MENDOTA - A large contingent of brave souls made a big splash while contributing to a great cause when they took a leap into Lake Mendota during the 2020 Polar Plunge on Feb. 29.

Presented by the Law Enforcement Torch Run and GEICO, the Polar Plunge is held each year to support Special Olympics of Illinois by taking a quick dip into the chilly water of Lake Mendota. The funds raised from the Law Enforcement Torch Run Polar Plunge® will benefit over 1,750 athletes that train and compete within Special Olympics of Illinois Region A.

Allison Nichols, Region A Assistant Director of Development, announced that 302 plungers participated in this year's event and they raised \$63,742.77. The total number of plungers was an increase of 60 from last year.

"It was a fantastic event for our local athletes and pretty good weather too," stated Nichols.





Severe Weather Preparedness Week, March 1-7

OTTAWA - While March is nationally recognized as Severe Weather Preparedness month, Illinois recognizes March 1-7 as Severe Weather Preparedness Week. Although there are many types of severe weather, this week and month focuses on severe thunderstorms that can produce heavy rain, flash flooding, high winds and possibly tornadoes. Knowing the difference

between weather watches and warnings is important for personal decision-making. The National Weather Service defines "weather watches" as weather conditions being favorable for the development of severe weather, while "weather warnings" are defined as severe weather that is imminent or currently happening; people should take action immediately if located within the warning area.

How someone receives emergency notifications is vital to personal survival. "There are many meth-

ods available to receive emergency notifications, but your life may depend upon making sure you're signed up for one," says Connie Brooks, director of LaSalle County Emergency Management. "Relying on outdoor warning sirens when you're indoors in an enclosed building is not as effective because those sirens are meant for individuals outside." A NOAA weather radio

is able to wake people up at night, if necessary. Today's weather radios are much easier to program alphabetically by state and county and are available at most retail stores for \$25-35.

Weather apps on smartphones are another way of receiving emergency notifications; some are

free and some require a paid subscription. People may also ask if their local jurisdiction offers an emergency reverse notification system and if so, they may sign up for it to receive weather notifications.

It is important to have a plan in place along with up-to-date emergency contact information and an emergency kit with current supplies that includes pets and anyone with special needs. This will allow people to act when they receive the warning to do so.

Central Illinois leads corn and soybean production as numbers decline across state

☐ Record-wet planting season hurt farmers statewide in 2019

SPRINGFIELD-Central Illinois counties led Illinois in corn and soybean production last year as every region and nearly all counties saw decreases in both crops, according to estimates released last week by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Both production and yields for corn and soybeans fell in nearly every Illinois county for which the USDA has data for the past two years, according to an analysis by Capitol News Illinois.

The USDA published county-specific soybean figures for 75 of 102 counties and corn figures for 67 counties. Remaining counties were lumped into regional totals. All nine of Illinois crop-growing regions, from the cold and snowy northwest to the temperate southeast, saw production and yields decrease.

McLean County, Illinois largest by area and a perennial powerhouse in cash crop production, was by far the top producer of corn and soybeans, producing more than 61 million and 18 million bushels, respectively. Fellow central Illinois counties Champaign and Livingston rounded out the top three. "The soil is good here,

but is it better than anything in northern Illinois? No. Western Illinois? Probably not," said Gerald Thompson, who grows thousands of acres of corn and soybeans in the McLean County town

A short drive down Interstate 55, Sangamon County topped the state in corn and soybean yields, which is the average number of bushels produced from an acre of land. Sangamon County farms averaged 206.3 bushels per acre of corn and 65.5 of soybeans.

"I think we're all suited to compete, it's just more of a weather issue," Thompson

Production and yields were down from 2018 across the state – in many places dramatically – after heavy rain and flooding plagued farmers during the spring planting season.



Corn production dropped more than 62 percent in Illinois' southernmost Alexander County, which sits on the conflux of the Mississippi and Ohio rivers. Another southwestern county, Perry, saw the biggest change in soybean production with 32 percent decrease.

Central Illinois' Douglas County had the biggest drop in corn yields with a 34 percent decrease. Calhoun County, which hugs the Mississippi River north of St. Louis, had the largest drop in soybean yields with a 48 percent decrease.

"Not only do you get the challenges of the water you get,"Thompson said of farming along the Mississippi, "but you get everybody else's water after about a week or two after it comes down the river, gets out of its banks and floods your fields."

Though McLean County led the state in production, it was not spared by the weather. Soybean production fell nearly 10 percent, while corn production dropped 13 percent. Thompson estimates his yields for both crops were down around 10 percent.

'While I'm not singing the

blues too bad, I don't want to in any way take away from those that really did stress," he said. Four counties for which

the USDA had data actually saw yields increase. Soybean yields in Hardin County and Lake County rose 3.46 percent and 16.71 percent, respectively, though both saw decreases in production. No county saw an increase in soybean production as Lake County fared the best with a 1.95 percent decrease.

Corn yields rose in Winnebago County (4.01 percent) and Madison County (0.25 percent). Another three counties saw production increase: Marshall (5.28 percent), Sangamon (1.95 percent) and Gallatin (1.59 percent).

Last week's numbers are the first county-level glimpse into the plight of Illinois' top two crops after statewide production totals released in January showed a 20 percent drop in soybean production and an 18 percent drop in corn.

Illinois last year saw its wettest January through June on record. Corn and soybeans are usually planted in the late spring, especially May. Unfortunately for farmers,

the state's wettest May on record forced many to wait until June and even July to put seeds in the ground. "We made an extra effort

to get ready for spring 2020," said Thompson, who didn't finish planting last year until mid-June. The National Oceanic and

Atmosphere Administration predicts a wetter-than-normal March through May for the entire state this year, especially southeastern Illinois communities along the Wabash River.

"Preparing for wetter-than-normal conditions to be more common or happen more frequently is something that farmers should be doing in Illinois," state climatologist Dr. Trent Ford told Capitol News Illinois in January. Ford added that scientists



The exodus continues

SPRINGFIELD - A fellow sat down next to me recently on a flight from San Antonio to Chicago and

I asked if he was heading home and he just shook his head and explained he is in the process of moving from Chicago to Texas. The 50-something fellow said he was returning to Illinois to get his convertible and to drive it south.

I asked him why he was moving and he told me: "the taxes and the politics."

It sounds familiar.

In the two decades that I've been writing this column, I've received hundreds of letters and emails from folks leaving the Land of Lincoln. The reasons they cite revolve around employment opportunities, tax burden and the state's political future.

According to Internal Revenue Service data, Illinois has experienced a net loss of 160,000 people since 2010. That's more than the population of Springfield, Peoria, Rockford or the Illinois Quad-Cities.

Illinois and West Virginia were the only states that lost population during that time.

While middle class people make up the bulk of those leaving the state, the group that had the highest proportion leave are those earning more than \$200,000 per year. Proportionately, the second largest group leaving are those earning between \$100,000 and \$200,000.

That's bad news. Why? Well, have you ever worked for someone poorer than yourself? Few of us have.

An inevitable consequence of losing these high earners is that they will invest elsewhere. Which means fewer jobs for Illinois. And that, of course, means more people leaving the state.

A second consequence is the tax base shrinks. This means with fewer people paying taxes, those who remain have to pay more to support the government that we have. Of course, higher taxes mean more people

It's a vicious cycle that shows little reason to abate. In 2016, the Paul Simon Institute at Southern Illinois University conducted a statewide poll and found that 47 percent of respondents would like to leave Illinois and 51 percent would prefer to remain in the state. Just under 2 percent said they didn't know.

Taxes are the single biggest reason people want to leave, the weather is next, followed by government and jobs. Specifically, 27 percent cite taxes as the motive for departing, 16 percent say weather, 15 percent cite government and 13 percent name jobs and education.

Illinois has the second highest property tax in the nation, just behind New Jersey.

For years, politicians have denied that Illinois has a problem with population loss. Now, most acknowledge the depth of the problem. But few propose solutions. It's one of

those problems that they would rather ignore than address. That's unfortunate. We deserve better.

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
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Whittling the school budget – 1992

Mike Duffy was superintendent of Mendota High School in 1992. He made a few suggestions as to how economies might be achieved. (1.) Eliminating all summer school classes in 1993 with the exception of driving time for Driver's Ed classes and mandatory Special Ed classes. This would save \$23,600. (2.) If only one of the two retiring faculty members were to be replace, another \$50,000 saving would result. (3.) If teachers' aides replaced certified teachers as the study hall monitors, there would be another saving. Aides would receive \$5 per hour.

Duffy's proposal for 1993 would not be effective in the upcoming summer of 1992. The pros and cons of his proposal would be discussed at a future meeting.

On the bright side, MHS were doing well in science competitions. In regional competition at IVCC, Mendota took several first places and advanced to sectional in Peoria. Four Mendota TEAMS members took third place in the event, and Dan Rebholz, with second place took part in state competition on March 10, 1992, at Champaign.

Bernie Sanders' skewed worldview

Bernie Sanders may be on the verge of gaining an insurmountable lead in the Democratic nomination fight, but he's not letting that get in the way of his socialist principles.

Asked in a "60 Minutes" interview about old statements praising Fidel Castro's supposed achievements in health care and education, Sanders stayed true to himself.

'You know, when Fidel Castro came into office, you know

what he did?" he told interviewer Anderson Cooper. "He had a massive literacy program. Is that a bad thing? Even though Fidel Castro did it? No, literacy programs aren't a bad thing, but they usually

don't require seizing power in a violent revolution, jailing and killing political opponents, seizing private property, or outlawing the free press. Teaching children to read is something that happens in free societies, too. That Bernie continues to believe a literacy program is some kind of recommendation for a regime that has otherwise oppressed and immiserated its people for decades is a sign of his skewed view of what's important and just for a polity.

Asked by Cooper about jailed Cuban dissidents, Sanders said he condemns that, but in any rational view, it's the imprisoning of people for expressing unwelcome political views that is the foremost thing to know about the Cuban dictatorship, period, full stop. The left has nonetheless always viewed Fidel Castro as

some kind of social worker who happened to take and hold power -- or "come to office," as Sanders delicately puts it -- via force. Back in 1989, Sanders wrote, "Cuba -- the one country in

the entire region that has no hunger, is educating all of its chil-

dren and is providing high-quality, free health care -- is hated

with a passion by the Democrats as much as Republicans." Besides the moral obtuseness of arguments like this, the

factual basis for such claims is dubious. Cuba was already doing well on measures of health care and education prior

Bernie's perspective on Cuba is characteristic of his worldview that has a sympathy for America's enemies, at least if they are communist or Islamist; that assumes the worst of the United States; and that opposes nearly all U.S. military interventions as misbegotten or malign (Sanders voted for the Afghanistan War after Sept. 11, and now regrets even

Electing Bernie Sanders would be almost indistinguishable from putting the late radical historian Howard Zinn, or the America-loathing linguist Noam Chomsky, or the tendentious left-wing filmmaker Michael Moore in charge of American foreign policy. The country would be in the hands of an opponent of its power with no faith in its goodness. Bernie would make Barack Obama's overly solicitous attitude toward our enemies and Donald Trump's bizarrely warm statements about foreign dictators look like American foreign-policy orthodoxy by comparison.

There is almost no enemy of the United States that wouldn't be heartened by a Sanders victory, and see it as an opportunity to make gains at the expense of the United States and its allies. If his decades-long track record is any indication, Sanders would be inclined to make excuses for our adversaries and look on the bright side of their repression and rapine.

He's doing it with the Cuban dictatorship to this day. Rich Lowry is editor of the National Review.

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IVCC expands online course offerings

OGLESBY - Illinois Valley Community College is seeing more students enroll in online courses as programs such as criminal justice expand offerings.



College basketball fans: Let the March Madness begin

Conference tourneys to begin; Selection Sunday is March 15

College basketball fans rejoice upon the arrival of March, which marks the dawn of conference tournament season and, of course, the NCAA Tournament.

The NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Tournament, commonly referred to as "March Madness," has been played each year since 1939. The tournament is a single-elimination event consisting of 68 college teams. The tournament takes place in seven rounds with each team vying for the right to advance and ultimately play for the national championship. When the teams are whittled down to only four remaining, the penultimate round is played, aptly known as the "Final Four."

The best 68 teams, out of more than 350 collegiate teams across the country, are not necessarily the teams that compete in the NCAA Tournament. Teams are split into 32 conferences, and each of those conferences earns an automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament. That bid goes to the postseason conference tournament winner or the regular season champion. The remaining 36 teams are chosen by a selection committee, and these teams earn what are known as "at-large bids." That process is subjective, and each year much debate ensues once the teams are announced.

The order of play can be a little challenging to the novice. Firstly, the four lowest-ranked automatic bid teams will compete against the four lowest-ranked at-large teams in games referred to as "The First Four." These games are held on the Tuesday and Wednesday before the tournament unofficially opens on Thursday. Teams are split into four regions of 16 teams each. Those regions are seeded, which means they are given a preliminary ranking for the purpose of game draw. According to the NCAA, the committee endeavors to achieve reasonable competitive balance in each region. The teams will be distributed to build the bracket. The seeds are ranked within each region, with the best team in a given bracket being assigned a number one seed. Because it is a single-elimination tournament, upsets are the norm in March Madness, and there's never a guarantee that any of the top seeds, much less all of them, will make it to

The term "March Madness" was given to the game of basketball by Illinois high school teacher Henry V. Porter in 1939. However, it was only after CBS broadcaster Brent Musburger used it during coverage of the 1982 NCAA Tournament that March Madness became synonymous with this beloved sporting event.

Since the inception of the tournament, 36 different teams have won a national championship. UCLA has won the most national championships of any school, hoisting the trophy 11 times. Selection Sunday occurs on March 15, 2020, and the Final Four will begin on April 4 in Atlanta.

"Frozen 2" (PG) -- Queen Elsa's magic has always been a source of wonder. When a mysterious force beckons her from a shrouded forest, and

itself, Elsa (voiced by Idina Menzel) and Anna (Kristen Bell) set off into the unknown for answers, with Kristoff (Jonathon Groff) and Olaf (Josh Gad) in tow. They find out more than they bargained for, including revelations from the past and the rediscovery of some forgotten people. of pinkish-purplish twilight and brings with it a miasma of technicolor madness that infects the family one by one. It's B movie weirdness with a creepy ET flair, based on an HP Lovecraft short story. Also featuring Tommy Chong in a cameo as the town's off-grid stoner who gets it, man. "The Corrupted" (R)

-- An ex-con (Sam Claflin) fresh out of prison returns home to east London to find that his brother is in way over his head with a crime syndicate that reaches to the upper echelons of power. Although he's keen to mend his criminal ways and be there for his son and the woman he loves, he's also honor-bound to save his brother. He engages in a careful game of cat and mouse with the corrupt and powerful, setting them up and taking them down so he can get his family back. Sound familiar? Yes, because this is

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every crime-con movie ever.


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

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


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Discover the blessing in your storm

At one time or another, all of us have experienced a setback or endured a significant loss. Maybe that's where you are today; perhaps you've lost a job, a relationship, or even someone or something you love.

If so, I want to encourage you with Matthew 5:4 (NIV). Jesus says, "Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted." I used to think this

was odd. I wondered, How can we be blessed if we are mourning? Then God helped me understand that our times of pain are actually perfect opportunities to receive and experience His supernatural comfort.

I wasn't trying to be flippant or insensitive to her hardship—I wanted to help her. So I explained that when things go wrong, the enemy wants us to spend the rest of our lives under the bus, feeling sorry for ourselves. But God's plan is for us to bounce back, get in the driver's seat, then go pick up other hurting people who are under the bus.

I'm not saying we shouldn't grieve after a loss or tragedy, but we just don't want to get stuck there.

Just look at the life of Joseph in Genesis chapters 37 - 50. As a young man, Joseph had great dreams for his life. But his older brothers hated him and sold him into slavery, and he was taken to Egypt. But Joseph refused to give up. He found great favor with his master, Potiphar, and was eventually put in charge of his entire household.

Years later, when Joseph was falsely accused of trying to seduce Potiphar's wife, he was thrown in jail. But he still didn't give up. And when the time was right, the Lord eventually gave Joseph an opportunity to interpret a dream for Pharaoh, who then promoted him to be the highest official in Egypt!

Joseph literally went from the pit to the palstruck the land, the Lord used Joseph to save his family and the entire house of Israel. Romans 8:28 says,
