Historic Sublette home 'traces its roots'

☐ Painter helps answer questions for owners of 148-year-old structure

SUBLETTE-Old homes have many stories to tell. Anyone who has lived in a home that is over 100 years old has surely wondered what hidden tales their historic dwelling would share if it could talk. But in many cases, those stories have been partially or completely lost over time.

Such was the case for Bob and Betty Jones of Sublette. As a young couple, they were living in Franklin Grove when Bob was given the opportunity to manage the Shrock/Tuloma/StandardOil fertilizer plant in Sublette. Having grown up in Sublette, Bob was excited to return to his hometown, but Betty had reservations about the move.

In Franklin Grove, they had lived in a newer, ranch style home right in town. Betty explained that she had a fear of living in the country and was concerned that her fear would be realized if they made the move to Sublette.

But Bob assured her that would not happen, promising that they would live in town. "But there was only one house available at the time a big Victorian with very little paint and a partial bell steeple, which made it look like a 'ghost house,'" Betty recalled.

The couple met with the realtor, Gerald Leffelman and the home's owners, Carol and Harold Bonnell Jr., who gave them a very friendly welcome. As they entered the home for the first time, Betty remembered seeing a dining room with painted

wainscoting, a kitchen with cabinets that went floor to ceiling with one big door, and what she called a hog trough sink (now called a farmer's sink).

As they went into the living quarters of the home, its appearance was more impressive. They saw ornately trimmed golden oak and cherry woodwork that had never been painted, a beautiful golden oak and marble fireplace, and pocket doors between the rooms.

Betty still remembers Bob saying at the time, "I think we can work hard and make it into a beautiful home to raise our kids and make some beautiful memories."

Betty admitted there were a few tears shed, but the couple bought the home and moved in on Oct. 19, 1967. At the time, they were told that the home had originally been the Methodist Episcopal Church, the first Methodist church to be built in Sublette. Constructed in 1870, the church was completed in 1871. This was an interesting bit of history for the couple but questions remained. Given its current layout, they wondered how church services could have been held in that space.

As the years went by, Bob and Betty made some changes to the house, both inside and out. Most importantly, they were able to build many fond memories in the home. "Times with family and friends, the births of our five children and one angel in heaven, a tree fire, boys climbing to the top of the roof (unbeknownst to us

until later in life), Barbies, and soldiers who protect the upstairs," Betty noted.

By 2019, it was again time to paint the exterior of the house but finding a painter proved somewhat difficult. "In today's world, not many painters can be found who will take on the challenge of this unique Victorian house," Betty explained.

By chance, a nurse at Saint Paul Medical Center in Mendota told the couple about a painter, Gary Mason of Rochelle, who did a great job painting a friend's home. They contacted Mason and when he came to give them a bid, Betty said he seemed as excited about painting the home as they were. "We learned that Victorians are his favorite type of house to paint," Betty recalled. "Gary has a real talent for bringing out the details of a home and as he says, 'It is only paint.' But it is more than that; it is his heart and talent. He has a real feel for the home

and cares how it looks, and he passes that passion on to

But when Mason learned that the home was originally the Methodist Episcopal Church, he became just as interested and passionate about the history of the home as he was about choosing paint colors. As a historian and member of the Lee County Historical Society, Mason went searching for more information on the 148-yearold structure. In his research, Mason was able to uncover some additional information and historical records that helped answer some of Bob and Betty's questions about

their home. Through that research, they learned that at the time of construction the interior had 20-foot ceilings and a large open space for placement of the pews. After the church was sold, it was

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Illinois soybean farmers cannot catch a break ☐ Economic slump from coronavirus increases

doubt about China's ability to honor trade deal By BEN ORNER

bean farmers in Illinois cannot catch a break.

After a promising trade deal with China last month gave farmers hope amid an intense trade war, the deadly Wuhan coronavirus currently overwhelming China is also

damaging its economy. The country's economic slump is now sowing fears that China might not be able to buy all of the \$32 billion of U.S. agricultural goods it promised for 2020, including soybeans from Illinois,

America's top soybean-producing state. "This kind of big shock to their economy diminishes their demand for a lot of primary products" like soybeans, said Todd Hubbs,

of Illinois at Urbana-Cham-"There was a lot of skepticism on whether they can hit those targets," he said. "That

was before coronavirus."

China has confirmed more than 17,000 cases of coronavirus as of Feb. 3, including 361 deaths. The country has slowed imports and shut down much of its international trading infrastructure in order to focus on fighting the disease.

"You've got what looks like a pandemic, possibly, on top of an uncertain trade deal," Hubbs said. "It's just a lot of uncertainty.


In 2017, the last full year before America's trade war with China, soybeans accounted for more than half of U.S. agricultural exports to China. In 2018, soybean exports fell 75 percent as China bought from other countries in retaliation for U.S. tariffs imposed on Chinese exports.

With the signing of the first phase of the U.S.-China trade agreement last month, however, farmers finally saw light at the end of the tunnel,

the Cleveland, Singapore, and New World Symphony Orchestras among many others, are testament to the remarkable journey of an artist who continues to grow and enrich the lives of those who experience his talents.

Born in Mayaguez, Puerto Rico, Torres moved to New York City, where he pursued classical flute studies at Mannes School of Music, jazz at Berklee College of Music and classical and jazz at New England Conservatory of Music in Boston. During that time, he also learned to improvise in the

"Charanga" Cuban dance music style, which helped shape and develop his melodic and danceable sound.

His CD, "This Side Of Paradise" won the Latin Grammy in the Pop Instrumental category and was scheduled to be presented on Sept. 11, 2001. This great achievement - and its timing on 9/11 - proved to be a major turning point for Torres.

"Of course, it was a great honor and privilege to win the Grammy. That being said, the fact that I was to receive it on 9/11 gave my work and my music a stronger sense of mission and purpose," Torres said.



reconstructed and made into a two-story residence with 10-foot ceilings. "This gave us some answers we never had," Betty said.

When Mason was hired to paint their home, Betty said his vision was to give it a welcoming, warm and inviting feeling and she felt it was a job well done. But by taking the initiative to do some research, Mason also gave the couple an unexpected bonus. "Now our home has so much more meaning and we have an understanding of certain designs in our home – for that we will always be grateful," Betty said. "Our home has provided warmth, love and many memories over the years, and we are blessed to be part of the history."

More questions

Although Mason was able to answer some questions about the former Methodist Episcopal Church in Sublette, other questions remain unanswered.

The Methodist organization had been in Sublette Township for about 25 years meeting in various locations before they were finally able to build a church. So why did the church disband less than 10 years after the new building was dedicated?

Although the records Mason researched at the LCHS gave various details about the church and how it developed over the years, he found no answer to that question. In fact, the historical writings stated that, "The records of this group of Methodists are few and scattering and do not agree on date and places.'

A paraphrased version of the historical records Mason found follows.

Written history The first Methodist orga-

nization within the limits of Sublette Township was held at the house of Levi Camp at Knox Grove in about 1846. Early members included Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Pratt, Mr. and Mrs. John Skinner, Mr. and Mrs. Vertrees, Joseph. Mariam and Sarah Vertrees, Mrs. Levi Ellsworth, Mrs. Dr. Heath, Mrs. John Clink, Joseph Knox and his family, Mr. and Mrs. John Barnes, Albert Linn and his wife, Skinner Pratt and his wife and Mr. and Mrs. Wood. They were all living near Knox Grove and nearly all of them were the first members of the congregation. For quite a number of years, the church was supplied by circuit preachers with meetings held in private homes and at Knox Grove school In those days, roads and

transportation were very bad so there were many classes held throughout the area. The classes were not held too regularly but they were a place where families could go to study the gospel.

The classes also served another purpose. Many children learned to read and write at such classes because

there were no public schools. There were many different classes in the circuit – Knox Grove, LaMoille, Arlington, Mendota, Bellnafs, North Prairie East, North Prairie West, Winder, Elliotts and Ivanhoe. In August 1855, Knox Grove had 37 mem-

These groups worked together sharing expenses and preachers. The first church was built in LaMoille in 1852-53. The Mendota group was too small in the 1854-55 conference to erect a building and the community was too small to finance another church at that time. Both the Presbyterians and Baptists were trying to build churches at the time and a seminary building was to be built as well.

The last piece of history found concerning Knox Grove was from October 1855; the first record of the church being moved to Sublette was not until September 1857. At first, meetings were held at Sublette's new town hall, which was built in 1856. Rev. W.H. Smith was one of the first pastors at the hall. When the new school was built in Sublette in 1861, meetings were held at the

In April 1863, the pastor of the Baptist Church died so they had a church but no pastor; meanwhile, the Methodists had a pastor but no church. The two congregations agreed to begin meeting together at the Baptist Church with the Methodist minister, Rev. Lowe, preaching.

Over time, the Methodist church grew in numbers and in 1870, two lots were bought on the north side of Main Street (306 Main St.) in Sublette from Henry and Marianna Chapman for \$300. Construction of the church was started that summer and was completed in April 1871 at a cost of

The original structure had a center tower and bell. A wing on the west side had three rooms to use as classrooms and for socials. The main church was 26 feet from floor to ceiling and was furnished with circular pews that could seat up to 192. It was heated by a furnace in the basement.

There was an ornamental gallery with two folding doors opening into the lecture room to accommodate part of the congregation if needed. The altar piece was made of black walnut, and the other interior woodwork was oak. The church had stained glass windows, a 75-foot spire and

was lighted with kerosene lamps on the side walls. It was furnished with ingrain

carpets, upholstered chairs, an Esty Organ and a clock on the wall. The contractor was Wil-

liam Van Vliet of Mendota who was said to "show excellent taste in his workmanship, his gentlemanly manner and upright dealing.'

On Sunday morning, April 16, 1871, the church bell announced the opening of the new church. Rev. N.H. Axtell of Mendota offered a prayer at the morning services and Rev. J.M. Read of Chicago read the scripture. Dedication services were held in the afternoon and the Sunday evening sermon was preached by Rev. Axtell.

Unsolved mystery

No records have been found to know how large the membership was at the time the church was built or what happened to the congregation over the next decade. However, less than 10 years after the church was dedicated, the property was turned over to the Board of Extension of the Methodist Church of the State of Pennsylvania and the church disbanded. The building sat vacant for a few years before being sold to George Malach in the 1890s. The church's spire and bell were removed and the interior was remodeled to turn the church into a residence.

Unless additional information is unearthed some day, chances are the reasons behind the Methodists' decision to disband will always remain a secret.

despite tariffs remaining until phase two is negotiated.

Now, the coronavirus outbreak has China possibly looking to revise its buying promises, according to a Bloomberg News report. "Chinese officials are

hoping the U.S. will agree to some flexibility on pledges in their phase-one trade deal," the financial news agency reported Monday, citing unnamed sources. A clause in the trade

agreement says the two countries can consult revising the deal "in the event that a natural disaster or other unforeseeable event" threatens either country from complying.

"I do expect them to buy more than they have been under the trade war, which would be supportive of Illinois soybean growers,' Hubbs said. But he says it might not be until this fall that China begins "the real ramp-up in buying of soybeans" expected from the trade agreement.

Soybean exports to China are also recovering from an outbreak of African swine fever last year. Soybeans are a major food source for Chinese hogs, and the disease killed as many as half the country's hog population. Further threatening

American soybean prices is Brazil, the world's second-largest soybean producer and China's emergency trading partner during the trade war. Brazil expects a record year of soybean production for its 2019-2020 growing season, which the USDA says could allow the South American nation to overtake the U.S. as the world's top producer. "A reduced demand is

going to lower how much they're going to buy from us, on top of the Brazilian crop, so that pushes the price down," Hubbs said. Prices of soybean fu-

tures – contracts between buyers and sellers trading on international financial markets - stabilized Monday after declining for nine straight days. Soybean futures have actually declined about 7 percent on the Chicago Board of Trade since the trade agreement was signed on Jan. 15.

As for the trade war that will enter its third year this spring, the U.S. Department of Agriculture said that farmers should expect to receive their third federal aid payment by the end of this week.

Good news on tuition at IVCC

OGLESBY - High school students in certain Illinois Valley Community College dual credit courses may pay as little as \$30 per class next fall, the board's audit finance committee learned Jan. 28. IVCC's administration

is recommending the \$30 fee for courses taught at high schools by qualified high school instructors. In addition, the administration will recommend

rolled in any IVCC online course pay just 75 percent of the tuition rate or about \$95 per credit hour. Courses taught at high schools by IVCC instructors will maintain the 75 percent tuition rate and

and Reduced Lunch will continue to pay just the \$5 registration fee. IVCC offers dual credit at 17 of its 21 district high schools and about 10 percent of its enrollment is

generated by dual credit.

For the second straight year, the administration is recommending no tuition increase. At its 6:30 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 13 meeting, the full board will consider a plan to freeze for a third consecutive year the combined tuition and universal fee at \$133 per credit hour for 2020-21.

The figure places IVCC favorably among 10 other colleges in its "super peer group": Black Hawk, Heartland, Highland, Kankakee, Kishwaukee, Lake Land, Lewis & Clark, John A. Logan, Richland and Sauk Valley. Average 2020 tuition and fees for the group is \$136 per credit hour while the state average for all 39 community colleges is \$147.

In other action, audit finance learned the college will propose changes to 77 course fees: 60 increases, 11 new courses, one decrease, plus the assignment of a course fee to five existing Audit finance also re-

viewed the proposed budget for 42 active student organizations. The proposed allocation is \$102,914, down from \$129,689 in 2017-18 and \$112,604 in 2018-19. IVCC Vice President

for Business Services and Finance Cheryl Roelfsema presented a three-year financial plan that forecasts level state funding and 2.5 percent annual increases in property taxes based on increased EAV.

Be wary of legislative tricks

Gov. J.B. Pritzker's progressive income tax proposal to hike taxes by \$3 billion a year was barely mentioned in his State of the State address, but voters can expect a full-court press from Democrats in the lead up to the November election.

The governor and the Democrat-controlled General Assembly have made the progressive income tax the linchpin for their spending plans going forward. The proposed constitutional amendment would scrap the state's existing flat income tax and allow lawmakers to create a graduated income tax system with higher rates for higher earners.

The initial tax rates lawmakers have set for the proposed graduated tax system would deliver slight tax cuts to most taxpayers. However, those who earn more than \$250,000 a year would see significant tax increases.

More worrisome is that state lawmakers would have the ability to change the tax rates and income brackets with a simple majority at any time. That's a lot of power for lawmakers who have shown time and time again that the only thing they know how to do is spend money. It's only a matter of time before middle-class families will be forced to pay more in taxes to cover the bill for the state's reckless spending.

Right now, the only thing standing in the way is the state's constitution, which mandates a flat income tax levied on everyone, regardless of income. In November, voters will be asked to decide whether to change the state's constitution. And the bar for that is high. To pass, the amendment would need 60 percent of the votes on the measure itself or a simple majority of all of those voting in the election.

Given the higher hurdle, expect Democrats to resort to any means necessary to try to persuade voters to give up the protection afforded by the flat tax in favor of a blank check for state lawmakers.

Pritzker has already shown that he's willing to cross the line. In November, Pritzker used a taxpayer-funded Governor's Office of Management and Budget report to tout the need for a progressive income tax. The report outlined the new revenue that a progressive income tax plan would bring in, used Pritzker's "Fair Tax" verbiage, and claimed the state's fiscal future was dependent on the passage of the amendment.

In the coming months, wary taxpayers should be on guard for legislative tricks of every stripe.

Ten years ago, on February 2, 1987, the Mendota City Council approved purchase of two parcels of land, abandoned by the Illinois Central Gulf Railroad. A six-acre parcel extending from Division Street south to the sewer plant had a price tag of \$5,000. It was comprised of the east 50 feet of the former railroad right-of-way. The west 50 feet would be the property of Vade Wehmeyer. By including the six-acres acquisition in a TIF District, funds would be generated to pay for needed improvements to the sewer system.

A 12-acre parcel lying north of Meriden Street, between East Main and West Main streets, was purchased for \$27,000, less than 10 cents per square foot. A number of uses for this land were considered, among them creation of a park for walking or bicycle paths. Some of the land would be used for construction work at the intersection of I-251 and U.S. 52

Conflicting opinions on allowing the Illinois Rivers Skiers Club to use Lake Mendota for practice during a six-week period in May and June were aired at a council meeting.

The Sportsmen's Club presented a petition with 280 signatures, opposing the permission. They contended that the Sportsmen had spent thousands of dollars for fish each year and even local people were not allowed to put boats in Lake Mendota. Spawning would be seriously disrupted.

The Skiers withdrew their request.

The Northern Illinois Industrial Development Corp. was reorganized with two Mendotans on its 24-member board of directors - Harry D. Conkey II and J. Leonard Schaller.

Dwight Heckert was named to head fundraising for pool renovation.

Trump removal would be insane

It's easy to forget what the Senate impeachment trial is supposed to be about.

It's not a fight over whether the Senate will call a couple of witnesses that the House couldn't, or didn't bother to, obtain on its own.

The underlying question is whether the United States Senate will impose the most severe sanction it has ever inflicted on any chief executive, voting to remove a president for the first time in the history of the country and doing it about 10 months from his

This is a truly radical step that, if it ever came about, would do more damage to the legitimacy of our political system than President Donald Trump's under-

If Trump were actually convicted, the 2020 election would proceed under a cloud of illegitimacy. Tens of millions of Trump voters wouldn't accept the result. They'd see it as an inside job to deny the incumbent president a chance to run for reelection, without a single voter having a direct say. The GOP would be brought to its knees by internal bloodletting, a prospect that Democrats surely would welcome, especially given that it would deliver them the presidency. Republicans would be out for revenge, and instead of a halcyon return to normalcy, our politics would be even more poisonous than before.

Democrats argue that Trump can't stay in office because he's such a threat to the integrity of our elections. But the portrayal of Trump's Ukraine scheme as "election interference," as the Democrats always say, is tendentious and inapt. If the Ukrainians had complied with the Trump team's pressure to announce an investigation of the energy company Burisma, it

wouldn't have changed one vote in 2020, even if former Vice President Joe Biden eventually is the Demo-

The fact is that impeachment, as my colleague Ramesh Ponnuru points out, is a weak check on the presidency. It requires a supermajority of the country to remove a president and one of the political parties being willing to nullify the choice of its own voters for president and an election he won. Both the Trump and Clinton impeachments show that this is a hateful prospect for the president's party.

The best case for what the Democrats are doing now is that Republicans impeached Clinton in the 1990s with little or no hope for conviction in the Senate, and turnabout is fair play. But it's time to conclude that this is a failed model of impeachment. It depends on a process that diverts the time and energy of the nation's political institutions as if the survival of a presidency is at stake, even when everyone knows

Congress can hold hearings on a president's conduct, subpoena witnesses and documents and fight the executive with full force if they aren't produced, hold officials in contempt, withhold funding, deny the executive traditional forms of interbranch comity and, if it wants to put down a long-lasting marker, censure

But it needn't drag the country through a melodrama based on the fiction that any president who hasn't crashed to, say, a 25% approval rating is going to be removed by his own party -- in other words, exactly what Adam Schiff and his managers are doing now. 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



Lady Trojans chalk up two more wins

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

Couch Theater

(Movies reviewed in this week's column have just been released on video and DVD.) "Parasite" (R) -- South

Korea's sleeper hit is a black comedy that effortlessly tackles social aspirations and class conflict. The Kim family lives in a squalid basement, with no prospects and no resources. Son Ki-woo, egged on by a college-bound peer, fakes some credentials and takes a job as a tutor to the daughter of the filthy rich Parks family. Buoyed by the lavish lifestyle, Ki-woo plots to secure jobs for all of his family members so that they can live the good life by association. Getting there was only part of the battle, though. The ends inevitably begin to unravel, with macabre consequences. Written and directed by acclaimed director Bong Joon Ho.

"Harriet" (PG-13) -- From self-liberation to American human-rights icon, Harriet Tubman (Cynthia Erivo) takes center stage in a stirring and inspirational biopic. When her husband, a freeman, attempts to secure her release, the farm's owner refuses. Tubman is labeled a troublemaker and sent to be sold, but escapes, making the arduous trek to Pennsylvania and winning her freedom. But it's not enough, so she returns for her family again and again, bringing home many slaves in the process. The supporting cast includes Janelle Monae as a savvy boarding-house manager and Leslie Odom Jr. as abolitionist William Still.

"Terminator: Dark Fate" (PG-13) -- James Cameron returns to the helm of the latest "Terminator" offering, which pits a newer, even more dangerous terminator sent back in time to kill a young woman, Dani (Natalia Reyes), who unbeknownst to her, will play a pivotal future role in the war between technology and humanity. Fortunately, along with the new Rev-9 terminator (Gabriel Luna), a cybergenetically enhanced

backup in some familiar faces: Sarah Conner (Linda Hamilton) and a grizzled but domesticated T-800 (Arnold Schwarzenegger).

"Motherless Brooklyn"

(R) -- Lionel Essrog (Ed Norton) is a detective, afflicted by Tourette syndrome and singularly focused after witnessing the killing of his mentor, Frank Minna (Bruce Willis). Although impaired by his disease, he also is shaped by it. His investigation drives him to chase a deadly secret across a highly stylized New York City, from the gritty underbelly to a Harlem club and into the lion's den of political intrigue. Based on the novel by Jonathon Letham, it's written and directed by Norton, who took the contemporary story and gave it a 1950s noir feel. You can't ask for better talent --Willis and Norton, along with Alec Baldwin, Willem Dafoe, Bobby Cannavale and others -- but it's a commitment at 144 minutes, all of which require your strict attention.

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
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
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But God had a plan, and He's brought it to pass over the last 40-plus years as I've learned to walk by faith that He would do what He said He would do.

Yet he did not waver through unbelief regarding the promise of God, but was fully strengthened in his faith and gave glory to God, being fully persuaded that God had power to do



what he had promised."

Abraham faced the facts of his circumstances—he was impotent and Sarah was barren—but he did not waver in his faith in God. Instead, he "was fully strengthened in his faith and gave glory to God."

To defeat doubt and unbelief, we need to face our circumstances but not focus on them. When doubt is coming against us, we need to praise God and remember who He is and the other victories He's given us in our lives.

Make It Practical

You can do this is by talking about God's goodness and the things He's done for you, not just your problems. Set vour mind and keep it set to walk by faith, trusting that God has something good in store for you. Don't try to figure everything out or do something about a situation you can't do anything about. Do what you know to do and believe that God will take care of the rest.

- 1 Peter 5:7 "Cast all your anxiety on him because he cares for you" (NIV).

I want to encourage you to trust God's love for you. Keep standing in faith for His will to be done and keep pressing on, one day at a time, doing what He's showing you to do. Put your hope in Him to do something good in your life and confidently expect it, because with God on

your side, all things are possible!

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

Fewer than half of 1 percent of students who take the ACT earn a top score. In the U.S. high school graduating class of 2019, only 4,879 out of nearly 1.8 million students who took the ACT earned a top composite score of 36.

The ACT tests in English, math, reading and science, each scored from 1-36.

The composite score is the average of the four test scores. The ACT's optional writing test is reported separately and is not included in the composite score.

In a letter to the student recognizing this exceptional achievement, ACT CEO Marten Roorda stated, "Your achievement on the ACT is significant and rare. Your exceptional scores will provide any college or university with ample evidence of your readiness for the academic rigors that lie ahead."

Students who earn a 36 composite score have likely mastered all of the skills and knowledge they will need to succeed in first-year college courses in the core subject areas.
