



## New surgical device improves precision and safety in certain procedures

MENDOTA — It's not exactly like cutting along the dotted line, but it's very close. Since the beginning of the year, surgeons at OSF HealthCare Saint Paul Medical Center have been using a new, advanced tool that - in essence - helps light the way when doing certain procedures.

It's an endoscopic fluorescence imager called Pinpoint and developed by Stryker Corporation. When paired with accompanying devices, it provides an extremely clear picture of an internal organ.

The laparoscopic procedure begins with the patient being injected with a fluorescent dye.

"Once it's absorbed by the body, the liver concentrates and excretes it as if it's bile, in this case," says Dr. Eric Kivisto, General Surgeon at OSF HealthCare Saint Paul Medical Center. "So, any structure that would have bile in it will fluoresce

when you use the fluorescent scope."

Traditionally, surgeons rely solely on their clinical judgement whether tissue is receiving adequate blood flow. Pinpoint provides the surgeon the ability to visualize blood flow during a procedure allowing for quicker and more accurate clinical decisions.

Through the number of surgeries Dr. Kivisto has performed using the device, he had found it to be more precise, faster and, overall, safer for the patient.

The Pinpoint system at OSF HealthCare Saint Paul Medical Center is the only one of its kind in the region.

cottish writer Ali Smith's novel, "Autumn," has been called the first great Brexit novel. As the first of a quartet of novels of the four seasons, it is light as a feather in its approach to the wintry turn of events, when Britain woke up to a new reality: "All across the country, people felt it was the wrong thing," Smith writes. "All across the country, people felt it was the right thing. All across the country, people felt they'd really lost. All across the country, people felt they'd really won." It is an echo of Dickens' "A Tale of Two Cities," which Elisabeth Demand, the protagonist of the novel, reads and thinks about the disruption and displacement that has just occurred.

But the first chapter belongs to Daniel Gluck, a neighbor from Elisabeth's childhood, who, despite their age difference he is 69 years older than 8-year old Elisabeth – becomes her lifelong friend. Frail, nearly beyond consciousness, Daniel at 101, is housed in a care home awaiting death. He dreams of a strange world in which he is transformed into the strong, healthy body of his youth. At other times, he appears to himself in the form of a tree, from which he can see far and wide, he is sliding into nature. In the meantime, Elisabeth for her part, is strolling down a country lane, nothing and no one around for miles, but somehow a double fence has appeared overnight. Two men in an SUV approach and order her to leave immediately, she is trespassing. She protests that she is not harming anyone, that she is simply taking a walk. They threaten to arrest her. "Prison for trees," she considers.

Passing a house on which someone had spray-painted "GO HOME," Elisabeth notices that the words "WE ARE ALREADY HOME THANK YOU" were painted underneath, along with bright red flowers and a tree. Bouquets of real flowers were left outside, in solidarity with and sympathy for the occupants. As in this hateful/gentle example, Smith explores the connectivity of things: between the living and the dead, the past and the present, art and life, bureaucratic oppression and the exhilaration of dancing.

Daniel and Elisabeth share an imaginative playfulness, a

delight in words and stories, pictures and ideas. Daniel tells Elizabeth, "Whoever makes up the story makes up the world, so always try to welcome people into the home of your story. That is what Smith does in this novel, she welcomes all of us because it's autumn with its many gifts and sorrows, not

# Human intelligence versus artificial intelligence

bill sits on Gov. J.B. Pritzker's desk Guest Column someone to hire. that would make Illinois the first in the nation to regulate the use of artificial intelligence in job interviews. When I was reading about the legislation I

was scratching my head.

What exactly is going on here?

Well, employers are creating video recordings of job applicants during interviews and then feeding the video into a computer program to analyze facial expressions and voice intonations to see if the candidate is a good fit for the job.

But can't you tell those things by, you know, listening and watching during the interview? I have interviewed a lot of job candidates

Duck necktie and a Yoda watch with ears extending three inches from each side of his wrist. I glanced at his resume and said, "I see you moved to

I smiled and said. "Well, usually folks go to California to oin a commune not the other way around.'

The candidate looked me in the eye and said, "Yes, but his is where the spaceship is going to land."

My dad was a farmer who hired lots of folks over the years. The first thing he'd do is shake the job candidate's hand to feel for calluses. Then he'd hand the person a bolt and ask what size wrench they would use on it. I remember after one interview my Dad

looked at me and said, "That fellow had hands like a preacher. I'm not hiring him.'

One of my favorite tactics when interviewing reporter candidates was to hand them an assignment when they came in the door and tell them they had two hours to gather the information and write the story.

The real test was to see how applicants would respond to deadline pressure.

I remember one fellow who stared blankly at a telephone on his desk for two hours. Other, more successful candidates would hurry through the Illinois Capitol pounding on doors and asking questions.

I suppose we could record such encounters and feed them into a computer.

But I don't need a computer to tell me what a blank non-comprehending expression looks like or when a job candidate is trying hard.

One of my favorite questions to ask applicants is: What is your greatest disappointment? I ask the question because I like to hire self-starters and risk takers. And I have yet to I didn't need artificial intelligence to tell me this wasn't meet a risk taker who hasn't experienced disappointment.

That said, it has elicited some interesting responses. One candidate started babbling about his divorce and stalking his ex-wife. (I didn't hire him.)

But other candidates gave heartfelt answers about accepting difficult jobs or taking a class they knew would be challenging. I like those types of candidates, even those who failed, because they were willing to take a risk.

But some employers are moving away from these types of interviews and letting a computer do some of the thinking. According to the Wall Street Journal about 100 major corporations -- places like Hilton and Unilever -- use artificial

intelligence to assess applicants during interviews. The folks who produce these computer programs claim they can screen for customer empathy, teamwork and prob-

lem solving. The measure passed by the legislature would require employers to notify job interviewees that AI will be used to

analyze their facial expressions and vocal intonations. The bill also requires employers to obtain consent from job applicants to be subjected to an AI analysis or to give them a chance to opt out. Employers may not share the videos and must destroy them if the applicant requests.

But I'm skeptical of the technology. When it comes to screening job applicants, I'll take human intelligence over artificial intelligence any day.

# More hits to pocketbook registration fees.

ou don't get a raise for doing your job. You get a raise for doing

an exceptional job, and the promise to do even better down the road. Does this sound like the

Illinois General Assembly? Hidden in the budget rammed through the legislature over a single weekend is a lawmaker pay hike of \$1,600. Gov. J.B. Pritzker refused to use his veto pen to strike that provision in signing the budget June 5. The raises will hit lawmaker bank accounts July 1, the same day, every Illinoisan who visits a gas station will see their bill go up.

The same state lawmakers who gave themselves a raise in a record-spending \$40 billion state budget also passed a \$45 billion capital plan. To pay for it, they doubled the state gas tax, hiked vehicle registration fees by \$50 for most vehicles, hiked the cigarette tax, imposed new taxes on parking and changed the tax structure for online shopping.

The gas tax hike will cost a typical Illinois driver \$100 more per year. And the state gas tax will automatically increase with inflation going forward. Illinoisans' total tax and fee burden on their gas will become the second or first highest in the nation, according to Tax Foundation

Meanwhile, at nearly \$70,000, Illinois state lawmakers will take home the sixth-highest base salary in the nation, according to a 2018 analysis by the National Conference of State Legislatures. Among the five other states with "fulltime lite" legislatures, Illinois lawmakers will be paid

the most.

The same day Pritzker signed the budget, he signed new income tax rates into law that would take effect should voters approve his progressive income tax amendment at the ballot box.

Pritzker has dubbed the progressive income tax the

"fair tax," because he promises middle-class tax relief while hiking taxes on the wealthy. The administration claimed in May that the plan would provide \$271 in tax relief for a family of four making the median household income of \$61,000.

But if a \$271 tax cut is "fair," what does that make a \$300 tax hike on the same family?

The average household in cities such as Aurora, Elgin, Joliet and Naperville has two vehicles, according to a Governing analysis of U.S. Census Bureau data. That means they will be whacked with \$300 in new taxes and fees under Pritzker's capital bill – with two parents each seeing a \$100 gas tax hike and a \$50 hike in vehicle Indeed, Daily Herald

watchdog reporter Jake Griffin found the tax and fee hikes on driving will wipe out any promised progressive income tax savings for "many Illinoisans."

Of course, that's assuming lawmakers keep their promise, and don't raise those income tax rates down the line.

Springfield politicians talking out of both sides of their mouths on tax "fairness" is one of many reasons they didn't deserve a raise.
