Demmer champions local government consolidation bill

SPRINGFIELD—State Representative Tom Demmer (R-Dixon) is championing legislation this year that would provide local elected officials and voters with a method for reducing taxes through consolidation of a township that is coterminous with a municipality.

"With nearly 7,000 individual units of government in Illinois, we need to be looking for opportunities to consolidate where it makes financial sense," said Demmer. "In instances where a township is located either entirely or almost entirely within a municipality, elected officials and taxpayers should be able to decide if both units of government are

necessary." HB2525 is identical to legislation Demmer sponsored in the 100th General Assembly that gained nearly unanimous support in the House, but stalled in the Senate. The legislation provides for two methods through which a township consolidation question would be submitted to voters:

If a township board or municipal board adopts an ordinance to place the question on a ballot; or

If a petition signed by 10 percent of the registered voters in a township is submitted to the township board or municipal board

Upon certification of the ordinance or petition, a proposition to discontinue and abolish the township would be put before voters in the next election. If successful, all rights, powers, duties, assets, property, liabilities, obligations, and responsibilities of the township would be transferred to the coterminous municipality.



Together, we can prevent the spread of the flu in our hospital and our community this season. Thank you for your cooperation and support.



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

Public Enemies


■ Imore Leonard's novel, "The Hot Kid" is set in early 1930's Oklahoma, where, according to Leonard who lived there when he was a kid, "It was said that there were probably 20 bank robbers for every doctor in America then, and I was certainly aware of the desperadoes." Like most of Leonard's novels, "The Hot Kid" is based on two notions: "That in this country there is hardly anyone who won't sell his soul for a quick buck and that the consequences of such a transaction are invariably comic and disastrous."

"The Hot Kid" is a tale of outlaws robbing banks, hiding out in whorehouses, and shooting down cops, of gun molls and Kansas City speakeasies where the waitresses work in their underwear or in nothing at all, and where a Harvey Girl waitress would "get recognized on the street like a movie star." Competition to become Public Enemy No. 1 is ferocious. Famous desperadoes like "Pretty Boy" Floyd once took his family to town to watch him rob a bank.

At the center of this mayhem is Deputy US Marshal Carl (Carlos) Webster, who at 15 encounters the famous robber Emmett Long in Deering's drugstore in Okmulgee, Oklahoma. Long steals the boy's peach ice cream cone and cold-bloodedly shoots down a policeman entering the drugstore. Shortly thereafter, the boy shoots and kills a thief making off with one of his father's Brahman cows. His father Virgil is amazed: "This boy has a hard bark on him."

Seven years later, Carl, already a rising star in the U.S. Marshall Service, confronts Emmett Long at the home of Emmett's girlfriend, Crystal Davidson, and it's to Emmett that he first issues his trademark line: "If I have to pull my weapon I'll shoot to kill." Tony Antonelli, an aspiring hack who writes for "True Detective" magazine, chronicles in suitable purple prose the crucial moments of the story, as part of "the mythmaking process that turned commonplace crooks into figures of folklore," according to critic Janet Maslin.

Carl's nemesis is Jack Belmont, a truly vile individual. The son of an oil magnate, Jack's road to perdition begins early on when he stands by and watches his little sister drown in the swimming pool. She is revived, but severely brain-damaged. Jack aspires to be the next Public Enemy No. 1, but he is so utterly inept that when he mows down scores of Klansmen, he hardly gets credit. It is the inexorable confrontation of the tall, handsome lawman with his trademark Panama hat and the delusional monster that drives the plot to its rather unexpected conclusion. However, Toni Antonelli decides it needs a bit of tarting up, that his own version "would need dramatic effects, a certain tone and a strong sense of place."



With God's Help

The Lenten Season, which begins on Ash Wednesday and culminates on Easter Sunday, is a good time for Christians to do some prayerful self-analysis. God has always declared His people "holy" and has required them to be holy. I Peter 1:15 "But as He who called you is holy, you also be holy in all your conduct." The subject of "holiness" can seem a little confusing at times because so many people have their own ideas and opinions of what holiness actually is and means. Even the thought of trying to live a holy life can seem overwhelming. I read a definition for "Holy" in a Bible Dictionary that seems to be a good and workable definition.

It said, "Consecrated or set apart for sacred use, standing apart from sin and evil." In other words, God's people are to be set apart "for" certain things and "from" other things. We should seek to live good and godly lives with God's help, while at the same time strive to resist that which is evil and ungodly.

The key phrase here is, "with God's help." We cannot live a good and holy life apart from God, but numerous Scriptures support the notion that God can and will help us live godly lives if we yield to the work of His Spirit. Philippians 2:13 "For God is working in you, giving you the desire to obey Him and the power to do what pleases Him." It encourages me to know that God himself desires to help me live a godly and holy life for Him. None of us is perfect, of course. We all fail, make mistakes, and sin. But this should not stop us from striving to be the very best that we can be for Him. His forgiveness and grace are available for us if we are sincerely repentant.

While the thought of "being holy" seems like an insurmountable task, one thing I have found helpful is focusing on one occasion or moment at a time. Matthew Kelly says, "a moment when you open yourself to God. You make yourself available to Him. You set aside what you feel like doing in that moment... and for one moment you simply do what you prayerfully believe God is calling you to do in that moment. That is a Holy Moment." And when we add these "Holy Moments" together we begin to see a good and godly pattern develop in our lives which, in turn, becomes a lifestyle.

I encourage you in this Lenten season, to set yourself apart for the Lord in a fresh new way.

Responding to a predator in their midst

did something. And it cost him his job.

Back in 2002, he was the editor of Illinois

Baptist, a newspaper covering Southern Baptist congregations across the Land of Lincoln.

When he learned that a pastor, Leslie Mason, was criminally charged with sexually abusing girls in Olney, Ill., he reported it. One of the girls apparently was only 13 years old.

Instead of receiving praise for informing Baptists about a potential predator in their midst, he found himself in a room with a lawyer and his boss Glenn Akins, who then ran the Illinois Baptist State Association.

They wanted him gone. According to Leathers, Akins offered a pe-

culiar complaint about the story: that writing about one pastor who committed sex crimes was unfair because that "ignores many others who have done

the same thing." In my 30 years in journalism, I've encountered some

Leathers' sacrifice for truth was cited in a powerful investigation by The Houston Chronicle and The San Antonio Express-News that found that the Southern Baptist Convention repeatedly tolerated sexual assaults by clergymen and church volunteers. The investigation found 380 credible cases of church leaders and volunteers engaging in sexual misconduct over the past several decades.

The series chronicled how the victims of abuse sometimes are shunned by churches, urged to not report abusers or advised to get

The investigation hit home with me because I'm an Evangelical Christian and Southern Baptists are the largest Evangelical denomination in the United States.

Of course, the problem of pastors, coaches, teachers,

physicians, scoutmasters and others abusing their positions of trust to harm children is not a new one.

And yet, when it occurs it often is confronted with silence. Southern Baptist leaders are hardly unique in how they responded to predators in their midst.

"I think there is a tendency for people in leadership to want to protect the institution by covering things up," Leath-

ers told me. "The interesting thing is that when I wrote the story, I got plenty of positive feedback from lay people in various congregations. They get it. It was people in positions of authority who had problems with me writing the story." Leslie Mason, the pastor Leathers wrote about was sen-

tenced to seven years in prison. He's now out of prison and again working as a minister in Illinois.

Yes, you read that right.

Glenn Akins, the boss who gave Leathers the boot, is now assistant executive director of the Baptist General Association

And Leathers? His newspaper career ended when he lost the job. For the past 15 years he's been in public relations.

Illinois facing jobs' crisis with latest policy initiatives

ing, an Illinois community learned this week it is losing almost 1,400 jobs. Is the decision by Fiat

Chrysler to lay off 1,371 workers at its plant in Belvidere in north-central Illinois the result of hurtful policy positions by freshman Gov. J.B. Pritzker and Democratic supermajorities in the General Assembly?

The company isn't saying that, but the automaker simultaneously announced it is investing \$4.5 billion at its Michigan-based plants and creating 4,500 new jobs

Illinois' loss is Michigan's gain.

And that should make anyone with an interest in the future of Illinois' economic health to take pause.

For decades, Illinois state government promoted policy positions that created a poor business and jobs climate here. That's no secret. The state has the second

highest property taxes in the country; the highest workers compensation costs in the Midwest in part because of the state's abusive legal climate, labeled a judicial hellhole; and a burdensome regulatory climate that hinders small-business growth.

As a result, Illinois' economic outlook lags behind other states despite the booming national economy.

"Although the economy has strengthened compared with the previous few years, Illinois still trails the rest of the country in most gauges of economic performance," Moody's Analytics says in its latest State of Illinois Forecast Report, released this month. "Employment is increasing more slowly than the Midwest and U.S. averages, the labor force is

near its lowest point in more than 10 years, and weaker consumer demand than in other states is weighing on population-dependent industries such as retail, leisure/ hospitality and real estate."

Illinois' jobs climate is bad. It could be getting worse.

This month, Pritzker signed legislation that will raise the state's minimum wage incrementally to \$15 an hour by 2025, despite warnings from downstate business owners that it will result in widespread job cuts.

Since then, the owner of Hopper's Poppers in Sycamore said he was closing his

TX7 ith no warning an Illinois Guest Column relocate out of state because to kill jobs. ... I'm really concerned with the direction he can't afford the new expense. And the owners of a seasonal business in Wood River decided it also had to shut down and lay off six employees for the same reason.

These are just two small examples in two different regions of the state, but they appear to be omens of things

What happens if Pritzker is successful in having the state's constitution changed to allow for a progressive income tax? The state's flat income tax of 4.95 percent is the one advantage it has over its neighbors. A progressive tax will mean higher tax rates for higher wage earners, resulting in tax hikes for middle class families and small businesses.

'Gov. Pritzker's progressive tax is really a jobs tax," state Rep. David McSweeney, R-Barrington Hills, said. "Small businesses create 80 percent of the jobs in the state. ... Any basic economy theory is going to say that more taxes and more regulations are going concerned with the direction we're heading in.'

Fiat Chrysler's decision was at least months in the making and not a knee-jerk reaction to anything that happened since Pritzker took office. But the governor has been talking about a \$15 minimum wage and progressive tax for well over a year. He ran on the initiative, and made no secret of his intention to force businesses to increase wages.

Prosperous business owners today want to remain prosperous business owners a few years from now. Business owners believe their companies will be ongoing concerns, and make the adjustments necessary to stay ahead of known expense drivers. They pay attention and plan accordingly.

Decision-makers in Springfield need to start paying attention as well.






