Ukulele Station site growing

Oregon Music Garage will go north of existing business

OREGON – No one can ever accuse John Lindhorst of not thinking big.

Sure, the Oregon business he owns – Ukulele Station America – is housed in a 208 square foot building. But that successful little shop is about to get a bigger neighbor.

Lindhorst said the plan now is to break ground by early May on the Oregon Music Garage, which will be built just north of the Ukulele Station America building at 10th Street and Rt. 64.

"My goal is to have the shop open by fall," Lindhorst said.

The Oregon Music Garage will be a 2,000 square foot space housed in a unique building that Lindhorst said is not really a barn or a shed, but will be a post frame building with some upgrades. It will also have garage doors on one end and be, "very industrial and cool looking.

Lindhorst said it will be built about 30 feet north of Ukulele Station America and will extend along Mix Street. There will be parking, a patio and maybe even a firepit.

But Lindhorst wants to be clear

on one thing: Ukulele Station America will stay put.

"I want people to realize, Ukulele station America and the little stone building will continue as is," he said of the popular business, opened in the summer of 2015.

The idea behind the Oregon Music Garage is to offer instruments other than ukuleles. Ukulele Station America will still be a space full of ukuleles and some lessons and meetings could still be held there.

But the Music Garage will house acoustic guitars, banjos, mandolins, dulcimers, world percussion and other "folky" stuff, Lindhorst said. And yes, there will also be ukuleles there.

"I may have a few electric guitars," he said.

The space will include and entryway, two handicap accessible restrooms, a second level private office, a workroom for inventory and a large showroom. Lindhorst said he hopes to have a stage area in the showroom, possibly something that can be moved.

"Once it's built, I'll be able to figure it out more," he said.

Brands that will be available in the new store include Fender, Gretsch, Deering and Gold Tone banjos and mandolins.

"I'm not trying to be the guitar store, the banjo store," Lindhorst said, adding that he wants to attract people who are looking for something special.

With a possible performance space, people might wonder if Lindhorst is bringing back the live music he used to have in the 80s when he had the Washington Street Mercantile and Coffee House at 221 Washington St.

"Maybe a little," he said.

But there is still a lot that has to happen between now and then

on a project Lindhorst said was a

big one for him.
"This is the biggest financial project I have ever undertaken," he said, adding that the people at Union Savings Bank in Mount Morris, where he got his loan, were great about making this dream come true.

Once the Oregon Music Garage is up and running, he said he might also start doing Internet sales, something he has thus far avoided. He said he is trying to find a way to make buying an instrument from him more personal.

"It's not a pair of socks," he said.


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Ogle County has first COVID-19 death

Forreston teacher earns technology award

Parks, Forreston Ag Teacher and FFA advisor, is one of the three high school science teachers in the nation to receive the Vernier Technology Award this year.

On Saturday, April 4, she had planned to be in Boston to receive this award but due to COVID-19 the NSTA (National Science Teachers Association) Conference was cancelled.

A partnership of Vernier Software & Technology and the National Science Teachers Association (NSTA), this award recognizes the innovative use, or potential use, of data-collection technology (e.g. probes or sensors) interfacing with a computer, graphing calculator, or handheld in the science classroom. Seven awards will be presented in the following categories: one elementary (grades K-5) award; two middle level (grades 6–8)

awards; three high school (grades 9-12) awards; and one college award.

Parks wrote in her award application "Our students in this day and age work with information that is instant; most of the information they can receive right at their fingertips. The Vernier Go Direct System connected to our class iPad will allow students to measure, evaluate, and act on those measurements in real-time. This enables my

classroom to simulate the real world of data collection and problem-solving that happens every day in the science labs, experimental fields, and agriculture."

This award gave the department \$3,000 to spend of Vernier equipment, \$1,500 travel voucher to Boston for the Conference and \$1,000 award for Parks. The Vernier equipment has already arrived at the high school and the students are excited to

do more experiments with it and use the probes to test the department's new aquaponics system (aquaponics is the raising of fish and vegetables and a unison system).

"I am so honored to receive this award," Parks said. "I really wanted to get this equipment for the students and I found a grant that I could allow us to have the equipment without asking our very generous local businesses. Premier leadership, personal growth, and career success is what we strive for in the Forreston High School Agriculture Science Education Department. We aim to offer the highest level opportunities for students with this high-level Vernier equipment we can continue to reach for mastery. Our students are ready to explore, learn about, and change the world around them with data that is accurate and instant."


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

County discourages open burning due to ongoing pandemic

The Ogle County Solid Waste Management Department (OCSWMD) discourages all open burning at this time due to the COVID-19 pandemic

The open burning of landscape waste and ground vegetation is particularly risky at this time due to the nuisance smoke conditions produced by open burning and the possibility of uncontrolled fire spread.

Since the COVID-19 virus is a respiratory virus, nuisance smoke conditions can cause breathing issues and make pre-existing conditions, such as asthma, worse. Nuisance smoke conditions may also make the impact of the virus worse on afflicted residents and can lengthen the time we are all dealing with this situation. In addition, when fires are uncontrolled and first responders are required, this places those personnel in close contact during the response and can spread out emergency personnel and resources unnecessarily.

The OCSWMD encourages county residents to forgo open burning atthis time, and encourages other means of dealing with landscape waste, such as mulching thatch and dead leaves with a mower, using a home compost pile for grass, leaves, and twigs, or having your waste hauler take it away if that service is offered in your area.

These efforts should help to flatten the curve and help everyone put the COVID-19 pandemic behind us. 



- * On May 3, 1469, the Italian philosopher and writer Niccolo Machiavelli is born. Machiavelli became one of the fathers of modern political theory. The term "Machiavellian" is used to describe an action undertaken for gain without regard for right or wrong.
- * On May 1, 1931, President Herbert Hoover officially dedicates New York City's Empire State Building. The building went up in just over a year, under budget and well ahead of schedule.

And how about we actu-



Imagine if each subdivision or community


ot together and picked up trash.

In December 1908, the new Carnegie library in Oregon was ready to be occupied. The books and pamphlets were all dusted and packed into boxes by the librarian, then slid down the long flight of stairs at the First National Bank building, placed on wheelbarrows and wheeled over to the new building. The library was not closed during the move and books were given out as usual all but one evening. On December 12, 1908, books were circulated from the new building for the first time. (Information compiled from historical documents found in cupboards in the Library office)
