Officer being hailed as hero after stopping school shooter

DIXON — Dixon Police Chief Steve Howell, Jr. and Lee County Sheriff John Simonton praised school resource officer Mark Dallas who shot a gunman at Dixon High School on the morning of May 16 and possibly saved many lives.

Howell's comments came at a press conference held late morning on May 16 regarding the shooting incident which occurred shortly after 8 a.m. at the school, where 19-year-old former student Matt Milby allegedly fired several shots from a gun near the west gym and was later shot and injured by Dallas before being taken

"I could not be more proud of the police officer and the way he responded to the situation," Howell, Jr., said. "When shots rang out through the hallway of the school, he charged toward the suspect and confronted him head-on and because of this heroic action, countless lives were saved."

Simonton echoed Howell on Dallas' actions, adding that "the school resource officer saved an enormous amount of lives today. It could have been a lot worse.'

At 8:06 a.m. the Dixon Police Department received a report from Dallas at the school of an armed male subject at the Dixon

Howell said Milby fired several shots near the west gym. Dallas confronted Milby, who then exited the school and began running westbound on Armory Drive. Dallas pursued the subject, who reportedly then shot several rounds toward the school resource officer, at which time the Dallas returned fire and struck the suspect. Shortly thereafter Milby was taken into custody and transported

for medical attention of non-life-threatening injuries.

Milby was charged late afternoon on May 16 in Lee County Court with three felonies, including aggravated discharge of a firearm, aggravated discharge at a school employee and aggravated discharge at a school building, each punishable by six to 30 years in prison. He was under 24-hour surveillance at a local hospital, but will be transported to jail and held on \$2 million bond.



Howell, Jr., said Dallas, a 24-year law enforcement veteran, will be placed on paid administrative leave per policy. He has been with the Dixon Police Department for 15 years and served as a DHS officer for the past five years.

Dixon High School and all Dixon public schools were initially placed on lock down, as were many area schools for a time on Wednesday as events unfolded.

Howell, Jr., said he believes Milby acted alone and there were no injuries to any staff or students, and added authorities also believe there are no further threats to staff, students or the community.

"The students and staff responded to the situation extremely well," Howell, Jr. "The district has been receiving training on how to respond to these situations. While removing students from the various classrooms, officers found that the staff and students had barricaded doors to the classroom with desks, bookcases and other objects per the training that they had received."

Dusti Batesh, a senior at Dixon High School, was in the gymnasium for graduation practice

Wednesday morning when the incident took place outside the gym in the hallway.

"We were listening to the principal tell us about the practice and all of the sudden we heard what sounded like five or six fire crackers," said Batsch. "One of the teachers went out and then came back in and told us to 'Go, go get out of here.""

Students initially fled to Sauk Valley Properties, then to the National Guard Armory before being bused to Page Park where parents could pick them up. The process took between two and two and half hours.

Batsch said he knows the alleged shooter only by name, but was not really acquainted with him. "I feel the school handled the incident well,

and I am grateful the Mr. McKay, Dr. Drady and Officer Dallas were there," Batsch added.

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




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The Gap of Time

he British writer Jeanette Winterson calls her novel "The Gap of Time" her cover version of Shakespeare's late play "The Winter's Tale." Like the original, Winterson's story is profoundly moving, beginning as it does as tragedy and ending in comedy. The play is about forgiveness. In the novel's Afterword, Winterson comments, "Shakespeare returns to the theme of jealousy, but brings with him a second chance: no one dies, and the next generation will not behave like their fathers."

Winterson's protagonists are Leo, who, as owner of a hedge fund company, is a master of the universe with a nearly sociopathic personality to match his wealth. He is married to Mimi, a renowned French singer, who is pregnant with their second child. Leo's best friend is Xeno. The two friends met at boarding school, where they were adolescent lovers, and have remained as close as brothers ever since. Xeno is poetic and adrift, but becomes rich as creator of computer games. He moves from London to New Bohemia, a thinly disguised New Orleans, after the breach.

The breach occurs when Leo is suddenly overcome by a murderous jealousy when he convinces himself that Mimi and Xeno are lovers. He has an underling install a webcam in Mimi's bedroom and misinterprets the innocent banter between Mimi and Xeno to fit his pornographic fantasies. Against all evidence, he decides that the baby is Xeno's and orders his gardener to take her to Xeno in America, along with an attaché case stuffed with money.

In New Bohemia, the gardener is pursued by thieves, but before they catch him and kill him, he manages to put the baby and the attaché case into a Baby Hatch of a hospital, where she is rescued by Shep, a man who has recently lost his wife. Shep understands that "important things happen by chance, the rest are planned." He takes the baby in and calls her Perdita (little lost one). After a sixteen-year gap, chance again takes center stage when Perdita meets Xeno's son. Because "the past must not mortgage the future," it is Perdita who will bring about a most imaginative, emotionally authentic moment of reconciliation. Time can indeed be redeemed.

A plot summary hardly does justice to this elegant and often profound retelling of a 400-year-old tale. Winterson's serious and not so serious riffs on time lost and time regained are often arresting, as when she suggests in an aside that stories of lost and found may have begun eons ago when the moon splintered off the earth, when it became earth's autistic twin, who keeps the earth from wobbling. "What is memory but a rope slung across time."

That Jesus sure has a knack for turning things upside down, doesn't he? In our world, we establish boundaries: professional, ethical, and relational. Managers aren't supposed to be "friends" with subordinates, nor teachers be "friends" with their students, right? Although "friendly" is okay, there is a line you don't cross. And yes, there are boundaries that pastors shouldn't cross with respect to parishioners, and for good reason. Likewise, certainly the Creator shouldn't be friends with creatures. So, when Jesus breaks down another barrier by telling his disciples "I no longer call you servants... instead, I have called you my friends." I'm reminded of the address given at my niece's college graduation, in which the University president related that he was told when he was hired that he needed to establish a Facebook page. He then reported that he had 432 "friends" – some of whom he actually knows. What a concept. We long for friends willing to stand by

us through thick and thin no matter what. Isn't that what a true friend really is? The kind of friends who, in the wise words of a couple of 4th graders from Monroe Center Elementary:

- Protect each other from bullies;
- Don't tattle on each other;
- Stick together;
- Help each other out; and • If you miss the bus, their mom can
- drive you to school We long for someone who loves us just

as we are, especially when we are at our most unlovable. Face it, we all have our moments. I suspect most of us likely have been through difficult times in our lives when we didn't know how in the world we would have survived without our friends' support. Through relationship breakups, through loss of loved ones, through all the pains and hurts life throws at us...this is when we find out who our true friends are. This is the type of friend Christ is to us, offering friendship that is steadfast and dependable through the best and worst of

Suppose you are the general manager of a sports team. You would want to assemble the best possible lineup of talented players in order to win, right? So why didn't Jesus have a few Pharisees on his dream team lineup? After all, they knew all the rules inside and out. They were the best players and the most pious folks around.

But look whom Jesus actually chose. They were fishermen, known to be crude, impatient, and hotheaded. He also chose a tax collector, known to be crooked scoundrels. And Jesus chooses us - with all our imperfections and flaws, and with all kinds of problems in our lives.







U-Haul investors drool as new tax hike plans pour in

Higher taxes in a state that already imposes the largest tax burden on its populace will mean fewer jobs and fewer taxpayers, leading to the need for even more taxes because a fewer number of people will be paying them.

It's a vicious cycle that policy leaders must ad-

dress before it's too late. What Illinois needs is a curb on state and local government spending, and the kinds of reforms pension, workers' compensation, prevailing wage, taxes – that will lower costs and the overall burden on taxpayers, as well as jumpstart our stagnant state

That fact, unfortunately, hasn't stopped a slew of new calls

for higher taxes to pay for Illinois' oversized state government. It seems like just about every week some new plan pops up that would force more Illinoisans out of their homes and send shares of U-Haul to new highs because of all the people fleeing the state.

The most infamous, perhaps, comes from the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago, which recently pitched a 1 percent statewide property tax hike on top of the already high local property tax levies that far too many homeowners can't afford.

Under the Fed's plan, the owner of a \$100,000 home would be on the hook for an additional \$1,000 a year - \$2,000 for a \$200,000 home, etc. – for the next 30 years to pay off the state's \$130 billion in unfunded pension debt.

Their reasoning? A property tax hike would be the "most equitable" way to raise money because homeowners benefit the most from state spending.

Never mind that Illinoisans already pay the second highest property taxes in the country and the highest combined local and state taxes. Or that both of those facts are leading more and more Illinoisans to pack up and leave for greener pastures.

With state lawmakers on both sides of the aisle recognizing the need for property tax relief for their constituents, the Federal Reserve's plan is a nonstarter, particularly in an election year.

But it's far from the only one The Illinois Economic Policy Institute has proposed more than

doubling the state's motor fuel tax – from 34 cents to 85 cents – and increasing the vehicle registration fee from \$101 to \$578 a year. And that's not even to pay down the state's monumental debt,

With gas prices already approaching or surpassing \$3 a gallon again, that's not exactly what motorists need.

The nonprofit Civic Federation's Institute for Illinois' Fiscal Sustainability also suggests tax increases. While also calling for smart spending caps and other necessary reforms, the Civic Federation recommends Illinois start taxing retirement income to the tune of \$2.5 billion annually and expand the state's sales taxes to 14 services that currently are

And then there are the calls for a constitutional amendment to allow for a graduated income tax in Illinois, even though the General Assembly just raised income taxes last summer by \$5 billion annually.

Championed by Democratic gubernatorial nominee J.B. Pritzker, a graduated income tax establishes higher rates for escalating levels of income.

The biggest problem with Pritzker's plan is that he doesn't have one. Or, he's not revealing it anyway. And that should scare every worker from a minimum-wage earner to a multimillionaire.

Illinois' constitution guarantees a flat income tax. If Pritzker gets his way, lawmakers can set the tax rates and income brackets anywhere they want and then continue to change them whenever they think they need more of our money.

Proponents of a graduated income tax like to call it a "millionaires' tax" to trick voters into thinking that only millionaires will be affected. Don't believe that for a second.

The one plan out there with specific rates and income brackets would implement a tax increase on most workers. State Rep. Robert Martwick, D-Chicago, introduced a progressive tax plan last year that would increase taxes on Illinoisans earning as little as \$17,300 a year.

That's hardly a millionaire's tax.

Yes, the state has a massive amount of debt. But constantly increasing taxes will only make things worse.
