will also qualify for automatic payments of \$1,200 from Treasury. These payments are anticipated to start arriving around the end of April.

The Treasury Department, not the Social Security Administration, will make these automatic payments

Illinois unemployment claims continue to skyrocket

SPRINGFIELD — In the week ending April 11, another 141,049 Illinoisans filed initial unemployment claims, bringing the total number during the latest four weeks of the novel coronavirus pandemic to more than 634,000 in the state.

About 60,000 fewer initial claims were made last week than were made the week prior, bringing the

four-week moving average to 158,656.

Since March 1, the state processed 12 times the number of claims it did in the same span last year and five times more than it did during the first six weeks of the Great Recession of 2008-2009.

Nationally, 5.25 million people made initial unemployment claims last week. That was a decrease of about 1.37 million from the week prior, but it upped the

four-week moving average to about 5.5 million claims.

"The advance seasonally adjusted insured unemployment rate was 8.2 percent for the week ending April 4, an increase of 3.1 percentage points from the previous week's unrevised rate," according to the U.S. Department of Labor. "This marks the highest level of the seasonally adjusted insured unemployment rate in the history of the seasonally adjusted series."

The previous high was 7 percent in May 1975.

The numbers were released one day after Gov. JB Pritzker's administration predicted the state will see a \$2.7-billion revenue shortfall this fiscal year, which ends June 30, compared to previous estimates, and a more-than \$6-billion budget shortfall next fiscal year, which begins July 1.

Maintaining mental health

Concerns, resources, ways to cope during difficult times

SPRINGFIELD – State lawmakers put mental health on center stage last week during a virtual town hall in which medical professionals offered advice to Illinoisans struggling with the mental and emotional pressures of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Hosted by Chicago Democrats Rep. Ann Williams, Rep. Yoni Pizer and Sen. Sara Feigenholtz, the town hall laid out the mental health challenges related to COVID-19's social and economic disruptions and offered therapies and solutions to people affected.

"I don't think any of us is immune to the challenges we're facing. Many of us feel anxious, fearful, sad, and we're experiencing a range of emotions, a lot of ups and downs," Williams said.

The three lawmakers presented questions to three Chicago-area medical professionals on the videoconference. The experts included the president of the Illinois Psychiatric Society, Dr. Hossam Mahmoud, psychologist Dr. Carri Hill and licensed clinic social worker Alexa James.

James, who is executive director of the Chicago affiliate of the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI), said people are dealing with four main mental health chal-

lenges during COVID-19 – having fulfilling connections with other people; the ability to adapt to change; the ability to handle trauma; and maintaining productive activity.

"In an instant, much of that was diminished for us. Much of it was complicated or disrupted," she said, as people's work lives, personal lives and daily routines were changed by social distancing and Gov. JB Pritzker's stay-at-home order.

An American Psychiatric Association survey last month found 36 percent of Americans said the coronavirus pandemic is having a serious impact on their mental health, while 59 percent said it is seriously impacting their daily lives.

James said unsettled routines have especially disrupted people's sense of purpose, which is why people stuck at home should not suddenly expect themselves to be more productive.

"Be compassionate with yourself. Be kind to yourself," she said. "Our expectations, we get married to them, and then when we don't do them we get really disappointed. And I don't think we have any room for that right now."

LaMoille student discovers passion for education at Monmouth College

MONMOUTH - For college senior Josh Gross of LaMoille, Monmouth College helped him find his calling.

teacher in the Illinois cities of Bloomington and Normal.

Gross said he found his vocation at Monmouth after arriving as a freshman with a few ideas.

"I knew I wanted to do something that helped people," explained Gross, whose

sister, Chelsea Gross, is a 2013 Monmouth graduate. "Some of the things I was thinking about were physical therapy, athletic training and even becoming a police officer. I finally decided that what I wanted to do was to make an impact on kids' lives, so that morphed into me taking a lot of classes in educational studies, and I'm very happy with my decision."

In addition to the course work in his major, Gross was strongly influenced by his work in the field.

"My student-teacher experience was really cool," he said. "It was (at Galesburg's Steele Elementary School) with Katy (Vaccarello) Flatt, who's a (2009) Monmouth grad. Working with her in that diverse setting really helped make me the teacher I am today."

Educational studies professor Michelle Holschuh Simmons had Gross in four classes during his junior and senior years.

"Josh had already earned a reputation in our department for being an excellent addition to any class," she said. "My impressions were confirmed with every interaction I have had with Josh for the last two years. In person and

in writing, Josh consistently communicates professionally and comports himself with confidence."

Lessons from track

Like Vaccarello before him, Gross competed on the Fighting Scots' track team. Having away meets almost every weekend of the spring semester required good time-management skills, and Gross was up to the challenge.

"Josh impresses everyone he encounters with his organization, his work ethic and his dedication to tasks," said Simmons. "His academic work is always meticulously completed and on time, and he has had perfect attendance in all of the classes he has had with me. As a track athlete, he has a full schedule with practices and meets, but he has been able to manage the many pulls on his time exceedingly well."

Gross said his time on the track team helped him in a number of ways.

"Coach (Roger) Haynes was phenomenal," he said. "The entire track team was a big family, and it helped me make a lot of friends.

It's really made me the man I am today."

A different kind of spring

Of course, like the rest of Monmouth's spring sports athletes, Gross no longer competes because of the COVID-19 pandemic. That's just one of several things that the sprinter is missing during these last few weeks of his Monmouth experience, including the traditional commencement ceremony.

"It's kind of sad that we won't be walking across the stage (in May) in our cap and gown," he said. "It just doesn't feel real quite yet that we won't be doing that."

Another thing Gross misses is the opportunity to simply chill in his dorm and talk to his roommate.

"We would just talk and share ideas about anything," he said. "Conversations like that have been a really great part of my Monmouth experience - to share ideas and not be judged and to be respectful of others' opinions."

That happened in the classroom, as well. "I really learned to think about things in a different way," Gross said. "I think that's what I'm going to miss most about my time at Monmouth - the connections I made with professors. Monmouth really felt like home."

OSF HealthCare deploys pandemic health workers to care for COVID-19, other patients at home

MENDOTA - While all but essential workers are being asked to stay at home to contain the spread of novel coronavirus (COVID-19) OSF HealthCare is expanding its digital response strategy to offer care to patients without the need to leave home.

Pandemic Health Workers (PHWs) will digitally connect with referred clients who are experiencing COVID-19 symptoms and need to stay home or in quarantine to protect themselves and others. Through this program, OSF HealthCare and the State of Illinois will proactively and digitally support those needing care, while also reducing the potential influx of patients into a hospital's emergency department when they don't need emergency care.

OSF HealthCare Saint Gabriel Digital Health has

initiated the PHW and its Acute COVID@Home program in Mendota, Ottawa, and Streator.

"The PHW program will allow us to fulfill our mission of serving with the greatest care and love, utilizing digital technology and trained compassionate and trusted community members to extend expert treatment and support to individuals where they are most comfortable, in their own homes," said Dawn Trompeter, president of OSF HealthCare Saint Paul Medical Center. "PHWs will monitor individuals daily and they will also assess other social supports that might be needed such as food, financial support, counseling and access to behavioral health tools such as OSF SilverCloud."

PHWs can assist those who are not tech savvy to help them download pro-

grams and understand how to work iPads that will be provided if there is no similar technology already in the household. Individuals will be followed for 14 days. PHWs can be assigned up to 27 clients per month.

If symptoms worsen, the PHW will refer their care recipients to the Acute COVID@Home program where supervision could increase to eventually include advanced practice provider and physician level care. Those individuals will be treated and observed using telehealth technology three times a day until they are better. If their condition continues to decline, they will be referred to the hospital.

These new solutions will help OSF care for individuals where they are, prevent the overcrowding of their sites

End of year events still pending at Mendota H.S.

◆ **Last day of high school classes is May 13**

MENDOTA - The Mendota High School Board of Education held their April 20 regular meeting via Zoom. With all Illinois schools closed by Governor Pritzker for the remainder of the school year due to the COVID-19 pandemic, many unprecedented decisions have been made by school boards and many are yet to be determined.

Remote Learning will continue for the rest of the school year. The last day of school for MHS will be May 13, which is earlier than originally scheduled because school was held through most of spring break.

Superintendent Jeff Prusator said there is still a long list of decisions to make, which they are working on, but the biggest is graduation. "We will not cancel graduation but we are waiting until the end of the month to see what the governor says about having gatherings," he told the board. "Graduation is likely to be postponed but we are going to do what we can to have it."

As dates are changed and decisions are made, e-mail correspondence will be sent to MHS families and students providing details. Decisions are expected to start being finalized next week and continue as plans are established.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Personnel

The board approved the hiring recommendation of several new teachers. Principal Denise Aughenbaugh said during the school closure, virtual interviews were conducted using Zoom.

Science - Nicole Cromwell of LaMoille was hired as a science teacher. Cromwell has 13 years teaching experience. She has taught all levels of chemistry and also has work experience at companies such as Abbott Laboratories. The annual S.T.E.A.M. event at IVCC was co-created by Cromwell while she was teaching at LaMoille.

Band - Paula Tuttle-Baker was selected for the position of band director. As a former volunteer for the MHS band program, she is well known at MHS and came highly recommended. Tuttle-Baker is currently employed at LaSalle-Peru High School. She and Jon Steben will work collaboratively as co-teachers and co-directors in the fine arts department.

Instructional Coach - Brock Zinke was approved as instructional coach. He will teach 60 percent social science/driver's education and serve 40 percent as instructional coach.

Athletic Budget

A recommendation from the Athletic Committee for fall athletic bids was presented by Aughenbaugh. The \$10,506 bid, which includes 21 new

football helmets, was approved by the board.

8th Grade Orientation

Aughenbaugh said the 8th grade transition day for incoming freshmen, Class of 2024, will be a virtual tour. Mr. Hanson, freshman dean, will design the virtual tour and everyone will be notified when it is ready.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The board approved a refund of spring participation fees including spring athletics, musical and show choir. The board also adopted an updated Board Policy Manual, which will now be available online and automatically updated by the state.

Approval was given to an agreement with Mendota District 289 and Holy Cross School for Algebra I in the fall. The class is held first hour and Aughenbaugh said it has worked well. "We appreciate the cooperation from District 289 and Holy Cross," Prusator added. "We have about 22 students participate and we have received positive feedback from parents."

In closing, Prusator expressed his appreciation for the support the school has received throughout the shut down. "I want to thank the parents and community for being so supportive during this time," he said. "I know it is stressful and frustrating for everyone but the teachers have been working hard to find creative ways to continue teaching students and we really appreciate everyone's support."

Master Gardener Q&A – Seed Starting

It's spring and University of Illinois Extension Master Gardeners are here to help answer your gardening questions. Gardening is a great way to be outside, stay healthy and enjoy the results of your work.

When is a good time to start seeds? Now! Early spring is the time to start hardy seeds outside, and more tender plants indoors.

Where can I get seeds? You can purchase seeds from greenhouses, garden centers, hardware stores, some grocery stores, online, and even at some food banks. Your neighbor might even have some they would share.

Can I use leftover seeds? If the seeds are only 1 year old, they are still likely viable. If they are older than that, germination rates will likely be lower.

What kinds of seeds can I start now? If you are sowing outdoor seeds, choose spinach, peas, lettuce, kale turnips or onions. If you are starting seeds indoors, choose tomatoes, peppers, petunias, marigolds, zinnias or coleus.

What do I need? For outdoor sowing, choose a place with well-drained soil, full sun and good drainage. For indoor seeds, you can use any containers such as cardboard egg cartons with the bottoms punched out, plastic clamshells with holes in the bottom or solo cups with the bottoms cut out. Put these on a tray and in a sunny warm place in the house. If a sunny place isn't available, you can use a shop light. For indoor and outdoor seeds, follow seed

pack directions on depth, spacing and watering.

What kind of soil do I use for indoor seeds? It's best to use a medium that is a soilless mixture, which is a seed starting mixture. Sometimes they come as cubes or seed starting pods.

Do I need a heat mat? The best temperature for starting seeds is 70-80 degrees Fahrenheit. Heating mats are very helpful and effective.

How much should I water? Consistent watering is very important for young seedlings, however too much watering is not good either. Water so that the soil medium stays consistently moist and does not dry out.

How much light do seeds need? New seedlings need 12-16 hours of light per day. An automatic timer is useful if you are using a grow light. Grow lights should be 6-12 inches above the leaves, so as the seedlings grow, the light will need to be adjusted to maintain that distance.

How do I get my seedlings ready for transplant? You should "harden" your seedlings by putting them outside for a few hours each day and bringing them in at night. Extend the outside time gradually until all danger of frost is past (usually around May 15 in Bureau, LaSalle, Marshall and Putnam counties).

When can I transplant my seedlings outdoors? Most seed packages list the growing time needed before transplant. Even if you can't provide all the time required, you can still transplant them as smaller plants.

CHICAGO - Harry D. Conkey II, beloved husband, father, grandfather, brother, friend and longtime Mendotan, died March 26, 2020 at his home in Chicago, following a remarkable life of almost 85 years. His family provided the following.

Harry was born May 25, 1935 in Mendota. He attended Blackstone School until 1943, when his father Robert purchased the Matthiessen home and property in Deer Park. There, he attended a one room country school and developed a lifelong love for the outdoors. He learned to hunt, fish and trap along the Vermillion River. And, he could shoot! He routinely hit 20 of 25 clay pigeons, even well into his 70s and with his grandfather's dependable old Browning 12 gauge.

His high school years that followed were at Lawrenceville Academy in New Jersey and Westminster School in Connecticut, where he graduated in 1954. He then attended Cornell University, but only for his freshman year. Harry often said all the activities that accompany living in a fraternity contributed to his "failing out." His father, unamused, recommended the military, and in November 1955 Harry enlisted in the Navy for two years and was assigned to Great Lakes Naval Academy.

In 1956 he started dating the love of his life, Lynn Sitterly, the daughter of family friends. He was smitten and pursued her the following year while she was studying abroad in Paris. When she returned by ship, Harry met her at the dock in New York and proposed immediately. They were married in the spring of 1957. Their marriage lasted 63 happy, adventurous years.

Following their wedding they moved to Lake Forest, where Harry graduated from Lake Forest College in 1959 with degrees in both religion and business. He considered attending seminary, but his father insisted he join the family business, H D Conkey & Co. founded by his grandfather, Harry in 1907. So, he and Lynn moved back to Mendota in 1960 where Harry began his business career.

For the next 20 years he and his father, Robert and their wonderful employees and colleagues built a great American manufacturing company. The Conco Inc. subsidiary of H D Conkey & Co. employed almost 900 persons at its peak. The diversified product lines included material handling (cranes), sewer cleaning equipment, barometric draft controls, and powder containers for military ordinance. During many of those years the Conco factory lit up the nighttime sky with production happening around the clock. Harry also spent three summers during this period at Harvard Business School, obtaining a degree in management. His time at Harvard nurtured his curiosity for technology and automation, and Conco became an early adapter, investing in the first versions of IBM System 3 computers. The Conco subsidiary was sold in 1978.

During his Conco years Harry's love for Mendota and community was boundless. He was a board member for 19 years and past president of the Mendota Community Hospital, a pioneering volunteer (with Lynn) of the Mendota Community Ambulance Service, a volunteer with Mendota Civil Defense, and a charter member and past president of Mendota Rotary Club. He also served on the board of the National Bank of Mendota.

His interests were limitless. He was blessed with an inquisitive and astonishingly retentive mind. Harry seemed to wake up every day in wonder that something new and exciting was going to happen. He owned one of the first Apple Lisa computers. He built a darkroom in his home on Fifth Street. Photography was his first love, and during his years at Deer Park he was deputized by the LaSalle County Sheriff, whom he accompanied to various calamities to take pictures for local newspapers. He developed the Coons Grove Tree Farm in Dimmick Township, including taking 80 acres of pasture land along the Little Vermillion River and transforming it into a magical Christmas tree farm. And, he planted a pristine 10 acre Illinois prairie at his home outside Mendota, which he would burn each spring and then marvel at its ability to replenish magnificent prairie grass and wild flowers by summer. In these ways, Harry was a technologist, an artist, an arborist and a conservationist, in addition to having great business acumen. He was all of these, but such praise falls short of who he truly was. And Harry was so much more. He was steady, a man of incredible curiosity, intelligence, and generosity. And he had empathy. True empathy. The kind that resulted in action, not just recognition. He was about honor, fairness, truth and especially, kindness. Not only a tolerance for all kinds of people, but a genuine affection for all kinds of people. In the end, it's hard to imagine a world without Harry Conkey. He touched so many lives and thus came to the end of his life surrounded by so much love. He will be remembered with abundant smiles. And his legacy, like his resplendent prairie, will live on and on and on.

In addition to Lynn, Harry is survived by daughters, Christine (Jeff) Tyner and Genevieve (Robert) Thornton Fischer; son, Harry D. III (Brooke) Conkey; and grandchildren, Frances, Alex and Wilson Tyner, Harry IV, Donald and Peter Conkey and Lily, William and Annie Thornton.

“You don’t have to be an epidemiologist to see that the virus is going to hit our budget hard,” Pritzker said.

Also of note, Illinois does not yet have a system in place for independent contractors or those who are self-employed to file for unemployment claims despite a new federal law, which allows for such claims.

Pritzker said the state is contracting with the private firm Deloitte to get such services up and running, but the program is not anticipated to be “fully implemented” until the week of May 11.

State systems nationally have been unable to handle the unprecedented number of claims, and Pritzker admitted the Illinois Department of Employment Security’s filing systems “simply haven’t kept pace” with the increase.

House Republicans criticized the governor’s handling of unemployment claims and said his administration did not act quickly enough to strengthen the system in anticipation of the increase that would result from his stay-at-home order.

The administration, however, said it overhauled the IDES website infrastructure, expanded web and call center capacity, worked with third-party vendors to enhance filing capabilities, and hired back recently retired employees.

Pritzker also said the IDES call center operates with a staff of 173 employees and that it recently updated its phone system to handle more calls. He also said the agency is establishing an outside call center with an additional 200 agents to field calls.

While Congress passed a \$2 trillion stimulus plan last month to provide relief to businesses through the U.S. Small Business Administration, the more than \$350 billion dedicated to that purpose had already run dry by last week.

That means a halt to the paycheck protection program, which is designed to avert layoffs during the pandemic by granting loans, which can be forgiven if businesses maintain their payrolls.

to beneficiaries. Recipients will generally receive the automatic payments by direct deposit, Direct Express debit card, or by paper check, just as they would normally receive their SSI or Social Security benefits.

For those SSI and Social Security retirement, survivors, and disability insurance beneficiaries, with dependent children, who use Direct Express debit cards, additional information will be available soon regarding the steps to take on the IRS website when claiming children under 17.

Please note that the agency will not consider Economic Impact Payments as income for SSI recipients, and the payments are excluded from resources for 12 months.

IVCC planning virtual commencement event

□ Ceremony set for May 16; graduates will be invited to 2021 commencement

OGLESBY—A virtual commencement ceremony is being planned for May 16, Illinois Valley Community College President Jerry Corcoran announced at the April 9 IVCC board meeting.

“Instead of the traditional ceremony, we will conduct a virtual event next month and invite this year’s graduates to join us at the May 2021 commencement,” Corcoran said.

The board meeting was held via Zoom technology with only board chair Jane Goetz, vice-chair Everett Solon, Corcoran, board secretary Judy Day and IT director Chris Dunlap in the board room. Other trustees participated remotely via computer or phone.

Corcoran praised IVCC staff for continuing to serve students while following Gov. JB Pritzker’s executive order to stay-at-home. Employees have “risen to the challenge” posed by the COVID-19 pandemic, he said.

“The move to online instruction for the last eight-weeks of the semester has gone incredibly well. Our faculty are deeply committed to teaching and our administrators and support staff are working hard to ensure no student is left behind.”

Corcoran said other major events being delivered in new and creative ways include:

- A virtual “Explore IVCC” replacing the traditional face-to-face event;
- Completely online College Parent 101 and nursing information sessions;
- A financial aid Q & A conducted on Zoom;
- Podcasts focusing on accessing services remotely and ways to alleviate stress;
- Recruiters connecting with applicants, students and parents via text, email and social media; and
- Development of a possible virtual job fair.

In other COVID-19-related business, trustees learned:

- The administration and American Federation of Teachers (AFT) Local 1810 last month signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) entitled “Sick and Personal Leave Related to COVID-19 Alternative Content/Services Delivery.”
- The college has developed temporary pandemic leave procedures for employees not affected by a collective bargaining agreement and members of the Service Employees International Union (SEIU) Local #138.
- In response to the disruption of classes, the college is exploring the possibility of offering more pass/fail options for students in the spring semester. Currently, no more than 20 percent of credit hours toward an IVCC degree or certificate can be earned via pass/fail courses.

In other action, trustees approved sabbatical leave for sociology instructor Jared Olesen for the 2020-21 academic year.

Goetz opened the meeting by recognizing student trustee Matthew Klein at his final meeting. The chair said Klein gave generously of his time, energy and talents and contributed to IVCC’s growth. Last month, the board nominated Klein for the ICCTA’s state student trustee award.

Trustees learned:

- Tony Galindo of Tonica, introduced to trustees via Zoom, is the newly elected student trustee for 2020-21. Galindo, a biology major, received 71 of 142 votes cast in a recent virtual election conducted by the Student Government Association. Galindo’s term begins May 14.
- Construction of the agriculture storage and routine maintenance facility is on schedule.
- Dean of Workforce Development Shane Lange successfully defended his dissertation and will earn the EdD from Illinois State University in May.
- Ashley Gonzales was hired as staff accountant in the business office and part-time Adult Education ABE/HSE instructor Abby Heider Schenck will resign effective May 6.
- Larry Vahle, a 47-year mathematics instructor, will retire at the close of the spring semester. He taught and tutored the past decade at Ottawa Center. “I have worked with many wonderful, dedicated professionals at Ottawa Center and on main campus. The core values of responsibility, caring, honesty, fairness, and respect are very evident at this institution,” Vahle said.

James suggested people try something positive every day in the name of self-care, whether it is “one creative thing,” “one connective thing,” “one productive thing” or “one self-care thing.”

James said she told her sister, who lives in “the middle-of-nowhere, Michigan,” to do simple things like wash her hair and put on mascara, because they “may just make you feel more human.”

Mahmoud said it is important to process what is happening by using what he calls “radical acceptance.”

“We’re going to go through tough times, but there is an end to this. And at some point, it will be over,” he said.

Impact on families

Hill, a psychologist with Jewish Family and Children’s Services in Chicago, pointed out that the major routines of school and family life have been upended, as many parents have to juggle working from home, running their households and helping their kids with remote learning.

She said that parents should lower the academic expectations they have for their children because we are in “survival mode” during this crisis.

“Our two primary goals right now are, one: to make sure everybody’s healthy; and two, to maintain positive relationships,” Hill said. “And then outside of those, a lot of our other expectations may need to be adjusted in order to achieve those goals.”

For kids having trouble coping, Hill suggested that parents impose some structure, like having dinner at a normal time, setting a regular bedtime and making kids finish their school work before talking with friends.

Most importantly, Hill said, parents should talk openly and honestly to their children about COVID-19.

“Trying to protect them by not sharing things with them actually just makes them more anxious,” she said.

Along with age-appropriate information about COVID-19 and its impacts, Hill said children need emotional support when they may be acting out or seem down

because of underlying stress and anxiety.

“What they need is additional support and love from everyone, so more hugs, more cuddles, that type of stuff,” she said.

Staying connected

Mahmoud, the psychiatrist, said that telehealth services have increased in the past four or five weeks as therapy sessions have moved online. He said psychologists, psychiatrists and social workers have quickly learned videoconferencing so they can stay connected with patients.

Gov. Pritzker issued an executive order in March that requires health insurance companies to cover telehealth services.

Mahmoud also suggested ways that people can stay connected as this period of social distancing is merely just physical distancing.

“Maintain interactions with your social network as much as possible,” he said, adding that video chatting and phone calls offer a more personal experience than just texting, especially when staying in touch with loved ones at nursing homes.

Feigenholtz said she experienced a hidden upside to videoconferencing this month when she held Passover Seder with her family over Zoom – calling it a “Zeder.”

“I was able to have my East Coast and Midwest family in a Seder, which would have never happened,” she said. And although she was reluctant at first, “it was such a positive experience.”

Feigenholtz also predicts that expanded telehealth access will continue past the pandemic, especially because of its benefits for rural and underserved communities.

“I don’t think you’re going to see the genie go back in

the bottle. I think that having telehealth access is going to be the new normal,” she said.

Mental health is one of a handful of issues that state lawmakers are focusing on in anticipation for a return to the Capitol, as both chambers have divided their members into “working groups.” The Illinois House of Representatives has a working group of seven members dedicated to “mental health and addiction.”

While no plans to return to Springfield have been announced, lawmakers are currently “on call” to return at any time. They were last in session on March 5. The 2020 session is scheduled to run through May 31.

Resources

The state launched a mental health hotline called “Call4Calm.” When someone texts “talk” to 552020, they will receive a free call from a counselor at a local community health center. Spanish speakers can text “hablar” to the same number.

People can also text “unemployment,” “food” or “shelter” for assistance with those things.

Hill suggested some online resources, like joining a Facebook group or reaching out to JCFS or Tuesday’s Child, a behavioral management nonprofit in Chicago. She also said that parents should consider professional help if their child’s emotions are impairing family dynamics.

James’s organization, NAMI, can help with a wide range of mental health challenges no matter a person’s age or insurance status, she said.

James added that if feelings worsen, people can call the National Suicide Hotline (1-800-273-8255), their local or personal health care provider or, in the most extreme cases, 9-1-1.

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Hard seasons of life

SPRINGFIELD – My daughters didn't wear new dresses for Easter this year.

And I didn't have to arrive at church early to compete with the Christmas-and-Easter-only crowd for a place to sit.

For Good Friday, I sat in my home office in front of my computer watching my church's service. I had a glass of grape juice and a saltine next to my keyboard to participate in a virtual communion with the rest of congregation.

But the internet in my rural area is so poor that the live service kept stopping and buffering for longer and longer periods. As I waited for the broadcast to continue I nodded off.

I woke up an hour after the service was over with the juice and cracker untouched. I felt ashamed. I'd failed at even this attempt at Holy Week normalcy in these abnormal times.

Jesus' disciples had a hard time staying awake too.

I think of my Jewish friends having seders away from relatives and friends. And for Christians it was a difficult week, too. In a week steeped in tradition, it's too easy to compare.

Most of us were confined to our homes avoiding a virus. I never thought I'd live to see a day when most church doors were locked on Easter Sunday.

Of course, the church isn't a building. It is imperfect people joined by belief and love.

On Easter Sunday, I once again found myself in front of my computer hoping this time I would get it right. There was a little bit of buffering but I rode it out and heard the sermon.

Pastor Steve said during the hardest seasons of life, God does great things.

I was left thinking of one of those hard seasons—when I stood alone in a cemetery almost seven years ago.

The preacher had spoken, the hearse had left the cemetery and my mother's coffin had been slowly lowered into the ground. My family milled around the gravestones, paying respects to loved ones long passed and I stood alone staring into the grave as workers shoveled dirt back into the hole. I thought: Is this it? You live and then you die?

Just days before I found myself sitting by my mother's bedside.

Her breathing was ragged.

I held her left hand with each labored gasp.

My dad, her husband of almost 59 years, gripped her right.

As she breathed slowly, shallowly, my dad cried out, "Save a place for me in heaven."

Tears fell down the face of my sister, who sat at the foot of the bed.

We watched 79 years of life and an 11-year battle with breast cancer come to an end.

Our mother was gone.

I felt helpless watching the cancer take her life. The chemotherapy left her bald. Sores developed on her feet. The cancer sapped her energy. Nausea haunted her for years.

It was not an easy life.

And now death...

As I stood at her grave I thought, "Is this it? Is this all we have to look forward to?" The woman who had brought me to life is gone. I felt alone.

And then words from a hymn rolled through my mind: "Up from the grave He arose,

With a mighty triumph o'er His foes
He arose a Victor from the dark domain,
And He lives forever with His saints to reign.
He arose! He arose!
Hallelujah! Christ arose!"

It was June, but I kept thinking of Easter.

I'm not a musical person, but the song ran through my mind as each shovelful of dirt landed in the grave. I believe I was being reminded that Jesus reigns supreme—even over death.

High school site chosen 75 years ago

(The following is from Jessica Nashold's *Backtracks & Sidetracks* column reprinted from April 17, 1991)

By the month of April 1916, a site for Mendota Township High School had been chosen. Now the first action to be taken was clearing away the old Mendota College building so new construction could begin. It was announced that the old building had been sold to George E. Moore & Co. for the sum of \$250.

The price of \$250 may seem small. However, it is said that one party offered \$50 and another agreed to tear it down and remove same if the owners would give him \$400.

Given these alternatives, the offer of \$250 was viewed as acceptable. It was hinted that the materials in the old college would be used to build "two or three houses."

The Mendota Association of Commerce met and discussed means of restricting "itinerant vendors of merchandise" wishing to sell goods in Mendota. Various canvassers attempting to raise funds for non-local projects were also to be strictly supervised.

Concern for an ongoing labor problem on railroads led to a request that the railroads and their employees settle their differences by arbitration rather than by striking.

The desirability of oiling paved streets rather than sprinkling them with water to control dust was discussed.

The G.A.R. asked the Association to take charge of the Memorial Day observance and a committee was appointed to make arrangements. R.N. Crawford was chairman.

The Sun Bulletin reported on the passing of "the last livery stable" as Eugene Meisenbach had a closing out sale on April 8. His stable was on the site at Illinois and Monroe now occupied by the First State Bank drive-up facility.

Commenting that Mendota had once supported three large, well-equipped stables, the Sun Bulletin continued—**Eugene Meisenbach is the last livery man to give up the game**

and on Saturday he disposed of his horses, carriages, harness, robes. In fact, everything was sold at some price.

There was not much demand for hacks.

The fine single vehicle used for conveying the minister at funerals sold for \$19. It had cost over \$200. The horses sold well.

The Meisenbach building was leased to Black & Miller to be used as a garage after May 1.

A correction of sorts appeared the following week.

Mendota is not entirely without a livery. William Larabee now conducts a light livery in the Boslough barn on East Sixth Street. He has 14 head of horses and is ready to supply the public with vehicles.

A Mendota man, John Ferguson, who had wintered in West Palm Beach, Fla., reported on a ride he had taken on a hydroaeroplane.

He has photographs on himself seated in the plane with the aviator, showing their ascent into the air and also descent into the water of Lake Worth.

Mr. Ferguson said he had been a half mile up in the air, traveling a mile a minute. The trip covered 20 miles and "return to point of starting." It was mentioned that Ferguson had also been one of Mendota's first automobile owners.

Mendota's water department took pride in its new Mueller Water Meter Tester. Mendota had 1,080 water meters and already 165 of them had been tested on the new equipment. Only one meter was found to be "measuring too much."

which should weigh 62 ½ pounds. Some meters failed to register because "foreign particles obstruct the wheels or else a disc is worn." This could be corrected.

At 4 p.m. on April 13, several IC refrigerator cars loaded with bananas jumped the track at Fifth Street.

The train must have been going at a rapid speed for two of the cars bumped along on the ties and mixed up with the rails and interlocking equipment until they reached the Sixth Street crossing.

One car also affected the CB&Q track. Both IC and CB&Q wrecking crews worked to clear the cars away.

Funeral director F.R. Bailey and car dealer Martin Fahler took the train to Chicago one morning and "drove out Mr. Bailey's new auto hearse."

The Sun Bulletin noted that Mendota "seemed to be the Mecca for numerous tramps" who camp east and south of town during the day and visit the city during the evening.

In a fight at the hobo camp near the coal chutes, one man was badly beaten.

Giving tramps money and food is only a means of prolonging their sojourn here.

Blaming China, WHO isn't scapegoating

President Donald Trump slammed the World Health Organization at a recent news briefing and was immediately accused of scapegoating.

There's no doubt that Trump is inclined to shift blame when possible (and even when it isn't). He'll never take ownership of the testing debacle at the outset of our coronavirus response or admit it was wrong initially to minimize the virus.

Yet none of this detracts from the force of his critiques of China (although he blows hot and cold on that) and the WHO, which are at the center of this international catastrophe and must be held to account.

Without China's deceit and WHO's solicitude for Beijing, the outbreak might have been more limited, and the world at the very least would have had more time to react. China committed unforgivable sins of commission, affirmatively lying about the outbreak and punishing doctors and disappearing journalists who told the truth, whereas the WHO committed sins of omission -- it lacked independence and courage at a moment of great consequence.

In effect, China and the WHO worked together to expose the rest of the world to the virus, at the same time they downplayed its dangers.

China acted as you'd expect. Countries that run gulags aren't typically noted for their good governance and transparency. The WHO is supposed to be different. According to its constitution, "The health of all peoples is fundamental to the attainment of peace and security and is dependent on the fullest co-operation of individuals and States."

But it's hard to see how the WHO would have acted any differently if its constitution contained a proviso stipulating that it should validate Chinese propaganda as much as possible, especially in the midst of a world-threatening outbreak

of a novel virus.

On Jan. 14, WHO tweeted that "preliminary investigations" by Chinese authorities had found no evidence of human-to-human transmission. Several days later, it reported "limited" human-to-human transmission, although it downplayed the finding as typical of respiratory illnesses.

Then, the WHO declined to call the outbreak in China a public health emergency of international concern on Jan. 22, at the same time there were confirmed cases in Taiwan, Australia, Japan, Thailand and South Korea. After the WHO finally declared the emergency, it proceeded to drag its feet on declaring a pandemic, waiting until March 12.

One of the worst things China did was seal off Hubei province from the rest of the country while flights continued around the world. Was the WHO concerned about that? No, it was fully on board. As a headline in Reuters put it in early February, "WHO chiefs says widespread travel bans not needed to beat China virus."

Incredibly enough, in late January, WHO Director-General Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus was praising Chinese officials for "the transparency they have demonstrated." Despite the emerging consensus that China has lied about its number of cases and deaths, WHO hasn't yet said a discouraging word about China's actions. It's been resolute, though, in excluding Taiwan from its workings, just as Beijing dictates.

Trump takes more than his share of potshots, but that doesn't mean he's always off the mark. China and the WHO are genuine malefactors who deserve all the obloquy the president, and anyone else, can heap on them.

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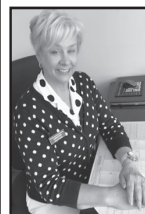

HOLLYWOOD -- With the studio system of The Golden Age of Hollywood gone, with it went the seven-year contracts, the studios controlling the lives of their actors, the fictitious biographies they created to sell them to the public and the cheesy dates they used to arrange for their young stars to spoon feed them to the public. During the heyday of the major studios, stars under contract worked every day of the week, sometimes on several films at a time.

When the studios gave up their contract rosters it was the end of an era. No more would major studio talent scouts scour the country looking for the next Garbo, Gable, Bogart or Bette Davis. No more would hopefuls

arrive on buses and trains to begin their pursuit of being signed to a major studio and being on the receiving end of a major Hollywood buildup.

When a studio signed a new talent to a seven-year contract, they were sent to the publicity department, which, with the assistance of a seasoned studio publicist, "reshaped" the biographical facts of the hopefuls' lives to make them appear more interesting to movie fans. The stars appeared on huge screens and were larger than life, so their life stories had to be larger than life too.

In the 1940s and '50s, before gossip magazines such as "Confidential" were created, the studios supplied the movie magazines with layouts of their contract players on "dates" and arranged for them to go to premieres and events together to be photographed as part of their star makeover.

When contract players got into trouble, they didn't call the police, they called their publicist at the studio. Once when Clark Gable was drunk

and involved in a hit and run accident, he called Howard Strickland, the head of MGM publicity, who made it all go away, and no one ever knew it happened.

In the 1954 film "A Star Is Born," Judy Garland, as Esther Blodgett, is signed by a major studio -- which could have been MGM but was actually Warner Brothers -- and is taken to the publicity department, where she has a new life history written by a publicist. Then when she goes to get her first weekly paycheck, she is told her name has been changed from Esther Blodgett to Vicki Lester.

When the studios became heavily involved in television and took hold of the TV industry by creating a slew of hit series, the big movie-theater screens were shrunk down to TV screens. Now the publicity of their stars under contract no longer had to be larger than life, and the biographies written for them were basically their real stories.

"Underwater" (PG-13) -- At the bottom of the Mariana Trench, a group of researchers must suit up and cross a stretch of ocean floor to get from their damaged satellite station to the mother ship or risk a permanent vacation in Davy Jones' locker. Research engineer Norah Price (Kristin Stewart, who shaved her head for the role) is chief among them, joined by Vincent Cassel as the captain and TJ Miller for comic relief. Director/writer William Eubank must have decided that ocean disaster and claustrophobic deep-sea thrills weren't enough, so for good measure, the crew is stalked by killer creatures as they venture out into the deep in what look very much like spacesuits.

"The Night Clerk" (R) -- Tye Sheridan plays a highly intelligent young man on the Autism spectrum whose voyeur habits put him on the edge of a murder investigation in this neo-noir attempt by director Michael Cristofer. Bart (Sheridan) is a hotel clerk with a peeping problem, as he plants cameras in rooms of the hotel and observes the human interactions within -- with an eye to improving his own communication skills. One of these interactions involves a murder. The balance of the

plot involves a passel of underused but talented actors: Helen Hunt, John Leguizamo, Ana de Armas. It's not a bad movie, just terribly slow ... too slow.

DOG OF THE WEEK

"Final Kill" (NR) -- I won't overburden you with too many plot points -- since it's not like the writer or director went to the trouble. A protection specialist takes one last job guarding a couple who stole a bunch of money from a crime syndicate and plan to spend it on an operation for a family member. Then it descends into terrible action sequence after terrible dialogue sequence with a couple of terrible flashbacks in there too. The film "stars" Ed Marrone -- and we're using our quotation marks for irony here -- along with Billy Zane, Dr. Drew Pinsky, Randy Couture and Danny Trejo for like 45 seconds. It feels very much like this group made a bet and everyone lost.

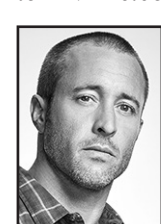
Q: Is it true that there will be another "Law & Order" series with Christopher Meloni? I hope so. I really miss his character. -- **M.R.**

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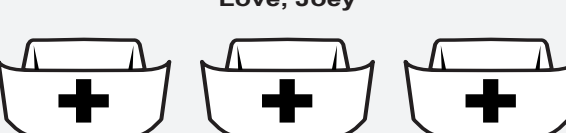

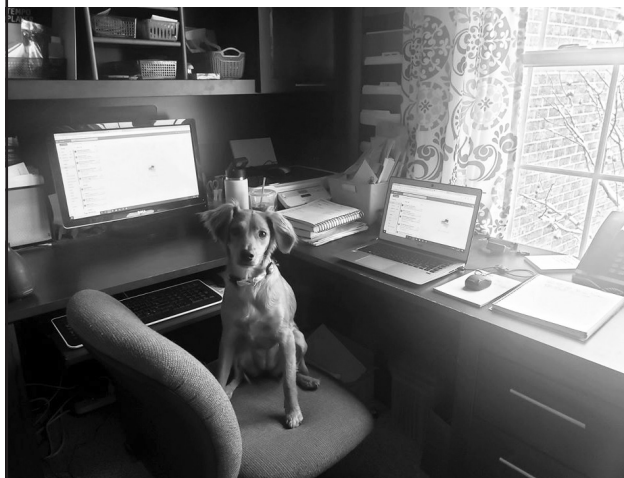

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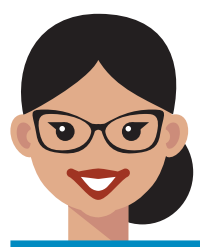

Ag in the Classroom provides 'Ag-Bag' lessons for students

HENRY - With students now unable to participate in their regular "Ag in the Classroom" lessons, the University of Illinois Extension Marshall-Putnam Agriculture in the Classroom Program and the Marshall-Putnam Farm Bureau collaborated to provide Ag-Bag lessons to school classrooms.

Abrienne Holler, U of I Extension Ag in the Classroom Community Worker, and Tiffany Moody, Executive Director of the Marshall-Putnam Farm Bureau, provided four different lessons focusing on agriculture for students who pick up a weekly lunch at school.

"Let's Grow at Home" was the first Ag-Bag. In this bag, students were given pots, seeds, a magnifying glass or ruler, along with a way to mark their plants. A brief lesson about plants was enclosed with the supplies including a germination journal to keep track of what they did each day with the plant.

A "Let's Get Poppin'" lesson was based on the Illinois state snack: POPCORN! Each bag had popcorn facts, a small bag of popcorn, and

a popcorn craft.

The "Why Did the Chicken Cross the Road?" lesson was focused on the embryology project most students would have experienced first-hand in the classrooms with Extension's incubator project. This bag included a snack that was made to look like a chicken, chicken activities, and 4-H resources to watch chicks hatch online.

The fourth Ag-Bag was "Calling all Conservation Superheroes." This bag focused on Earth Day, April 22. The lesson featured resources on how to reduce, reuse and recycle.

U of I Extension Ag in the Classroom and the Marshall-Putnam Farm Bureau will continue to work together to support students, teachers, schools and parents with Ag-Bags and to provide experiential lessons highlighting the importance of agriculture.

State Water Survey: Illinois' soils were cooler and drier in mid-April

CHAMPAIGN - Colder weather entering Illinois caused soil temperatures to fall, according to Jennie Atkins, Water and Atmospheric Resources Monitoring (WARM) program manager, University of Illinois' Illinois State Water Survey.

Soil temperatures at 4 inches under bare soil averaged 46 degrees statewide on April 15, a drop of 4 degrees from April 1.

Soils warmed the first week of the month, reaching temperatures from the mid-50s in the north to high 60s in the south. However, cooler weather led to falling soil temperatures

with daily lows in the mid-30s to low 40s. Mid-month temperatures averaged 2 degrees below those of mid-April 2019.

Soil moisture also fell. Moisture levels at 2-inch depths declined an average of 21 percent statewide from April 1 - 15.

The southern and central regions have seen decreases of more than 20 percent, while northern Illinois had an average decline of 8 percent. However, moisture levels were ample with an average of 0.33 water fraction by volume on April 15, slightly below field capacity for most of the soils monitored.

Declines were also seen at depths from 4 to 20 inches. At 39 and 59 inches, soil moisture remained high with little change in April.

The Illinois State Water Survey's WARM program collects hourly and daily weather and soil information at 19 stations across the state. Daily and monthly summaries can be found at the WARM website (<http://www.isws.illinois.edu/warm/>) and in the Illinois Water and Climate Summary (<http://www.isws.illinois.edu/warm/climate.asp>).

I went to church for years and never heard about the devil. It's not fun talking about him, and I don't ever want to put too much focus on him. But the truth is, we have an enemy. First Peter 5:8 (NIV) says, "...Your enemy the devil prowls around like a roaring lion looking for someone to devour."

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ISA SEEKS QUALIFIED CANDIDATES FOR DISTRICT DIRECTOR BOARD SEATS

The Illinois Soybean Association (ISA) seeks qualified candidates to fill a board seat representing District 1 (Boone, Carroll, DeKalb, Jo Daviess, Lee, Ogle, Stephenson & Winnebago Counties). Paul Rasmussen, current director, will term off the board in July 2020. The Illinois Department of Agriculture directs the election process.

The Illinois Soybean Association (ISA) represents the interests of more than 43,000 soybean farmers in Illinois through the state soybean checkoff and membership efforts. ISA, which is one of the entities of the ISA organization, manages and invests Illinois soybean checkoff funds.

Board members serve a term of three years and are eligible for up to two terms. The ISA board is comprised of 18 district directors and six at-large directors.

Eligibility to serve requires candidates be Illinois residents of legal voting age that contribute to the soybean checkoff. Candidates must also be residents within the district and maintain eligibility during their term(s). Directors may need to devote about 24 days per year, depending on level of leadership and representation needs.
