#### Proposed vote-by-mail expansion

URBANA – As the 2024 election season draws near, voters in Illinois will once again choose whether they want to cast their ballots in person or by mail.

But one lawmaker is proposing a bill in the Illinois House that could make that decision a lot easier, making voting by mail the default option for people in counties and cities that choose to go that route.

State Rep. Carol Ammons, D-Urbana, said voting by mail has been shown to be a more convenient and efficient way of running elections.

"Vote-by-mail has been proven by way of court order, as well as people's utilization of vote-by-mail - I vote by mail - that it has been safe," she said during interview. "There have been no problems. I have not missed a single election. And people who use it increase their voter participation."

Voting by mail, often referred to as absentee voting, was originally intended for people who planned to be away from home on Election Day, particularly military personnel, as well as students and people whose jobs required them to travel.

# Clinton joins other communities in fiber optic expansion

Internet for All aims to provide access for everyone

CLINTON — As the flurry of activity with fiber optic cable installation in Clinton subsides, many residents likely welcome an end to all the digging for a while. But, what was the digging about?

Contractors working for several fiber optic Internet providers, including Frontier Communications and Pavlov Media, began boring in 2023 to install the cables, which will expand Internet choices.

One of the primary reasons for all the activity is a federal program known as Internet for All, which is intended to provide internet service to previously underserved areas and some areas with no Internet access.

The program is providing \$65 billion in funding for the expansion.

Other companies involved with fiber optic

installation in Clinton over the past year include Fibersmith, Campus Communications Group, Metro Communications and Conxxus.

A major attraction the use of optics for internet is its enhanced speed other technologies. The first usable fiber optic was developed in the 1950s with the technology adapted for communications use in the



Illinois lawmakers last vear met with National Telecommunications Information

Administration (NTIA) officials to learn what Illinois could do in expanding the program in the state.

Internet for All grants provide funds for Internet infrastructure in order to provide access everyone, homes, businesses and farms. Also, Illinois allocated \$400 million for Internet expansion from the Rebuild Illinois plan. Costs could increase to nearly \$1 billion. The five-year plan involves installation of fiber optic lines to reach every part of Illinois.

The federal government also has offered a program known as the Affordable Connectivity Program, which provides discounts on Internet bills for low income households and people who are already enrolled in some other federal programs, such as WIC, Federal Public

Housing Assistance, and a list of others. Enrollment for the program ends in early February.



Each workshop location will open at 8:30 a.m., and training will begin at 9 a.m. The training lasts 3.5 hours, and IDOA staff will administer the exam after the training. The Illinois Extension training fee is \$40, and IDOA's certification fee is \$30.

A range of topics related to the operation, management, and utilization of livestock and waste waste facilities will be covered. Additionally, latest regulations, best management practices, and research for manurerelated issues will be discussed. The training manual used will be "Livestock and Poultry Environmental Stewardship Curriculum." It is available at go.illinois. edu/manual.

The LMFA requires facilities designed for 300 or more animal units to have at least one

employee certified environmentally aware management manure techniques. Facilities designed for 301 to 999 animal units must have at least one employee attend a workshop OR complete the online training. Facilities with more than 1,000 animal units must have a certified livestock manager attend a workshop and pass the IDOA exam OR complete the online training and pass the online test.

For the 2024 season, there will be 50 questions on both paper-based and online tests. The pass rate is 70% or 35 of 50 questions. A Spanish version of the test is now available upon request. Young family members under 18 are welcome to take the training, but they cannot be the only certified managers at the facilities.

Cannot attend workshop? Online training and testing are available year-round and follow the same format as the in-person workshops. Online training involves nine modules of 10- to 20-minute videos that can be viewed at an individual's own pace. Those who have more than 1,000 animal units may take the test online.

All participants must register and check for weather-related updates at go.illinois.edu/CLMT. 

#### HISTORY ALMANAC

1949 - The salary of the President of the United States was increased from \$75,000 to \$100,000 with an additional \$50,000 expense allowance for each year in office.

# Psychedelics for our military

\$883.7 The billion National Defense Authorization Act for 2024 makes for some interesting reading, not only for what it left out, but what it included. What you won't find is the medical cannabis pilot program for veterans promoted by many, but you will find a treatment program using psychedelics for veterans and active duty with traumatic brain injuries and post-traumatic stress disorder.

disorder.

Specifically, it calls for clinical trials with the Department of Defense to create a system wherein they can spend up to \$10 million on psychedelics research. It

only gives them 180 days to get started. Covered conditions, besides TBI and PTSD, include depression and insomnia.

Some of the drugs to be used are psychedelic drugs psilocybin (magic mushrooms), MDMA (ecstacy) and 5-MeO-DMT (from toad glands).

There are some reported successes from using psychedelics. The Food and Drug Administration said in 2017 that they'd had positive results using LSD and the magic mushrooms. The amounts given are small and are called "microdoses." A short report with a lengthy list of citations in the Marine Corps Gazette in

2019 describes the use of LSD, mushrooms and more to attempt to gain an edge in efficiency and productivity when it comes to attention to detail, mental processing reasoning. report points to the way LSD changes the brain's method of problem solving. Maybe this explains why it might be useful in helping veterans who suffer from PTSD. By creating new ways to think about things?

Yet another study,

documented in the Lancet Psychiatry journal, found that the magic mushrooms reduced PTSD symptoms. The trial combined three doses of the mushrooms with psychotherapy. After Phase 2 of the trial, 56% of participants no longer had PTSD when checked 12 months later, after having suffered for many years.



# A new location

Welcome to my little corner of culinary delights. Now, let us see if I can get my directions correct this time. On the map, south is down and west is to the left. Yes, I think I got it right this time. Therefore, in the southwest of France, there is a lot of Spanish influence that spills over into culinary practices. The Bay of Biscay and the Mediterranean influences. not only the climate, but the cuisine as well. There, one can expect various kinds of seafoods such as monkfish, cod, and even eel. Shellfish, such as clams and mussels, are enjoyed. For a fantastic fish soup, go to Pays Basque.

Listing seafoods and referring to Pay Basque brings to my mind "bisque". Bisque is a creamy heavy soup that originated in France. It traditionally made with crustations such as lobster, shrimp, crab, and crayfish. Bisque does not necessarily need to be made of seafoods. In this case, I prefer holding to French tradition. I have made lobster bisque. Other times, I made shrimp bisque. I might

favorably Being SO located, France has an abundance of fowl both wild and domesticated. Regarding the geese comes your foie gras. I pluck this out of the list simply because of its many oddities. For one thing, foie gras is a fatty liver produced from force feeding a goose. It is an uncommon product and very expensive. It has a unique flavor difficult to describe and very delicate. It is generally cooked but very lightly. It practically melts in your hand, let alone in the mouth. I have cooked and eaten some. I did not find it all that great. Perhaps I am not sophisticated enough for such. Personally, it is not worth the trouble or expense.

The common poultry of that area are duck, turkey, and pigeon. Pigeon is also known as squab. In French, it is "pigeonneau".

These are not you garden variety pigeons flying around in parks and decorating statues. The common variety are too tough. Once the pigeon is dressed out, there is very little of it left. Due to its size, it cooks-up quickly.

Having listed duck on the food list, I should include duck confit. Only once I produced duck confit. Wild duck, especially, has a thick layer of fat just under the skin. To render it, one makes crisscross cuts nearly through the fat layer. The fat is cooked either on the duck or separately. The rendered fat is collected. The cooked duck is broken down and packed into a storage container. The fat is poured over it. It needs to be completely covered. It is then stored that way without the need of refrigeration. Fat creates a natural barrier.

As one might expect, French cuisine offers us a liberal culinary education full of adventure and delights. I fear that I will not be able to escape France any too soon.



#### **BRIDGE BITES**

#### AN EXTRA CHANCE



E-W Vulnerable South West North East Pass 3♠ **Pass** 1♠ Pass Pass Pass


The opening lead is the ♦K, won by Declarer's Ace. A Heart is lost to East, but Declarer's hopes of getting two Heart ruffs on the board are dashed when East returns a trump. So much for Plan A. Setting up the Clubs is Plan B, will it succeed?

At first glance it may appear that the only chance is for East to hold the singleton or doubleton Club King. If that is the case then Declarer can cross to the Spade Ace, lead a Club and finesse (assuming that the King does not appear from East). If the Club King comes down in two rounds, and if trumps are 3-2, then the Clubs will run and there will be no fewer than 12 tricks.

As you can see, the Club King does not come down in two rounds. Does this mean the contract fails? Not if Declarer realizes the potential of the Spade Six! That valuable card is a potential Dummy entry if one opponent or the other has Eight-Seven doubleton of trumps. And just as valuable as the Six is Declarer's precious Three!

When East returns that trump at Trick 3, Declarer plays the Queen from hand and overtakes in Dummy. Now the Club finesse works and the Club Ace is cashed. The Spade Jack is overtaken in Dummy, and a Club is ruffed high. Now Dummy's Clubs are good and, thanks to West's doubleton Eight-Seven of trumps, the Spade Six is an entry to those Clubs. Well done, Declarer! If she had carelessly played the Three on the first round of trumps she would not have reaped the benefit of her extra chance.



# 12 Questions to ask before powering up the snow thrower: Keep safety top of mind

(NAPSI) - Snowflurries and winter storms can be unpredictable and the Outdoor Power Equipment Institute (OPEI) encourages home owners business to prepare in advance before bad weather "Outdoor power equipment such as snow throwers can make quick work of a big job," says OPEI President and CEO Kris Kiser. "Just remember: When getting out your snow thrower, review your owner's manual. You should know how to correctly operate controls and quickly shut it off if necessary."

Kiser offers 12 questions to ask before operating a snow thrower.

Before operating your

snow thrower
Have you read your owner's manual? Know safe handling procedures and how to operate the controls of your machine. If the manual cannot be found, look it up online and store a copy on the computer.

Have you checked your equipment? Equipment should be powered off when checking it. Adjust any cables and check the auger. If you forgot to drain the fuel before storing your equipment last year, empty the gas tank.

Have you purchased the right fuel? Be sure to use the fuel recommended by the equipment manufacturer. Fuel that is more than 30 days old can phase separate and cause

operating problems. Buy gasoline ahead of a storm. For more information see LookBeforeYouPump.

Is gasoline used safely? Never add fuel to a running or hot engine. Store gasoline in a fuel container and label with date purchased and ethanol content. Make sure fuel is stored safely and out of reach of children.

Are batteries charged battery-powered (for equipment)? Make sure batteries are fully charged before a storm in case the electricity goes out. Recharge batteries only with the charger specified by the manufacturer. A charger that is suitable for one type of battery pack may not be compatible with another battery pack. Follow all charging instructions and do not charge the battery or equipment pack outside the temperature range specified in the instructions. Charging improperly or at temperatures outside the specified range may damage the battery.

Is the outdoor space you intend to clear of snow free of obstructions? Snow can hide objects. Doormats, hoses, balls, toys, wires, and other debris should be removed. When run over by a snow thrower, these objects may harm the machine or people.

Operating snow throwers safely Are you dressed properly? Wear safety glasses, gloves and footwear that can handle cold and slippery

Is your clean out tool ready? NEVER put your hands inside the auger or chute. Use a clean out tool to unclog snow or debris. Always turn off the snow thrower and wait for all moving parts to come to a complete stop before clearing any clogs.

Is your snow thrower operated only in visible conditions? Never operate the snow thrower without good visibility or light.

Will you use extreme caution clearing slopes and hills? Never attempt to clear steep slopes. Use caution when changing directions on slopes or inclines.

For electric equipment, do you pay attention to where the cord is? Use an extension cord designed for outdoor use. Be aware of where the power cord is at all times when using the machine. Avoid tripping. Do not run over the power cord.

Are pets and children inside while the snow thrower is operating? It's best to keep kids and pets indoors and supervised while a snow thrower is operating. Do not allow them to play in the snow as it is tossed out of the chute.

# Backers of proposed Lake Michigan wind farm forge ahead despite failures

CHICAGO – Now that a proposed wind farm on Lake Erie has been scrapped, backers of a Lake Michigan wind farm near Illinois say it's time to seize the moment.

Rising costs, challenges from bird lovers and a lawsuit funded in part by a coal company managed to delay the Lake Erie wind project long enough to halt the project.

Several Illinois lawmakers are calling for the General Assembly to pass the Rust Belt to Green Belt Act to pave the way for wind turbines in Lake Michigan off the coast of Illinois.

"News that Lake Erie won't be home to offshore wind in the near future is unfortunate, but it also provides Illinois with the opportunity to take advantage of more of the federal resources on the table to help meet our state's clean energy goals," said state Rep. Marcus Evans, Jr., D-Chicago.

Evans said such a project could create approximately 2,700 construction jobs for minority communities.

In October, a Danish company pulled out of a billion dollar project to build wind turbines off the coast of New Jersey. U.S. Congressman Chris Smith, R-New Jersey, said the effects on marine life are just some of the

repercussions of a wind farm on the water.

"Vessel navigation, including U.S. Navy ships, merchant cargo, fishing boats and search and rescue operations by the Coast Guard may be significantly hampered due to radar interference," Smith said.

The Pentagon also sounded alarms over the Biden administration's plans for offshore wind projects along the Atlantic coast due to conflicts with military operations.

Some of the groups who have expressed support for a Lake Michigan wind farm include Illinois AFL-CIO, Teamsters Joint Council 25 and the Chicago Urban League.

That often required voters to ask their state or local election official for an absentee ballot and, in some cases, explain why they wanted to vote by mail.

In more recent years, Illinois and other states have made voting by mail an option for anyone by adopting "no-excuse" absentee voting laws, meaning anyone could request a mail ballot without giving a reason.

Illinois also gives voters the option of asking to be placed on a permanent vote-by-mail list so they can automatically receive a mail-in ballot without having to fill out a new request for one each election cycle.

And in 2020, amid the COVID-19 pandemic, the General Assembly passed a law requiring local election officials automatically send vote-by-mail applications to every voter in their jurisdiction, instead of requiring voters to ask for one.

During a special meeting of the House Ethics and Elections Committee Wednesday in hometown of Urbana, Ammons said voting by mail has become increasingly popular. But she said the multi-step process of voting by mail is still inefficient because it requires voters to fill out and send in a vote-by-mail application to receive a ballot.

"But when we went back to look at the utilization of the ballots, the number that came back, and the cost associated with mailing a ballot, we realized as we talked to other jurisdictions that you would actually save the money if you simply mailed them the ballot," she said.

Ammons is the sponsor of House Bill 4198, which would allow county clerks and other local election authorities to make voting by mail the default option in their jurisdiction. It would give them the option of mailing ballots to all registered voters in their jurisdiction, without requiring voters to ask for one. But it would still require local election authorities to offer inperson voting as well for those who prefer to cast their ballot in person.

Currently, eight states and Washington, D.C., operate elections almost entirely by mail. William Cavecche, an election administrator in King County, Washington, which includes the city of Seattle, said that state passed a similar law in 2005 and immediately, two-thirds of the counties in the state shifted to voteby-mail systems.

"Speaking to someone who has run both polling-place elections and vote-by-mail elections, I can tell you from experience that vote by mail elections are significantly easier to administer," he said.

Among other benefits, Cavecche said, in a voteby-mail election, there is no need to worry about problems that commonly occur at in-person polling places such as running out of ballots, voting machines breaking down or poll workers failing to show up.


He also said vote-bymail elections are more secure because all ballots can be counted in a centralized location. He said ballot counting can also be livestreamed on the internet to provide more public transparency. Wednesday's meeting

was a subject matter hearing, meaning committee only heard testimony and did not take action on the bill. But Rep. Maurice West, D-Rockford, who chairs the panel, said he intends to hold additional hearings during the upcoming legislative session, which begins Tuesday, and it's possible lawmakers could vote on the measure in time to take effect for the 2024 general election in November.


The second set started with a home team service point and then the Lady Raiders took hold again with a 9-point run. The home team, not giving in, produced its own 9-point run to close in on the opposition.

The varsity game began after warm-ups and the National Anthem.


With the 13-6 record against the home team's 10-8, the Lady Panthers were the favorites, at least among the LeRoy fans. But, then the rout began.



#### January 19

1994: Bitterly cold air invaded the mid-Mississippi Valley. Several dozen record lows were set, including 28 below zero at Newton, 25 below zero at Champaign and 21 below zero at Peoria. The 25 below reading at Champaign also tied the city's all-time record low, first set on February 13, 1905.

2000: During the day and early evening hours, a winter storm with heavy snow affected Central Illinois with 4 to 6 inches of snow across a large area. There were

some local 6 to 8 inch amounts of snow, mainly along and north of a Galesburg (Knox County) to Bloomington (McLean County) to Danville (Vermilion County) line. A cooperative observer in Minonk (Woodford County) reported 7.5 inches of snow. Blowing and drifting of snow was reported as well. The storm caused numerous road closures, as well as accidents. Two injuries were reported with a couple of the accidents (one in Peoria County and one in Vermilion County).
