Man gives police chase before being arrested

LEE COUNTY — On Dec. 26, 2018 at 8:36 a.m., Lee County Deputies stopped a 2000 gold Ford Explorer for an expired registration sticker, just west of Woodlawn Road on US 30.

Deputies spoke to the driver who was later identified as Brandon M. Foster, 42. Foster gave two false names and after advising he was being arrested for unlicensed driving, he fled the scene. The vehicle was located in the southbound ditch on I-39 near MP 78, just south of the overpass for Welland Road.

Foster had fled the scene on foot, but was seen walking toward Welland Road by a passing motorist, traveling on I-39. An extensive search was conducted by the Lee County Sheriff's Department, Illinois State Police District One, Illinois State Police Air Operations, Illinois Department of Natural Resources, Dixon Police Department, Mendota Police Department, LaSalle County Sheriff's Department and Sublette Fire Department, for utilization

A nearby resident was interviewed and informed the Sheriff's Department that a subject matching the description of Foster, flagged them down and asked for a ride to a gas station. He was taken to the Amoco Station in Mendota.

Foster then walked to the Quality Inn and subsequently rented a room. He was identified by the attendant and verified via lobby

Foster was taken into custody at the Quality Inn in Mendota, and charged with Driving While License Revoked. Additional charges may be considered, upon further investigation and review by the State's Attorney's Office.

Foster resides in Sunnyland, in Tazewell County.

The charges are merely an allegation and all parties are presumed innocent until proven guilty.

Illinois Department of Labor to enforce new **laws in 2019**

SPRINGFIELD—Effective Jan. 1, the Illinois Department of Labor (IDOL) will enforce the following new state laws:

Public Act 100-1094 (SB2999) Employer Reimbursements for Employee Expenses Summary:

Amends the Wage Payment and Collection Act. Mandates employers reimburse employees for necessary expenditures or losses incurred by the employee within the employee's scope of employment and directly related to services performed for the employer. Mandates an employee submit expenses for reimbursement within 30 days or within parameters of employer reimbursement policy. Provides an employee is not entitled to reimbursement under the Act if the employer has a reimbursement policy.

Public Act 100-1140 (HB4743) – Equal Pay Summary: Amends the Equal Pay Act of 2003. Provides that no employer may discriminate between employees by paying wages to an African-American employee at a rate less than the rate at which the employer pays wages to another employee who is not African-American for the same or substantially similar work on a job that requires equal skill, effort, and responsibility and is performed under similar working conditions.

Public Act 100-0944 (SB3240) - Increased Civil Penalties for Carnival and Amusement Enterprise Operators for **Failure to Conduct Criminal Background Checks on Employees Summary:**

Amends the Amusement Ride and Attraction Safety Act. Increases the civil penalty for carnival or amusement enterprise operators that employee workers convicted of any offenses set forth in Article II and Article 9 of the Criminal Code of 1961 or the Criminal Code of 2012, is a registered sex offender, or the employer fails to conduct a criminal background check on the employee. First offense civil penalty raised to \$5,000 from \$1,000, second offense civil penalty raised to \$10,000 from \$5,000, and subsequent offense shall result in the revocation of the operators

A look at the 2018 Farm Bill


t has been a little more than a few weeks since President Trump signed the 2018 Farm Bill into law after passing in the House of Representatives earlier this month.

Key points in the bill include certainty and stability to farm families for the next five years, upholding fiscal responsibility by being budget neutral and protecting crop insurance. It will fund needed trade development as well as investing in ag research and beginning farmer programs. It also continues nutrition assistance programs for lower income families.

Ogle County Farm Bureau manager Ron Kern talked about how the new bill will affect farmers.

'The passage of the new Farm Bill is welcomed relief for farmers across the country who are facing yet another year of depressed commodity prices and shrinking balance sheets," Kern said. "The new bill will add stability to farmers by retaining crop insurance as a key risk management tool, developing foreign markets to expand trade and continue valuable environmental stewardship programs."

Illinois Farm Bureau President Richard Guebert Jr. applauded the "historic and overwhelmingly bipartisan"



"The 2018 farm bill is a complete package that serves all Americans. It helps to ensure the food security and economic security of our nation," Guebert Jr. said. "Directly or indirectly, it benefits everyone in towns large and small.

Farm Bill facts

The House Agriculture Committee assembled a short summary of the 2018 Farm Bill; it highlights each of the sections commodities, conservation, trade, nutrition, credit, rural development, research, forestry, horticulture and crop insurance.

There are also several facts listed: Just 8.6 cents of every dollar spent on food goes to the farmer.

The remaining share goes to processors, wholesalers, retailers and food service; the 2014 Farm bill was expected to save \$23 billion over 10 years. Most recent projections show it will save \$100 billion, which is more than four times what was anticipated; and U.S. Ag exports to Canada and Mexico are up over 400 percent since NAFTA took effect in 1994.

New laws impact motorist in 2019

SPRINGFIELD — Two new laws supported by Secretary of State Jesse White that take effect Jan. 1 include child passenger and bike safety initiatives.

The first law will require parents and caregivers to secure children in rear-facing safety seats until they are 2-years-old or weigh 40 pounds or more or measure 40 or more inches tall. "Children are five times safer

riding in a rear-facing seat because their head, neck and spine are better protected in a crash," White said. "Let's make sure we keep our children safe by putting them in an appropriate car seat that is properly installed."

Car crashes are a leading

• Car seats have been shown to reduce fatal injury by 71 percent for infants and 54 percent for toddlers, according to

The Secretary of State's office, through its Keep Me in a Safe Seat program, provides child safety seat inspections by certified child safety seat technicians at 10 Driver Services facilities throughout the state. The second law that will be enacted at the beginning of the year places more emphasis on bicycle safety for those taking Secretary of State driver exams. Test questions on the Dutch Reach, a technique drivers are encouraged to use in order to avoid hitting bicyclists with their car doors and other bike safety measures will be included on the Secretary of State's driver's exam and in the 2018/2019 Rules of the Road.

"This legislation will help improve safety between drivers and bicyclists who share the roads," said White. "By adding questions to our written exam about bike safety, drivers will be more aware of the deadly consequences that can occur if they do not follow the Rules of the Road."

White also reminds Illinoisans that the office issues the Bicycle Rules of the Road to ensure safe bike travel.

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



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
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The Map of the Salt and Stars

The Map of Salt and Stars" by Jennifer Zeynab Joukhadar is a novel about the parallel journeys of two Syrian girls who live 800 years apart. Joukhadar is a fine storyteller, her language is lyrical without being mawkish, her style is in the tradition of the great storytellers of the Middle East. "Stories map the soul in the guise of words." For one of the girls, map making is the occasion for high adventure, for the other, her mother's secret map will save her life.

Nour is a 12-year-old Syrian-American girl living in Manhattan until, in 2011, her mother returns to Syria with Nour and her two sisters after their father's death from cancer. They return to her uncle's house in Homs. Bombs are going off in the distance. It is the onset of the Syrian civil war, and Homs, the "capital of the revolution" against Syrian President Assad, will be under siege for three years and then surrender. Nour's perilous journey begins when their house is blown apart in a rocket attack. From then on, they "aren't on any map."

Disguised as a boy, Rawiya is a 16-year-old Medieval adventurer apprenticed to legendary real-life scholar and mapmaker, al-Idrisi. He is commissioned by King Roger II of Sicily to map the world. Once they cross the Mediterranean, the mapmaker and his apprentices visit many famous cities, beginning with Homs. Though al-Idrisi is a historical figure, Joukhadar introduces all sorts of supernatural elements, as when she has Rawiya battle the roc, the monstrous bird of prey of Middle Eastern mythology (a Medieval helicopter gunship?). Rawiya, like the young King David, is lethal with her slingshot. She blinds the bird in one eye, and in a later epic battle, blinds him completely. The ship nearly capsizes when the vanguished bird plummets into the sea. In 1154 al-Idrisi produces the magnificent Tabula Rogeriana, the

Nour's older sister is badly injured in the Homs bombardment. Her mother and uncle rush her to a hospital in Damascus. The family manages to flee to Jordan, but when her mother, a cartographer, stays behind to tend the injured girl, Nour and her other sister must fend for themselves. Imperiled at every turn, Nour must somehow decipher her mother's secret map that will point them to safety. One night, the girls come upon a group of Bedouins. In a moment of grace, Nour befriends one of the men when she points to the stars and the man tells her that they have different names for the constellations. Ursa Major, he says, is three mourning daughters and their father on a funeral bier. Is that not how their journey began, when their father died in impossibly far away New York.

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Last four years an expensive lesson

et me get this straight - Bruce Rauner spent Guest Column tinge of optimism. more than \$50 million of his own money to keep a job he really didn't want?

Apparently, after reviewing his poll numbers that showed he was not quite as well liked as tooth decay, he got cold feet and didn't want the job anymore.

He now says he offered four individuals campaign money to run in his place.

None would take him up on the offer.

Can you blame them?

Illinois state government is in disarray. No state has a worse credit rating than the Land of Lincoln. Our pension plans are underfunded to the tune of \$130 billion and things are moving from bad to worse.

But that doesn't explain why Rauner is a failed governor. Two words come to mind: arrogance and I make these observations with a bit of humility.

I voted for Rauner in 2014. When he won, I felt a

It didn't last long.

Rauner is the first governor in my lifetime to use government as a weapon. He essentially told the legislature: "Pass my reforms or I'll use my veto pen along with my legislative allies to keep the state from having a budget."

We went 736 days without a budget and not one of his key reforms became reality.

This is not how a democratic government should operate. It should be a process of unifying, of seeking input, of finding compromise that benefits everyone, of careful and well-considered positions and negotiations.

Governing properly is the art of calming the waters, not throwing hand grenades into them.

Then Senate Republican leader Christine Radogno tried to save Rauner – and the state of Illinois – by quietly negotiating with Senate President John Cul-

lerton. The compromise package covered much of Rauner's wish list – but not all of it.

Instead of embracing a partial win, the governor turned up his nose and walked away, leaving himself and the state of Illinois

in worse shape. And then there is the lying. Rauner lied about big things and little things. No, his grandparents weren't immigrants from Sweden. They were born in Wisconsin. It was a fib he told over and over – even after being called out on it by reporters.

Yes, I'm well aware politicians lie.

But Rauner developed a reputation in Springfield that his word just wasn't good.

The most infamous example, of course, was when he told a group of pro-life lawmakers that he would veto a measure providing state-funded abortions for women on Medicaid and those covered by state insurance. Later, he made the same pledge to Chicago Cardinal Blase Cupich, only to sign HB 40 a few months later.

Republican lawmakers knew he was pro-choice when he first ran and they still supported him. But they weren't willing to sup-

voters gave Rauner the boot.

The governor can look back on the last four years as an expensive lesson – not just for himself – but for the people of Illinois.

Does Trump care that he's President?

The office of the presidency is known for Guest Column restrained, even if no one else is. wearing down the mere mortals who hold it. At the very least, it prematurely ages its occupants. Often, it humiliates them, forcing them to rehabilitate their reputations later (George H.W. Bush and Jimmy Carter). In the worst case, it chews them up and spits them out (Lyndon Johnson and Richard Nixon).

It is a journalistic trope that this is happening to Donald Trump before our eyes. The media constantly write stories about how the president is panicked and cornered, barely able to handle his duties, as the walls perpetually "close in." But as far as any outside observer can tell, he's as ebullient and combative as ever, and has never blinked no matter how intense

the pressure of any given controversy. Far from getting crushed by the weight of the office, Trump doesn't seem to feel it at all. Never has any president been as outwardly unfazed by the majesty of the presidency, or made less accommodation to its trappings and norms.

President Trump still acts like he's Celebrity Trump fighting a vicious flame war with Rosie O'Donnell, except his targets now might be another head of state, or his own attorney general, or losing members of his own party.

The idea that he's a representative of the nation apparently makes very little impression on him. He never stops to think that any given gibe might be unworthy of the office, or maybe that he, blessed with more power and showered with more attention than anyone on the planet, has an obligation to be elevating and



One of the attractions of the presidency to him appears to be that he can continue to punch down - but do it from a higher altitude than ever before.

Even after two years, he hasn't lost his capacity to surprise. Did the president of the United States really render the last name of the incoming chairman of the House Intelligence Committee, Adam Schiff, as an expletive? Did he call that TV anchor "low IQ"? Did he call his former secretary of state dumb? Of course, he did.

Much of this is ephemera, but collectively and over time it creates a lasting impression. A major factor in the drubbing that Republicans suffered in the suburbs in November was a reaction against

Trump's persona, as underlined by his own conduct and tweets. If he cares about keeping the presidency - and he surely does - he should care a little more about respecting the dignity of the office.

The great advantage of the presidency is that it is naturally set up to invest people elected to it with a certain grandeur, via the White House, saluting Marines, Air Force One, "Hail to the Chief" and ceremonial events large and small.

All it requires is showing up and, very often, reading from a script. Rather than simply pocketing this benefit, Trump tends to undercut it 280 characters at a time.

If he's ever brought low, it's less likely to be from the pressures of his responsibilities than his cussed inability or unwillingness to make a minimal effort to conform to his role.

IDNR reminds anglers to keep safety in mind when ice fishing this winter

SPRINGFIELD–If you're planning to go ice fishing in Illinois this winter, the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) wants you to review life-saving safety measures before heading out of the ice, drilling a hole and dropping a line.

"The IDNR cannot stress enough the importance of safety when ice fishing. Outdoor recreation in the winter can be invigorating and a lot of fun, but can turn into a dangerous situation in just seconds. Being prepared and ready for anything while outdoors this winter, especially if you are headed out on the ice to fish, can save your life," said IDNR Conservation Police Chief Rafael Gutierrez.

Those planning to ice fish should stay off of ice that is less than four inches thick. New ice is usually stronger than old ice. Four inches of clear, newly formed ice may support one person on foot, while a foot or more of old,

partially thawed ice may not. It is recommended that anglers carry a rope or floatation

device with them to help assist if someone falls through the ice. Wearing a life jacket/personal floatation device (PFD) is always recommended when fishing offshore, including when ice fishing.




