POLO – Dambman Lawn Mower Hospital in Polo was destroyed by fire last week.

Polo Fire Chief Tony Karrow said the call for the fire at the business, located at 605 S. Congress Ave., came in at 10:48 a.m. on Monday, Oct. 15.

Besides Polo, responding departments included those from Stillman Valley, Oregon, Byron, Sterling, Mount Morris and Dixon. Karrow said it does not appear the fire was intentionally set, but the cause is under investigation.

Democrats, Republicans ready for the Nov. election

for us," she said.

Being a Democrat in Ogle County can be a bit lonely.

She said one reason the party has been energized is President Donald Trump.

According to County Clerk Laura Cook, there are 31,242 registered voters in the county. Of that number, 13,689 are registered Republican, while only 5,488 are registered a Democrats. Undeclared voters account for 12,065 of the total number.

"Yes," she said with a chuckle when asked if the president has made more people active in the party this year. "There's not a day goes by that he keeps renewing our drive."

But that doesn't mean Democrats are not excited about their chances in the Nov. 6 election. In fact, Ogle County Democratic Party Chairman Christine Ballard said they are seeing a lot of enthusiasm and involvement in the party this year.

But the Republican Party in the county is also engaged and ready for the election, said Stacy Flanagan, chairman of the Ogle County Republican Party.

"Yes, the Ogle County Republicans are excited about the election," she said. "We are excited about every election. People are getting fired up."

STD rate much higher in county

OREGON – The Ogle County Health Department (OCHD) is working with the Illinois Department of Public Health to address higher than expected rates of Gonorrhea in Ogle County.

The department has seen a 171 percent increase in cases of Gonorrhea in Ogle County from 2017 to 2018.

Gonorrhea is a reportable sexually transmitted disease. People that contract the disease may be asymptomatic or symptoms may not present for several weeks or months. When present, symptoms can include burning or pain with urination, penile or vaginal discharge, and pain or swelling in the testicles of men. Rectal infection can also cause rectal pain, bleeding, or discharge, and throat infection can cause a sore throat.

Gonorrhea is caused by infection with the Neisseria gonorrhoeae bacterium, and it can be transmitted through vaginal, anal, and oral sex.

Gonorrhea most commonly infects the repro-

ductive tract, including the cervix, uterus, and fallopian tubes in women, and the urethra in women and men, but can also infect the throat and rectum.

Untreated gonorrhea can cause serious and permanent health problems in both women and men. In women, gonorrhea can spread into the uterus or fallopian tubes and cause a serious infection of the reproductive organs called pelvic inflammatory disease (PID), which can cause abdominal pain and fever and lead to chronic pelvic pain, infertility, and an increase in the risk of ectopic pregnancy (an abnormal pregnancy that develops outside of the uterus).

In men, gonorrhea may cause inflammation of the testicles and surrounding tissues and can also lead to infertility.

Prevention for gonorrhea includes abstinence, getting tested for sexually transmitted diseases (STDs) before beginning a relationship with a new partner, limiting the number of sex partners, and

using condoms every time. Treating infections with appropriate antibiotics is also important for stopping the spread of gonorrhea.

The Ogle County Health Department recommends that everyone who is sexually active should talk with their healthcare provider about being tested for STDs, such as gonorrhea and chlamydia, and anybody who may have been exposed to gonorrhea through a sex partner should seek care immediately for testing and treatment. OCHD's staff can provide testing and treatment at either of our locations 907 W. Pines Oregon, or 510 Lincoln Highway Rochelle. Call the department for more information at 815-562-6976.

She said she also expects good voter turnout in the county.

"I do expect a good turnout, mostly because of the governor's race," she said. "People seem more concerned about this governor's race than any other governor's race we have had in the past."

Cook said she also thinks that race will bring people out to vote.

"I believe the people are coming out because of the governor race, and I would expect maybe a 52 percent turnout," Cook said.

Locally, Ballard said Rockford Democrat Sara Dady has a real shot to unseat Republican Congressman Adam Kinzinger.

"She's working hard to reach all voters in the district," she said of Dady.

Nationally, Ballard said she believes her party's chances are good on election night for some major gains in Washington.

"I think we're going to take back the House," she said. "I'm hoping the Senate."

But Flanagan isn't so sure.

"A lot of people don't follow and understand the political process" she said. "They will get caught up in some of the rhetoric and vote Democratic. Most Ogle County voters are conservative and will vote that way. With social media, a lot of Republicans are staying quiet because they are afraid of being bullied by the so-called 'blue wave.'"

Whatever happens, it will be a night many political junkies will enjoy.

"I don't think many people who follow politics is going to get a night's sleep," Ballard said.

2018 Ogle County tentative multiplier announced

SPRINGFIELD – Ogle County has been issued a tentative property assessment equalization factor of 1.0000, according to Constance Beard, director of the Illinois Department of Revenue.

The property assessment equalization factor, often called the “multiplier,” is the method used to achieve uniform property assessments among counties, as required by law.

This equalization is particularly important because some of the state’s 6,600 local taxing districts overlap into two or more counties (e.g. school districts, junior college districts, fire protection districts). If there were no equalization among counties, substantial inequities among taxpayers with comparable properties would result.

State law requires property in Illinois to

be assessed at one-third (1/3) of its market value. Farm property is assessed differently, with farm homesites and dwellings subject to regular assessing and equalization procedures, but with farmland and farm buildings assessed according to standards based on productivity.

The equalization factor is determined annually for each county by comparing the sales price of individual properties sold over the past three years to the assessed value placed on those properties by the county supervisor of assessments/county assessor.

If this three-year average level of assessment is one-third of market value, the equalization factor will be one (1). If the average level of assessment is greater than one-third of market value, the equalization factor will be less than one (1). And if the

average level of assessment is less than one-third of market value, the equalization factor will be greater than one (1).

Assessments in Ogle County are at 33.02 percent of market value, based on sales of properties in 2015, 2016, and 2017.

The equalization factor currently being assigned is for 2018 taxes, payable in 2018. Last year’s equalization factor for the county was 1.0000.

The tentative factor is subject to change (1) if the County Board of Review takes actions which significantly affect the county assessments or (2) if local officials or others can present data showing that the Department of Revenue’s estimates of the average level of assessments in the county should be adjusted. A public hearing on the tentative multiplier will be held between 20 and 30

days after the tentative factor is published in a newspaper of general circulation within the county.

A change in the equalization factor does not mean total property tax bills will increase or decrease.

Tax bills are determined by local taxing bodies when they request money each year to provide services to local citizens. If the amount requested by local taxing districts is not greater than the amount received in the previous year, then total property taxes will not increase even if assessments may have increased.

The assessed value of an individual property determines what portion of the tax burden a specific taxpayer will assume. That individual’s portion of tax responsibility is not changed by the multiplier.

Byron man legally intoxicated at time of fatal crash

BYRON – A Byron man who was killed in a head-on crash on July 28 had a blood alcohol level well over the legal limit at the time of the accident.

According to Illinois State Police, Randall L. Hilliard, 50, from Byron, had a blood alcohol concentration of .358. The legal limit in Illinois is .08.

Hilliard, a lieutenant with the sheriff’s department who was off duty at the time, was driving a 2003 Dodge pickup east on IL Route 72 when his vehicle apparently crossed the center line and struck a 2007 Jeep SUV driven by Rick A. Sgro, 51, of Oregon. Also in the Jeep were Allison

R. Sgro, 24, from Mount Morris, Abigail E. Sgro, 20, from Mount Morris and Daniel W. Merritt, 20, from Gering, Neb.

Rick is Allison and Abigail’s uncle.

All members of the Sgro family were transported to SwedishAmerican Hospital in Rockford. Merritt was transported to Mercyhealth Hospital in Rockford.

Abigail and Merritt were both released from the hospital. Both are active duty members of the U.S. Air Force.

Rick and Allison suffered more severe injuries, including broken bones and internal injuries.

Polo Library District has board positions open

POLO – Nominating petitions for three open board positions at Polo Public Library District are available at the library.

Three of the seven positions will be open for election to four-year terms. The election will be held on April 2, 2019.

Library board members must be, on the date of the election, a citizen of the United States, at least 18 years old, a registered voter, a resident of the State of Illinois and must have resided in the library district (Buffalo Township) at least one year at the time he or she files nomination papers.

To be considered for elec-

tion, candidates must file a petition with ten signatures of qualified voters who live within the library district. The candidates must complete a statement of candidacy, a statement of economic interests, and may complete an optional notarized loyalty oath. All necessary forms are included in the candidate’s election packet available at the library.

The filing period is Dec. 10 through Dec. 17. Packets returned after December 17 will not be considered for candidacy.

Packets may be obtained and filed during library hours: Monday-Thursday from 10 a.m.-7 p.m., Friday from 10 a.m.-4 p.m., and Saturday from 10 a.m.-3 p.m.

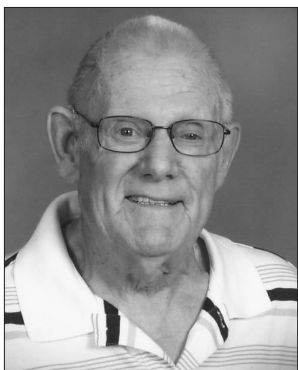
Eleanore is preceded in death by her parents, husband: John W.; one brother: Lyle; four sisters: Leola, Verdelle, Eilene and Helen.

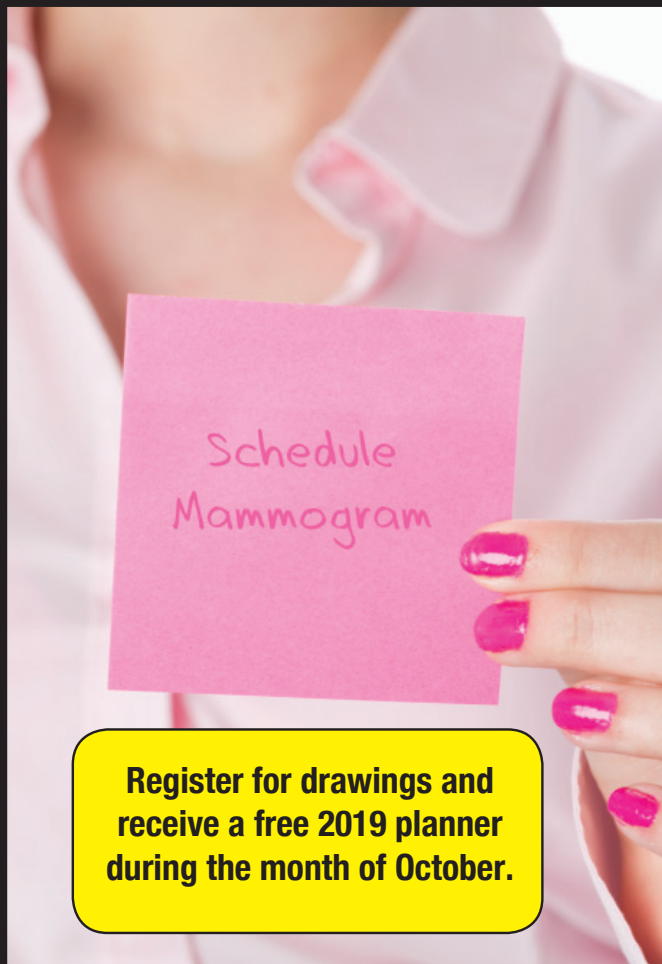
When the class gathered at Oregon's Cork & Tap at noon Saturday a bar-b-q

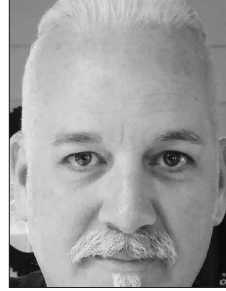

Sadly, there are still too many bad managers out there. You know the type—the ones who talk incessantly about themselves and their accomplishments, even

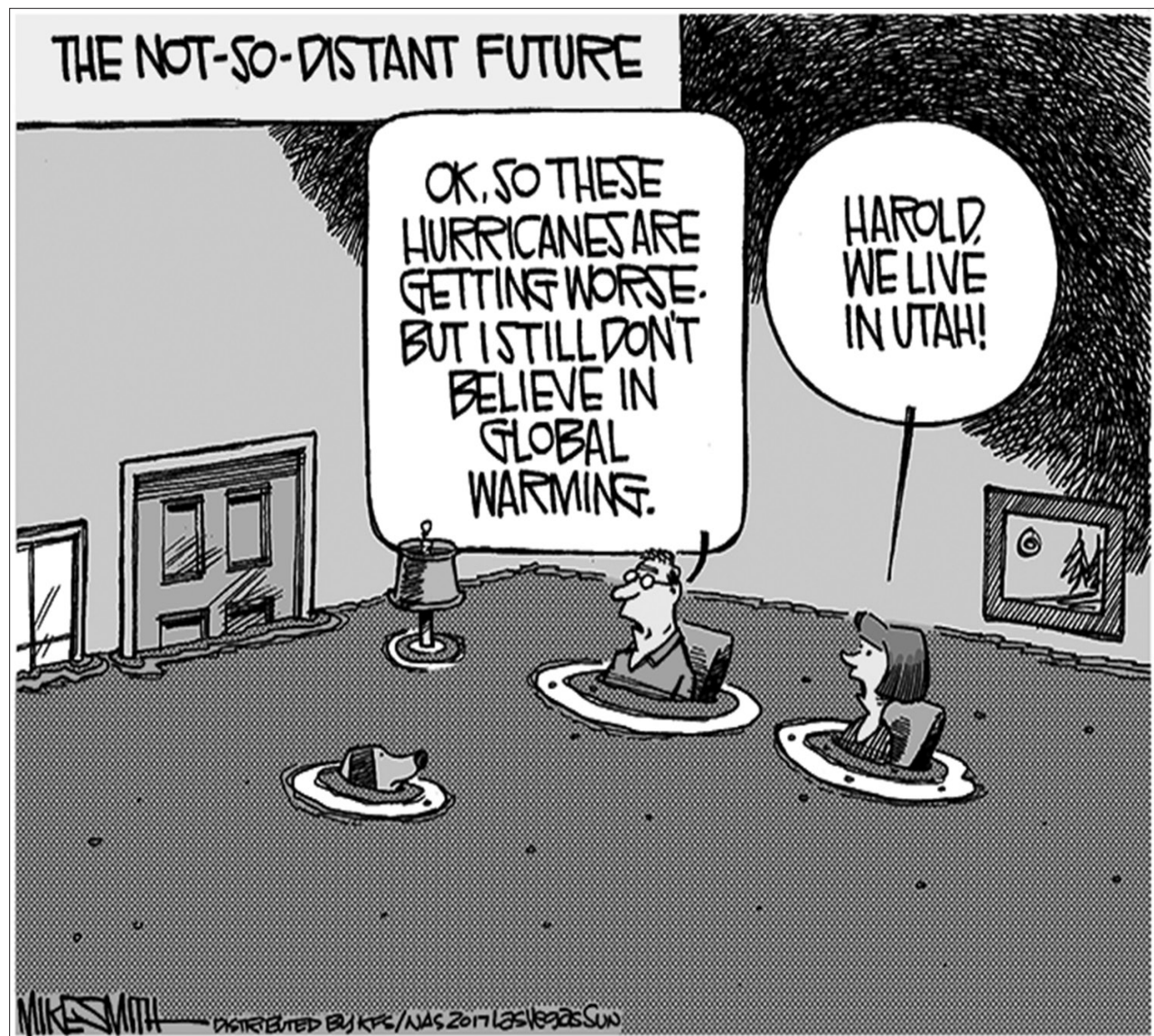
when those accomplishments aren't theirs alone.

Solar should happen at the expense of our community

Dear Editor,

I have lived in Ogle County since I was nine years old. I attended public schools, graduated college from Northern Illinois University (NIU), married, and started a family in Ogle County. My husband and I recently bought our country dream home on a few acres just a mile outside of Davis Junction. Within two months of closing on our new home we were informed the County was going to allow a solar farm to be constructed about 200 feet from our house.

The proposed plant will reside on a 150-acre field and consist of thousands of black glass panels interlaced with toxic metals and carcinogenic cadmium. The panels will stand nearly 8-10 feet high and be surrounded by a seven feet industrial security fence lined with

strands of barbed wire and warning signs detailing the dangers of high voltage electricity.

The Illinois 2016 Clean Energy Job Act targets renewable energy growth by redistributing over \$200 million dollars of taxpayer funded subsidies to encourage power companies to build solar plants in our State. Ogle County is facilitating these solar plants under a "special use" permit provision on agricultural-zoned farmland and seems unprepared for the onslaught of solar companies prospecting Ogle County for this new subsidized "solar gold rush."

The solar companies' business models rely on these subsidies to make a profit. They have no commitment to the long-term outcome of our land or communities. Our County is short cycling approval

and placement of these industrial solar plants with very little consideration of zoning and long-term impacts to land and community. Some of our immediate concerns include:

* What are the long-range impacts of solar panels to our farm land and ground water?

* Can we trust these solar companies will be around to effectively operate and maintain these power plants?

* Will the solar companies remove these power plants at the end of their life?

* What happens if the Illinois State subsidies go away?

Some may say the County will yield additional tax revenue from these solar plants. However, the solar companies already lobbied our State (Illinois Senate Bill 0486)

which caps solar plant property values to \$218,000 per megawatt of electric power produced. This limits the property value to less than an average Ogle County home on five acres. They have also lobbied into law the ability to depreciate the value of their industrial electrical plants by four percent per year for next 20 years. That means the equivalent solar plant will only be worth approximately \$40,000 of taxable property value after 20 years. I wish we all had the ability to depreciate our home property bill.

In fact, these solar plants may actually cause a net revenue loss for our County given there are many homes near where these solar plants are being proposed.

We must encourage our leaders to develop a comprehensive plan and not arbitrarily approve these

"special use" permits for solar plants that are clearly impacting zoning across our county. We must encourage our county elected officials to establish a comprehensive plan working with the townships, villages, and municipalities before haphazardly allowing utility scale solar plant. The County needs to reconsider the "special use" permit that is allowing these solar farms to be placed near residential homes and enact limitations such as extending siting restrictions two miles out from residential areas.

There is a place for solar, but not at the expense of our greater community and rustic character. We must ask ourselves, how can we as a community allow growth without losing our rural community foundations, hearts, and souls?

Hunting



It takes a lot of gear to tackle hunting season

Big game and migratory bird hunting is a billion-dollar industry that attracts millions of enthusiasts across North America. According to Statistics Brain, 12.5 million people over the age of 16 hunt annually, and 220 million days are spent hunting each year.

Nature-based tourism and resident and nonresident hunting is also big business in Canada. According to the Guide Outfitters Association of British Columbia, these industries generate \$120 million and employ roughly 2,000 guide outfitters in this province alone.

Hunters provide a necessary service besides keeping game animal numbers within reason. They are the eyes and ears on the

ground, and help inform wildlife management decisions. Hunting also generates benefits from hunter-supported organizations like conservation groups, habitat enhancement services and restoration outfits.

Hunters require certain gear to ensure safe and productive trips. Here are some must-have items for any hunter's packing list.

Hunting knife

No hunting expedition is complete without a quality knife, which is an invaluable tool. Knives come in different sizes. Many hunters carry a fixed blade knife to field dress a kill and for self-defense against larger animals. Every day carry knives,

or EDCs, also are another sound investment. EDCs may be paired with other gadgets to form a handy multitool, which is vital in many different applications.

Trail markers/light strips

Hunters and outdoor enthusiasts can mark their way to a hunting spot or tree stand and see the path in the dark thanks to illuminated light strips. This helps avoid getting lost at dusk and dawn.

Hunting apparel

Hunting apparel includes coats, pants, waders, boots, hats, gloves, and much more. Depending on the game to be hunted, attire will be patterned in camou-

flage to blend into surroundings or blaze orange to set hunters apart and make them more visible to fellow outdoorsmen. Deer cannot distinguish color, so bright orange is commonly worn during deer season. Sales associates from popular outdoor equipment retailers can advise about appropriate attire. Considerations to habitat and weather should be made.

Storage pack

Hunters require a lightweight, accessible pack that provides easy-to-reach storage. A variety of options are available, and there are even models that have a tree stand work shelf, rifle and bow mount, as well as a removable small items organizer.

Swiveling bi- or tripod

A small tripod can help hunters stay on moving game and remain steady for the shot. Pivoting or swiveling action keeps a hunter's movement smooth and on target.

Binoculars

Every hunter can benefit from a good set of binoculars. High-quality binoculars will feature glare- and fog-resistant lenses.

Tree stand

A tree stand platform gives hunters the advantage of an elevated position, which offers better vantage points and keeps them out of the scent line of prey. Tree stands should be coupled with safety harnesses.



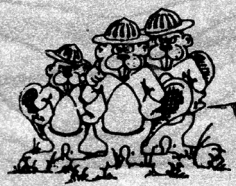

Twenty-six classmates were able to attend with one coming from as far away as Hawaii. The Moose provided a great buffet meal as we listened to music from the 50s and 60s over the course of the evening. We now look forward to gathering again in 5 years for our 60th reunion. The class of 63 has been an unusually extraordinary group as they meet monthly over the course of the year for a luncheon in and around Oregon.

It is easy to complain, but there is danger in doing it too much

Complaining is dangerous business. It can damage or even destroy your relationship with God, your relationships with other people, and even your relationship with yourself.

It's easy to complain. We likely don't realize how much we do it, and I believe it's one of the most challenging things to overcome.

Philippians 2:14 (NKJV) says, "Do all things without complaining and disputing." That's a pretty clear command. And not something anyone can do in their own strength.

Think about what you're talking about. It's important to understand that every word you speak has some kind of effect.

Proverbs 18:21 says that our words have the power of life or death in them. In other words, the way we speak really does matter. So it makes sense that we should avoid complaining at all cost.

I think of complaining as the enemy's language. When we do it, we open the door for him to come into a situation and cause trouble. On the other hand, praise and thanksgiving is God's language.

Like I said before, it's easy to complain. There are many things that happen every day that we could murmur about if we let ourselves go there. But they really aren't worth the effort it takes to get upset and gripe about it.

For example, we travel a lot and stay in a lot of hotels. I like to take a hot bath to relax before speaking at our conferences. Once when I went to fix my bath, I discovered there was no hot water. So I called the front desk to see about getting hot water, but they weren't able to fix the problem when I needed them to. And later, I learned that my room was the only room in the hotel that didn't have hot water! Now, I could have gotten all upset

about this at the time. But God helped me to relax and resist the temptation to get upset. And the truth is, complaining wouldn't have changed anything – it would have just made the situation harder.

Check the attitude of your heart.

Complaining comes from an ungrateful, prideful attitude of the heart. It causes us to feel that we shouldn't be inconvenienced or have bad things happen to us.

It's easy for us to think, Why are you making such a big deal out of it? when someone else is inconvenienced or struggling. But when we have to deal with the pain ourselves, it's a different story. That's when we say, "Why is this happening to me?!"

Many people in the western world are spoiled by the conveniences of our culture. We're used to instant gratification, getting what we want when we want it. We don't like discomfort or sacrifice. We don't want anything to be hard. This causes us to have an immature, selfish perspective of difficult situations and say things we shouldn't say.

I've learned that there's a better approach: Look for the treasure in every trial.

The truth is, I've done most of my spiritual growing during the hardest and most painful times of my life. The trials of life have caused me to press in to God. And as I've done that, He's changed me. He's helped me to develop an attitude of gratitude and humility, which has brought real freedom into my life.

What's real freedom? Real freedom is being able to not have my way and still be just as happy as if I did.

Trust God throughout the process.

It's a difficult process getting to the point of having real freedom. But whatever it takes to get there, it's worth it! We

just need to accept that gaining spiritual maturity is going to hurt. Growing up in God is not comfortable, and there are times that sacrifice is required. There will be times when God will ask you to do things and you'll feel that you just don't have the strength to do them – but whatever God tells us to do, He always gives us the grace to do it!

Something else that helps me is meditating on scriptures about watching the words of my mouth. I like to pray Psalm 19:14 (ESV): "Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be acceptable in your sight, O Lord...." There are many more, and I encourage you to find them and pray them over yourself often. Daily is a good idea!

Make it your goal to have a constant attitude of gratitude. Resist the temptation to complain and instead praise and thank God for who He is and all He's done for you. By God's grace and through His strength, you can overcome complaining and live each day with a thankful heart!



“Mamma Mia! Here We Go Again” (PG-13) -- It’s another go-round of the super-cute jukebox musical “Mamma Mia!” featuring the songs of Swedish supergroup ABBA. As Sophie (Amanda Seyfried) prepares to reopen her mother Donna’s (Meryl Streep) renovated boutique hotel, we time-travel back to 1979, when Donna (played in flashback by Lily James) graduated Oxford and swags through Europe, romancing three lovely suitors along the way -- one of whom is Sophie’s dad. If you were charmed by the original, you’ll love this follow-up, which includes all of the original cast plus young versions, too. And, in the piece de resistance, Cher makes an appearance as Sophie’s grandmamma -- singing “Fernando” no less!

“Sorry to Bother You” (R) -- This fresh and inventive comedy-fantasy stars LaKeith Stanfield as Cassius “Cash” Green, a struggling young black man who goes to work in telemarketing. After he gets a hot tip (if you want to get anywhere in telesales, you need to use your “white” voice), he is catapulted to the position of “power caller,” hawking an illustrious and dubious product in return for a filthy amount of compensation. And then things get crazy. The film marries subversively thought-provoking issues with bellyaching absurdity, and it does so seamlessly. Tessa Thompson plays Cash’s revolutionary girlfriend Detroit, and there are choice roles for Armie Hammer, Danny Glover, Terry Crews and more.

“I Am Vengeance” (R) -- Stu Bennett, perhaps better known as the WWE’s Wade Barrett, headlines this muddled British military mystery/action flick as John Gold. After learning that his best friend and his family were murdered, Gold heads on down to his home town of Devotion to unmask the perpetrator. A group of untainted people live underground in a nuclear silo, their scientists searching for patient zero, whom they need in order to reverse-engineer a cure that will make the world safe again. The searchers are headed up by Dr. Rose (Natalie Dormer) and Morgan (Matt Smith), who was bitten but not zombified -- so, he can communicate with the infectious ragers. When an infected professor (Stanley Tucci) is brought in for interrogation, he posits the theory that this is cleansing evolution, not regression.

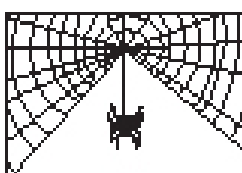

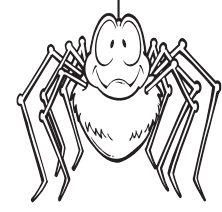
