## Project on track to be completed by November target date

OREGON-Work on the new Ogle County jail in Oregon continues at a quick pace, with the brick exterior done an interior work underway. "If anything, we'll be on time or ahead of schedule," said County Board Member Don Griffin, Jr., chairman of the Long-range Planning Committee for the county.

The new jail, or Judicial Center Annex, will be a 42,000-square foot, 154-bed adult jail. It will house both males and females. It will cost about \$25 million to complete and is expected to open in November.

The project will also include the construction of a Sally port that will connect the new jail with the Judicial Center, allowing for the safe transportation of inmates.

At its regular meeting on Feb. 18, the County Board approved the latest payment for the jail - \$1.3 million - most of that going to the construction manager on the project, Gilbane Building Company.

Griffin said Gilbane has been doing a great job keep on track and on budget getting the work on the new jail done. He said, "it's amazing how many little things pop up," on a project of this size.

## Registration opens this week for Children's Center for 2020-21

**OREGON**–Registration for the Oregon Park District's Children's Center for the 2020-21 school year will begin on Tuesday, Feb. 25.

Annual members may register one day early on Monday, Feb. 24. Residents may register at 7 a.m. and non-residents at 9 a.m. both days. The Children's Center will help prepare your child for Kindergarten as they learn to interact with their peers.

The three-year-old program meets on Tuesday and Thursday from either 8:15-10:15 a.m. or 10:45 a.m.-12:45 p.m. The four-year-old program meets on Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 8:15-11 a.m. or 12-2:45 p.m. All program supplies are included in the monthly tuition payment.

Children receive a snack daily.

Tuition for the three-year-old program is \$85 per month for residents and \$102 per month for non-residents. Tuition for the four-year-old program is \$120 per month for residents and \$136 per month for nonresidents.

A \$25 non-refundable deposit and your child's birth certificate are required at registration. Children must be toilet trained and be the appropriate age on or before September 1, 2020.



a week programs are largely play-based. During the two-hour, two days a week program designed for three-year-old learners, children have opportunities to develop social skills such as sharing, taking turns and caring for one another, as well as small motor skills, such as cutting, gluing, drawing and "writing" and large motor skills, through both teacher-directed and self-directed play. Color, shape, and name recognition, as well as counting, patterning and sorting are all topics that are addressed in this program.

The 2.75-hour, three days a week program is designed as a kindergarten prep program for those learners age four and five. Through stories, art, games, self- and teacher-directed play, and gym activities, children will learn cooperation, manners and self-regulation skills to establish positive and appropriate social interaction with peers and adults Learners also develop readiness skills, such as number concepts, problem solving, recognition of capital and lowercase letters, name printing, as well as early printing practice of all letters, and letter-sound recognition that will help promote their success in kindergarten. Learners will also take field trips in the community.

He said most of the brick work inside the building is done, and paint is going on the walls. The roof shingles, which will match the Judicial Center, will go on this spring.

Griffin said the big thing

inside will be the "technology," including the interlocking gates and fire alarms.

"The finishing end of doing this sometimes take a little time," Griffin said. The street repair - part

of a deal with the City of Oregon when it agreed to close a portion of Sixth Street for the new building will start next month, along with landscaping.

Griffin said the Sheriff's Department staff is already preparing the transition to the new building.

### Salon finds way to give back to community

Knowing so many organizations benefit from donations, salon owner and Oregon native Meggan Dickson-Grennan chooses to use her business's position in the public eye as a way to involve the community and give to those organizations in a bigger way than a single person might be able to.

The salon, w@sh, is located at 303 W. Washington St. in Oregon.

In December 2019, w@sh sold raffle tickets for a Pureology luxury hair care boxed set. All proceeds from ticket sales were donated to the Lifeline Food & Self-Help Project. Dickson-Grennan and w@sh stylist, Kendra Remrey, had the recent opportunity to finally meet with Lifeline co-presidents, Sharon Wallace and Earl Martin.

Lifeline is located inside historic Conover Square Mall and has been serving Ogle County for 38 years. The project began as a food pantry, with clothing following a few short months later. Wallace said that Lifeline follows a set of rules and regulations set by the Northern Illinois Food Bank, and they are inspected by the Health Department. Wallace and Remrey are only part of the 10-person Board of Members. Lifeline also has a crew of nearly 53 volunteers who sort clothing to be sold and disperse food to our local families and individuals in need of a little boost.

After a tour of the storage unit, volunteer Eddie Monnahan discussed the food donation procedure. Clients may come once a month, and also on an emergency basis. They show proof of identification and list their family members. Lifeline keeps track of the number of adults and children, as well as single persons and families they serve on a monthly basis and submit their stats to the Northern Illinois Food Bank. By 2017, the Lifeline Food & Self-Help Project had served 10,000 families and in that same year was named the Autumn on Parade Unit of Honor.



Each recipient is given basics to provide good nutrition as has been determined by the local Lifeline Board Members.Lifeline purchases their supplies at a reduced rate from the Northern Illinois Food Bank.

Wallace said Lifeline is run on clothing and monetary donations – clothing sales fund the food pantry and cover utilities and rent for their space which has been located for the last 16 years inside Conover Square. Lifeline does not accept government funding and is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit.

### **MOMENTS IN** TIME

\* On March 15, 1820, Maine is admitted into the Union as the 23rd state. Administered as a province of Massachusetts since 1647, the entrance of Maine as a free state was agreed to by Southern senators in exchange for the entrance of Missouri as a slave state.

\* On March 12, 1894, Coca-Cola is sold in glass bottles for the first time. It had been available only as a fountain drink. A bottle of Coke cost 5 cents, and it stayed that way until 1959.

\* On March 11, 1918, a U.S. Army soldier reports to the hospital at Fort Riley, Kansas, complaining of cold-like symptoms. By noon, over 100 of his fellow soldiers had reported similar symptoms, marking what are believed to be the first cases in the influenza pandemic of 1918. The Spanish flu would eventually kill 675,000 Americans and up to 50 million people worldwide.

\* On March 13, 1942, the Quartermaster Corps of the U.S. Army begins training dogs for the newly established War Dog Program, or "K-9 Corps."

\* On March 9, 1959, the first Barbie doll goes on display at the American Toy Fair in New York City. Barbie was the first mass-produced toy doll in the United States with adult features. Ruth Handler, co-founder of Mattel, named the doll after her daughter, Barbara.

Yes, "fake news" was as much a problem for the 19th century as it is today. How can we as citizens in a democracy better navigate the oceans of information surrounding us and make sense of it all? Beginning with Altgeld, I will lay out an alternative to the toxic media environment that permeates our times and enable citizens to become informed news consumers using media literacy tools online and off. ### To Your Good Health

#### No Screening Test for Bile Duct Cancer

DEAR DR. ROACH: A family friend has just been diagnosed with bile duct cancer. She is a breast cancer survivor and is 75 years old. The tumor is said to be the size of a quarter, and it was discovered after she complained of heartburn symptoms.

Are there screening tests that could have detected the condition before the heartburn symptoms? Are there things that she could have done to avoid the cancer? My family members are frightened and want to avoid her condition. -- Anon.

ANSWER: Cholangiocarcinoma, cancer of the bile ducts, is a rare cancer that is, unfortunately, associated with a high mortality rate. There are no symptoms in most people until it is advanced. Since the cancer is in the bile ducts, the most common symptoms are caused by obstruction of the bile ducts: jaundice (yellow in skin/ eyes), generalized itching, dark urine and light-colored stools. Abdominal pain, fever and weight loss are other symptoms.

Cholangiocarcinoma is not a disease that's amenable for screening; it is rare in North America (it is more common in East Asia, where there are screening programs). Further, the available screening tests, such as blood tests and imaging studies, are not very sensitive, meaning the tests will miss cases. And they are not very specific -- a positive result on the screening test does not necessarily mean cancer. For these reasons, screening is not currently recommended for people at average risk, although it may be considered in people at high risk, such as people with primary sclerosing cholangitis, a chronic liver disease that puts people at high risk for cholangiocarcinoma.

Other risk factors for cholangiocarcinoma are mostly beyond a person's control: other liver diseases, parasites and genetic conditions. There is some evidence that obesity and diabetes increase the risk of this cancer; however, it does no good for you or your friend to look backward. Never blame the victim. She should concentrate on getting treated. I don't have enough information to comment on her prognosis, but the fact that it was diagnosed early -- apparently before obstruction of the bile ducts -- and with a tumor only the size of a quarter, are favorable. Treatment may include surgery and chemotherapy (before or after surgery).

DEAR DR. ROACH: My 22-yearold daughter was diagnosed with overactive bladder at the end of June. She tried medications, but they made her sick. She was given a prescription for a physical therapist to work with her for her condition. Unfortunately, she has hit dead ends. How can she find a physical therapist to work with her? -- A.F.

ANSWER: Physical therapists, like most other health care professionals, have individual skill sets. Pelvic-floor physical therapy requires a level of expertise that not all physical therapists have. I suspect she may have just been calling physical therapist offices near her and not finding a therapist with that expertise. A quick internet search found a good number of specially trained therapists in the area where she lives.

There are many online reviews of physical therapists, just as there are reviews of doctors and dentists. They have some value, but I would be cautious about both overenthusiastic and overly negative reviews.


