Sublette board learns April approved motion invalid

SUBLETTE — The Village of Sublette Board learned on Monday night that the motion they approved in April, which retained Phalen Steel of Mendota as a design firm to help with the new maintenance building project, was invalid.

Village of Sublette President Michael Vaessen told the board during the village's monthly meeting on Monday night, that the vote they took in April needed to have a 2/3 majority vote to be approved. The vote in April to retain Phalen Steel ended in a tie vote, with Vaessen breaking the tie vote by casting a vote for approval. Village of Sublette Trustees Richard Klaser, Brian Wilson and Scott Hanson voted yes, while trustees Julie Kessel, Laura Jackson and Jerry Leffelman voted no.

Vaessen told the board on Monday night that due to an Illinois State Law, because the village

was going with a design firm instead of hiring an engineering firm and bidding the job out, they needed to pass the motion by 2/3 majority. He told the board they had two options on Monday night. Option one was to entertain another motion to retain Phalen Steel as the design firm for the project, but, Vaessen said, everyone would have to vote yes on this motion for it to pass. Or, option two, have a motion to hire Willett and Hoffman, or another engineering firm, to design and put the project out for bids.

Vaessen told the board he found a quote from 2014 from Willett and Hoffman, and that back then, it would cost \$16,500 for engineering work and \$3,000 for advertising the bid.

"It's a four-year-old proposal," Vaessen said. "I'm not sure where the cost is going to come

Electronic recycling available to Lee County residents

AMBOY—Lee County continues to offer free electronic recycling to Lee County residents at the Lee County Highway Department in Amboy.

The free service is open Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. - 3 p.m.

Acceptable items include: computers, monitors, printers, laptops, copiers, modems, telephones, cellphones, scanners, TVs, DVDs, VCRs, stereos, camcorders, camera, electric motors, answering machines, handheld electronics, adding machines, faxes, calculators, shredders,

Items not accepted are: microwaves, refrigera-

tors, coffee makers, de-humidifiers, white goods, air conditioners, smoke detectors, fluorescent bulbs, washer and dryers, dishwashers, vacuums, batteries, fans, stoves, blenders, and toasters.

This free service is for Lee County residents only. No businesses or institutions. No staff members are present to assist with unloading. All acceptable items should be placed in Gaylords. Please do not leave items not on the accepted list.

Please avoid dropping off items during inclement weather.

Please do not drop off items during off-hours, weekends or holidays.

Mailbox improvement week arrives in time for spring cleaning

AMBOY — The U.S. Postal Service is asking all Amboy homeowners to inspect and repair their mailboxes during Mailbox Improvement Week, May 13-19, says Postmaster Jeanna Ohda.

'Repairing suburban and rural mailboxes improves the appearance of our community and makes delivering and receiving mail safer for our carriers and customers," says Ohda.

The Postal Service makes this annual request because of the wear and tear that occurs to mail-

"This is especially important after the effects

of last winter," adds Ohda. Some of the typical activities homeowners

may need to do include: • Replacing loose hinges on a mailbox door.

- Repainting a mailbox that may have rusted
- or has started to peel.
 - Remounting a loosened mailbox post.

· Replacing or adding house numbers. "If a homeowner plans to install a new mailbox

or replace a worn one, he or she must use only Postal Service-approved traditional, contemporary or locking full/limited service mailboxes," said Ohda.

"Customers must be careful when purchasing curbside mail receptacles because the use of unapproved boxes is prohibited. Customers may use a custom-built mailbox, but they must consult with my office to ensure it conforms to guidelines applying to flag, size, strength and quality of construction," she said.

For more information on the use of names or numbers on mailboxes, or answers to any other questions, contact your local Post Office directly.

The Postal Service receives no tax dollars for operating expenses and relies on the sale of postage, products and services to fund its operations.

Lee Center Church to celebrate 150th anniversary

LEE CENTER – The Lee Center First Congregational United Church of Christ, Lee Center, was organized by the Rev. Joseph Gardner at the home of Moses Crombie on July 5, 1843, under the name of the First Congregational Church of Palatine Grove. For some time services were held at the Crombie home which was situated near the south end of Crombie Lane. The house was later moved to Amboy and remodeled.

At the end of 1849 the church began holding services in the new Lee Center Academy building and in 1852 engaged it's first regular minister, the Rev. S. W. Phelps, at a salary of \$200 per year and use of the parsonage. In addition, during the winter the parishioners gave the pastor a donation, which included about \$100 in cash and a large load of wood.

In October 1854, plans were initiated for erection of a church building. Completed in 1856, it joined the Methodist and the Episcopal churches in Lee Center. The pews in the church all had doors, and the seats were rented to the church members. Receipts from these "rentage slips" paid the pastors salary. An entertainment was held in Mr. Blake's store to raise money for the furnishings. It took all day for the ice cream to freeze, but was declared a success. Articles of fancy work were sold by the ladies and supper was served. Proceeds of this sale purchased a roll of bright carpet from a store in Amboy, where it had just arrived from Boston.

The church has undergone several remodeling and additions over the years. It was wired for electricity in 1907. In 1917, a balcony was added along with back of the church to a corner under a newly erected tower.

The bell was purchased by the "Wild Flower Club" from a Methodist Episcopal Church society in 1918 when their church was dismantled. The church sheds, which were used to shelter members horses during services, were torn down

The final major change came to the building in 1949 when the annex was completed. It was built almost entirely by volunteer efforts. For several years it housed the overflow of pupils from the elementary school and in the basement the kitchen was used by Lee Center students as a cafeteria and also a base for meal preparation for over 600 students of District 271. The dining area was remodeled in 1977, again with volunteer help.

In 1953 and electric organ was installed to replace the pipe organ which had been installed in 1902. The wood from the pipe organ cabinet was made

into what is now the present alter and lectern. The interior of the church contains extensive stenciling by an Amboy artist in 1952. In more recent years, the hardwood flooring of the church has been sanded and refinished, a lighted church sign placed in the front yard and a cement handicap ramp constructed.

The church has ordained nine ministers, sent out one minister to Turkey, has seen to other Congregational churches

established in Amboy (1854) and Sublette (1871.) During the 1940s and 1950s, the church was yoked with the Amboy congregation, sharing a common pastor. At this time, the church is yoked with the Franklin Grove Presbyterian Church, with Jack Briggs serving as pastor. During its 175 years, the

church has been a moving force in the community. It continues to give focus and leadership in the Lee Center community. The congregation will celebrate the anniversary on July 15, at the 10:30 a.m. service.

Special entertainment for the day will be The Sauk Valley Barber Shop Singers, performing after a luncheon.





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

Out of sorts

ge did not turn Ferdinand Brun into a crotchety old man, he's always been that way. Ferdinand is the hero of Aurelie Valognes' comic novel, "Out of Sorts." At 82, his only happiness is Daisy, his Great Dane. Ferdinand moved into his apartment two years ago when his wife served him with divorce papers and ran off to the south of France with the mailman. The apartment house is chockful of widows and is lorded over by Mrs. Suarez, the concierge, an overlord comparable to our super, but more fearsome. Mrs. Suarez, the enforcer of absolute adherence to her rules and whims, is Ferdinand's nemesis. She hates Daisy and calls him "Ferdinand, the Disruptor."

Ferdinand, under threat of being shunted into a retirement home by his estranged daughter Marion, a diplomat in faraway Singapore, has to submit to Mrs. Suarez's inspections to remain viable in his apartment. The widows relish Mrs. Suarez's gossip about Ferdinand, including the rumor that he murdered his wife. Ferdinand doesn't mind, he is content to take long walks with his Daisy. Until the day Daisy disappears. She has apparently been killed in a bus accident. Ferdinand takes to his bed. Days later, he rises, takes a rare bath, and, dressed in his best clothes, walks in front of a bus. He's only nicked and so must go on.

Two saviors appear in Ferdinand's miserable life. Juliette, a precocious school girl, has moved into the apartment above Ferdinand with her father and baby sister, who cries night and day. Ferdinand despises babies: to him, a human that drools is not gifted. Juliette knocks on his door with a gift of licorice because she wants to meet the serial killer. In no time at all, the girl and the old man become compadres.

Bernice Claudel is Ferdinand's neighbor, who at 92, is everything Ferdinand has never been. She saves him from the retirement home when she loans him her maid for Mrs. Suarez's inspection. And when Ferdinand is accused of murder, Beatrice, a crack attorney, rescues him from the clutches of the police. A demon driver, Beatrice rushes the terrified Ferdinand to the hospital after his ordeal in lock-up.

The novel reflects one of the great virtues of the French: it is not sentimental, even though all sorts of complications in Ferdinand's life, along with old grievances, dissolve into the inevitable happy ending, at Christmas, no less. The grumpy old man becomes

Give thanks to the Holy Spirit

This Sunday the Church celebrates the Solemnity of Pentecost. The Greek word Pentecost means 50th. Originally a Jewish feast, Pentecost refers to the 50th day after the feast of Passover. On that day, after having celebrated the Passover and the Israelites' liberation from slavery in Egypt, Moses received the Law from God on Mt. Sinai where he had remained for 40 days and 40 nights. This reception of the Law (the Ten Commandments) completed the birth of the People of Israel which had begun with the Passover.

In Hebrew, this feast of Pentecost is called Shavuot which means weeks, referring to the seven weeks which separate the Passover and Moses' reception of the Law on Mt. Sinai. God commanded the Israelites to celebrate each year this feast of Pentecost or Weeks for two reasons: (1) to commemorate and give thanks to God for his gift of the Law to Moses on Mt. Sinai and (2) to give thanks to God for the grain harvest by offering to him their first fruits. All of this was to foreshadow the great feast which we celebrate today: the Christian feast of Pentecost, the birthday of the Church. Jesus Christ is both the true Passover Lamb and the New Moses

who gives us the New Law of grace. As the true Lamb of God,

his blood takes away the sins of the world. As the New Moses, he liberates us from the slavery of sin and death by his passion, death, resurrection, and ascension. Like Moses who remained forty days on Mt. Sinai, Christ, the New Moses, remained forty days on earth after his resurrection. And as Moses ascended Mt. Sinai to deliver the Law fifty days after the Passover, Christ, the New Moses, ascended into Heaven itself to deliver the New Law of grace by sending down the Holy Spirit.

Seven weeks after Christ's Resurrection, the Holy Spirit descended upon the Apostles in the form of tongues of fire, filling them with his seven gifts. This outpouring of the Holy Spirit's grace and gifts allowed them to fulfill the Law with divine love and gave them an active power to proclaim and defend the faith fearlessly. So full of divine power were the Apostles, that on the day of Pentecost, the Apostle Peter converted 3,000 people through his preaching of the Gospel and through Baptism.

The offering of the first fruits of the grain harvest was only a shadow of the offering to God of these first fruits of the Apostles' preaching. This Pentecost, let us give thanks to the Holy Spirit for his grace and his gifts received at Baptism and increased at

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Why Huck Finn could stop smart consolidation effort

mid all of the slimy backroom deals that are struck and all the regressive, overly burdensome policies that continue to be debated under the dome in Springfield, there actually are some good pieces of legislation that get filed.

Take Senate Bill 3418, which is intended to allow neighboring school districts to reduce costs by sharing superintendents if they choose to do so.

I realize reducing costs is a novel concept for many of Illinois' more than 850 school districts, not to mention a state government that has never seen a taxpayer dollar it didn't want to spend.

But figuring out how to smartly shrink government is a must in a state that taxes its citizenry more than any other in the country.

The legislation, filed by state Sen. Sue Rezin, R-Morris, would allow two or more local school boards to agree to share the costs of a single superintendent, or allow voters in multiple school districts to force superintendent consolidation, according to a recent story from Illinois News Network's Benjamin Yount.

To force a shared superintendent, 51 percent of voters in each school district would have to agree to do so at the ballot box.

"As we are trying to find extra, additional dollars to get into the classroom, this could be one way to free up dollars, even with no new money from the state," Rezin said during committee debate. "And allow those dollars to get to the classroom."

I've written before about how Illinois has way too many school districts to begin with and the districts themselves need to consolidate.

Of the state's more than 850 local school districts, one in four supports only a single school and more than 40 percent serve

just one or two schools. A perfect example of the need for consolidation can be found in the city of Marengo in the northwest suburbs of Chicago. With a population of fewer than 7,500 residents, Maren-

go is served by three separate Guest Column

school). Each has its own superintendent and administrative staff. The combined compensation of the superintendents of Districts 154 and 165 was \$331,648 in 2017, according to OpenTheBooks.com, a government watchdog site. The Riley District 18 superintendent position has been in transition in recent years, with an interim superintendent filling the spot. But the district's school board recently hired its lone school's principal to become superintendent, which will add to the cost of high-priced school administrators that Marengo-area taxpayers must support.

The average superintendent salary across Illinois is \$106,273, according to the state's School Report Card. Statewide, that's a lot of high-cost administrators.

Given that, Rezin's legislation seems like one small but sensible step in helping to reduce the tax burden. It would not be another unfunded mandate being handed down from the state cap-

itol. Local school

Rezin's measure does have its share of supporters, but it also has opponents. State Sen. Dan Biss, D-Evanston, is one

"Now imagine the English teacher who assigns a book that is controversial. There is an outcry and there is a big fight in front of the school board, as happens from time to time," Biss said in voicing his opposition during committee debate. "Do you come back here and pass a bill that allows the public, by petition, to fire an English

Yes, he actually said that. Biss, you might recall, was among several candidates who sought the Democratic nomination for Illinois governor. He lost to billionaire J.B. Pritzker

Both Biss and Pritzker support amending the state constitution to allow for a progressive income tax so they can take more of Illinoisans' hard-earned wages. This support comes less than a year after the General Assembly passed the largest permanent income tax hike in the state's history.

But a common-sense idea to reduce bureaucracy in a state with more local units of government than any other in the country? That could lead to mass firings of teachers who have the gall to assign "The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn" or "The Catcher in the Rye" to their students?'

And that's the excuse not to support Senate Bill 3418?

I'd say I've now heard it all. But this is Illinois state government. And it's only the beginning of May.

Expect plenty more nonsense from the capital in the weeks ahead.

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

Logan Whelchel pitched a complete game to earn the victory for the Clippers.


