

County Board get update on Law Enforcement Center

DIXON — The Lee County Board received an update on the Law Enforcement Center from Lee County Sheriff John Simonton at the meeting held on Tuesday, June. 19. The building is on track and all systems are go. The plan is to have the shell erected and the roof on so that workers can be out of the elements over the winter months.

Addressing security measures, Simonton and Lee County Board Chair Jim Wentling, will be permanently locking the Old Courthouse's Second Street entrances to reduce the amount of public access to the building. The building will be accessible to the public from the south side of the courthouse's third street entrance via stairs and handicap ramp.

The board approved a motion to suspend the rules under VIII Rules and Procedures. They also approved three ordinances for the Enterprise Zone.

An ordinance regarding law enforcement regulations will be held over until July.

The prevailing wage, which was held over from the May meeting, was approved with a roll call vote, 14 ayes and 6 nays.

The board approved the appointment of William Shaw, trustee of the Amboy Fire Protection District for a three year term.

Lee Center Church to celebrate 175th anniversary

LEE CENTER – The Lee Center First Congregational United Church of Christ, Lee Center, was organized by the Rev. Joseph Gardner at the home of Moses Crombie on July 5, 1843, under the name of the First Congregational Church of Palatine Grove. For some time services were held at the Crombie home which was situated near the south end of Crombie Lane. The house was later moved to Amboy and remodeled.

At the end of 1849 the church began holding services in the new Lee Center Academy building and in 1852 engaged it's first regular minister, the Rev. S. W. Phelps, at a salary of \$200 per year and use of the parsonage. In addition, during the winter

the parishioners gave the pastor a donation, which included about \$100 in cash and a large load of wood.

In October 1854, plans were initiated for erection of a church building. Completed in 1856, it joined the Methodist and the Episcopal churches in Lee Center. The pews in the church all had doors, and the seats were rented to the church members. Receipts from these "rentage slips" paid the pastors salary. An entertainment was held in Mr. Blake's store to raise money for the furnishings. It took all day for the ice cream to freeze, but was declared a success. Articles of fancy work were sold by the ladies and supper was served. Proceeds of

this sale purchased a roll of bright carpet from a store in Amboy, where it had just arrived from Boston.

The church has undergone several remodeling and additions over the years. It was wired for electricity in 1907. In 1917, a balcony was added along with back of the church to a corner under a newly erected tower. The bell was purchased by the "Wild Flower Club" from a Methodist Episcopal Church society in 1918 when their church was dismantled. The church sheds, which were used to shelter members horses during services, were torn down in 1926.

AMBOY – There is always something new and exciting happening at Teen Turf, where director Eileen Piper has been serving the youth of this community for many years.

Recently Megan Cheatham joined the effort at Teen Turf and is making a huge contribution to the youth that come there.

She is also learning new skills herself while she is there. Cheatham, from Ashton, recently returned home after spending four years at the Illinois School for the Visually Impaired at Jacksonville, Illinois. She learned many skills while she was there but is always learning and each day is an adventure.

On the day we visited, Cheatham and two of her friends, Sydney and Lexi, were in the kitchen with Flo Hamilton, the kitchen manager, and they were learning how to use a sharp knife. Each of the girls learned the proper handling of a sharp knife, blade pointed down while moving, and how to properly hold a knife while using it. Prior to wielding the knife, the girls were instructed how to place a wet dish cloth under their cutting board to prevent it from sliding. They proceeded to cut an onion with skills that were near perfect.

Cheatham is learning these and other skills while she is in the kitchen with Flo. She has mastered the art of making herself a peanut butter and banana sandwich and using the Keurig machine.

The final major change came to the building in 1949 when the annex was completed. It was built almost entirely by volunteer efforts. For several years it housed the overflow of pupils from the elementary school and in the basement the kitchen was used by Lee Center students as a cafeteria and also a base for meal preparation for over 600 students of District 271. The dining area was remodeled in 1977, again with volunteer help.

In 1953 and electric organ was installed to replace the pipe organ which had been installed in 1902. The wood from the pipe organ cabinet was made into what is now the present alter and lectern. The interior of the church contains extensive stenciling by an Amboy artist in 1952. In more recent years, the hardwood flooring of the church has been sanded and refinished, a lighted church sign placed in the front yard and a cement handicap ramp constructed.

The church has ordained nine ministers, sent out one minister to Turkey, has seen to other Congregational churches established in Amboy (1854) and Sublette (1871.) During the 1940s and 1950s, the church was yoked with the Amboy congregation, sharing a common pastor. At this time, the church is yoked with the Franklin Grove Presbyterian Church, with Jack Briggs serving as pastor.

During its 175 years, the church has been a moving force in the community. It continues to give focus and leadership in the Lee Center community. The congregation will celebrate the anniversary on July 15, at the 10:30 a.m. service.



Held June 21-23 in Peoria, the conference offered more than 30 educational sessions and workshops on topics of interest including cancer in the fire service, first responder resilience, financial reporting and the latest in legal and legislative developments that affect the

local operation of fire districts in the state of Illinois.

Attendees were also able to explore the latest in emergency response vehicles, fire apparatus, firefighter gear and technology being used to service today's fire departments.

Yesterday's fire service was about neighbors helping neighbors in the local communities. Today the fire service is more complex with concerns about accountability, disclosure, self-regulation and ethics.

Each year the state conference enables fire officials to keep up with trends and changes taking place.

Farm Service Agency county committee nominations begin June 15

AMBOY—The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) encourages America's farmers and ranchers to nominate candidates to lead, serve and represent their community on their local county committee. According to USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) Jerald Quinton County Executive Director, FSA will accept nominations for county committee members from Local Administrative Area (LAA) #3 which began Friday, June 15, and ends Wednesday, Aug. 1.

Producers across the country are already serving on committees where they play a critical role in the day-to-day operations of FSA, making important decisions on programs dealing with disaster and conservation, emergencies, commodity loan price support, county office employment and other agricultural issues.

"County committees are unique to FSA and allow producers to have a voice on federal farm program implementation at the local level," said Quinton. "It is also important that committees are comprised of members who fairly represent the diverse demographics of production agriculture for their community. I encourage all producers, including women, minority and beginning farmers and ranchers, to participate in the nomination and election process."

Nationwide, more than 7,700 dedicated farmers and ranchers serve on FSA county com-

mittees, which consist of three to 11 members and meet once a month, or as needed. Members serve three-year terms.

Producers can nominate themselves or others. Organizations, including those representing beginning, women and minority producers, may also nominate candidates to better serve their communities. To be eligible to serve on an FSA county committee, producers must participate or cooperate in an FSA program and reside in the area where the election is being held.

This year, nominations and elections for Lee County will be held in LAA #3, which includes Alto, Ashton, Brooklyn, Viola, Willow Creek and Wyoming Townships. An eligible voter listing for LAA #3 is available for viewing on the Lee County FSA Office's counter.

To be considered, a producer must sign an FSA-669A nomination form. The form and other information about FSA county committee elections are available at www.fsa.usda.gov/elections, or from the Lee County FSA office. All nomination forms for the 2018 election must be postmarked or received in the local FSA office by Aug. 1. Visit farmers.gov for more information.

Election ballots will be mailed to eligible voters beginning Nov. 5. Read more to learn about important election dates.

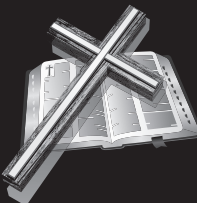

At first, it must have seemed preposterous, ridiculous, and impossible to the disciples' way of thinking. But just look what has happened over the last 2000+ years.

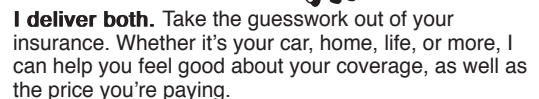

Manteno case sheds light on absurdity, severity of Illinois’ eavesdropping law

Paul Boron is 13 years old. He’s facing a felony eavesdropping charge that could change the course of the rest of his life.

Boron’s story stands as another chapter of controversy surrounding an eavesdropping law ripe for abuse, and state lawmakers should take action to fix it.

On Feb. 16, 2018, Boron was called to the principal’s office at Manteno Middle School after failing to attend a number of detentions. Before meeting Principal David Conrad and Assistant Principal Nathan Short, he began recording audio on his cellphone.

Boron said he argued with Conrad and Short for approximately 10 minutes in the reception area of the school secretary’s office, with the door open to the hallway. When Boron told Conrad and Short he was recording, Conrad told Boron he was committing a felony and promptly ended the conversation, Boron says.

Two months later, in April, Boron was charged with one count of eavesdropping – a class 4 felony in Illinois.

“If I do go to court and get wrongfully convicted, my whole life is ruined,” said Boron, who lives with his mother and four siblings in Manteno, Illinois, an hour southwest of Chicago. “I think they’re going too far.”

Boron’s mother, Leah McNally, was shocked when she learned about the charge against her son.

“It blew my mind that they would take it that far ... I want to see him be able to be happy and live up to his full potential in life, especially with the disability he has,” she said. Her son is legally blind in his right eye.

Illinois’ eavesdropping law is clear as mud on the matter of recording authority figures, which has led to a number of contentious legal battles and attempts at reform in recent years. Boron is not alone.

Christopher Drew, an artist arrested for selling artwork without a permit on a Chicago sidewalk in 2009, was charged with a felony for recording the incident.

In 2010, Bridgeport resident Michael Allison was charged with a felony for recording his own court hearing after the court did not provide a court reporter.

The same year, Chicagoan Tiawanda Moore was charged with a felony for recording conversations with Chicago Police Department investigators regarding her sexual misconduct complaint against

an officer.

These cases arose because the law established Illinois as an “all-party consent” state, where, essentially, recording any conversation unless all parties consented was a felony offense. Federal law and a majority of states allow for one-party consent.

In March 2014, the Illinois Supreme Court struck down Illinois’ eavesdropping law, holding that it “criminalize[d] a wide range of innocent conduct” and violated residents’ First Amendment rights.

But during a lame-duck legislative session in December 2014, the Illinois General Assembly passed and Gov. Pat Quinn signed a new eavesdropping law. In the wake of the Supreme Court ruling, lawmakers included changes aimed at allowing residents to record interactions with police, for example, but kept in tact the “all-party consent” provisions and introduced a difficult-to-gauge standard

for when a person must get consent for recording.

Specifically, the new law made it a felony to surreptitiously record any “private conversation,” defined as “oral communication between [two] or more persons” where at least one person has a “reasonable expectation” of privacy.

But when does someone have a “reasonable” expectation of privacy? And is it fair to expect Illinoisans to know where to draw that line in their everyday lives?

If that phrase seems purposefully vague, that’s because it is. One of the bill’s sponsors, former state Rep. Elaine Nekritz, helpfully defined “reasonable expectation” as “We’ll know it when we see it.”

That’s music to the ears of overzealous prosecutors.

Boron isn’t quite sure what he wants to be when he grows up. He’s interested in serving in the military, but his vision impairment limits his opportunities there. And if he’s exposed to the juvenile justice system, his opportunities could narrow further.

“It would be heart-wrenching,” McNally said of the possibility that her son is found guilty.

“He didn’t do anything wrong, and for him to be snatched from his family, the emotional impact that’s going to have ... it’s just going to follow him throughout his years.”

Given the tenacity with which Illinois prosecutors have enforced the state’s eavesdropping law, reform from the Statehouse may be Boron’s best hope.
