

School heating repairs mount up during January cold snap

AMBOY – A stretch of bitterly cold weather in January tested not only the human spirit but also caused a variety of problems for local school buildings.

Reporting at the Jan. 25 board of education meeting, Amboy Superintendent Jeff Thake said all three of the district’s school buildings were challenged by the weather but the junior high was hardest hit. “The intense cold is finding all of the weak spots in our heating system,” he told the board. “Our maintenance director and assistant director have been scrambling since we got back from break.”

Thake read a list of emergency repairs needed at the junior high due to an aging furnace and pipes including replacing leaking coils, unit ventilator

leaks, a leaking zone valve, a split line in the heating coil, and repair to the thermostat. “So, turning the heat up for the deep freeze is wreaking havoc in our junior high school,” he told the board. “We’ve also have some maintenance at Central and at the high school but the junior high is the most widespread - all we did was turn up the temperature so it would be warm.”

Thake also discussed a meeting on the state’s new evidence based funding formula for schools that he and AHS Principal Joshua Nichols attended. The meeting gave information detailing how the calculations for funding will be made. This includes recognizing the amount each district levies, then calculating exactly what the state should kick in each year. “The state will look at that and annually by 5 percent, they will start closing that gap to where we don’t levy as much,”

he said. “The main question, is the state going to honor that commitment? Should we plan on that?”

Board member Katie Pratt commented that Gov. Rauner this month again vetoed part of the funding bill. Thake explained that this most recent veto had to do with money the governor wants to go toward school choice (state funding of private schools) but said he expected the law to move forward once language in the bill was changed to accommodate that issue.

Principal Joshua Nichols, Amboy High School, congratulated the January Student of the Month Cassidy Corcoran.

Other winners were Emma Weber, Mallory Powers and Chloe Welch, who won Casey’s gift cards, and Logan Wood, Trevor Vaessen and Eden Lindenmeyer, Subway gift cards. Thirty-six students earned an ice cream party for having a 3.0 GPA or higher.

* ISBE finally sent the results of a Biology/Science assessment, which was given to freshmen in 2016. The test was the first of it’s kind in Illinois and Nichols said the AHS freshmen that year did well with an average score of 314 compared to the state average score of 300.

* The high school administered the 5Essentials survey during the week of Jan. 16.

Why Amboy needs a new junior high

School board gives reasoning behind new construction & cost for property owners

AMBOY - Voters living in Amboy Community Unit School District 272 will soon have a very important decision to make. A referendum on the March 20 primary ballot will ask for approval of a \$15.8 million General Obligation bond for construction of a replacement junior high school building adjacent to Amboy High School.

Speaking at the Jan. 25 board of education meeting, Nicole Jones, board president, read a prepared statement from the board regarding the project. This was followed by a slide presentation showing the approximate property tax increases and a question and answer session with Lee County Treasurer John Fritz.

Board statement:

“At our December 2017 meeting, we, the board of education for the Amboy School District, voted to place a \$15.8 million General Obligation bond question on the March 20, 2018 ballot. We believe that investing in infrastructure is necessary to continue to provide high quality education to our students and a good work environment for our teachers and staff.

The Amboy Junior High School was built in 1922 and has served our communities and thousands of families well. Investment in the people, places and things that make education possible for the

students of our rural area is our priority.

This decision was not reached without careful consideration of our options:

- * To continue basic maintenance of the junior high and make improvements required to meet the standards as outlined by the mandated 10-year health and life safety plan.
- * To fully invest in renovation of the junior high.
- * To house junior high students at the elementary or high school.

Option one and two are costly. In each case we would be sinking tax payer dollars into an old building. We would achieve nothing more than application of expensive band-aids to reoccurring problems. Unfortunately, the age of the building makes fixing infrastructure issues complex – parts must be custom-made, some manufacturers are no longer in business, and the time and money spent just maintaining leaves nothing for improvement projects like building a secure school entrance, replacing windows or installing air conditioning, to name a few.

Option three seemed to be a good idea until we looked closer at how students move throughout their school day, how many hours in the school day, what is required by teachers to teach and finally, at the environments needed for students of various ages to learn.

Last year a building plan survey was issued to voters both by mail and online. We asked if there would be support for starting over with a new building. We asked if taxpayers would be willing to bear the cost of a new building or the cost of renovating the current structure. We asked for ideas. We asked for concerns. More than 500 people responded with a favorable response to exploring options for a new building.

In October, we held our first town hall meeting and convened

a group of parents and community members to further vet our options. In December, that group came to the board with their recommendation . . . to pursue a general obligation bond seeking funds to build a new junior high at the high school and make improvements to the current high school thus freeing school funds to continue health and life safety projects at Central Elementary.

Central was considered briefly as a location for a junior high building extension. However, the elementary school grounds sit on a floodplain and any new structure would most likely take away the playground and recess area.

This decision has not just been about considering a new school, but also about the future of the current junior high building. The Board is committed to developing a solid exit plan that will NOT leave an abandoned building in the community. During construction the junior high will still function and be maintained as a usable school building for grades 5-8 at least through the 2018-19 school year.

The Board of Education has proven its ability to steward the district’s finances wisely. When the state of Illinois held school funding hostage, some districts faced closing their doors. We did not. When our educators saw the tides turning towards technology use, we invested and became early adopters of innovative teaching practices, investing in and utilizing technology that give our students a learning environment that matches the innovation in the world around us.

* Amboy hosted K-5 teachers, directors of professional development, and assistant principals from Kaneland Unit School District 302 on Jan. 25. Thake said the group saw classrooms at Central and visited with a panel of teachers and a panel of students. “They were absolutely floored when they left, that’s a common theme,” he commented. “It’s always fun and a good reminder that we are on course. It’s good that we invested in 21st Century learning and in technology - it’s been an amazing transformation. I

couldn’t be more pleased with what’s happening and I hope everybody feels the same way.”
* The board approved a student activity account for the new Amboy Leo’s Club at AHS. Kaitlyn Orgiesen, club president, and Danielle Benesh, social studies teacher/club sponsor, said the new club is a division of the Amboy Lion’s Club and currently has 33 members. The club is geared toward community service and getting students actively involved in their community.
* AHS alumnus Ed Morris, spoke to the board during open forum, saying he thought it “might be interesting to see how I turned out.” Born Tonica, Morris said his father was the school board president there before the family moved to a farm near Harmon. In his senior year at AHS, Morris won letters in football and track and awards in music, drama and journalism, was president of FFA and was awarded the degree of State Farmer.
He studied ag education at the University of Illinois for three years, then volunteered

for the draft and was called to active duty for two years. He returned to U of I, got a Master’s degree and joined the Air Force Reserves, where he was promoted to major and retired.
After college, Morris said he farmed so his father could retire. He was also a substitute teacher at area schools. When special education became required, very few teachers were qualified, so he quit farming and became qualified.
After a dozen years teaching special ed in Amboy, he moved to Wheaton and spent 20 years working for a publisher. After retiring, he returned to the Amboy area and did some more teaching.
PERSONNEL
Following closed session, the board accepted the retirement resignation of Beth Becker as home economics/horticulture teacher, effective at the conclusion of the 2017-18 school year and approved Brad Metz as head custodian at Amboy High School, effective Jan. 8.
The next regular meeting will take place at 7 p.m. on Thursday, Feb. 22 at Amboy High School.

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We urge the voters of the Amboy School District to carefully consider the future of the Amboy Junior High. On the surface, this may seem to be just about brick and mortar. The greater discussion goes much deeper. This is about the future of our communities – our students.”

Following the prepared statement, Jones continued, “The big question is real estate taxes. How are we going to pay for this?”
Using a slide show presentation, Jones gave examples of the expected property tax increases for various home and land values.

Owner occupied home-senior exemption: \$60,000 fair cash value; owner occupied exemption, an annual tax increase (20 years) of \$77.38.
Owner occupied home: \$60,000 fair cash value; owner occupied exemption, an annual tax increase (20 years) of \$120.40.

Owner occupied home-senior exemption: \$90,000 fair cash value; owner occupied exemption, an annual tax increase (20 years) of \$163.40.
Owner occupied home: \$100,000 fair cash value; owner occupied exemption, an annual tax increase (20 years) of \$235.07.
Non-owner occupied home: \$100,000 fair cash value, an annual tax increase (20 years) of \$286.67.
Owner occupied home: \$150,000 fair cash value; owner occupied exemption, an annual tax increase (20 years) of \$378.40.
Owner occupied home: \$250,000 fair cash value; owner occupied exemption, an annual tax increase (20 years) of \$665.07.
Farmland-40 acres: net

taxable value \$9,263*, an annual tax increase (20 years) of \$79.66.
Farmland-120 acres: net taxable value \$18,773*, an annual tax increase (20 years) of \$161.45. (*For farmland, the net taxable amount varies, so your tax bill is needed to more closely estimate.)
Farmland: net taxable value \$50,000, an annual tax increase (20 years) of \$430.
Farmland: net taxable value \$100,000, an annual tax increase (20 years) of \$860.
The property tax calculator is available on the school district website at www.amboy.net (go to the Building/Grounds Project tab, click District Projects) or link directly at <http://www.amboy.net/building--grounds-project.html>. Jones noted that the calculator includes an

owner-occupied exemption only, not the senior exemption.
Fritz emphasized that anyone with questions about the effect the referendum would have on their property taxes is welcome to contact his office. As for farmland, he noted that farm value is reassessed every year using four criteria, which makes the taxes much more complicated. “If you want to come and talk to us, we’re always open to answer questions, that’s our job,” he said.

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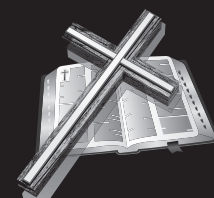

True crime

The abduction of a beautiful young woman by a fiend who will savagely destroy her is such a commonplace in movies, TV, and books, that by now it rarely has the power to shock us. But when the crime really does happen, and when it is told as vividly as Richard Lloyd Parry's "People Who Eat Darkness" (2011), we pay attention. At the very least, we don't read it at bedtime.

As the Asia editor of the Times of London, based in Tokyo, Parry covered the story of the disappearance of Lucie Blackman from the beginning. In May 2000, Lucie Blackman, 21, from Kent, England arrives in Tokyo with her friend Louise Philips for a three-month stay. Tall, blonde, a former British Airways flight attendant, Lucie soon gets a job as a hostess at Club Casablanca in Roppongi, a night club district in Tokyo.

A club hostess is required to fill glasses, light cigarettes, and talk with male customers within the confines of the club. Part of a hostess' duties is a quota of a minimum of 15 "douhan" per month. A "douhan" is a paid date with a customer, but Lucie isn't very good at it. On the afternoon of July 1, she excitedly calls Louise to say she is going on

a "douhan" with one of the Casablanca customers. She vanishes without a trace.

Lucie's sister and father soon arrive in Tokyo to search for her. Tim Blackman immediately decides to enlist the media in the search for his daughter. The Tokyo police strikes him as "cozy, feckless, and sinister." He is appalled that the police station does not have a single computer.

He even enlists British Prime Minister Tony Blair who happens to be in Tokyo.

Lucie's disappearance attracts world attention.

Since the case is so well known, Parry tells us from the outset that Lucie is dead. He devotes a long section to a lively portrait of Lucie, her family, and her time as a Tokyo club hostess. He then takes up the nation-wide search for Lucy, starring her father Tim. A gripping account of the Tokyo police's search for Lucie and subsequent manhunt for her killer is perhaps the best part of the book, if for no other reason than that Japanese police methods are so different from our Western notions of law and order.

When we do meet the killer, we come face to face with a monster. Parry never sensationalizes his story, indeed, it is his calm, judicious rendering of the egomania and narcissism of a truly malevolent human being that makes "People Who Eat Darkness" so compelling. But the killer remains opaque, unknowable, which is just as well.

his opponent but for the process.

Rauner has called Ives a “fringe candidate.” Perhaps he thinks she is unworthy to be in the same forum with a sitting governor.

Well, I know Ives and I respect her. She has six years of service in the Illinois General

Assembly under her belt. That's six more years of elected public service than Rauner had when he was running for governor four years ago. So, in that sense, she is less of a “fringe candidate” than when the governor first ran.

Yes, Ives is conservative on both social and economic issues. But so are many of the GOP's primary voters.

Perhaps the governor is talking about money. He is way ahead of her in that area. He donated \$50 million to his own campaign fund as a way of intimidating any would-be opponents from running. The only GOP candidate to step forward to challenge him was Ives. She has raised about \$500,000.

So, if the criteria for determining whether someone

is worthy of being debated is how much money someone has raised, why have an election?

We could hold an auction instead.

Since Rauner's campaign won't say why he won't debate, I asked Ives why she thinks the governor is avoiding facing her.

next to a passenger when they've just realized there's nothing waiting for them at the baggage claim.

That's when my wife took me by the hand and gently told me that if Stanley missed his flight today, my luggage would be waiting for me on the front porch when I got home.

Payne pumped in a season-high 17 points to lead the offense. She also dished out three assists. Jones (six points, six rebounds) and Appleman (six points, five rebounds) were instrumental in the win, while Sachs and Lachat each had two steals.

Amboy is 12-12 on the season with two regular season games remaining – Senior Night on Wednesday, Jan. 31 against Orangeville and at Freeport Aquin on Friday, Feb. 2.
