Rec center coming together

Approval of equipment bids moving project plans along

ROCHELLE—Residents and locals who plan to use the 24-hour fitness facility inside the future Flagg-Rochelle Community Park District recreation center will soon have an idea as to what exercise equipment will be made available.

The park district board of commissioners approved a combination bid from Life Fitness and Midwest Commercial Fitness for up to \$242,000 during its monthly meeting at Rochelle City Hall on Monday. Life Fitness will provide the weightlifting exercise equipment, while MCF will deploy cardiovascular exercise equipment for use at the recreation center's fitness facility.

"When Jackee [Ohlinger] and I started the process, we started labeling our goals and objectives for who we wanted to select," recreation director T.C. Hager said. "We wanted a quality warranty and service and we wanted a trusted sales representative to be with us throughout the process. We wanted high quality equipment and we wanted the ability to outfit the facility for a multitude of different needs from our community, all at an affordable cost." The cost for equipment from Life Fitness and MCF will be roughly \$219,000 with an estimated 10-percent contingency for possible additional equipment including wheelchairaccessible cardio equipment and potential upgrades. Four companies submitted bids for the community center's fitness facility including Life Fitness, MCF, Matrix and Direct Fitness Solutions.

Visitor restrictions in place

Hospital announces restrictions in response to Pertussis outbreak

ROCHELLE — Effective immediately, Rochelle Community Hospital has announced that it is restricting visitors under the age of 18 from visiting the hospital until further notice due to recent confirmed cases of Pertussis in Ogle County.

This change in policy is aimed to protect patients and children from Pertussis (whooping cough) in response to the increased incidence of symptoms related to this disease. In addition:

The number of people visiting a patient has been limited to two at any one time.

Visitors with severe coughs, including a fever, sneezing or sore throat should not visit patients.

Patients and/or visitors who present with severe coughing will be required to wear a mask.

It is in the best interest of patients and staff to limit the presence of younger children in the hospital until further notice. Obviously, RCH will continue to see children whose parents' have brought them in seeking medical attention. spread through coughing and sneezing in close contact with others who then breathe the pertussis bacteria.

Treatment

If you have whooping cough symptoms, please call your doctors office first. If you have any of the symptoms mentioned above, call your physician's office or come to Convenient Care at RCH, utilize the Emergency department or call 911 depending on the seriousness of the situation.

If you come to the hospital for care you may be asked to wear a mask while waiting or be placed in a segregated area with other patients

with similar symptoms.

If you must leave the house, cover coughs and sneezes with a tissue and wash your hands often to keep from spreading the disease to others.

Precautions

There are everyday actions people can take to stay healthy.

Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw the tissue in the trash after you use it.

Wash your hands often with soap and water, especially after you cough or sneeze. Alcohol-based hand cleaners are also effective. Avoid touching your eves, nose or mouth. Germs spread that way. Try to avoid close contact with sick people. Remember the 3C's, spread the word, not germs or illness. Clean Hands – Wash your hands often with hot soapy water for at least 20 seconds Cover – Cover your cough or sneeze Contain the germs - Stay home when you are sick.

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

Symptoms

Early symptoms of the disease usually start with cold-like symptoms and maybe a mild cough or fever. This can include a runny nose, low-grade fever, and a mild, occasional cough. After one- to two weeks, as the disease progresses, the traditional symptoms may appear and include: fits of many, rapid coughs followed by a highpitched "whoop" sound, vomiting (throwing up) during or after coughing fits, exhaustion (very tired) after coughing fits.



Governor plans to sign insulin price cap

Amended bill, approved Thursday by Senate, will increase cap by consumer price index each year

SPRINGFIELD—A cap on prescription insulin costs for some health insurance plans is headed to Gov. J.B. Pritzker, who said Thursday he looks forward to signing the measure.

Supporters of the bill gathered at the Illinois State Capitol on Thursday to celebrate the passage of Senate Bill 667 and make clear the legislation was only part of a larger effort to hold prescription drug manufacturers and insurance companies accountable.

"It's time to fix this broken system. It's time to stop the tweaks. It's time to stop the half measures. It's time to stop passing the buck. That will not lower drug prices," said William McNary, co-director of Citizen Action Illinois. "We need policies that will hold drug companies accountable and make medicines affordable and to take away the corporation's power to put profits over people's health."

McNary said drug companies have artificially run up the price of insulin.

The bill will not affect the price drug manufacturers set for insulin, however. Rather, it caps, at \$100, the out-ofpocket price insurers can charge for the drug for those who have insurance regulated by the state. This includes those purchasing their insurance on the marketplace, and state employee insurance plans, among others. The bill takes effect in January 2021

The bill's House sponsor, Rep. Will Guzzardi, D-Chi-

cago, said it would not apply to plans offered by large employers governed by the federal Employee Retirement Income Security Act because the state cannot preempt federal law.

It is estimated to affect approximately 20 percent, or 260,000, of the state's 1.3 million insulin users.

While McNary called the Illinois bill a "significant step," he said federal action is still needed to address rising prescription drug prices across the board, and Guzzardi agreed.

His bill passed with significant bipartisan majorities in each chamber, as representatives of the prescription drug and insurance industries listed themselves as "neutral" on the measure.

Guzzardi said he negotiated amendments to the bill to bring industry groups to a point of neutrality in order to strengthen the roll call.

Concessions

One of those concessions was including an annual increase to the \$100 price cap at the same rate of the medical care component of the Consumer Price Index of the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics.

The amendment also removes "intravenous" insulin from the cap and shifts the responsibility of creating a report on the cause of rising insulin prices to the Illinois Department of Insurance from the Illinois Attorney General's Office.

Guzzardi also said that, beyond the amendments, public pressure helped get the industry advocates to a neutral

position.

"They knew that this was coming. And they saw the power and the movement behind this bill, and they realized that it was not going to be a good look to stand in its way," Guzzardi said. "That's how we beat them on this issue. And that's how we're going to beat them on all the issues to come."

In floor debate Wednesday, however, Rep. Deanne Mazzochi, R-Elmhurst, said industry groups were neutral because they knew they could continue to rake in profits by shifting costs to other areas such as premiums and deductibles.

"The reason industry players are neutral on this bill is because they know it's really not going to cut costs, it's going to make a redistribution of costs," she said. "It's going to shift them from one player to the other, but the players are still going to get paid."

Pritzker, a Democrat, has been advocating for the measure for the past month and released a statement declaring his intent to sign the bill.

"It's fitting that on World Diabetes Day, Illinois has taken bold action to protect our residents' health, rather than force them to use lower quality medication or even ration their supply," the governor said in a statement. "We are proud that Illinois continues to be a national leader in ensuring health care is a right and not a privilege. ... I look forward to signing this legislation and continuing my commitment to ensuring Illinois residents have access to comprehensive, high-quality and affordable health care coverage."

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LOCAL NEWS Rochelle school districts confirm one case of whooping cough

County health department investigating county-wide outbreak

ROCHELLE—Last week the Ogle County Health Department informed the community of 10 cases of pertussis, commonly known as Whooping Cough, had been confirmed at Oregon High School.

This week, Rochelle school officials sent home a letter informing parents that one confirmed case of pertussis had been made of a student at a Rochelle school.

The letter, dated Nov. 18, read:

Dear Parent or Guardian,

The Rochelle School Districts have been notified that we have had our first students test positive for pertussis (whooping cough). Pertussis is an infection that affects the airways and it can spread easily from person to person by coughing or sneezing. Symptoms include a runny nose, low-grade fever, and cough that can last for weeks. Anyone can get pertussis, even those who are vaccinated as we are seeing throughout Ogle County. Pertussis can be especially dangerous for babies and people with weakened immune systems. Our school districts will follow Ogle County Health Department's recommendations for isolating positive cases

and preventing spread. Illinois/Ogle County Health Department Recommendations:

If your child is presenting symptoms of pertussis at home:

Keep your child at home from school and activities. Limit your child's exposure to others.

Make an appointment with your child's doctor as soon as possible and explain your child may have been exposed to

If your child is presenting symptoms of pertussis at school:

The nurse will screen, mask, and send your child home.


Make an appointment with your child's doctor as soon as possible. Ask to be tested for pertussis.

If your student tests positive for pertussis, your student will remain out of school for 5 days as they complete a course of antibiotics. Without antibiotics, your child remains contagious.

Contact your child's school to tell them of the positive diagnosis for pertussis and ask your doctor for a note that states your child has pertussis.

If you take your child to the doctor and they do not have pertussis, ask for a note from the doctor telling the school your child does NOT have pertussis and that your child can return to school.

Whether your child is vaccinated or not, we strongly encourage you to contact your child's physician to determine how to keep your child healthy over the next few weeks. If you need "Tdap" contact your



The Rochelle School Districts are working with the Ogle County Health Department and our maintenance staff to ensure that we are taking every precaution that we can to ensure that our school buildings are cleaned and sanitized to help prevent the spread of pertussis and other germs. By tomorrow, all classrooms will be outfitted with hand sanitizer liquid and wipes if they do not already have them. As always, we will actively remind our students to be diligent in following appropriate personal hygiene standards throughout the day.

Utility scam circulating

RMU warns customers about telephone hoax

ROCHELLE – Rochelle Municipal Utilities is warning customers about utility scams in the area. Customers are receiving phone calls from individuals that appear to be part of a scam designed to obtain personal information and/or money from customers. The calls are not authorized by RMU.

Red flags

The scammer often becomes angry and tells a customer his or her account is past due, and service will be shut off if a large payment isn't made – usually within less than an hour.

The scammer instructs the customer to purchase a prepaid debit or credit card – widely available at most retail stores – then call him or her back to supposedly make a payment.

The scammer asks the customer for the prepaid card's receipt number and

PIN, which grants instant access to the funds loaded to the card.

How to protect yourself

Utility representatives will never ask a customer with a past due balance to purchase a prepaid debit card to avoid disconnection.

Never provide social security numbers or personal information to anyone initiating contact with you claiming to be a utility representative or requesting you to send money to another person.

Never make payment for services to anyone coming to the door.

RMU is urging customers not to respond to these fake calls. Customers who have received such calls can report them to the Attorney General Office's Consumer Fraud Hotline at 1-800-386-5438 or the RMU Customer Service office at 815-562-4155.

Journalism exists to comfort the afflicted and afflict the comfortable

YE sat across from many victims of violent crime and had them share what they have suffered. The more intimate the viola-

tion the less likely they are to want to be identified.

I can appreciate this. It took me 40 years to pub-

licly disclose that I was sexually assaulted when I was 12.

Victims often suffer in silence.

It's difficult to know where to turn. But during the more than 30 years I've been in journalism, I have had others who have been violated come to me wanting to share.

Often, they don't want their identity disclosed. And like most journalists, I'm honor-bound to abide by their wishes.

Sadly, officials at the University of Illinois would have journalists violate this confidence.

Rachel Otwell, a terrific journalist working for WUIS public radio in Springfield, has ruffled the feathers within the university community by reporting on sexual misconduct by professors.

She, along with ProPublica, published an investigation into how the university protected the reputations of faculty even after serious allegations of sexual misconduct were substantiated. Serial offenders were given paid leave and had the circumstances of their offenses hidden from future perspective employers.

Otwell's reporting was first rate. It not only was broadcast on public radio stations, but it found its way onto front pages of newspapers across Illinois. Along with the stories, the reporting team asked people who had experienced sexual misconduct at Illinois colleges and universities to share their stories through an online form. The form specified that the accounts would

not be shared or published without permission.

It doesn't take a Ph.D. to figure out that administrators were embarrassed by their sleazy backroom deals coming to light. And they were more than likely worried that more allegations could be made.

But it would appear these college bigwigs have come up with a clever scheme to stifle future reporting.

University officials told Otwell's station it could not promise confidentiality to students, employees, faculty or others who contacted the newsroom to share experiences of sexual misconduct at the University of Illinois.

How can they do this? Well, the university owns the station. And while the journalists are editorially independent, the university said they are considered "responsible employees," which means that like most other campus workers, they are required to pass on misconduct allegations to the institution for further investigation.

But here is the rub: the university administrators are the fellows that have been covering the trails of their miscreant professors. Now journalists investigating the university are supposed to turn over the names of confidential sources to the administration before writing a story?

Give me a break. "I've been told if I don't do this, I could face discipline up to and including termination," Otwell told me.

To her credit, Otwell said she would be willing to sacrifice her job to protect the identity of confidential sources. But no reporter should face that decision. But university officials remain obstinate.

In a letter to the university, ACLU lawyers wrote: "A survivor of sexual misconduct may choose to confide in a reporter for any number of reasons. They may want their story to help others in similar circumstances but do not want to be further identified for fear of retaliation. They may know that their experience is representative of a larger issue that should be more widely known. They may simply be uncomfortable invoking the university's formal accountability mechanisms. In any case, the university should not close off this option for confidential disclosure."


Journalism exists to comfort the afflicted and afflict the comfortable.

That's a lesson that some leading our universities have yet to learn.







Cole swims to third straight IHSA state meet

ROCKFORD — Rochelle swimmer Alli Cole entered the water at the IHSA Jefferson Sectional on Saturday looking to become only the second student-athlete in school history to qualify for three consecutive state championships.

Cole worked hard throughout the offseason to prepare for the state series, and her efforts showed during the sectional meet, as she recorded respective times of 1:24.75 and 2:58.80 in the 50-yard and 100-yard freestyles for athletes with disabilities. Cole finished first in both events, earning two sectional medals and joining former Lady Hub standout Aubrey Headon as the only three-time state qualifiers from Rochelle Township High School.

"It feels good," Cole said. "I've been swimming for a long time. I swim for fun and I also compete with the [Rochelle Rays] swim team over the summer. Marianne Swanson, Jeremy Stein and my family have motivated me to keep swimming. I enjoy seeing the other kids and I enjoy trying to win. I want to do my best and I'm not going to quit."

Cole beat her 100-yard freestyle time from last season's sectional (3:06.29) by about 9 seconds, and she exceeded her state time in the 50-yard freestyle (1:26.71) by almost 2 seconds. Cole will race in the state championships at New Trier Township High School in Winnetka from Friday, Nov. 22 through Saturday, Nov. 23.

Cole's historic achievement at the sectional meet drew praise from Rochelle Rays head coach Marianne Swanson, who Cole has worked with extensively in recent years. A return to the state meet her senior season would make Cole the first-ever four-time qualifier from RTHS.

"She's history in the making," Swanson said. "Alli is an extremely hard working and dedicated swimmer who never gives up. I couldn't be prouder of her."




