## Variety, value keys to auction experience familiar Chana site

CHANA - It might have new owners and a new name, but the Chana Rt. 64 Auction Barn is operating in a familiar location at 620 Stone Hill Road in Chana, just off or IL Route 64 a few minutes west of Kings.

Packed with items ranging from lawn and garden and poultry to lumber, automotive supplies, antiques and collectibles, the auction has something for everyone.
"We have our regular auctions every Tuesday at 8:30 a.m.," said Mike McNeal, manager and overseer for the auction facility. "You never know what you'll find here... it's like a treasure hunt."

The team, which also consists of three auctioneers, has been involved in
the auction and wholesale merchandise business for over 50 years.
"Our job out here is to make the best money for the seller... the best buck," McNeal added.

McNeal, along with owner Lori Shelton, explained the auction house has recently added a wholesale event that is open to the public, scheduled for several Sundays including Sept. 9, Sept. 23, Oct. 14, and Oct. 28. The wholesales open at noon and feature overstock items from local stores, closeouts, and discontinued items.
"The wholesales are a good place for people to stock up. It's new items - cleaning products, toilet paper, frozen foods," Shelton said. "It's also a great place to find toys, gift items, tools... it's all brand new and it's good, in-

## Rickard to serve as Byron's acting mayor

BYRON - Byron Alderman John Rickard was elected to serve as acting mayor at the Byron City Council meeting on Wednesday, Sept. 5 Former Mayor Tom Palmgren resigned the position effective Aug. 31, due to a change in residence. According to Municipal Law, the office of acting mayor was required to be filled by one of the seven Aldermen currently in office. Because there are 28 months remaining on the unexpired mayoral term, Mayor Rickard will serve in this position until a new mayor is sworn in on May 1,2019 , following a Special Election on April 2, 2019.
Mayor Rickard has served as an Alderman for Ward 2 since 2009, and chairs the Community Services Committee responsible for Public Works and Planning and Development. He and

his wife, Debby, have resided in Byron for 17 years. He is a Presbyterian minister and is the Executive Presbyter for the Presbytery of Blackhawk, the regional governing body for the Presbyterian Church.

Sales tax guidance available for out-of-state sellers

SPRINGFIELD - The Illinois Department of Revenue is announcing online resources for remote (out-of-state) sellers seeking to determine whether they must begin collecting and remitting Illinois sales tax beginning Oct.
The guidance is a result of the enactment of Illinois Public Act 100-587 and the subsequent U.S. Supreme Court decision in South Dakota v. Wayfair, Inc.
IllinoisPublic Act 100-587 requires remote sellers who have sold either cumulative gross receipts from Illinois sales of \$100,000 or more, or 200 or more separate Illinois transactions to register and remit Illinois Use Tax forsales made on or after Oct. 1.
Remote sellers should visit www.tax.illinois.gov for specific details and available resources on Illinois' new law, including: informational
bulletin, FAQs, tax matrix, and more. and more.

## Bill allows patients to seek physical therapy without prescription

SPRINGFIELD - On Aug. 16, 2018 Illinois Gov. Bruce Rauner signed into law a bill that eliminates the requirement for patients to obtain a doctor's prescription prior to seeking treatment from a licensed physical therapist.

As a result, Illinois patients will have direct access to physical therapy treatment immediately.

Gov. Rauner signed the legislation at a ceremony at the State Capitol. Members of the Illinois Physical Therapy Association were on hand to celebrate the milestone.
"We would like to thank the governor, the legislature and the Illinois Physical Therapy Association for providing Illinois patients with

the freedom to directly seek physical therapy treatment," said Athletico CEO Mark Kaufman. "Removing the physician-referral requirement will give patients an
opportunity to begin the treatment process sooner, and it will save them money. In addition, it will free up appointment times for medical doctors to see patients needing advanced medical treatment. This is ultimately a win for Illinois residents and the entire medical community."

The measure is expected to reduce the need for unnecessary X-rays, MRIs, and opioid prescriptions. According to a recent BlueCross BlueShield of South Carolina study, direct access to physical therapy led to a 31 percent reduction in total health care costs, 80 percent decrease in patient out-of-pocket costs and a 90 percent reduction in opioid use.

Illinois became the 45 th state to allow patients to seek treatment from a physical therapist without a prescription or physician referral Under the Illinois law, a physical therapist must refer a patient to a health care professional if they do not demonstrate measurable or functional improvement after 10 visits or 15 business days, whichever occurs first.

Local facility manager Dr. Chad Brinkmann of the Oregon Athletico clinic is very excited for this new law
'Patients will now have quicker access to physical therapy and can get on the road to recovery that much sooner, which will help improve their treatment outcomes as shown by re search," he said.

## Exelon Generation kicks off fall maintenance work

## $\square$ Byron Generating Station refueling and maintenance outage is the first of

 three large projects designed to ensure $24 / 7$ production of electricityBYRON - The city of Byron's population jumped by a third this week as more than 1,400 temporary workers traveled to the area in support of Byron Generating Station's annual refueling outage. Operators removed Unit 1 from service to inspect, refuel and upgrade the nuclearenergy plant to ensure continued safety and reliability during the winter months ahead.

Byron's refueling and maintenance outage is one of three planned this fall, including a Unit 2 outage at Braidwood Generating Station in Braceville, Ill., and a Unit 3 outage at Dresden Generating Station in Morris, Ill. These outages will add 4,200 temporary jobs and infuse millions of dollars into the

Illinois economy.
'Exelon's fall outages support more than a thousand electricians, pipe fitters, welders, laborers and other contractors," said Stacy McCaskill, director, Illinois Small Business Development Center (SBDC) at Sauk Valley Community College. "This influx of people and purchasing makes small-town businesses thrive. We are so thankful for Exelon's support of our Illinois SBDC so that we can continue helping small business serve the needs of Exelon's hardworking employees."
"The extra workers in town for the outage give our businesses an added boost to their bottom line," said

Oregon Mayor Ken Williams. "The timing works out very well with the outage lasting through September and then our annual 'Autumn On Parade' taking place Oct. 6-7. We hope many more visitors can enjoy our scenic area as we transition into fall."

During the outage, the Unit 1 cooling tower will not produce any water vapor cloud. This is normal when a unit is taken offline.

Byron's Unit 2 reactor will continue to supply carbon-free electricity to customers during the Unit 1 outage With both units at full power, the site produces almost 2,500 megawatts, enough electricity to power more than 2 million average American homes.

## Is President Trump the wave of the future?

THE President is often called, with an air of disapproval, a populist. Cambridge Dictionary defines populism as "political ideas and activities that are intended to get the support of ordinary people by giving them what they want." What could be wrong with that?

The problem is that populists have a reputation for undermining democratic principles and institutions in the name of giving the people what they want. Exploiting fears and popular prejudices, some of them have experienced much success here and throughout the world. Seeing this, the President's critics fear that he's riding the wave of the future.

He probably isn't. The reason lies in who his supporters are and aren't.

They aren't the poor or people who are mainly concerned about income inequality or the economy. According to Steven Pinker in his recent book, Enlightenment Now, they voted for Clinton in the 2016 election. Those in the four highest income brackets went for Trump.

We have to look

President's supporters. Educational background offers one clue. Pinker reports that, regardless of their income, people with less of it voted for Trump while those with more voted for Clinton.

Another clue shows up in Pinker's quote from research on populism in Europe. "Populist voters are older, more religious, more rural, less educated, and more likely to be male and members of the ethnic majority." Trump voters' support for policies like his Muslim travel ban and their belief that white people were victims of discrimination spring from that kind of cultural identity.

Their concerns are in line with those of conservative American populists, going back to
the 1850 's, who saw and feared the changes taking place in America in their time. Many of today's Trump supporters feel that their way of life is under attack from the rising influence of women, African Americans, the LGBT community, and immigrants. They distrust and resent the "experts" and educated "elites" who promote these changes while undermining cherished religious and social traditions.

The President's followers have been on the losing end of this cultural struggle for a long time and their movement can be seen as a last-ditch stand. But in spite of their energy and commitment, it would be a mistake to think that the future is on their side. The reason is captured in one sentence from Pinker: "Populism is an old man's movement."

He reports that the younger the age group, the less support there is for leaders like the President. Worse for Trump adherents, it appears that the young are unlikely to move in a more conservative direction as they age. Research from America and Europe since the 1940's shows
that each generation has been more liberal than the one before, and that as the years go by each carries its liberal convictions with it into the future. Meanwhile, my generation, the outsized and influential but aging baby boomers, is gradually shrinking as more of us die each day.

Given the President's unpopularity among the general population, and as society continues to become more urban, less white, more educated, and younger, it's hard to see a future in which the his brand of conservative populism wins out, because there's no end in sight to these trends. It seems more likely that his populist movement, instead of being the wave of the future, will follow the path of all the previous ones, which have arisen in the past and then faded away in a changing society.

## Safety tips for parents of young farmers

People who live in cities, exurbs or suburbs may not come across farms very frequently. But millions of people, including children, still live on farms. In fact, in 2009 the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention noted that more than one million children under the age of 20 lived, worked or had a regular presence on farms in the United States.

Protecting children from injury on farms, especially those who perform work on farms, is of paramount importance. The American Society of Safety Engineers offers the following safety tips to parents of children who will be spending time on farms

- Know and obey the laws. Various state and federal laws are in place to protect young children from farm-related accidents and injuries. Age requirements dictate which jobs children can perform on a farm, and parents should adhere to those requirements. Asking children to do more than they're physically capable of can lead to accident, injury or even death.
- Review equipment operation instructions. Before assigning children a task on the farm, parents should review the equipment operation instructions. Doing so can help parents reacquaint themselves with tools and equipment they may not have used in awhile, and that can make it easier for them to teach kids how to use such equipment. In addition, reviewing equipment instructions may provide insight to parents unsure if their children are old enough to use certain tools.
- Inspect equipment. Before children perform any tasks on the farm, parents should inspect the equipment their children are likely to use to make sure each tool is safe. Make sure tools are in proper working order, as broken or poorly working equipment increases the risk of accident or injury.
- Enroll children in farm safety camps. The ASSE recommends that parents contact their local Cooperative Extension and Farm Bureau offices to enroll children in farm safety camps. Such camps can teach kids safe farming techniques and the proper ways to use age-appropriate tools.
- Set a positive example. Another way for parents to protect their children on the farm is to set a positive example Parents can do so in various ways. Using equipment properly, removing tractor keys from ignitions when tractors are not in use and exercising caution when using hazardous materials shows kids the importance of caution when working on farms.

Hundreds of thousands of children perform jobs on farms across the country. Parents who want to teach their kids to farm should always do so with safety in mind.

## New WIU application rolled out Sept. 1

MACOMB - Western Illinois University has unveiled a new application that will allow prospective students to apply to the University earlier than ever before.
The new application now has an option for self-reported academic information to be included. According to Interim Director of WIU Admissions Jason Woods, this allows Western to make its admissions decisions earlier - and more quickly - for those students who wish to enroll in Fall 2019.

Students can apply online and should have a copy of their unofficial high school transcript to use as a guide when completing the application. Students will need to enter their SAT total or ACT composite (along with subscores and test date), cumulative high school GPA, GPA scale (4.0, 5.0, etc), enter grades in English/composition and math courses and indicate whether the scale is weighted or unweighted. This information will be used to make the WIU admissions decision, and students should receive notification within three days.
Students who choose to self-report their academic information will be eligible for the automatic Western Commitment scholarship, provided that they have earned at least a 3.0/4.0 GPA and have earned at least a 1030 SAT (20 ACT). Students who choose to selfreport must provide a final official transcript and official test scores prior to July 15, 2019. Students who prefer not to self-report can complete the online application, opting out of self-reporting and submitting official documents to Undergraduate Admissions, Western Illinois University, 1 University Circle, Macomb, IL 61455-1390, or admissions@wiu. edu

## Choose Bold Faith and Demolish Your Doubts!

In Acts 27 (AMP), there's a great story about the apostle Paul. He was travelling by ship with some people when "a violent wind...] [a northeaster, a tempestuous windstorm like a typhoon], came rushing down from the island" (v. 14). For days they were caught in the storm, and at one point it was so fierce, they were "violently tossed about by the storm" (v. 18) and had to throw the ship's equipment overboard. They ended up without food, hungry, stranded - seemingly without hope.
In that moment, Paul stood in the midst of the survivors and said to them, "I urge you to keep up your courage and be in good spirits, because there will be no loss of life among you..." (v. 22). He then shared that an angel of God told him this, and said in verse 25 , "So keep up your courage, men, for I believe God and have complete confidence in Him that it will turn out exactly as I have been told."
How could Paul, in the middle of a horrible storm, ask the people to "be in good spirits" and have a good attitude? Because he believed in his heart-without a doubt-"that it will turn out exactly as I have been told."
I love that! It's a great picture of the power of faith in God when all hope seems lost. And we can have the very same faith that Paul had if we will overcome doubt.
We all face storms in life, and some are more difficult than others. That's why we have the gift of faith. Ephesians 6:16 (ESV) calls it "the shield of faith, with which you can extinguish all the flaming darts of the evil one." Doubt is a type of "flaming dart" that the enemy uses to attack our faith.
We usually experience doubt after we've made a decision. In James 1:6, the Bible says having doubt is like being tossed about like the wind, which feels like you're
trying to go in two different directions at the same time. And it's miserable to be torn between two places, not able to decide what you really believe.

It's in those moments we have to choose whether we are going to believe God or the enemy...God or our feelings...God or what people tell us...God or our circumstances.

When doubt comes against us, we have to lift up the shield of faith. We do this when we open our mouth and say what God's Word says, rather than grumbling and complaining about the problem. Our

 faith is released as we say, pray and do the Word. So in those times, open your mouth and say, "I believe that everything God has told me will come to pass!"Maybe you're doubting whether you can hear God's voice or not. This happens because we usually doubt ourselves more than we doubt God. Now I'm not talking about actually hearing a voice; I'm talking about that knowing we have inside our hearts about what is right or wrong. That's the still, small voice of God. Believers in Jesus Christ all have it, but many don't have the confidence to trust it.

The Bible says in James $1: 5$ that when we need wis-
dom, we can go to God, "who gives generously to all without reproach" (ESV). This means that even with our imperfections, God will be faithful to us and give us what we need if we will ask Him for help. He loves us, blesses us and uses us in spite of us, because He is faithful! And we never have to doubt that.

I've learned through my own
 relationship with God that He's not expecting me to be perfect; He wants me to do my best to be in His will and take steps of faith as He leads me, through His Word and the promptings He speaks to my heart. Remember, He wants us to put our confidence in Him.

God really does want to speak to you personally and lead you in His great plan for your life. So don't be afraid to step out and do what's in your heart. If you make a mistake, you'll learn from it and go on. That's how we "step out and find out." And we all have to do it.

I want to encourage you to begin making confessions every day that will help you grow in your faith and confidence in God. We need to make declarations like, "God loves me. He wants to speak to my heart. I can hear from God. He is faithful to me and will lead me in His will for my life. And I believe it will be exactly as God has told me!"
By God's grace, we can be bold in faith and overcome every attack of doubt during the storms of life.
