### Fatal hit-and-run traffic accident being investigated

**LEE COUNTY** — The Lee County Sheriff's Office is currently investigating a fatal hit-and-run traffic accident that occurred near the intersection of Sterling Road and Walton Road at approximately 9:29 p.m. on Dec. 4. From the initial investigation, 40-year-old Patrick J. Yocum from Rock Falls was walking near the area and was struck by a vehicle. The victim was located by a passerby in the middle of the roadway. The victim was transported to KSB Hospital by the Amboy Fire Department and was later pronounced deceased.

Due to the nature of the investigation, the roadway at the location was closed to traffic for a period of time. An accident reconstructionist and detectives from the Sheriff's Office were brought in to investigate the incident. Evidence left at the scene revealed that the offending vehicle has significant front-end damage to the grill, hood, and windshield of the vehicle. The offending vehicle is believed to a 2014 to 2018 Jeep Cherokee.

On Dec. 5, an individual contacted the Lee County Sheriff's Office and reported that they had been involved in an accident near that location. The offending vehicle was located and identified as a 2014 Jeep Cherokee. The vehicle was impounded, and the driver was questioned by detectives. Further investigation into the incident is currently being conducted and the Sheriff's Office is withholding the name of the driver at this time. An autopsy of Patrick Yocum was conducted on Dec. 6; however,

the outcome is pending toxicology results. Anyone with information is urged to contact the Lee County Sheriff's Office at 284-6631 or Ogle-Lee Crimestoppers at 1-888-CAUGHT U (1-888-228-4488). Callers do not have to leave their names and may be eligible for a reward of up to \$1,000 that leads to an arrest.

September of 1918 brought suffering and large-scale tragedy to Camp Grant, Illinois the entry point into World



War I for most Lee County soldiers. The socalled "Spanish Flu" had already begun sweeping the United States, including numerous army bases spread across the states. Located just four

miles south of Rockford, Camp Grant was a primary site for training and equipping infantry soldiers before sending them off to fight in

On Sept. 21, soldiers

in the officers' training school presented flu-like symptoms to medical officers who immediately sent them to base hospital.



### Lee County Sheriff's Office releases Thanksgiving enforcement numbers

LEE COUNTY – The Lee County Sheriff's Office conducted a traffic safety campaign Nov. 17-27 reminding motorists to buckle up and drive sober. The "Click It or Ticket" and "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" mobilization was conducted by Lee County Deputies and other state and local law enforcement agencies across Illinois to reduce highway fatalities.

During the campaign, Lee County Sheriff's Deputies

- Three (3) seat belt citations
- Zero (0) DUI arrests
- One (1) fugitives apprehended
- One (1) suspended/revoked licenses
- Three (3) uninsured motorists
- Nine (9) speeding citations
- One (1) distracted driving citations
- One (1) suspended registration citations

The Thanksgiving enforcement effort is made possible by federal traffic safety funds administered by the Illinois Department of Transportation and is part of the statewide "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over".

The next group of soldiers affected by illness were those from the 5th Limited Service Regiment, whose barracks were located next to the officers training school. These boys had recently been inducted as part of the September 5th replacement draft, and resided in nearby counties where the flu had already appeared. One of those newly drafted boys was Fred Dillow of Amboy.

The flu epidemic spread quickly and violently so that

within 48 hours a majority of soldiers at Camp Grant were infected. With the base hospital overwhelmed, some barracks were vacated and turned into medical wards equipped with hospital beds, and medical officers and Red Cross nurses were called back from leave to meet the emergency at hand. In the days to follow, soldiers were restricted to base, outside visitors were mostly barred, and flu-infected soldiers were quarantined in isolated medical barracks with inspections twice daily. All personnel were required to wear gauze masks. At the time, it was thought that overtaxing recruits with excessive drills, lack of cold weather clothing, and crowded barracks all contributed to this outbreak. The weather had been unusually cold and damp for the month of September.

On Sept. 27, one week after its onset, the flu epidemic began to subside. On Oct. 2, Pvt. Frederick Dillow died of

influenza at the base hospital along with 41 other soldiers. The last death from this illness occurred on Nov. 3, and a total of 1,060 soldiers had died of flu at Camp Grant. Although Pvt. Dillow's ser-



### Deck the halls with fire safety in mind

**SPRINGFIELD** — The OSFM stresses the importance of fire safety while decorating for the holiday season. According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) more than one-third of home decoration fires are started by candles. More than two of every five home decoration fires occur due to decorations being placed too close to a heat source.

Candle fires peak in December followed closely by January. More than half of home decoration fires in December are started by candles. The top three days for home candle fires are Christmas Day, New Year's Day, and New Year's Eve. Before you head to bed or out for the evening, extinguish all lit candles.

"Decorating for the holiday season is an exciting time, but you need to keep fire safety in mind when you deck the halls," said Illinois State Fire Marshal James A. Rivera.



were killed in alcohol-related crashes each year from 2017 to 2021, with one person killed in a drunk-driving crash approximately every 45 minutes. These fatalities are preventable, and drivers must remember that driving impaired — by alcohol, cannabis, or any other substance, whether legal or not — is potentially deadly

and illegal behavior. The Lee County Sheriff's Office recommends these safe alternatives to drinking and driving:

• Designate a sober driver or plan to use public transportation or a ride-sharing service.

• If available, use your community's sober ride program or call a taxi. • If you see an impaired driver on the road, pull over

and contact our office. • Have a friend who is about to drive impaired? Take

their keys and make arrangements to get them home safely. They'll thank you later.

Remember to buckle up.

The holiday enforcement campaign is administered by IDOT with federal highway safety funds managed by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

### Red Cross holiday decorating safety steps

**LEE COUNTY** — Follow these safety tips and visit redcross.org/fire for more information. You can also download the free Red Cross Emergency app by searching "American Red Cross" in app stores.

If you must use candles, keep them away from anything that could burn, and place them out of reach of pets and children.

Never leave burning candles unattended.

Check all holiday light cords to ensure they aren't frayed or broken. Don't string too many strands of lights together — no more than three per extension cord.

Ensure outside decorations are for outdoor use and fasten lights securely to

your home or trees. If using hooks or nails outside, make sure they are insulated to avoid an electrocution or fire hazard.

If buying an artificial tree, look for a fire-resistant label. When putting it up, keep it away from fireplaces, radiators and other sources of heat. Never use electric lights on metallic trees.

If getting a live tree, make sure it's fresh and keep it watered. To test if the tree is fresh, bend the needles up and down to make sure no needles fall off.

Don't light the fireplace if hanging stockings or other decorations on the mantel.

She'll play a role in education, helping us hone-in our skills, and making decisions in which equipment we need or what needs to be replaced."

### How high does the Sycamore grow? If you lived in one, you had a pretty good idea...

The Sycamore is the largest and tallest deciduous tree in the eastern U.S. The trees have been measured over 150 feet tall and with trunks over twelve feet thick. The bark of

the upper branches is mostly white with a little gray or green. The bark is constantly peeling off as the trees grow larger. There are some very old and large Sycamores in the Franklin Center area.

A Sycamore's leaves have three to five lobes, similar to maple leaves, but much larger. The buds are hidden inside the base of the leaf stalks. The fruits look like small golf balls hanging on a long stalk. I have always wondered why there were no Sycamores anywhere along the old channel of the Green River, even though Sycamores are usually found along the banks of creeks and rivers. Although the Green River flows through extensive former marshes, the Sycamore should still be growing on its banks.

If one travels down Bureau Creek, you will soon see Sycamores, but they are not found in the upper reaches of that stream. They have extended their range up the Rock River and Franklin Creek into Lee County. They can be found in Melugin Grove along a stream that flows into Green River, but nowhere else on Green River. The seed for the Melugin Grove trees must have come overland from the Paw Paw area in eastern Lee County.

Did you know? Sycamore trees have grown so large, and often with trunks so hollow, that two brothers once actually lived in one. Back in 1761, during the French and Indian War, John and Samuel Pringle deserted their British garrison in favor of residing elsewhere. They escaped into the wilderness that is now West Virginia. Where, after three years in hiding, and not knowing that the war had ended, they took up residence in

the hollow of a giant Sycamore. They lived in the tree until 1767, at which time one of the brothers ventured away from the tree to find out that the war had ended three years prior.

Editor Native Americans once regarded Sycamore trees as the "Ghosts of the Forest". The tree's odd appearance has inspired a long history of related folklore dating back to Egyptian times, when the tree was thought to connect the living world with the world of the dead. -- Editor

Editor's Note: James Brady Long was born in Amboy on June 12, 1926. Known by many as "Mazie", he grew up in Amboy, served in the army during World War II, then studied forestry at the Michigan College of Mining and Technology. rish writer Paul Lynch's first novel, ."Red Sky in Morning," is an astonishing blend of poetic language and thrilling plot, classic storytelling at its best. As he put it, "While the modern novel and the postmodern novel abandoned at times that interest in storytelling ... I am convinced the post-postmodern novel – whatever that is - can learn to reincorporate old-fashioned storytelling again." The title goes as far back as when Jesus said, "When in evening, ye say, it will be fair weather: For the sky is red. # Puppy scammers top the online shopping naughty list

**ROCKFORD** – Online shopping remains the #1 scam category both locally and nationally, and pet and puppy scams lead the list for dollars lost. Con artists have the perfect combination of high emotions and the time pressure of the holidays to catch people off guard and steal money from families that were supposed to add a wonderful pet to their household.

Dennis Horton, director of the Rockford Regional Office of the Better Business Bureau, says, "Pet purchasing scams are sad any time of the year, but they are even more heart-wrenching during the holidays, especially if children are involved. Puppy scams were one of the most emotionally and financially devastating scams last year; victims of pet purchasing scams lost an average of \$850."

Scammers entice their victims by posting copied pictures of cute pets, especially expensive breeds, and create phony company websites to trick their victims. BBB Scam Tracker has received many reports of fake web pages impersonating real businesses for this pur-

pose. To add even more agony to the scam, fraudsters often say they shipped the pet, but there is a problem in transit, and they will need additional funds. The scammer also may demand fees for vaccinations or other last-minute "needs." Ultimately, the pet does not exist, and the consumer has lost money and emotional

The Better Business Bureau advises extreme caution if shopping for a pet online. The number one red flag in these cases is that the fraudster will find any excuse to never meet in person or have a video meeting where you can see the pet and the alleged seller. The seller prefers to handle communication by email and not by phone.

Common tactics used in pet scams continue to evolve. Scammers increasingly ask for payment through untraceable cash apps such as Zelle, Google Pay, Cash App, Venmo, and Apple Pay.

BBB offers the following additional tips to stay safe:

• Only purchase from a reputable dealer. Check BBB Business Profiles on BBB.org for complaints and customer reviews before purchasing.

- See the pet in person before paying any money. Since scammers are highly unlikely to comply with the request, this may help avoid a scam. At the very least, demand a virtual meeting with the seller and the
- pet you're interested in. • Do a reverse image search of the photo of the pet and search for a distinctive phrase in the description.
- •Research to get a sense of a fair price for the breed you are considering. Think twice if someone advertises a purebred dog for free or at a deeply discounted price. It could be a fraudulent offer.
- Consider visiting a local animal shelter online for a pet you can meet before adopting.

Who to contact if you are the victim of a pet scam:

- •Petscams.com petscams.com/report-pet-scamwebsites tracks complaints, catalogues puppy scammers, and endeavors to get fraudulent pet sales websites taken down.
- Better Business Bureau BBB Scam Tracker to report a scam online.
- Your credit card issuer report the incident if you shared your credit card number, even if the transaction was not completed.

#### IHSA Legislative Comission forwards 14 proposals to IHSA member schools

BLOOMINGTON – The Illinois High School Association's Legislative Commission voted Nov. 27 to advance 14 proposals to amend the IHSA Constitution and By-laws to a vote of the general membership. The Commission voted after hearing feedback from member school personnel at 28 town meetings held virtually and in-person around the state during the month of November.

Among the proposals on the ballot are:

• Proposal 4: Allows coaches to conduct out of seasonstrengthandconditioning workouts with limits of no more than four days per week and no more than 90 minutes persession outside the season. No coaching of the skills of a sport during any session.

• Proposal 5: Allows students to meet the residence by-law when their parent/guardian is a full-time staff member at a public school whose attendance boundary they do not reside in if the districthasa Board Policy permitting students of employees to attend tuition free.

 Proposal 9: Modifies the All-Star games participation limit to include all sports as opposed to just basketball, football, soccerand volley ball.
• Proposal: 11: Modifies the number of summer con-

the number of summer contact days restriction from 25 to 18 days.

• Proposal 12: Allows

• Proposal 12: Allows coaches to conduct strength and conditioning workouts with limits of no more than four days per week and no more than 90 minutes per session during the summer contact days. Conditioning training does not count against the summer contact day count. No coaching of the skills of a sport during any session in order for the session not to count as a summer contact day.

 Proposal 17: Creates the opportunity for football teams to conduct a pre-season scrimmage with another school. Specific scrimmage limitations include the following: Use of IHSA Officials, four separate 12 play segments, no special teams, 48 total play limits per player, no live contact or thud in practice the day before or after the scrimmage. Scrimmage to be held on Friday or Saturday of IHSA week 7. Players are eligible to participate in the scrimmage after participating in eight different days of practice.

 Proposal 18: Establishes districts in the sport of football to be determined by the IHSA using geography and classification. Eight districts in each class with eight schools in each district. District games in weeks 3-9 of the regular season. Top four schools in each district qualify for the IHSA Playoffs. Seeding procedures will be similar to current seeding procedures with teams from the same district not to play in the first round.

 Proposal 20: Eliminate the match limit per tournament language in girls' and boys' volleyball.

• Proposal 22: Increase the number of girls' wrestling team contests from 18 to 25.

• Proposal 23: Establishes a Girls' Flag Football fall season limitation (Monday of week 6 to Saturday of week 21), a pre-season practice requirement of nine practices before a contest and a regular season contests limitation of 25 games exclusive of the IHSA State Series.


