First round of bids let for Junior High construction project

AMBOY – Groundbreaking on a two-year project to construct a new Amboy Junior High School and a new gym/main entrance at Amboy High School is scheduled for this summer. Michele James of CTS (Control Technology Solutions), project manager, discussed the current status of the project at the May 16 Amboy Board of Education meeting. She also gave a report on health life safety work and improvements to energy efficiency that will take place this summer at Central Elementary School.

James said bid package #1 for the junior high/high school project includes earthwork, foundation, site utilities, excavation, and temporary fencing. Bids were let on May 16 and will be accepted until June 10. CTS hopes to have their team on site and work started by July 1. James said the goal this summer is to prepare a new temporary main entrance for the high school, which will be located on the back side of the building, by the softball field (door 10). A construction fence will be built all around the construction site, James noted.

Along with a new junior high, the overall project will include construction of a new gymnasium and main entrance at Amboy High School.

At Central, CTS will begin Phase III of a performance contract to improve energy efficiency and complete health life safety work. This will involve replacing unit ventilators in the library wing, domestic water supply, asbestos abatement and removal, and replacement of asbestos tile. Superintendent Joshua Nichols said with the upgrades in the unit ventilators, if funding is available, a chiller could also be installed which would allow for air conditioning at Central.



Just 15 minutes away in Beloit, Wis., the Ho-Chunk Nation tribe awaits federal approval from the Bureau of Indian Affairs to build a casino there, the Beloit Daily News has reported.

Some estimates say that project could employ up to 5,000 people and generate more than \$5 million in annual revenue for the local government. If that casino is built before Rockford has a chance to build

one, "Illinois residents would bypass our community and our

state and take their dollars to Wisconsin," McNamara said. But it's unclear if Illinois lawmakers will pass a "gambling expansion" bill in time for the end of the legislative session on May 31. No language for such a bill has been filed, but it would

likely be similar to ones that were proposed in prior years but failed to pass, which would have created six more state casino licenses. Illinois currently has 10 casinos. "We have talked and talked and talked about casino

expansion, literally since before I could drive," McNamara told House lawmakers in a hearing on gambling expansion earlier this month. "You hold all the power, we need you to McNamara said revenue from a Rockford casino would

help alleviate the city's pension problems, because "in the not-too-distant future, 100 percent of our annual property tax revenue will be going to our state-mandated pension "We cannot afford to be outflanked by our neighbors up

north yet again," he said. While there's no timeline for federal approval of the Beloit casino, a February report from Wisconsin's Division of Gaming estimated the project is "four years from approval."



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



With "If Beale Street Could Talk" Baldwin signaled a break with the white liberals who had turned him into a star, but who "had had enough of hearing about problems they no longer had the will to solve." When the novel appeared, it was swamped by negative reviews with a fairly consistent message: Race in America is no longer the problem Baldwin makes it out to be; he should get over it.

The novel is not centrally about systematic racism. It is a love story. It is about the love of Tish, the 19-year old pregnant narrator, and Fonny, the boy she has loved since grammar school, as well as their two families' fierce struggle to get Fonny out of prison. The novel depicts a black interior world – through Tish's remarkable narration – and the social



Lady Clippers 4x400-meter relay team takes fifth at state

CHARLESTON – Amboy-LaMoille's 4x400-meter relay team proved it belongs up there with the best in the state after competing in the IHSA Class 1A State Track Meet on May 16-18 at O'Brien Stadium on the campus of Eastern Illinois University in Charleston.

The Lady Clippers came into the state meet as having one of the best 4x400 times in the state all season, and the A-L relay kept up that lofty status in the state meet by finishing in fifth place with a time of 4:07.65.

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



## There really are no Trump mysteries

The surprise about the big New York Times story on Donald Trump's tax returns is that there are no real sur-

Trump's taxes have been an obsession of the left since he, in violation of a long-standing norm, reneged on his promise to release his returns during the 2016 campaign.

Democrats counted as one of the advantages of taking the House that they could demand Trump's returns. The dispute resulting from the administration's refusal to turn them over is now probably headed to the Supreme Court.

All the while, the expectation, or at least the suspicion, was that the returns contained some awful secret, perhaps evidence that he is a tool of the Russians.

And here, The New York Times has obtained Trump's tax information spanning a decade from the mid-1980s to mid-1990s, and the revelation is that he wasn't doing as well as he said in public and lost a boatload of money in a period that nearly destroyed him. In other words, exactly what anyone paying any attention would have expected.

Yes, the amount of the reported loss, \$1.17 billion, is remarkable (although inflated for tax purposes) and some of the details memorable, but can anyone say that they are surprised?

Trump himself, the Washington Examiner notes, talked about his precarious financial state in this period on the first episode of "The Apprentice." In fact, he may have exaggerated, saying that he had been "billions of dollars" in debt.

As for Trump's use of tax loopholes, he said in a debate with Hillary Clinton that if he didn't owe any tax liability, that made him "smart."
