Amboy Fire among recipients of Public Safety Grants

AMBOY – To enhance public safety and quality of life in communities across northern Illinois, ComEd and the Metropolitan Mayors Caucus today announced grants of up to \$10,000 each to 25 public agencies through the ComEd Powering Safe Communities Program. From digital messaging and speed notification signage to cameras that help locate victims in danger, the projects address critical safety needs in the communities ComEd serves.

"The safety of the public and our employees is our highest priority," said Melissa Washington, vice president of governmental and external affairs at ComEd. "That's why we partner with the Metropolitan Mayors Caucus each year through the ComEd Powering Safe Communities Program to promote a culture of safety and wellness in our communities. By providing local agencies with the resources required to help address public safety needs, we're powering a brighter, more resilient future for the residents they serve."

Locally, the Amboy Fire Protection District received a grant that will support the purchase of two thermal imaging cameras to help locate victims and firefighters trapped in a fire.

Since 2015, ComEd has supported critical safety needs of local municipalities through Powering Safe Communities, bringing essential public safety programs and services to people and populations throughout the energy company's service territory.

For the past four grant cycles, ComEd has collaborated with the Metropolitan Mayors Caucus, a council for Chicagoland's chief elected officials, on public policy issues and to fund \$670,000 worth of public safety projects throughout northern Illinois. Through this collaboration, ComEd provides the program funding, the Metropolitan Mayors Caucus administers the grants to local communities, and grant recipients match ComEd's contribution with their own funding of equal or

"For the past four years, we have been able to leverage over \$1.8 million for 95 local public safety projects," said Joseph Tamburino, Mayor of Hillside, Ill., and Chairman of the Metropolitan Mayors Caucus. "Our partnership with ComEd has put our shared public safety commitment into action and increased community resiliency. We are grateful for ComEd's generosity.'

Public forum schedule on plan to reduce storm damage



Members from the Lee County All Hazards Mitigation Planning Committee will be available to discuss this Plan.

'Individuals can come and go at their convenience to review and comment on the Plan. If someone only has a few minutes to review the Plan, ask a question, or comment, they can do so at any time during the forum. This forum is designed to accommodate busy schedules. Unlike some conventional meetings, there are no formal presentations forcing attendees to wait before they can speak," according to Kevin Lalley, Lee County **Emergency Management** Agency Director.



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



STERLING — Baby-Friendly USA recently announced that CGH Medical Center has received the prestigious designation as a Baby-Friendly birth facility as part of the Baby Friendly Hospitals Initiative. Based on the Ten Steps to Successful Breastfeeding, this international award is only given after a rigorous on-site survey, and recognizes birthing facilities that offer breastfeeding mothers the information, confidence, and skills needed to successfully initiate breastfeeding (within one hour of birth) and continue to breastfeed upon discharge from the hospital. CGH Medical Center has been working towards this designation since 2013, when the hospital and clinic staff began to make major practice changes that collectively support pregnant and breastfeeding mothers.

'We are very proud to have achieved this Baby-Friendly Designation," said Jennifer Behrens, RN, CGH Birthing Center Assistant Manager. "Achieving the designation was a difficult process. It required education not only for anyone who cares for newborns, but also for those that care for pregnant or breastfeeding women. This included all hospital OB nurses, clinic nurses and medical assistants in OB, Pediatrics, and Family Practice. We also set up a program to educate patients prenatally on the benefits of breastfeeding, rooming in, and skin-to-skin contact after delivery, and we partnered with WIC in both Whiteside and Lee counties during the process to help ensure everyone is communicating the same message."

Number of hospitalizations potentially tied to vaping increases

SPRINGFIELD - The Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) has received reports of six young people experiencing severe breathing problems after vaping, and is investigating five more individuals. These individuals experienced respiratory symptoms including cough, shortness of breath, and fatigue. Some also experienced vomiting and diarrhea. Symptoms worsened over a period of days or weeks before admission to the hospital.

"IDPH is working with local health departments and hospitals to investigate reported cases of hospitalized individuals with unexplained respiratory illness and a history of vaping," said IDPH Director Dr. Ngozi Ezike. "The short- and longterm effects of vaping are still being researched, but these recent hospitalizations have shown that there is the potential for immediate health consequences."

IDPH is also working with local health departments, other

states, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and the Food and Drug Administration to investigate the names and types of vaping products, as well as where they were obtained. Without this information, we have been unable to conclusively determine which chemicals the individuals may have been exposed to.

The cases live in the northeastern part of the state, as well as in the St. Louis Metro East area. In order to protect the identity of the affected individuals, additional information is not being provided.

People who experience any type of chest pain or difficulty breathing after vaping in the weeks or months prior to these symptoms should seek immediate medical attention. Health care providers caring for patients with unexpected serious respiratory illness should ask about a history of vaping.

Discussion was had about the budgeted appropriations and that the village can move money in the budget so that this donation could be made as well.

Hanson made a motion to approve the \$4,400 donation with Jackson offering a second to the motion. The motion was approved unanimously.

Trustee resignation

Jackson turned in her resignation from the village board effective at the end of the meeting on Monday night. Jackson relocated outside of the village limits. Stenzel said he created a questionnaire for anyone who is interested in the open board seat. If anyone is interested, please contact Stenzel. He told the board he would like all of the questionnaires back by Sept. 4.

In other board news:

- Stenzel thanked the City of Amboy for use of their street sweeper. He said they came down and swept the streets with curbs. He added that Amboy has always been a very good about coming, that they are good neighbors.
- The board approved a temporary liquor license for Sublette 365 for the Hops and Harmony event on Sept. 14.
- The board took no action on the request for new liquor license. Stenzel said the person requesting the license is interested in opening a video gaming business in the location of the beauty shop. Per Illinois rules, to open the video gaming business, the establishment must have an on-premise liquor license, which means the establishment serves alcohol for consumption on premises. Stenzel said the village has four liquor licenses and all are being used. He added the board would have to create a new liquor license for this request to be approved. Stenzel said he doesn't see Sublette as a big draw for gamblers. Jackson said she thinks four liquor licenses is enough for what the they have for the small village. Other board members expressed agreement with Jackson. No action on the matter was taken.
- The board approved the appointment of Dana Considine as new village attorney, with Kessel and Jackson voting no. Stenzel said the attorney will cost \$200 per hour, and that she will not be able to make every meeting because she is also the attorney for the Village of Franklin Grove, which meets at the same time as Village of Sublette.
- Stenzel said that removal of the old maintenance building should be starting and that the project will hopefully be completed by next week. • The board approved the purchase of two new garbage
- containers for Main Street at a cost of \$1,087. The new containers are 30-gallon containers.

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Celebrating Mary, Immaculate Mother of God

n Thursday, Aug. 15, the Catholic Church will celebrate the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. On this Solemnity, Catholics celebrate the mystery that "Mary, Immaculate Mother of God ever Virgin, after finishing the course of her life on earth, was taken up in body and soul to heavenly glory" (Pope Pius XII, Munificentissimus Deus, Nov. 1, 1950).

Mary's bodily assumption into heaven is a dogma of the Catholic faith, that is, a truth contained in divine revelation. Pope Pius XII wrote that Mary "was taken up body and soul into heavenly glory, and exalted by the Lord as Queen over all things, so that she might be the more fully conformed to her Son, the Lord of lords and conqueror of sin and death" (Ibid.).

As Mary uniquely shared in her Son's mission on earth, so too she shares uniquely in his glory in heaven. Her "yes" to the archangel Gabriel ushered in the Incarnation, the Son of God becoming man (cf. Lk 1:26-38). Without losing her virginal integrity, she gave birth to Jesus in Bethlehem, wrapping him in swaddling clothes and lying him in a manger (cf. Lk 2:1-7). She nursed him, cared for him, and presented him to God in the Temple (cf. Lk 2:22-38). She brought him to the Temple in Jerusalem to worship his Heavenly Father (cf. Lk 2:41-52).

During his public ministry, she followed him as his most faithful disciple, hearing the word of God and keeping it with all her heart (cf. Lk 2:19; Mt 12:46-50; Lk 11:27-28). When

he was crucified, she stood at the foot of his cross, embracing the Beloved Disciple, St. John, as her own son (cf. Jn 19:25-27). Having felt the sword of suffering pierce her own heart at her Son's death and burial (cf. Lk 2:34-35), how fitting it is that she should uniquely share in his Resurrection from the dead and Ascension into heaven! Mary's Assumption "is a singular participation in her Son's Resurrection and an anticipation of the resurrection of other Christians" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 966). Mary "already shares in the glory of her Son's Resurrection, anticipating the resurrection of all members of his Body" (Ibid., 974). This mystery foreshadows our own destiny of being body and soul in heaven with God. As Mary exercised her spiritual motherhood over the early Church, gathered with and around her in prayer, so Mary "continues in heaven to exercise her maternal role on behalf of the members of Christ" (Pope St. Paul VI, Credo of the People of God, 15; cf. Acts 1:13-14).

The Solemnity of the Assumption is a Holy Day of Obligation – a day when good Catholics attend Mass just as they do on Sundays. The Mass times for the Solemnity of the Assumption are: Wednesday, Aug. 14 - 5:30 p.m. at St. Patrick Church in Amboy and 7 p.m. at St. Flannen Church in Harmon; Thursday, Aug. 15-7 a.m. at St. Patrick Church in Amboy and 6 p.m. at St. Mary Church in Walton. What a great way to begin the new school year by entrusting ourselves and our students to the prayers and maternal protection of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

With Friends Like These

udrey Hepburn once quipped that all she needed to know about a character was the clothes she had to wear for the part. In British author Claire McGowan's "What You Did," the emotional depth of her characters never strays beyond the clothes they wear. A tedious and rather lazy stratagem – why, for goodness' sake, should the reader care – yet it does manage to convey the comprehensive superficiality of her narrator. Ali is a suburban housewife who is given to talking about her life in self-satisfied clichés: "These days, now that everything is over, I often find myself thinking of the moment it all changed. The small slice of time when my life went from perfect, or, OK, not perfect but pretty good at least, to utterly ruined."

The moment Ali is describing is when late one night after a drunken party, Karen, Ali's best friend of 25 years, staggers into her kitchen, bruised, a trickle of blood running down her thigh, sobbing that she has been raped. Falling dramatically to her knees, Karen accuses Ali's husband Mike of raping her. Karen is one of a group of friends who has gathered at Ali and Mike's for a reunion. Though they were inseparable during their time at Oxford University, most have not seen each other in over two decades.

Ali, who is proud to volunteer at a women's shelter, knows all too well about violent rapes, but without hesitation, she takes her husband's side against her best friend. In their college days, Mike, a rich, spoiled fellow, was the big catch, and Ali snagged him when she gave Mike an alibi in an unsolved murder case. Ali was richly rewarded with a good marriage, two children, a posh mansion in the Kent countryside, and the respectability of the English upper class.

Ali sets about defending her husband, as well as solving the mystery of the old murder. McGowan is not shy about piling on – she tosses multiple adulteries, two attempted murders, cyber bullying, and additional treacheries and betrayals into the mix. Quite a bit for a suburban housewife to handle. But she does, even though only two characters, Ali's young son Benji and Bill, a saintly and ruggedly handsome member of the group, are moderately likeable. The rest, including Ali, are liars and manipulators, but she at least wears stylish clothes.

Mental health treatment a good place to start in reducing mass shootings

ast week, I sat in this small Texas town Guest Column and listened to a mother tell me how a gunman killed her son as he hunkered in a classroom closet.

Her boy was one of 10 people killed in the May 18,2018, shooting at Santa Fe High School. In the wake of the tragedy, she works in a counseling center that is helping the commu-

I'm glad psychiatric care is available for the victims, but there might not be any victims if the shooter had received such care.

After all, what mentally well person would shoot-up a mall, a store or a school?

In recent years, our alternatives for dealing with the dangerously mentally ill have dimin-

According to an Ohio State University Study,

there were 400,000 patients in American mental

hospitals in 1950, a time when the population of the United States was half what it is today.

Today, that number is about 30,000.

1970s with the best of intentions. The idea was to transition these troubled souls into community-based out-patient care. Instead, millions By Scott Reeder ended up homeless on American streets.

Communities such as East Moline, Galesburg, Kankakee, Jacksonville and Peoria once housed large state facilities dedicated not only to caring for the afflicted but protecting society from the potentially dangerous.

And the story is the same in other states. Closing mental institutions, after all, was a national phenomenon.

If the rate of hospitalization had kept pace with population growth, about one million Americans would be receiving in-patient care for mental health issues, Dr. E. Fuller Torrey, founder of the Treatment Advocacy Center, said in a recent Wall Street Journal column. Perhaps not surprisingly, the frequency of

mass shootings has increased steadily since the 1980s, when the closing of state mental hospitals reached its peak.

Torrey noted that multiple studies have reported that, at any given time, between 40% and 50% of those who in an

earlier era would have received hospital care are receiving no treatment for their mental illness.

America emptied its public psychiatric hospitals without ensuring that the released patients would receive the necessary treatment to control their symptoms. We should not be surprised by these outbreaks of violence.

Torrey notes, multiple studies done between 2000 and 2015 suggest that about a third of mass killers have an untreated severe mental illness. If mental illness is defined more broadly, the percentage is higher. In 2018 the FBI released a report that found that 40% of the shooters had received a psychiatric diagnosis, and 70% had "mental health stressors" or "mental health concerning behaviors" before the attack. But thinking in a broader since, what rational person would


Mandatory injectable antipsychotic medication, which can

commit a mass murder?

be effective for as long as three months, may be something we should consider for individuals who refuse to take their medication. And, yes, we may need to consider expanding in-patient treatment options as well.

Is mental health treatment the only factor in reducing mass shootings? No. But it's a good place to start.





Illinois high schools can now offer hunter safety courses for credit

SPRINGFIELD – A bipartisan-backed law passed last month gives Illinois public schools the option of offering hunter safety education for course credit.

Currently, anyone born after Jan. 1, 1980, must take a class and get a certificate in order to qualify for a valid hunting license. Classes are offered by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources, are affordable, and generally take place over the course of two days. Jeff Hopkins, the department's safety

education administrator, says that allowing

students to take the classes in high school makes it more convenient for them and exposes more people to the idea of hunter safety.

Before the law was passed, some schools offered hunter safety as part of a larger curriculum, such as natural resource management, he said. Now they can offer it for credit. And the Illinois Department of Natural Resources is happy to help. 'It (the law) is a wonderful thing," he said.

"If more teachers want to become certified, we'll put them through the process, make

them certified instructors, and they can offer and can teach the program in the schools. We already have the standardized materials and manuals for the students."

The department's course meets international standards, Hopkins said, and Illinois hunters who have state certification can hunt in all 50 states, which is not the case for older hunters who might have just purchased licenses.

Hopkins stressed that hunting safety is about much more than handling firearms.

"Hunter safety features how to be safe in the

field, and that incorporates everything from hunter responsibilities, hunter ethics, wildlife conservation, wildlife management," he said. We talk about state regulations and laws.

'Archery, bow hunting – that's a big thing now, and then we definitely have to cover tree-stand safety, because individuals now are doing a lot of hunting out of the trees. Actually, the majority of hunting incidents that we have now are tree-stand falls."

So, the new law, he said, "is definitely a plus for the students."

New graduation requirement for Illinois high school students: File a FAFSA Illinois is ranked 10th among all 50 states and Washington

SPRINGFIELD - High school seniors in Illinois will soon be required to fill out a federal financial aid request before getting a diploma.

A new law that takes effect starting in the 2020-2021 school

year requires students to apply for financial aid, regardless of their post-high school plans. Illinois Gov. J.B. Pritzker said he signed the bill into law

to help encourage more students to seek additional education after high school. "We want Illinois' young people and anybody that wants to go to school, community college or university, to be able

to do so," the governor said. The new law requires graduating seniors to fill out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid, or FAFSA form. Students can opt-out by signing a document indicating they understand the FAFSA forms and choose not to take part.

FAFSA funding can be used for four-year universities, community colleges or trade schools.

There's a direct correlation between the number of students who complete the FAFSA application and the percentage of students who attend college, according to the National College Access Network. Some 90 percent of high school seniors who complete a FAFSA form attend college directly from high school. That number drops to 55 percent for those who do not complete a FAFSA form, according to the National College Access Network website.

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
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D.C. in FAFSA completion, with 63.3 percent of students graduating this past spring completing the form, according to data compiled by the network. The governor said opening the door to more financial

aid for college will help bring more federal dollars to help Illinois students. We're out to make sure that we bring as many federal

dollars as we can to help our students go to school here in Illinois, or anywhere else that they choose," Pritzker said. The new graduation requirement could mean a boost in

community college and trade school enrollment. Matt Berry, a spokesman for the Illinois Community College Board, said the FAFSA law could show more high

school seniors that attending community college or trade schools are a possibility. It will "make college an opportunity for more students,"

Berry also said the financial aid application process

could help students to start thinking about post-high school plans earlier.

"I think it gets students thinking about the possibilities of community college earlier on in the process and gets them prepared and ready to go sooner than many of the students who might not otherwise," he said.

Berry said the new requirement also "allows the community college system to get connected with students earlier and make those contacts and relationships and really show students what the possibilities are for them, not just a fouryear degree." Supporters of the new law have said it's intended to show

students the possibilities for post-secondary education. Opponents of similar legislation have said that requiring the FAFSA application could lead to more students accumulated more debt without fully understanding the costs associated with long term debt.

Some have also raised concerns about the additional costs for high schools to comply with the new law.





at the Fire Station starting at 7 a.m.





Real winners of 50/50 raffle are local organizations

The story behind the story is the 50/50 drawing is the most exciting part of the Amboy Depot Days for many people. As part of the Depot Days celebration the car show started having a 50/50 drawing. In the early days, the ticket holder took home 50 percent of the drawing and the Amboy Depot was the recipient of the other cash. The Amboy Depot Museum is still a recipient of a cash donation, but the car show committee has had the opportunity to donate to many other community interests as well.

The drawing grew over the years and

the recipient list has grown as well. Over the years, the lucky ticket holders have realized winnings of anywhere from \$8,400 in 2001 to \$149.333 in 2015. The 50/50 drawing grew at a rapid rate over the past few years. Last year's winner took home \$99,530. Again this year second - fifth place will also receive a cash prize of \$5,000.

But the real winners are the local organizations that benefit from a piece of the pot. Last year's recipients were Amboy, Sublette and Ashton fire departments, Amboy Depot Museum, local food pantries, Lee County Fair Association, Ashton Lions Club, Lee County Shop with a Cop, Buddy Bags, Lee County Ag in the Classroom, Dixon PADS Shelter, Amboy's Central School Library, Pankhurst Memorial Library, Amboy FFA Chapter, Amboy Lions Club, BWB & the A-Team, Lee County Veterans Assistance Committee, Lee County Emergency Management Agency, City of Amboy, Amboy American Legion, Lee County Historical Society, Franklin Grove Fundraisers, Teen Turf, Special Olympics, and Sublette 365. In total, these organizations received about

\$66,000 through the 50/50 drawing this past year.


Each year organizations are able to submit a request for a donation from the committee to assist with their needs. The letter needs to be clear on what the funds are being sought for and the amount they are requesting. After the car show is done, the committee meets to recap the recent show and to review the requests. The entire committee votes on which of the requests and decides on the amount to be rewarded.



Performing Rock 'N Roll hits of the 1950s, 60s and 70s as well as surf, rockabilly, and original songs, 'Rick Lindy & The Wild Ones' are sure to be a hit with people of all ages.

Rick Lindy

Rick got his first bit of Rockabilly fever at the age of 11 when his sister Caren bought him his first guitar. He began writing songs around that age, usually parody songs about his 7th grade teacher Gary Tate. Always a fan of 50's and 60's and country music, Rick began learning tunes of his favorites like Marty Robbins, Buddy Holly, Roy Orbison, Johnny Cash and the late great Hank Williams Sr.

His late Father Richard Sr. a WWII Veteran was an accomplished Saxophone and Clarinet Player and organist. Rick was encouraged by his parents to perform for relatives and guest while visiting the family home.

In and after high school, Rick was cast as the lead in many musicals such as Bye Bye Birdie, South Pacific, 1776, The Music man, The Sound of Music, Annie Get Your Gun. How to Succeed in Business without Really Trying and many more. A graduate of the American Academy of Art in Chicago, Rick studied Illustration and Advertising and design. After graduation, Rick's mom Dorothy saw an ad for an audition for a male singer in a travelling band. It turned out to be the Serendipity Singers, and Rick was hired for a twoyear contract. He lived on a tour bus even in the dead of winter. With the "dips," Rick toured all over the USA and Canada.

Rick left the "dips" in 1992. He entertained at The Imperial Palace in Las Vegas and the Aladdin Hotel. He found the heat intolerable so he left Vegas and started Rick Lindy and The Cyclones with Wild Ones members Todd Menke and Butch Nelson.

In 1996, Rick and Butch joined Big Guitars from Memphis and began touring nationwide and abroad in Europe. He has had the pleasure of opening up for Johnny Cash in 1997, Robert Gordon in Norway 1998, and Hank Thompson in Sweden 1999. He is also personal friends with Sun Rockabilly legend Hayden Thompson who sang on the Wild Ones first album, Wild Side of Town.

Currently Rick is also working close at hand with Scott Mackay of true Oldies 94.7FM, planning various tribute shows. Rick also has been combining talents with Anthony Smith in Guitar Street band. He will be performing various solo shows and combining talents with other musicians in the very near future.

Rick's hobbies are collecting antiques, old movies, drawing and painting... and spending time with his beloved dogs Roxy, Petey and Yoda.

Todd Menke – Lead Guitar

The original lead guitarist of the band is Todd Menke. He began playing guitar

at age 12 and caught on so quickly that older teenagers were asking him to join their bands. Todd was told about Rick Lindy's talent in 1992 and approached Rick to come over to his house to play some music. The two hit it off and formed a band with Steve Dvorak on lead guitar, Todd jumped on the standup bass and Al Wagner on drums who was later replaced with Butch Wahx.

They formed a group called Rick Lindy and The Cyclones, a raw Rockabilly quartet, which was the launching pad for The Wild Ones.

he Amboy Depot Museum is located in a former depot and division headquarters of the Illinois Central Railroad located in downtown Amboy. The structure is an architecturally unique two-story building built of brick and cut Joliet limestone and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

The Depot has been completely restored both inside and out and includes the original brick tarmac surrounding the depot and the grounds of the former rail-yard, which is now preserved as a city park. Also reconstructed were the distinctive chimney caps on the building's eight chimneys, fully restoring the building to its original exterior configuration. Within the museum are artifacts of both the history of Amboy and the Illinois Central Railroad.

The museum complex also includes a freight house with additional artifacts, a

fully restored one-room country school-house, a retired steam engine and a caboose. Everyone is welcome to stop in and enjoy some local history at one of the best small-town depot museums to be found anywhere.

The Amboy Depot Museum and gift shop will be open to the public throughout Depot Days.

Their regular hours are from 1 – 4 p.m., Sunday and Thursday, and from 10 a.m. – 4 p.m., Friday and Saturday. They are closed on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. The Depot closes for the season from Nov. 1 through March 31.

The museum is located on Main Street, two blocks west of US 52. There is no admission; donations are accepted. They may be reached by phone at 815-857-4700 or e-mail information@amboydepotmuseum.

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Safety a priority at Depot Days

he Amboy Fire Department will ramp up the safety procedures during the Amboy Depot Days again this year.

"Each year we try to build on the services that we were able to offer the year before," said Amboy Fire Chief Jeff Bryant.

During the 2019 Depot Days there will once again be a cooling center housed inside the Lee County Farm Bureau Building from 10 a.m. – 4 p.m. There will be an area for cooling off, an area to have your vitals checked, a first aid station, a triage area and a treatment area that will be staffed by EMTs and a physician from Mercy Health.

In addition to the cooling center, there will be five mobile ATV with an EMT and a paramedic on them to assist visitors as needed.

There will also be four stations throughout the area, staffed by local churches and FFA, that will dispense free water. The water is donated by Republic Services and the Amboy Lions

Club

"One of the major issues we have seen over the years, is that people become dehydrated," said Bryant. "So we hope to alleviate issues by having free water available to everyone. The water was donated by the Amboy Lions and Republic Service. Area churches and FFA will handle dispensing the water."

"Every year we get better and are better prepared to handle emergencies," said Bryant.

The attendance at the car show on Sunday averages about 100,000 people.

In addition, area departments who will assist this years event include fire-fighters and EMTS from Advanced EMS Dixon, Sublette Fire Department, Harmon Fire Department, Lee Fire Department, Freeport Fire Department and Compton Fire Department.

"The weather definitely dictates the day," said Bryant. "If it is as hot, we will be busy."

Handicap parking will be available at the Amboy Fire Department parking lot.

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
