I think about those who have truly earned our respect, for they have brought us to where we are today by their service, their sacrifice, and their experience. I hate to admit it, but there can be a

subtle ageism even in a church setting. You see and hear it in the frequent friction between "contemporary" and "traditional" worship formats, as if you have to choose one or the other. While there is a benefit to updating and considering fresh ways to convey timeless messages, we should not dismiss the saints who have gone before us, and who are still with us, and those things that resonate with them. An occasional "thee," "thou," or "thine" doest a person good, because it helps to keep us connected with our heritage.

I figure there is or may be someone in each of our lives who has a story to share, maybe an aging parent or grandparent or that gentleman who sits on his front porch down on the corner, day after day, watching over the neighborhood. Maybe it is the gentle lady quietly tending her precious flower beds, whose green thumb you have admired, but whose name you never learned. Maybe it is someone who is in the twilight of his or her life and sits looking out the window at a care facility, watching the world pass by.

It doesn't matter who they are or where they live, there are plenty of opportunities to reach out to a senior. And there is very little cost involved. All that is required is an ear to listen, a heart to love, and a hand to hold, and a little time to share.

By the way, regarding time...don't squander this precious commodity and allow the opportunity to connect with an elder pass you by. For some, for them, time may be short. So, what are you waiting for?

Finding The True And Lasting Value In Life

BY PASTOR JOHN KALEBAUGH ately we have been talking in our congregation about the importance of "letting go" of things in our lives. These may include negative things in our past which we are not proud of, but also the things that we may look to that are not bad but which we may seek to identify ourselves in any way apart from our identity in Christ.

The Apostle Paul wrote, Philippians 3:7-8 "But what things were gain to me, these I have counted loss for Christ. Yet indeed I also count all things loss for the excellence of the knowledge of Christ Jesus my Lord, for whom I have suffered the loss of all things, and count them as rubbish, that I may gain Christ." The verses preceding this text reveal to us that St. Paul came from, as we would say, "good stock."

He had also excelled academically (as a Pharisee) and that he strove to be the best moral person that he could be. Yet he realized that having a good and solid family heritage, academic achievement, or even moral goodness really did not help in terms of having a relationship with God. St. Paul realized in his own personal

life that if he placed all his confidence in lineage, that he would be missing out on something far greater – a relationship with Jesus Christ. Paul realized that Jesus was not just a "means to an end" (like getting to heaven) – but rather that a personal relationship with God through Jesus Christ was the ultimate goal in life. It wasn't his family name. It wasn't his academic achievements. It wasn't the fact that he was ... a very religious person. It was his relationship with Jesus Christ. Knowing Him. Identifying with Him. Even... as Paul often did, suffering with Him.

Why? Was it because the Apostle Paul liked suffering? Of course not. He was not foolish – he was actually highly intelligent. Rather Paul realized that most of the things of life which humanity places so much value on – a good name. A good job. A good reputation. If they are lived out apart from or in contrast to, Jesus Christ, then they will ultimately be the thing which we identify ourselves by – rather than Him.

How about you? From where do you seek your self-esteem and identification? Is it from your own (or your families) goodness? Or is it (as God desires) from Him? My hope is that you find true and lasting value in life through the ultimate source of life – God.

Toni Morrison in Her Own Words

oni Morrison, one of our greatest and most honored novelists, died on Aug. 5, 2019, at the age of 88. I vividly remember coming upon Morrison's strange, exhilarating novel "Sula" with its precise lyrical prose, and how I strong-armed my friends into reading it. "Sula" is the story of the friendship of two young black women, Sula and Nell. Nell is responsible for everything, whereas Sula, as Morrison said of her years later, was frivolous. "But," Morrison added, "freedom is choosing what you want to be responsible for. Space doesn't permit me to discuss Morrison's work, so

I've decided to have her speak, as in her 1993 speech upon receiving the Nobel Prize in Literature. "When language dies," Morrison told her audience, "...infantile heads of state and power merchants whose evacuated language leaves them with no access to what is left of their human instincts for they speak only to those who obey, or in order to force obedience." Furthermore, "oppressive language does more than represent violence; it is violence; does more than represent the limits of knowledge; it limits knowledge.'

'Like statist language, censored and censoring. Ruthless in its policing duties, it has no desire or purpose other than maintaining the free range of its own narcotic narcissism, its own exclusivity and dominance. However moribund, it is not without effect for it actively thwarts the intellect, stalls conscience, suppresses human potential. Unreceptive to interrogation, it cannot form or tolerate new ideas, shape other thoughts, tell another story, fill baffling silences."

Morrison often said that evil in literature bored her. "I always thought that evil, war, murder, all these things needed a tuxedo or top hat or drumroll because fundamentally they are not complex, they are not interesting. They are devastating. That is all. What is really interesting to me is their opposite, which has no top hat, has no musical, has nothing. It's just goodness. You don't get anything with or for it."

But... "You cannot erase whole races of people on a continent," Morrison told an interviewer, "unless you have persuaded yourself that they are not people or their lives are not worthy or that you have a mission to do that. No human being can do that unless you believe it is better for those people to be dead. If, as in Brazil, you get on an airplane to fly around and shoot Indians for sport, you have to persuade yourself that they are sport. I don't know if that's malice or psychosis, but it exists, and the people who do it, know it, they know they are living a lie.

In a 2004 commencement address at Wellesley College, Morrison said, "I am a teller of stories and therefore an optimist, a believer in the ethical bend of the human heart, a believer in the mind's disgust with fraud and its appetite for truth, a believer in the ferocity of beauty.'

magine the disappointment of getting ready to put on civilian clothes and walk Guest Column - and hair dye - for maybe another seven years.

I wanted to feel bad for Blagojevich, but out the prison gate and then being told, 'Oh, never mind.'

That's what reportedly happened to former Illinois Gov. Rod Blagojevich last week, when President Donald Trump waffled on whether to commute his sentence.

I almost felt sorry for Blagojevich. Almost. But then I remembered Blagojevich also governed with a wetted finger in the air trying to figure out which way the political breeze was blowing any particular day. He changed his mind often.

So far, he has served a little over half of his 14-year sentence. But Trump said, "I think he was treated very, very unfairly. His name is Rod Blagojevich and I'm thinking about commuting his sentence." The statement hacked off Illinois' Republican members

of Congress who wrote a letter to Trump telling him to keep Blago in the clink.

Later, the president tweeted about Blagojevich's sentence, saying "White House is continuing review of this matter." According to Fox News, a member of the president's

administration halted the commutation because the person was "concerned from the public push back."

He was an ordinary fellow who worked for the state of Illinois organizing ceremonies and events. He taught art in schools and volunteered for the Boy Scouts. He was a nice guy all the

On Blagojevich's first day in office, Raney organized a news conference for the governor. I was standing next to Raney, notebook in hand, when Blagojevich's press aides handed out a news release announcing the people the governor was firing.

I heard Raney gasp as he read the release and saw his own name on the list.

Imagine being asked to organize the news conference where they would announce your

Does it get any lower than that?

Well, maybe finding out by Tweet that you're not going to be released from prison after all comes close. But still...

The same week that Raney learned of his firing at the news conference he organized, Blagojevich hosted another media event. This time it was to condemn people who were being paid for unused vacation time at the end of their careers with the state.

Blagojevich issued a press release listing names of the

"worst offenders."

One of the people on the list was Kim Knauer, a hard worker who was spokesperson for the Illinois Board of Education for 20 years. Even during her seven-year battle with breast cancer, she worked long hours. She died two weeks before Blagojevich took office.

At the end of the news conference, several reporters approached the governor and asked if he was aware one of the people on the list had just died.

The governor responded by saying if she had taken more vacation time she might still be alive.

Try as I might, I just can't feel sorry for Blagojevich. I do have sympathy for his wife and two daughters though. Like 2.3 million other American families, they know the pain of being separated from a loved one who is incarcerated.

But should they get special treatment because the criminal in their family knows the president?

Let's not forget Blagojevich is in prison for attempting to trade an appointment to Barack Obama's U.S. Senate seat for personal gain as well as for trying to shake down executives from a children's hospital and the horse-racing industry for campaign contributions.

Corruption of this severity warrants a lengthy prison sentence. My thoughts when he was sentenced were that 14 years wasn't nearly enough.

There are many people in prison serving lengthy sentences who deserve to have their time behind bars shortened. But Blagojevich isn't one of them.
