Oregon native brings new ideas to Center

OREGON – Jamie Nobis doesn't look uncomfortable behind her new desk in her role as executive director of Rock River Center.

The Oregon native actually seems pretty at home.


"Sometimes things just happen for a reason, and I was in the right place at the right time," said Nobis, who replaced Ann Haas, who retired on Dec. 14. "And I'd always wanted to work with seniors.'

Nobis joined Rock River Center as assistant executive director about two years ago after working for years with the Social Security Administration. That job had her working in Sterling, Rockford, Chicago and Baltimore.

She sought a change due to family, and applied for a part-time job at RRC. That turned into something much more, as Haas recommended Nobis learn the ropes to replace her when she retired.

"I spent a lot of time shadowing Ann," Nobis said of the last two years.

Nobis said she learned a lot not only about the job, but also about how to treat people. She said Haas told her everyone who enjoys Rock River Center is like family.

"Ann just handles every situation with grace," Nobis said of Haas. "She's so giving of herself. She really was the heart of the Center."

But Nobis is ready to put her own stamp on RRC, and

she said she is off to a very busy start.

"We're excited," she said. "We're adding a few new things."

Nobis said she is seeking input from people who use Rock River Center, as well as people throughout the community.

"We just want to try and reach out to all of the seniors, all of the individuals that we're trying to serve," she said, adding those served range in age from 50 to 100.

She said one thing she learned after joining the Center is the variety of assistance it offers people. She said case workers at RRC can help people with paperwork for things including Medicare, Social Security, tax issues and prescription drug enrollment.

Nobis also praised the

volunteers who have volunteered their time and money to help RRC.

"We couldn't do it without a lot of volunteer efforts"

As Nobis looks to the future, she said she understands that the interests of people reaching retirement age continue to change, and that Rock River Center wants to be there to meet their interests.

"To be progressive and offer a variety of programming that changes as the clientele changes," she said of her goal. "As the generations change."

One thing she hopes doesn't change anytime soon is her own role.

"I probably have a good 20-30 years here myself, hopefully," she said with a smile.

Identification is requested for event participation. Acceptable forms of identification include a drivers' license, property tax bill, or recent utility bill showing address.

Items accepted at this event include all televisions, all computer monitors, computer towers, laptop computers, printers, FAX machines, copiers, cell phones, tablets, DVD/ VCR players, video game consoles, keyboards, electronic mice, computer cables, computer speakers, routers, servers, mainframes, UPS back-up units, stereo equipment, radios, digital clocks, holiday light strands, extension cords, landline phones and answering machines, calculators, rechargeable batteries, printer ink cartridges, and CFL bulbs. Microwave ovens are accepted at a charge of \$5

There is a limit of seven

(7) large or bulky items per vehicle. Crates or tubs filled with wires and small, mixed items are considered to be one item. Items not accepted include all wooden stereo speakers, smoke detectors, coffee pots, bread makers, toasters, toaster ovens, vacuum cleaners, heaters, fans, lamps, dehumidifiers, air conditioners, power tools, personal hygiene equipment, yard tools, flashlights, exercise equipment, motors, sump pumps, alkaline batteries, household appliances, and packaging (boxes, Styrofoam, and plastic wrap) from electronics. Items which

have been disassembled and scavenged over will not be accepted. Please review the list of accepted items and bring only these items to the event. Doing so results in a more efficient wait time for all event users.

Farm Bureau scholarship apps available

The Ogle County Farm Bureau is pleased to announce that applications for their 2019 Scholarship Program were available beginning Jan. 4 to graduating high school seniors, or those enrolled at an accredited university.

Farm Bureau members may pick up or have applications mailed. Applications can also be downloaded from the Ogle County Farm Bureau website at www.oglefb.org.

The Don Bybee Memorial Scholarship is jointly funded by the Bybee family and the Ogle County Farm Bureau. Bybee served for many years as a director on the Ogle County Farm Bureau Board and offering this \$1,000 scholarship recognizes his passion for offering opportunities for Ogle County youth to advance their education.

Also available is a \$1,000 scholarship funded jointly by the Ogle County Pork Producers Association and the Farm Bureau. The Mark Detig Memorial Scholarship will be awarded annually. Detig served as past president and director on the pork producers association board of directors and was involved in 4-H youth activities in Ogle County.

These scholarships are in addition to the \$1,500 Del Flessner Memorial Scholarship, honoring the former manager of the Ogle County Farm Bureau; and two \$1,000 General Farm Bureau Scholarships.

Finally, an Ag Technology Scholarship will be awarded in an amount of \$1,000. It will be awarded to students studying in an ag technology field similar to diesel mechanics, crop technician or similar fields of study.

Eligible applicants must meet the following criteria: must be a high school graduate; must be an Ogle County Farm Bureau member or dependent of a member; must be accepted at an accredited university or college and pursue an agricultural or agricultural-related field of study; must be a resident of Illinois; and must demonstrate a financial need.

Applicants can be graduating high school seniors or students currently enrolled in an accredited college or university.

Applicants successfully completed and submitted will be judged on criteria including: academic performance, demonstrated interest in agriculture, financial need and character/personality.

If you want to sit around the fire and discuss literature I'm your man, though.



Master Gardeners bring education and the joy of horticulture into rooms, homes, communities, and demonstration gardens throughout their counties. They offer sciencebased guidance, develop demonstration gardens and community service projects, run gardening workshops for youth and adults, conduct youth outreach, and staff the Horticulture Help Desk service.

Every year, the University of Illinois Extension seeks to re-invigorate and increase its volunteers. 2018 was a training year for DeKalb County and training was scheduled from Sept. 24-Dec. 10. Certification as a Master Gardener is achieved only after participation in a rigorous 10week training course and completion of 60 hours of volunteer hours.

Topics covered in training include (but are not limited to) Botany, Annuals / Perennials, Plant Classification and Identification, Soil Science, Plant Selection and Care, Fruits & Propagation, Vegetables. Soils & Organics, Integrated Pest Management, Plant Diseases, Entomology, Wildlife, and Landscape Design.

Some tips for a good vegetable garden

URBANA - This summer marked the fifth year Jennifer Fishburn's vegetable garden's current location.

"Besides the okra, this was the least amount of produce that I have ever harvested," says the University of Illinois Extension horticulture educator. "Squash bugs killed the squash plants, tomato plants succumbed to disease and lack of fertility, and rabbits ate all the green bean plants."

So what is a gardener to do? Some conditions are out of a gardener's control, such as temperature and the timing and amount of rainfall. However, there are steps that can be taken to have a more productive vegetable garden.

Plants need an optimum pH for good growth. For example, most vegetable plants grow best in soil with a pH range of 6.0 to 7.0. A soil test will determine

the current levels of phosphorus, potassium, organic matter, other important minerals, and pH. Soil test results can help gardeners determine the amount of fertilizer or organic matter to apply to the soil. Vegetable gardeners should get their soil tested every three years, according to Fish-

"Soil can be collected for a soil test when soil temperatures are above 50 degrees Fahrenheit. Late summer or fall is the best time," Fishburn says. "Take several random soil samples in your garden at 4 to 6-inches deep. Mix samples together and put about 2 cups in a bag for testing." For a list of labs, visit the University of Illinois Extension soil testing lab website at http://extension.illinois.edu/soiltest.

Tomatoes grow best in a well-drained, loamy soil with a pH of 6.5 to 6.8.

Fishburn says many gar-

diseases this year. Gardeners who experienced tomato diseases should sanitize cages and stakes with a nine-part water to one-part bleach solution. Purchasing disease-resistant cultivars is a good idea, but does not guarantee immunity to a disease. Space plants correctly to allow for good air circulation. If possible, rotate the planting location on a three- to five-year rotation.

Squash bugs prefer to feed on squash and pumpkins but will also eat other members of this plant family, such as cucumbers and melons. Adults suck the sap out of leaves, disrupting the flow of water and nutrients causing a yellow spot that eventually turns brown. They also can feed on fruit. Adult squash bugs survive the winter in sheltered places such as under plant debris.

Protect your vehicle from damage from the cold

Winter can be an unforgiving season. Freezing temperatures coupled with snow and ice can take its toll on people who live in climates where cold weather is a fact of winter life.

While winter can test people's patience, it also can be harsh on cars and trucks. Understanding what components of a vehicle can be compromised by dropping temperatures and snowy roads can help drivers take action to safeguard their automotive investments.

While the Canadian Automobile Association notes that winter can wreak havoc on just about every part of a vehicle, there are some parts that seem to bear the brunt of Old Man Winter's abuse. Properly servicing and caring for a car or truck can help.

Drivers should take their vehicles for a tuneup and inspection before wintry weather arrives. A mechanic will examine the car battery and check antifreeze levels and make sure that the thermostat, defroster, brakes, and even wiper blades are working effectively. Have the tires inspected for adequate tread, which can make navigating roads safer. If the treads are worn, replace the tires.

In addition to visiting their mechanics, drivers can perform some inspections and fixes themselves.

- Check that all of the vehicle's lights are operational so your car can be easily seen during inclement weather. Exchange your existing windshield washer fluid with one that will not freeze in cold conditions. Check the nozzles on the windshield-washer system routinely and clear out any blockages of ice or debris. While addressing windshield washer fluid, also replace worn out windshield wiper blades with ones that can withstand snow and icy weather.
 - A new coating of wax can serve as a



shield against road salt, snow, sleet, and rain. Try a polymer wax to protect the paint. Whenever possible, rinse off salt and grime so it does not dry on the car and gradually wear away at the paint. Some drivers mistakenly believe that salt stops being a problem once it dries simply because moisture is the active ingredient for a corrosive reaction. But humidity in the air is enough to keep the salt eating away at the car's paint, and that can contribute to rust. Be sure to

rinse off the undercarriage of the vehicle as

- Have your tires' alignment checked toward the end of winter or early spring. A season of traveling over pothole-ridden roads or hitting curbs buried under snow drifts can affect the alignment. Get everything back on track. Similarly, inspect tires routinely, as weather changes can affect tire pressure and strength.
 - Use a soft snow brush or a foam brush

to clear snow off of the car. Avoid hard plastic scrapers you might use on your windshield, as they can scratch painted surfaces

• Try to park the vehicle in a garage or under a car port, each of which can protect cars and trucks from the often harsh elements of winter

Vehicles can be affected by the cold weather. Keep them running efficiently to prevent damage this winter.

Upgrade headlights for safer driving

• Know how to recover from a skid. When skids occur on black ice or slush, drivers should take their feet off of the pedals and steer gently in the direction they want to go. As the vehicle regains

traction, only then should the brakes or accelerator be applied.

Winter weather requires making some vehicle modifications, and drivers may want to alter the way they drive to be more safe on the road.

The key to fulfill your purpose in life

God loves you and He has a good plan for your life. You are a wonderful creation made by Him and you have a unique purpose to fulfill in this world.

Ephesians 2:10 (AMP) says that as Christians, "we are His workmanship [His own master work, a work of art], created in Christ Jesus...for good works, which God prepared [for us] beforehand [taking paths which He set], so that we would walk in them [living the good life which He prearranged and made ready for us]."

It's so exciting to know we are each created with a purpose and God has a good life that He has prepared in advance for us to live. But it's important to understand that we have an enemy, Satan, who wants to keep us from having the life Jesus died to give us.

The Measure of Your Faith

Faith in God is required for us to release the power and authority we have in Christ. Romans 12:3 (ESV) says each person has a "measure of faith that God has assigned." This means God has given you enough faith to do His will, whatever it may be and no matter what the enemy throws at you to stop you.

There are many challenges and difficult situations we have to face in life. You may have a child with special needs to care for, or maybe you're in a difficult marriage. You could be facing a devastating illness or have serious financial problems. Whatever your situation is, God has given you everything you need, through Christ, to keep you moving forward in His plan for your life.

We need to always remember that God is greater than our problems—nothing is too hard for Him and nothing catches Him by surprise. When we're going through hard times and the enemy is attacking us, we don't need to ask, "What can I do?" The question is, "What can God do?" The Word says all things are possible with God, and greater is He who lives in me than he who is in the world. (See Matthew 19:26 and 1 John 4:4.)

I want you to really get this in your heart today: In Christ, you have enough faith and the strength you need to do whatever you need to do in life! Get rid of "I can't" thinking and focus on the truth of God's Word, which says, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me!" (See Philippians 4:13.)

The Simple Solution to Overcome Enemy Attack

Prayer is a simple, powerful way to interrupt Satan's plan because we release our faith through prayer. 1 Thessalonians 5:17 (ESV) says, "Pray without ceasing." This basically means prayer can be as natural as breathing, and our first response in every situation. It's so amazing that we can talk to God all the time.

Now the enemy doesn't want us to pray, so he will do everything he can to discourage us. He wants us to think prayer is hard, that we need to use eloquent speech and sound poetic, that we need to be careful what we ask God for so we don't overload Him with too many requests, or that we have to be in a certain place with a certain posture (on our knees, head bowed, eyes closed) for God to hear us. But it's actually simple to pray effectively.

James 5:16 (ESV) says, "... The prayer of a righteous person has great power as it is working." God wants you to come to Him honestly, with a sincere heart, and just talk to Him as a friend. Be yourself and don't approach conversation with God as a religious activity. Humble yourself before Him and open your heart to Him. He loves you and wants you to walk in His will for your life victoriously.

As a believer in Jesus Christ, you are God's child and He is always with you. He is Almighty God, and if God is on your side, who can be against you?

In Christ, you have what you need today to live in victory. Put your faith in God constantly. Pray, take God-inspired action, and fulfill your true purpose in life!







Couch Theater

"First Man" (PG-13) -- The controversial Neil Armstrong biopic "First Man" does two things: First, it does a commendable job of putting the viewer inside the rocket -- the successes and the disasters. Second, it takes a deep dive into the personal life of Armstrong, played stoic and restrained by Ryan Gosling. Armstrong had a rocky road to the moon, from test pilot crashes and personal tragedy, and director Damien Chazelle (who paired with Gosling on "La La Land") highlights his perseverance through the perilous space race -- lost personnel and failed missions that might have sent less enduring astronauts reeling. Although I don't feel like I know Armstrong any better, the film is worthwhile if only for the NASA history lessons it imparts.

"The Hate U Give" (PG-13) -- Weighty topics are explored in "The Hate U Give," based on the YA novel by Angie Thomas. Amandla Stenberg plays Starr, a young black woman caught between two worlds: her neighborhood, a poor to working-class area rife with gang activity; and her school, packed with peers who are predominantly white and privileged. When her best friend -- a young black man from the neighborhood named Khalil -- is shot at a traffic stop, Starr becomes an unwitting witness to injustice. The story makes national news, and Starr must navigate gang violence, neighborhood politics, class inequality, police and community relations, racial tension and youth activism, all while finding a way to heal.

"Johnny English Strikes Again" (PG) -- Rowan Atkinson returns as the titular Johnny English, the surprise spy who's wholly and perhaps delightfully unaware that he's ridiculously out of his element. A cyberattack has revealed the identities of all the British operatives, so Agent English is called up to investigate and find the cyberbrains behind the attack. The gag is that Johnny English is a rotary phone in a cellular world, and gag after gag after pratfall and awkward situation reminds us of it. I feel like you either get Rowan Atkinson (Mr. Bean) or you don't. If you



do, you'll like this movie.

"American Renegades" (R) -- Navy Seal Matt Barnes (Sullivan Stapleton) leads a ragtag but surprisingly good-looking group of soldiers on an off-the-books mission to recover a pile of Nazi gold. As the story goes, the noble townspeople, rather than have one put over on them, flooded the WHOLE TOWN. So that bullion is at the bottom of a big old lake. Take that, Nazis. Fast-forward to the now, and our cowboys aim to take it back -- because Navy Seals can dive. Get it? The story is good (Luc Besson wrote the

script), but this movie is so bad that not even J.K. Simmons as the commander can save it.
