State Senate bill would outlaw live animal prizes at carnivals

SPRINGFIELD - It is a mainstay of fairs and carnivals around the country: sink a ping pong ball into a fish bowl and win the goldfish swimming inside.

But if a bill in the Illinois Senate becomes law. carnivals would no longer be allowed to award live animals - such as fish, reptiles and hermit crabs – as prizes.

Illinois' Humane Care for Animals Act already prohibits rabbits, ducklings and baby chicks as carnival prizes, but Senate Bill 2472 would expand the law's protections to all animals including the goldfish that winners can take home in a plastic bag.

Sen. Suzy Glowiak Hilton, a Democrat from Western Springs, introduced the bill with backing from the Humane Society of the United States.

"This isn't just a 'goldfish bill," she said. "Carnivals across the country give out other animals as prizes, specifically iguanas and other exotic reptiles."

Glowiak Hilton said these reptiles can grow up to six feet long and become a burden to people who did not consider the specialized care the animals need.

"Many are simply abandoned and wreak havoc on our natural wildlife, or are turned into local animal control centers, which are not equipped to handle them,"

Her county, Cook, is one of at least four municipalities in Illinois that have banned live animals being used as prizes. The other three are Kane County, McHenry County and the city of St. Charles.

Illinois would join Iowa, Massachusetts, South Carolina and Vermont as states that outlaw all live animals as prizes, according to Fish Feel, an advocacy organization for the humane treatment of fish.

Glowiak Hilton's bill applies only to carnivals. She plans to add an amendment to expand it to fairs.

Ken Tyrrell, president of the Illinois Association of Agricultural Fairs, says SB 2472 could affect the \$170 million the Illinois fair industry contributes yearly to the state economy.

"That's how these people make their money," said Tyrrell, whose organization represents Illinois' 104 county fairs, its two state fairs and hundreds of vendors. "It affects the people that

bring those games to fairs and it affects the fairs if they don't have that," he said.

Rollo church among Illinois sites added to National Register of Historic Places

☐ Church built in 1913 described as having elements of the Romanesque Revival style

SPRINGFIELD-Thanks to the efforts of historic preservation advocates in Illinois, 12 sites in the state were added to the National Register of Historic Places during 2019, the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) announced recently.

The places recognized are located throughout the state and include a replica of the Leaning Tower of Pisa, a stone wine cellar, and three historic districts that, when combined, include more than 60 significant properties.

Among the sites added to the National Register of Historic Places is the Rollo Congregational United Church of Christ north of Earlville in DeKalb County,

listed Aug. 27, 2019. The Rollo Congregational United Church of Christ is a good example of a side steeple vernacular church with elements of the Romanesque Revival style. Completed in 1913, the church was designed by a small group of church members. The church was constructed with volunteer labor, which was supervised by an experienced local builder hired for the project. Presently, the church remains in excellent condition with no new additions and most of the work completed in the building having only been done for maintenance purposes.

Historic places are added to the National Register by the National Park Service based on recommendations from the State Historic Preservation Office, a division of the IDNR.

Each of these places tells a unique story that is a part of the rich fabric of Illinois history," said IDNR Director Colleen Callahan.

local preservationists to obtain national recognition for these historic buildings and neighborhoods.'

The National Register of Historic Places is the official list of properties that merit special attention and preservation. Every Illinois county has at least one property or historic district listed in the National Register. Together, they represent a cross section of the Prairie State's history from its early settlement to the mid-20th century.

In general, properties must be more than 50 years old to be eligible for the National Register. A listing places no obligations on

private property owners but does make properties eligible for some financial incentives.

Voices from the Prairie & Princeton Library to co-host programs on U.S. Constitution

PRINCETON - A series of four evening programs titled "The U.S. Constitution: Why it Matters" has been scheduled at the Princeton Public Library. The sessions will take place at 6:30 p.m. on Wednesdays, Feb. 19 and 26, and Thursdays, March 5 and 12.

The first program of the series will feature Amanda Cook Fesperman, professor of political science and history at Illinois Valley Community College, speaking on "What Were the Founders Thinking?"

"The United States Constitution is often treated like a sacred document that should be literally interpreted and rarely amended. However, it emerged as a compromise among competing interests and since 1787, has been amended 27 times," Cook Fesperman said. Addressed in the program will be the con-

tentious debate over slavery that took place at the Constitutional Convention. Cook Fesperman will also discuss how other debates among the founders continue to haunt us. This includes how much power the president should have and whether the very small and very large states in population should still get equal representation in the senate.

Cook Fesperman has taught at IVCC for the past 20 years and is also chair of the IVCC Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Committee and is the coordinator for International and Multicultural Education and Study Abroad. Her academic interests lie largely in the study of women and minority groups in American and African history and in contemporary American and African politics.

Free copies of the Constitution and resource lists will be provided to participants.

The second will be presented by Matt Schafer, assistant general counsel, litigation at ViacomCBS, New York. Schafer is a graduate of Princeton High School.

All four programs will be offered with support from the Interactivity Foundation, a non-partisan, tax-exempt organization that promotes civic education and small group discussions of current issues. Shaw Media,



publishers of the Bureau County Republican, Ottawa Times and News Tribune newspapers, is collaborating along with WNIJ of Northern

Students and adults of all ages and political perspectives are invited to participate in the free sessions.

Stephanie VanOrdstrand of Voices from the Prairie said the series begins by addressing the history and writing of the original document and the Bill of Rights. It continues, with audience engagement, by looking into the impact of the Constitution and later amendments on everyday life and current affairs.

"In this election year, it's more important than ever for us all to have a more thorough understanding of not only the key legal foundations, but the historical, social and moral issues that brought us to where we are today,' VanOrdstrand said.

The project will include presentations and group discussions, a trivia night, and other learning activities as well as media outreach to schools and community groups.





State releasing broadband expansion funding

SPRINGFIELD - The

state is accepting applications for the first \$50 million in disbursements of a \$420 million grant program aimed at increasing internet access across the state.

Gov. JB Pritzker announced the release of funding recently at Ridgely Elementary School in Springfield, noting that the rights to "health care and education and economic opportunity" are all "tied to digital connectivity" in the 21st century.

"I want to be clear though," he said, "this isn't about a person's ability to go online and just look at their Facebook page. This is about a small business owner having the tools that she needs to reach new customers. This is about an elderly couple's ability to get access to medical experts anywhere in the nation, even if they live in a rural community. This is about giving children like the ones that are here today the ability to research their homework assignments online."

The program, known as Connect Illinois, is part of the \$45 billion capital infrastructure plan that the General

Assembly passed last year. Applications for the first \$50 million can be submitted through Friday, April 3. Applicants can receive up to \$5 million per project as part of the first round of funding, but they must provide at least 50

percent of the project's funding. Matt Schmit, head of the office of broadband within the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity, said he expects applicants to include internet service providers, rural broadband cooperatives and possibly communities looking to invest in broadband.

"We'll have an inclusive process when it comes to applicants," he said. "The point is that you've got to have a strong track record of demonstrating that you can do this kind of work. And so we're going to be very diligent in making sure that any applicant that the state partners with is up to this work, and that we're making sound investments for the long haul."

He said he also expects to see community and provider partnerships in some circum-

"And we want to hear ideas, we want to hear from you," Schmit said. "Because this is not a state-driven approach. This is a partnership between our providers, our communities and folks who are interested in getting a better connectivity future for our communities around the state.

Schmit said the \$420 million accounts for "the nation's largest competitive matching grant program" for broadband expansion. He said \$20 million of that funding will go to maintenance of the Illinois Century Network, which is the high-speed state

system that serves educational, research, governmental and health care organizations across the state. "A year ago, our adminis-

tration made a daring promise to prioritize not just with our words, but with action to bridge the digital divide that hinders so many rural and urban communities," Lt. Gov. Juliana Stratton said at the news conference. She chairs the governor's

Rural Affairs Council, and said she has met with rural and agricultural leaders who relayed that a "primary need" was expanding broadband.

"About 10 percent of the population is underserved when it comes to broadband access, and those communities are overwhelmingly people of color or those living in remote parts of our state," she said.

Pritzker likened the need for broadband in rural communities to a period when rural communities lagged behind on electricity. He also noted several neighborhoods in Chicago lack reliable internet access.

Tyrell also says the bill erases the nostalgia of taking home a small pet from the local carnival.

"I've been in the fair business all my life, and people have a tendency to go back and play the same games every year," he said. "If your small children look forward to going and playing the game where you have the possibility of winning a goldfish, they're going to be very disappointed."

Glowiak Hilton included a workaround in her bill, though. Carnivals can offer a coupon or voucher to winners so they can buy the animal from a licensed pet store.

"(SB 2472) will allow prize winners to go into a pet shop and fully understand the animal that they are going to

be caring for," she said. 'As far as nostalgia, this bill will create an even better experience for kids who win the coupons," she added. "They will be able to go to a pet store with their parents and pick out exactly which animal they want."

Tyrrell, however, saidteaming up with pet stores is unrealistic for carnival workers who are constantly on the road.

'Carnival people travel all over the state and all over the country," he said. "They don't have those local associations to do that. That would be very difficult, time-consuming and expensive."

SB 2472 was assigned to the Senate agriculture committee. If it passes committee, the bill will go to the full Senate for a vote.

Rubbing Lincoln's nose

SPRINGFIELD – It doesn't seem like a decade has passed since my then 4-year-old daughter, Grace, announced that her luck had run out – and something needed to be done.

"Daddy, I rubbed Mr. Lincoln's nose for good luck two weeks ago but now my luck is all gone. We need to go to Mr. Lincoln's tomb right away," she told me with more than a bit of desperation in her voice.

With Lincoln's birthday approaching, I got to thinking about that long-ago trip to Springfield's shrine to Illinois' martyred saint. Going to the tomb and rubbing the nose of the Abra-

ham Lincoln statue for luck is one of the more unusual of Illinois' customs.

Sightseers in the state capital notice that the nose

of Lincoln is shiny from visitors' touches. In fact, it's touched so often that a metalsmith periodically is dispatched to fix the nose when a hole is rubbed through. The statue was created by Gutzon Borglum, the

The statue was created by Gutzon Borglum, the sculptor who also shaped Mt. Rushmore.

When you are born in Illinois on Lincoln's Birthday, February 12, as I was, you quickly become immersed in Lincoln lore.

When I was a kid, I read every Lincoln biography in the school library, had a picture of Honest Abe that I'd cut out of the Farm Journal thumb tacked to my bedroom bulletin board and could rattle off Lincoln trivia the way other boys can recite baseball statistics.

When I was 8, I wanted to go to Gettysburg – not Disney World.

Other states have nicknamed themselves after their crops, heritage or natural attributes.

Illinois, on the other hand, is the only one that has chosen a person as a symbol of state identity – thanks to state Sen. Fred Hart of Streator, who in 1955 sponsored legislation designating the state as the "Land of Lincoln."

Illinois is a wonderful place to live but it lacks a strong sense of identity. Lincoln seems to be the stitch in the fabric that holds the state together. School children are taught at an early age to revere Lincoln. My second-grade teacher told my class how he walked five miles to return 6 cents to a friend, and that is how he came to be known as "Honest Abe."

Being a cynical journalist, I'm more than a bit skeptical of such tales. But there is no denying that myths are part of what unites a state.

When my daughter Grace asked to be taken to Lincoln's Tomb on a chilly Sunday a decade ago, I wasn't exactly thrilled. That tomb just plain creeps me out.

Maybe it's not an idol. But it's certainly a graven

image many in the Prairie State revere.

Folks travel to the tomb to lay Lincoln pennies on

the headstone of the original burial place of the Great Emancipator.

Despite my misgivings, my daughter continued to

pester me to take her to see Mr. Lincoln's tomb.

So, we drove to Oak Ridge Cemetery, which is just a few minutes from our house. Grace scampered to that statue and said, "Lift me up, Daddy. Lift me."

After she gave Lincoln's nose a vigorous rub, she hit me up for three pennies.

She left one at the tomb – and kept two for herself. Maybe the nose rubbers weren't the most gullible to visit the cemetery that day.

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When the banks closed – 1932

Backtracks

(The following is from Jessica Nashold's Backtracks & Sidetracks column reprinted from Feb. 13, 2002.)

Reporter readers of a certain age, living anywhere in the United States in 1933, can easily recall the time President Franklin Delano Roosevelt ordered banks to close. For Mendotans, this was not a new experience. As early as January 14, 1932, the Farmers & Merchants State Bank in Mendota had closed its doors to protect funds on deposit there.

On January 23, 1932, Mayor John U.

Rutishauser issued a proclamation declaring a six-day moratorium on banking in Mendota. (Sunday, January 24 was not counted.) The Mendota Reporter issued a rare Extra Edition on January 23 to spread the news.

Although the First National and Mendota National banks were not in financial difficulty, Mayor Rutishauser and his advisers agreed –

No bank can stand heavy with-drawals.

Before the six-day moratorium had expired, plans were already being discussed to open a new bank to operate until the old established banks reopened. The temporary bank would then dissolve.

Meantime, school, church and other

funds were tied up in the closed banks. Teachers were paid in warrants. A grade school operetta, "Tulip Time," was presented in February. Director Harlan Peithman announced there would be no admission charge.

On February 11, The Reporter

learned that a Rockford man, who had been negotiating to buy a 51 percent interest in the proposed interim bank, had withdrawn his offer. His Rockford bank had closed February 10.

Also on February 11, it was reported that Federal bank examiners were in town to get information needed in order to reopen the closed banks. A week later, on February 18, 1932, it was announced that a receiver had been appointed by the Federal Government for the two national banks in Mendota. Urban Tracey of McPherson, Kan., was named receiver for both the First National and National banks. The State Banking Commission appointed Vincent Reem of Peru as receiver for the Farmers & Merchants State Bank. It would take \$150,000 to open the Farmers & Merchants, which

had not yet given up hope.

In this same February 18 issue, it was noted that 47 individuals had agreed to purchase stock in a new bank. A week later, on February 25, 97 shares had been spoken for.

On March 5, 1932, County Treasurer

J. Ward Smith informed County Judge B. Harry Reck that he was sure Mendota would have a bank. He planned to present a resolution to the LaSalle County Board of Supervisors, asking that the Mendota bank be named as a depository for tax money received. Earl Lewis and Arthur Landgraf,

formerly with Farmers & Merchants, opened an insurance office on the second floor of the F & M bank building, behind the dental office of Dr. B.N. Hughes.

On March 9, there was a mass meet-

on March 9, there was a mass meeting at the Elks to discuss further steps needed in order to open a new bank. At the start of the meeting, 77 shares needed to be purchased.

At the close, new stock was oversubscribed.

The March 17 issue of The Reporter indicated that the Continental Illinois Bank & Trust of Chicago had been selected as the mandatory corresponding bank. The news on March 31 was that all 500 shares in the new National Bank of Mendota had been paid for and the required sum of \$65,000 sent to "the Chicago bank."

Acharter will come in a few days. The April 7 issue confirmed that

the National Bank of Mendota would open on Saturday, April 9 in the former Mendota National Bank building, northwest corner of Washington Street and Illinois Avenue.

On opening day, deposits totaled \$76,500. First to open a savings account was Paul Engelbrecht. First to open a "regular account" was C.A. Harbaugh.

The officers were: D.L. Barnett, president; Joseph L. Zolper, vice president; C. Walter Jacob, cashier; F.J. Reichardt, assistant cashier.

Meantime receivers for the two national banks were representing the

interests of deposition in these two institutions. On September 8, 1932, checks were forwarded to Washington, D.C., for the signature of the Controller of Currency. On September 20, the checks were ready for distribution here – a 50 percent allocation to Mendota National depositors, 45 percent to First National depositors.

Farmers & Merchants State Bank depositors met with a State Bank Examiner to continue exploring the possibility of reopening.

It was believed that if depositors left 50 percent of their deposits in the bank and limited withdrawals to 5 percent each month, the bank could continue. Instead, depositors elected to receive a percentage of what they had in the bank when it closed.

Even while banks were closed, construction of the new post office continued.

Acleaning and pressing shop opened

with Don King in charge. • National Teabought the Erbes Grocery on Illinois Avenue and moved there from Washington Street. Erbes retained his meat market at the same location. • Ed Wixom opened an ice cream parlor on Washington Street in the building vacated by National Tea. • A cheese factory decided to locate in Mendota. • St. John's Lutheran Church went forward with plans for a parish house. • Alger leased the Strand Theatre building from Degenhardt and later opened the State Theatre there.

Moving fast forward to March 1933, Roosevelt's order closing all national banks affected the National Bank as well. Under this order, the bank could make a change and allow access to safety deposit boxes. In addition, the National Bank of Mendota accommodated the public insofar as possible, by accepting money "off the books" and keeping it available on demand as a "convenience."

In the Mayoral Proclamation of January 23, 1932, all business activity was suspended from January 23 through January 30 except those businesses dealing with "the necessaries of life." Groceries, meats, drugs, coal, gasoline and the public utilities.

All others will desist from gainful occupation.

The end of 2016

And so 2016 finally draws to a close.

It's been the longest election year in

It's been the longest election year in American history. It ran from Feb. 1, 2016, the date of the Iowa caucuses, to the Senate vote to acquit President Donald Trump in early February 2020.

It's true that Nov. 6, 2016, was a signal event in this long election year, but it didn't really conclude anything, even though the result wasn't in doubt. Usually, contested elections are ties or near-ties. This is the first time an election has gone into overtime, with repeated attempts at what were in effect recounts, despite the winner comfortably prevailing (Donald Trump won handily in electoral votes, the measure that determines the outcome, 304-227).

Immediately Democrats concluded that they'd been

robbed, and Hillary Clinton did indeed get some bad breaks during the campaign, most consequently at the hands of then-FBI director James Comey. Such is life in the arena. But no one on the left was in a mood to move on.

Rather taking stock and recalibrating as warranted,

Rather taking stock and recalibrating as warranted, Democrats remained fixated on 2016. Rather than simply mobilizing opposition to Trump's agenda and reelection, as any opposition always does, they mused about how to reverse the 2016 result. Rather than acknowledging the near-impossibility of removing a duly elected president, they indulged in fantasies about how to do exactly that.

Above all, they obsessed about Russia as the cause of their undoing in 2016. With enough investigation, all would be made plain, the Trump-Russia conspiracy would be unraveled, the walls would close in, and the world would be restored to its axis. The rightful winner of 2016 wouldn't take office, but the wrongful winner would be vanquished. What voters

in Michigan, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin failed to do, the grinding machinery of investigation would achieve.

When the Mueller probe didn't produce the impeachment that the Democrats had expected with such fervent certainty, it seemed briefly they'd finally have to accept the outcome of 2016, however grudgingly. Then, Ukraine emerged, and impeachment was, thankfully and gloriously, back on.

Russia was a proximate cause of the impeachment over

Ukraine. The Democrats charged that Trump sought Ukrainian interference in our elections, just as he had sought Russian interference (for all their interest in the Mueller investigation, Democrats have never absorbed its conclusion that there is no evidence that Trump colluded with the Russians). Absent their conviction that Trump is an illegitimate president, Democrats would have been, understandably, outraged by Ukraine and determined to investigate it, but they wouldn't have impeached over it.

In this sense, the Senate trial is the last act in the 2016 election. It establishes, once and for all, that he won't leave office prior to the end of his first term. It makes it clear that another election, not some other mechanism, will be necessary to remove him. It represents the final failure of the investigatory apparatus around Trump's alleged Russia collusion to deliver Democrats from the consequences of their 2016 defeat.

Trump, obviously, isn't blameless in any of this. But he is not a Russian agent. He won the presidency in a free and fair election, and despite his attempted removal, will have a chance to do so again. On to 2020.

Once upon a time in Hollywood there were five major studios: Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer (MGM), Warner Brothers, Columbia, Paramount and 20th Century Fox. Between them they created the majority of the greatest films made from the 1935 through the 1960s (when the studio system began to decline due to the success of television). MGM claimed they had "More stars than in the heavens." Warner Bros. had Bette Davis, Olivia De Havilland, Humphrey Bogart and Lauren Bacall. Columbia made "It Happened One Night," "From Here to Eternity" and "On the Waterfront." Paramount had Dean Martin and Jerry Lewis, and the "Road" pictures with Bob Hope and Bing Crosby. Fox gave us Marilyn Monroe, "All About Eve," "Butch Cassidy and the Sundance

Kid," "M*A*S*H," "The King and I," "The Sound of Music" and the "Star Wars"

When the crash came, MGM sold its backlot to condo builders. Sony acquired Columbia, then bought what was left of the MGM lot and moved Columbia there. Warners and Paramount had no backlots but retained their studios, while 20th Century Fox sold its backlot, which became Century City.

Now Disney has acquired 20th Century Fox and stripped it of the Fox name, calling it 20th Century Studios. When I moved to Hollywood, in 1967, I was able to explore and wander around the still-great studios, then more into TV production, such as "Voyage to the Bottom of the Sea" at Fox. and "Dr. Kildare" at MGM. I was in heaven. The five major studios paved the way for the new wave of movie-making today, operated by five streaming services: Netflix, Disney+, Amazon Prime, Hulu and Apple. Time marches on ... either love it or don't stream it!

hether your feline friend is curled up next to you on the couch or lives outdoors, cats have a way of making their way into our hearts one way or another.

When Dr. Elizabeth Jeter is not lecturing in the Texas A&M College of Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences' Department of Veterinary Pathobiology, she can be found bringing fourth-year veterinary students to care for the animals at the Aggieland Humane Society, including those in the Barn Cat program.

While some cats do prefer living outside, Jeter said all cats are considered domestic but there are some differences that set these felines apart from others. One of those differences is that barn cats serve a specific purpose.

"Most people seek out barn cats for the main purpose of having a form of organic pest control," Jeter said. "They help control mice and rat populations, which is especially important in barns due to diseases that can be transmitted to livestock.'

Jeter says outdoor cats can have a wide range of personalities - they can be very social and friendly or they can be feral, meaning they do not associate with humans and may even avoid human contact altogether. "Each cat is as unique as a person," she noted. Because of this, the level of inter-

action between barn cats and humans will depend on the cat as well as the human. "Some cats become a household icon, greeting everyone who comes to the barn, while others are rarely seen," Jeter said. "Both cats are still working

cats - they just have different attitudes."

Barn cats have the same basic needs as other pets, but Jeter says it is important for owners to acknowledge that caring for barn cats looks a little different.

'Special care needs to be taken with these cats, since they do not obey the same rules as friendly or indoor cats and are often treated more as wildlife," she said. "An example of this special care may be working with veterinarians who understand how to handle feral cats, since they cannot be caught and handled like friendly or indoor cats and may need to be trapped in humane live traps."

When owners bring a new barn cat home, they should be placed in a secure location, such as a tack room or an indoor enclosure, where they cannot escape for the first three to four weeks.

"This allows them to acclimate to their new environment and familiarize themselves with where they will be fed," Jeter said.

As with any other pet, it is important

to provide outdoor cats with protective medical care, including vaccinations and spaying/neutering. Jeter explained that long-term medical care is necessary, especially since barn cats are exposed to hazards such as wildlife more than the standard house pet.

"It is most ideal to spay or neuter barn cats so they are not reproducing or displaying nuisance behavior, such as fighting or yowling. Spaying or neutering will also help them to do their job more effectively and make them more likely to stick around," Jeter said. "Sometimes the barn cat life chooses you, and other times there may already be outdoor cats established in your area. It's important for prospective owners to be willing and able to provide care for their outdoor companions to help them live their best lives."

Sublette board approves new billing software, passes resolution to ban cannabis sales within the village

SUBLETTE — The Village of Sublette approved a motion to change to a new billing software for its water bills.

The board met during its regular monthly meeting on Feb. 10 at the Ellice Dinges Center. All board members were present.

In January, Acting Village Mayor John Stenzel introduced the board to UBMax, an online utility management software, for water bills. He said with this software residents could look up their bills, review their history and pay their bills online.

At Monday night's meeting, Stenzel reviewed the costs of the software with the board. He said the total cost for the first year would be \$1,425, which would include a \$865 one-time fee and a \$50 conversion to the new software fee. After the first year, Stenzel said the cost to the village would be \$510 annually. He said the current software the village is using costs them \$758. Stenzel said his goal is to have it up and running by the next fiscal year. He added that if the conversion from the old software wouldn't take a long time, saving if they started using the software on a Friday, everything would be transferred over to the new software by Monday. He said that customers opting for having bills emailed would save the village postage and envelopes expenses.

Sublette Village Board member Julie Kessel made a motion to approve the switch to the UBMax software with Sublette Village Board member Scott Hanson seconding the motion. The motion was approved 6-0.

In other board news:

 Based on the consensus from the board at Monday's meeting, Stenzel will have the village attorney draft a resolution to be voted on in March, stating that the village will not allow the sale of cannabis in the village.

- · Don Dinges reported that work on the upcoming Sublette Toy Show is going well. The dates of the show this year are March 14 and 15. He said they are working on the details of the dinner during the toy show. Tickets are \$20 each. For the toy show, Dinges said they are not doing a silent auction this year, so instead he has been approaching businesses about being corporate
- Dinges also reported that the Sublette Business Association is looking to host an event in June welcoming back the campers. He said it's about the 60th year of the first campground in the area. He said the first campground was Pleasure Acres, which is now Mendota Hills Campground.
- The board approved the purchase of a chlorine bulk tank and containment tank for \$330 from Hawkins. The board also approved the purchase of a pallet fork safety platform for the tractor in the amount of \$200 from Jayson Stamberger. Finally, the board approved the purchase of two 12-foot stainless steel sheets cut and bent for the maintenance building benches at a cost of \$150 from American Machine.
- The board is looking at moving its July meeting from July 13, due to Grace Fellowship Church using the Ellice Dinges Center for its vacation bible school. No new date for the July meeting was set.

During the 2019-20 deer seasons, hunters took 45 percent does and 55 percent males.

Archery: Archery deer hunters in Illinois took a preliminary total of 67,696 deer during the season which began Oct. 1, 2019 and concluded Jan. 19, 2020. That compares with the harvest of 61,096 deer during the 2018-19 archery season.

Youth: Youth deer hunters harvested a preliminary total of 3,775 deer during the three-day Illinois Youth Deer Season Oct. 12-14, 2019, compared to 1,660 in 2018.
