## Amboy school district residents vote down bond issue

**AMBOY** – They say that every vote counts.

And when only 27.62 percent of Lee County voted in the primary election on Tuesday night, every vote really did count.

The residents of the Amboy School District voted against the bond proposal to build onto the Amboy High School for a new junior high school.

A total of 1,478 votes were cast on the issue, with 769 people voting no and 716 people voting yes.

"I am still reflecting on this, but I know that this decision is bigger than the Amboy school district, it's about the whole community. It's larger than the 1,478 people who went to the polls to vote," Amboy School District Superintendent Jeff Thake said. "We will reconvene and determine how to best move

forward. This is still an unofficial count, the final results won't be announced for 30 days. We will wait it out to the extent we need to. We want to make sure we know what the community thinks before we move forward. Our next board meeting is this Thursday, March 22 and there may be more discussion at that time."

Thake commended all of the hardwork that was put into the bond issue.

"I can't speak highly enough about all the parents, teachers, community members and board members who devoted so much time and energy to this process," Thake said.

In the race for Lee County Board District 1 on the Republican ballot, the top three vote getters were Marilyn Shippert with 764 votes, Jim Schielein with 583 votes and Christopher Norberg received 515 votes. Richard Humphrey, Jr. received 496 votes and Don Riva received 301 votes. There wasn't any candidates running on the Democrat ballot for Lee County Board District 1.

In the race for Lee County Treasurer on the Republican ballot, Paula Meyer won the vote 2,629 against her opponent Melissa Lawrence with 1,205 votes. There wasn't any candidates running on the Democrat ballot for Lee County Treasurer.

On the Republican ballot for the State of Illinois Governor position, Lee County voters elected incumbent Governor Bruce Rauner over Jeanne Ives by a vote of 1,943-1,841. On the Democrat side, Lee County voters selected JB Pritzker as their choice for governor with 1111 votes. Challenger Daniel Biss received 366 votes while Chris Kennedy received 346 votes.

Incumbent Republican Representative Adam Kinzinger won the Lee County vote over opponent James Marter, 2,676 to 1,079 votes. Lee County Democrats voted for Sara Doty to face Kinzinger in November. Doty won the county with 677 votes. Neill Mohammad received 489 votes, Amy Briel received 384 votes and Beth Vercolio-Osmund received 186 votes.

For Illinois Attorney General on the Democrat side, Lee County voters elected Pat Quinn with 53.3 percent of the vote over his seven other opponents. While on the Republican side, Lee County voters elected Erika Harold with 1,803 votes beating her opponent Gary Grasso who received 1,514 votes.

# Chance encounter leads to lifetime of memories in Amboy

**AMBOY** — Jim Braida, started his college career as a business major.

One day, as he was walking on the campus of Northern Illinois University, a gentleman, Bob Reinbolt, stopped to ask for directions and then asked Braida if he was interested in a teaching job at Walton Elementary School. Reinbolt invited him to come out to Amboy for a visit and he hasn't left since.

Braida taught seventh and eighth graders for three years in Walton.

"When I was in my first year at Walton," said Braida "I asked the kids one day what they were having for lunch. They responded 'Morrisey Special.' Morrisey special has come to be a favorite meal. It is a stew type meal with peas, carrots, onions, hamburger and other veggies."

After the three years at Walton, Braida accepted a job teaching business at the Amboy High School. He taught for five years and the moved on to a principal position that lasted 25 years. Braida received his Master's in Administration at NIU. He worked at A & P and Kroger at night to help make ends meet.

"I never met a student at Amboy that I didn't like," said Braida. "One day, not too long ago, there was a knock on the door and a former student, Mike

Masters, came into the living room to thank me for being such a positive influence on his life. He was a 1969 graduate and has served in the Marines for 40 years. He said that George Mason and myself had been great mentors to him."

Over those 25 years that he spent as principal at Amboy High School he saw many changes in the curriculum and activities of the youth.

"There is much more involvement for the girls on a variety of programs these days," said Braida. "They are more competitive in sports and academics."

He added that he would like to see the schools bring back more vocational type classes.

# City to seek bids on new flooring for community building

**AMBOY** — The Amboy City Council approved motions to seek bids on projects around the city on Monday night.

The Amboy City Council held its monthly meeting on Monday night in the Amboy Community Building. All members were present. On the agenda were three separate items that, once approved, would authorize the Amboy City Clerk to advertise for bids.

The first item approved to seek bids on was for new flooring in the Amboy Community Building. The city is seeking bids on both vinyl and epoxy flooring options. This is the second time a bid on new flooring for the community building is being sought.

During the February Amboy City Council meeting, it was reported that only one bid had been received by the deadline in the amount of more than \$37,000 for vinyl plank flooring for the community building. The council voted to reject that bid and asked for the matter to seek bids be brought before the council again in March.

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#### The sin killer

arry McMurtry's "The Sin Killer" has all the ingredients for a tale of high adventure – the Western Frontier, heroes and heroines, witches and prophets, satire and tragedy, comic characters and evil ones – and yet "The Sin Killer" never comes to life. The novel is the first of four books called "The Berrybender Narratives," and perhaps that is the problem. Far too many peripheral characters and narrative threads are introduced that end up fairly irrelevant to the plotline.

"The Sin Killer" is the story of an aristocratic English family, the Berrybenders, who, in 1832, embark upon a hunting expedition up the Missouri River in a steamboat. Servants, retainers, tutors, three Chiefs, and a large bickering family are satirically contrasted with the simple life of the frontiersman. The pompous and bawdy Lord Berrybender, who has come to America to shoot new kinds of game, gets his wish when he shoots forty buffalos in two hours. But he does manage to lose three toes when he shoots himself in the foot and three fingers when he scuffles with a Sioux warrior.

The love story of the oldest Berrybender daughter, Lady Tasmin, and Jim Snow, the Sin Killer, so called because he loses his mind when a mere curse word is uttered in his presence, is the centerpiece of the novel. Tasmin and Jim's encounter when they are both bathing in the river is a lovely set piece. However, she is often quite obnoxious and self-involved and he is a rather wooden impersonation of the strong, silent type.

The sex scenes are pitched to satire, but they are so silly and sophomoric, they fall flat every time. There are a good many scenes of extreme violence, almost entirely perpetrated by warriors from various tribes. People die or are killed in awful ways, but hardly anyone remarks upon their deaths, and no one mourns them. There is very little that recommends these characters, and their selfishness and indifference soon become tiresome

## After 200 hours of Olympic coverage, still no elephant polo

ike much of the world, I spent a good portion of the winter Olympics watching hundreds of athletes from all over the world doing things that I could do if I just had strength, speed, agility, grace and an unquenchable desire to leave the couch for anything other than more snack food.

With a total of 280 hours of Olympic programming this year, it's hard to imagine any sport that could've been overlooked. For those of you with a weak heart (or who are simply tired of standing) I suggest you sit down before this next revelation, which is that, in spite of heavy lobbying, there still was no Unicycle Hockey, Gale-Force Kayaking or Elephant Polo among this year's Olympic competitions.

Because we didn't see any of these events during year's Olympic coverage, I thought I would take the opportunity to introduce them to the handful of readers who might not be familiar these sports.

We'll begin with unicycle hockey, which actually Guest Column has its roots in Germany—where they drink A LOT of beer. If you're sporting interest is geared toward individual events, it doesn't get any more exciting than gale-force kayaking, which is exactly what it sounds like: someone in a kayak during a hurricane. To do this requires a special kayak, something

that was first developed by lifeguards in Australia as a tool for rescuing people caught in the surf. Naturally, the next step in this evolutionary process was for people to begin using these kayaks as a tool for getting caught in the surf during hurricanes and, therefore, need rescuing.

Last year alone, a total of 12 gale-force kayakers died — a number that the health department says is "entirely too high." Especially when you consider nine of those deaths occurred out of the water, while driving to the beach during hurricanes.

This brings us to my personal favorite, elephant polo. To compete, you must have a mallet (\$73), a polo ball (\$22), and an elephant (priceless). The game takes place over two 10-minute periods called "chukkers," which is exactly what you'll feel like doing after 20 minutes of elephant riding.

The game begins with the referee tossing the ball between two opposing elephants who are positioned within a small circle. (Note: The game ends if the referee doesn't leave the circle in time.)

Keep in mind that it is a foul if your elephant lays down in front of the goal in order to block it from opponents. It is also a foul if your elephant picks up the ball with his trunk.

The same goes for picking-up, or laying-down on, any officials. Finally, if after two "chukkers" the game is tied, the next round will be sudden death. Because this is a family-oriented newspaper, I can't get into
