Depot Museum gets ready for Depot Days

AMBOY-The Amboy Depot Museum, built in 1876, is preparing for the 37th Annual Depot Days Celebration. Board Member Jack Dempsey was on hand Thursday as new storm windows were installed and painting was completed.

Phil Young and his son, Conner, installed the last of the 52 storm windows. "This is a high quality product", Young said of the Accoya® Wood used for the custom-made storm windows that contain double strength glass. The wood is acetylated, which reduces the ability of the wood's cell walls to absorb water by 80 percent and therefore less likely to swell, shrink or twist. The windows are warranted against fungal decay for at least 50 years in above the ground applications. The product is also non-toxic, fully reusable and recyclable.

Also working at the depot was Working Girl Painting of Dixon. A coat of paint was added to exterior windowsills before the storm windows were installed. Shirley Bender had been busy patching and painting ceilings and the hallway on the

Bender has done other work at the museum and hopes to be able to work on the stairwell walls sometime in the near future.

Sublette board tables construction of new building

— Failing to get a second to a motion to approve a bid from Phalen Steel for building a new maintenance building, the Village of Sublette Board of Trustees voted to table moving forward with the bids until next month.

The Sublette Village Board met on Monday night with all board members present. Sublette Village President Michael Vaessen told the board that two bids for the new maintenance building were opened in early August. Of the two bids, Phalen Steel of Mendota, came in the lowest at a cost of \$379,855. The second bid came in around \$497,000.

Sublette Village Trustee Brian Wilson made a motion to approve the bid from Phalen Steel.

Vaessen told the board, that local subcontractors were lined up if the bid was approved.

Sublette Village Trustee Jerry Leffelman suggested that the village could maybe save some money by redesigning the building and making the building smaller.

Getting your kicks on Route 66

The Mother Road offers amazing sights as it winds through Illinois

erhaps it is the yearning for yesteryear that endears so many to

Who wouldn't want to jump into a classic car and explore the United States, stopping at shiny new service stations to pump gas into your vehicle, or sip a cold drink from the soda shops that dot the roadway? Such sepia-toned wishes of driving the Mother Road in its heyday could prompt many of us to start packing for a trip.

Ford had been mass-producing vehicles for a little more than a decade when Route 66 was commissioned on Nov.

11, 1926. It was one of the original highways within the U.S. Highway System, its 2,448 miles starting in Chicago before arriving on the West Coast in Los Angeles (and later the Santa Monica Pier).

By 1985, Route 66 had been removed from the federal highway system, as the entire road had been replaced by the Interstate Highway System.

But it's still possible to get an idea of what the roadway looked like: Just stop in Lexington to take a trip down "Memory Lane," a one-mile stretch of the original 1926 alignment of Route 66 pavement. It was turned into an interpretive trail and is open year-round to pedestrians and bicycles. There, people can delight in the restored vintage billboards and signage.

Despite it not being part of the Interstate Highway System, every year thousands still travel



Route 66 to explore the communities that make up America's Main Street.

Just a small area of Route 66 in Illinois can net some fun experiences. Take Macoupin County: Stop in Girard for a handmade soda at Doc's Soda Fountain, which opened in 1929 as part of Deck's Drug Store.

Take in the 22-foot-high granite monument in Mount Olive of Mary Harris "Mother" Jones, known for her work as an organizer for the United Mine Workers. And, if you're willing to go off the beaten path, you can find the 34 separate bird tracks an errant turkey left on the wet highway cement in the 1920s (find them south of Nilwood on Donaldson Road).

Any road trip should include visits to the many giant characters that call various Route 66 communities home. The Gemini Giant still towers over Wilmington. He holds a rocket and wears a space helmet — unlike his counterpart, the Lauterbach Man in Springfield, which holds an American flag and wears a stocking cap. Both are 28-foot "Muffler Man" creations from International Fiberglass, which were made as a promotional tool for auto shops.

Of course, the 19-foot fiberglass man holding a hot dog in Atlanta shouldn't be missed either (too bad it's not closer to the giant catsup bottle that served as a water tower in Collinsville). And don't forget to stop in Lincoln to see the 12-foot-tall Abraham Lincoln on a 24-foottall covered wagon.

There are too many amazing sights to be seen on the Mother Road to list them all. But we offer a few suggestions for those who hop on the roadway at its starting point near Lake Michigan in Chicago and head southwest as they aim to get their kicks on the portion of Route 66 that travels through Illinois.

Texaco Station, 417 W. Waupansie St. in Dwight

Ambler's Texaco in Dwight is a shining example of the domestic-style gas stations along Route 66 during the mid-20th

Built in 1933, the station had wood clapboard siding, an arched roof and residential windows adorned with shutters and flower boxes. Three Texaco gas pumps out front were sheltered by a canopy.

In 2002, it was donated to the village of Dwight, which, with the help of the National Park Service, restored it and turned it into a visitor center.

Route 66 Association Hall of Fame & Museum, 110 W. **Howard St. in Pontiac**

With the world's largest painting of the Route 66 shield on the outside and thousands of artifacts inside, the Route 66 Association Hall of Fame & Museum in Pontiac is a shrine to the starting stretch of the Mother Road.

The current incarnation opened in a former firehouse in 2004 and honors people and places that made significant contributions to the history and character of the road.

Beer Nuts, 103 N. Robinson St. in Bloomington Travelers have been able to find Beer Nuts since 1937.

That's the year Arlo Shirk and his father, Edward Shirk, bought a small confectionery store in downtown Bloomington, along with the recipe for a special glazed peanut. In 1950, the Shirks packaged the first bag for a local liquor store, calling them "Shirk's Glazed Peanuts." Three years later, the name was changed to Beer Nuts.

International Route 66 Mother Road Festival, **Downtown Springfield**

More than 1,000 classic cars and tens of thousands of spectators annually attend the three-day International Route 66 Mother Road Festival in downtown Springfield. This year's is scheduled for Sept.

There always has been food, special guests and musical entertainment. But from the Friday night cruise and restoration-parts vendors to the classic restored cars, trucks and motorcycles lining the curbs, it has been the motors that matter.





A notorious woman

ike millions of Americans, I am a fan of Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg, "the Notorious RBG," as she became known in 2013 after her blistering minority opinion when the Supreme Court gutted a key section of the Voting Rights Act. Section 5 covered pre-clearance for five Southern states, but in Shelby County v. Holder, the Court countermanded the authority of the Justice Department to dispute changes made in the five states. Justice Ginsburg warned that getting rid of the measure was like "throwing away your umbrella in a rainstorm because you are not getting wet."

Justice Ginsburg became an instant culture hero on the Internet. Tee shirts and coffee mugs appeared with the logo "The Notorious RBG," a sly take-off on the famous rapper "The Notorious B.I.G." The book "The Notorious RBG" by Irin Carmon and Shana Knizhnik became a bestseller, and the documentary by the same name and in theaters now is a huge hit. At 85, Justice Ginsburg had reversed Gloria Steinem's dictum, "Women lose power with

It has not always been so. Feminists were antagonistic to Ginsburg because she did not like Roe v. Wade. A gradualist, she firmly believed that a woman's right to choose an abortion should have been accomplished case by case, rather than the sweeping 50-state mandate. Considering the awful struggle over a woman's right to choose, Ginsburg proved right.

The book is a fascinating short history of "the Life and Times of Ruth Bader Ginsburg." Born in 1933 in Brooklyn (she still retains her Brooklyn accent), she married Marty Ginsburg in 1954 and their daughter was born a year later. In those days, a woman, no matter how brilliant, was to put family first. Thus, when in 1956 she enrolled at Harvard Law School, she had to leave two years later.

In many ways, Ginsburg's career reflects the history of the women's rights movement. She has been called the Thurgood Marshall of the Women's Movement. In 1972, she became the co-founder of the ACLU's Women's Rights Project. She argued six cases in front of the Supreme Court and won five of them. Arguing that women, like black Americans, have an unalterable characteristic, they must be freed from so-called special protections: "The pedestal has all too often been a cage.

Bill Clinton nominated Ginsburg to the Supreme Court in 1993. Her first victory came in 1996 in United States v. Virginia, a landmark case in which the Supreme Court struck down the long-standing male-only admission policy of the Virginia Military Institute. With the VMI decision, the high court effectively struck down any law which, as Justice Ginsburg wrote, "denies to women, simply because they are women, full citizenship stature — equal opportunity to aspire, achieve, participate in and contribute to society."

Missouri's right-to-work vote: Boon or boondoggle?

Missouri showing voters struck down the state's pending right-to-work law.

AFL-CIO President Richard Trumka called it a tremendous achievement."

Is this a sea change for unions in the Midwest? A signal that worker freedom will forever be squashed in non-right-to-work Illinois?

In fact, the union strategy in Illinois' southwestern neighbor should leave some rank-and-file members scratching their heads. The victory was expensive, potentially short-lived and may even cut against some of the unions' other political priorities.

It's yet another reason workers might want to keep more of their paychecks in their own pockets, rather than seeing those dollars thrown away on political crapshoots.

Some background: In February 2017, now-disgraced former Missouri Gov. Eric Greitens signed a right-to-work bill into law. A right-to-work law doesn't change collective bargaining. It

doesn't change union representation. It doesn't even necessarily weaken unions, especially if they treat members well. It only does one thing: right to work allows workers to withhold their money from a union if they don't feel like it is representing his or her interests effectively.

Without right-to-work protections currently offered in 27 states, you pay the union or lose your job. It's very simple.

Unlike Illinois, Missouri gives motivated citizens a fighting

Thions across the country declared victory late Tuesday as numbers rolled in from Guest Column so, following Greitens's signature, unions rounded up 300,000 signatures to block the law's implementation By Austin Berg until voters had a choice at the ballot box

> To say unions outspent right-to-work proponents would be an understatement. It was an avalanche.

The union-backed We Are Missouri Coalition raised more than \$16 million from labor organizations and spent nearly \$7 million on ads in July alone. They outspent two opposing groups combined by a nearly 5 to 1 margin, according to the Wall Street Journal's analysis of state filings.

With that money, unions secured a landslide

Or did they?

An important thing to note about the Missouri case is that Greitens could not have played more into unions' hands.

Too eager to pass a landmark reform, he gave organizers most of the spring and all of the summer to gather signatures. Any firstyear lobbyist would have taken a different tack. State lawmakers could have waited to vote on a right-to-work bill until the last day of session in mid-May, waited to send the bill to the governor until the end of May and then Greitens could have sat on it well into July before signing, thus giving motivated interests just a few weeks to gather signatures – rather than six months.

Unfortunately for union members who saw millions of dollars in dues money flow to this fight, that gamesmanship is still very much on the table. If Missouri Republicans hold on to their supermajorities in November, which is not unlikely, a right-to-work

bill will certainly bubble up yet again in 2019.

And that brings us to the electoral angle.

Missouri U.S. Sen. Claire McCaskill is perhaps the most vulnerable Democratic senator in the country. Millions of union dollars that flowed to the right-to-work battle will no longer go to support her. And millions of dollars that weren't spent trying to outmaneuver unions in that fight will flow to her opponent, Republican Missouri Attorney General Josh Hawley.

Despite the right-to-work proposition being the star of the primary election, Missouri Republicans cast about 60,000 more votes than Missouri Democrats statewide. That's not a good sign for McCaskill.

So, at the end of the day, what did union members get in exchange for millions of dollars?

An opportunity for union officials to pat themselves on the back, a weaker position in a key congressional race and a few more months, though possibly years, of compulsory dues.

Private sector union members in right-to-work states have reason to ask themselves that question, because they have a choice in whether to fund those fights.

Missouri's private sector union members have little reason to, because they still don't.
