Hopper's Poppers to close

OREGON – Hopper's Poppers has become a popular part of Oregon's downtown.

But the gourmet popcorn and ice cream store, which opened in 2016, will soon be sold, said owner Ryan Hopper.

Hopper put the building

up for sale on March 1, but will run the business until the building sells. There is no guarantee, of course, that it will remain a popcorn business.

"If someone comes in and offers me the prices I'm asking and they don't want the popcorn store, that's going to be it," he said.

Hopper and his family are selling not only the Oregon

business, but closed the Sycamore popcorn store recently as well. They will be selling their other properties, including their home, in Oregon and will eventually re-locate to the Raleigh-Durham area in North Carolina.

"It certainly is very hard," he said of moving from the area.

County OKs bids for jail construction

\$24 million project expected to break ground in April

OREGON – At a special meeting last week, the Ogle County Board approved bids for the construction of a new jail that will be built in Oregon.

The total amount of the bids approved was about \$17.2 million.

Also at the Feb. 26 meeting, the board also approved a new overall budget for the project, which had been projected to be about \$25 million. That number has been reduced to \$24 million, and could be reduced further, according to Ogle County Board Chairman Kim Gouker.

"The bids came in pretty good," he said. "Several of them were under the estimate."

The new jail will be built on county-owned land just west of the Judicial Center. It would house between 180 to 200 prisoners.

Gouker said several area companies, including Martin & Company of Oregon, won bids to do some of the work on the jail project.

"It's more local than what I thought it might be," he said.

Oregon schools asking for help to recruit, retain teachers

OREGON – A recent study by the Illinois Association of Regional Superintendents of Schools found the teacher shortage in Illinois has reached crisis levels.

The Oregon School District is looking to change the trend by debuting the “Teacher Loan Payoff Program,” a program that will aid qualifying district teachers in paying off their student loans.

To kick-off the first year of the program, OCUSD is asking for the community’s help recruiting and retaining district teachers by making a donation toward the \$10,000 goal. The district hopes to meet their goal in 30 days starting Monday, March 4.

Three local companies have already made sizeable donations to the fundraiser, including F.N. Smith Corporation, Central Bank and Harvard Bank.

If the community raises \$10,000, a local foundation will match that amount, totaling \$20,000 to be awarded to Oregon teachers.

The “Teacher Loan Payoff Program” provides up to \$20,000 each year to help qualifying Oregon district teachers pay off their student loan debt.

Teachers who have been with the district for five or more years are eligible to receive up to \$5,000 each.

“Our goal for the district is to attract

and retain good teachers,” said Oregon High School Superintendent Tom Mahoney. “Donations made to the Teacher Loan Payoff Program are guaranteeing teachers stay in Oregon to continue teaching and aiding in the growth of our community.”

The district is asking for the community’s help in reaching its \$10,000 goal. Donations are tax-deductible.

“I set my roots here. I planned on being here my whole life.”

Hopper said with Illinois set to start raising the minimum wage, as well as a high tax burden, moving makes business sense.

Add to that the better weather and business environment in North Carolina – and with Hopper still only 34 – this is the time to make

the move.

Hopper said he is keeping the name of the business and will take that to North Carolina, where he can sell ice cream year around.

Hopper’s Poppers has four part-time employees, who will work until it is sold.

Hopper and his wife, Stephanie, also have a daughter in the local school system, and will wait to move until the end of the school year.

Hopper said the family

has become a part of the community since moving to Oregon. He is involved with the Chamber, and his wife works with the community-boosting group Oregon Together.

So moving might sound exciting, but it is also tough.

“I think it’s more tough than exciting,” said Hopper, who has lived in the area his entire life. “I’m really integrated into the Oregon community.”

Gouker said the concern was that a strong economy might mean fewer firms bidding on the project because of other work.

Ground is expected to be broken on the project in the middle of April. Gouker said a substantial amount of the work should

be done by November of 2020. After adding the finishing touches, the plan is to occupy the new jail on the spring of 2021.

Overall, Gouker said he is pleased with the way the bidding process went.

“Yes, I am, because we were able to reduce our project by \$1.5 million,” he said. “And we might be

able to reduce some other things as well.”

Gouker said the project could ultimately come in \$2 million less than the initial estimate.

The county already \$15,000 by renting the former Liquor Mart in Oregon to be used as an office of the construction manager instead of using a trailer.



Train cars derail near Oregon

On Feb. 23 at 9:57 p.m., Ogle County Sheriff's Deputies, along with the Oregon Fire and Police departments, responded to a report of a train derailment at the Pines Road rail crossing just west of Devil's Backbone Road. The railway is owned by Illinois Railway and operated by Omni Track. Ninety-nine empty rail cars, with

no locomotive attached, were being stored on the rail line between Gale Road and Oregon Trail Road. For an unknown reason the rail cars began to roll southeast towards Pines Rd where the unaccompanied cars struck a derauling device causing 17 of the 99 empty cars on the line to derail.

During the derailment one of the

rail cars struck and damaged a Com Ed utility pole.

Several of the cars came to a rest on Pines Road and in the north ditch area of the road.

No one was injured in the incident and Pines road was closed for most of the day on Feb. 24 while crews work to remove the rail cars from the scene.

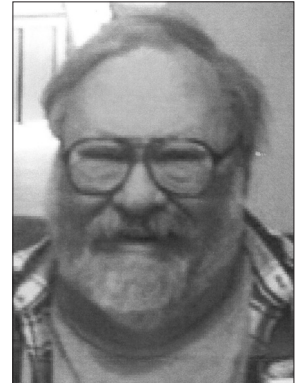

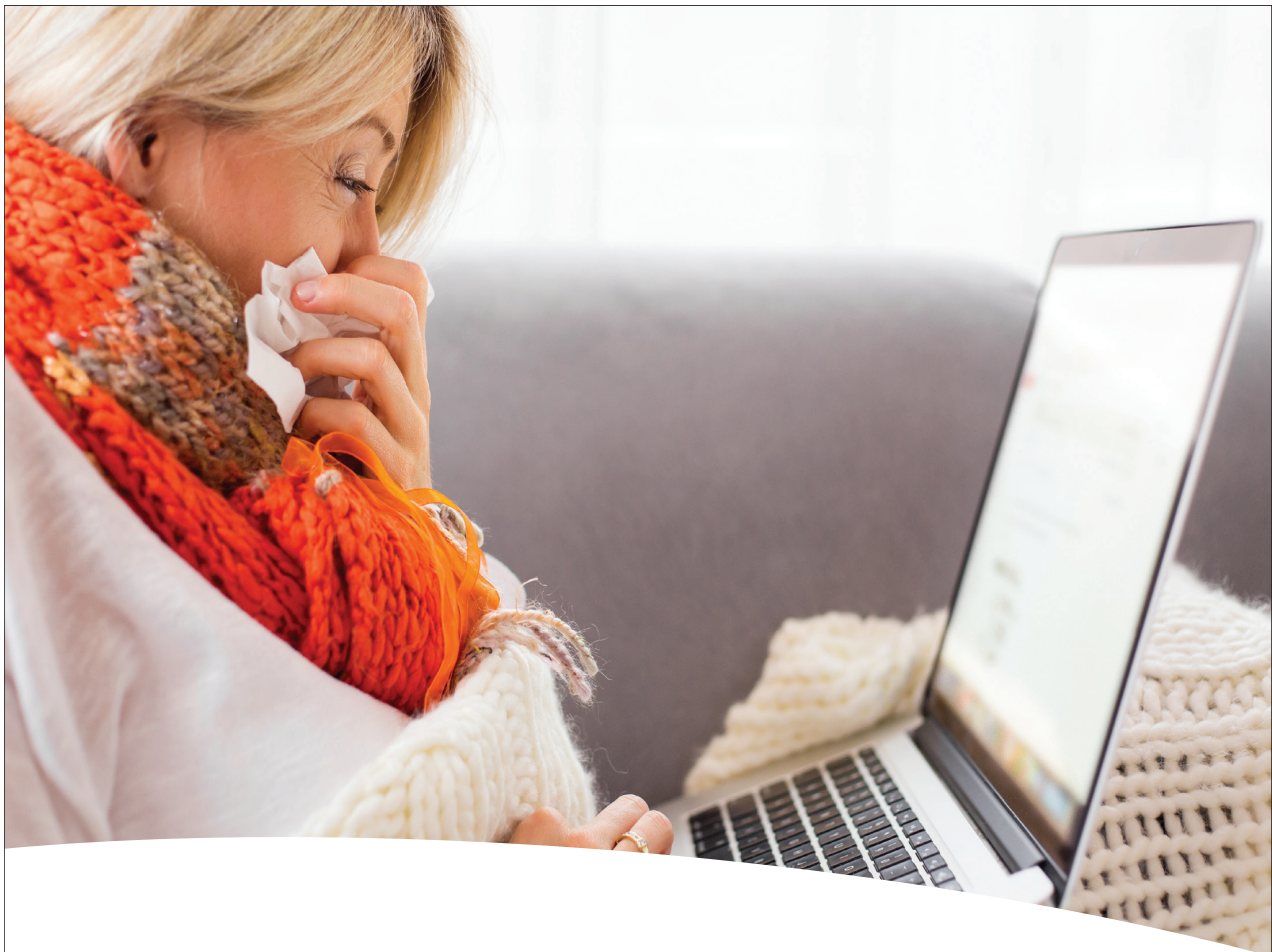

Final Lecture Series program is March 10

BYRON – The Byron Forest Preserve District’s final program of its 2019 Winter Lecture Series will be held Sunday, March 10 beginning at 2 p.m. at the Jarrett Prairie Center in Byron. Dr. Thomas Loebel, Statewide Cultural Resources Coordinator with the Illinois State Archaeological Survey will present his research regarding Paleo-Indians in Illinois and Wisconsin. North American early Paleo-Indians (circa 12,000 BC) are perhaps amongst

the most highly stereotyped archaeological cultures. They are widely viewed as nomadic hunters of elephants who did little else except produce a remarkable similar style of fluted stone spear point over a vast geographical area. However, hidden within the Paleo-Indian archaeological record is subtle evidence of the social and ritual life of these late ice-age hunter gathers. By examining large-scale patterns of raw material use, Thomas has identified probable instances of trade, ex-

change, and the movement of individuals, groups, and artifacts during the Clovis period. These movements reflect both the economic and social adaptations of these groups as they dealt with adjusting to a rapidly changing environment at the end of the last Ice Age. BYRON—Northern Illinois Food Bank’s Mobile Pantry Program provides food distribution to underserved areas, where there is little access to food assistance.

Byron High School Key Club and Byron Kiwanis are partnering with the Northern Illinois Food Bank to help hungry families in Ogle County on Saturday, March 16. We are hosting a Mobile Food Pantry distribution from 10 a.m.-noon at the Byron Community Schools transportation lot (510 W. 7th St., Byron).

The Mobile Pantry truck has nine bays, six of which are refrigerated,

and can hold up to 9,000 pounds of food. Every distribution includes frozen meat, a valuable source of protein, fresh produce, bread, and nutritious non-perishable items, as well as cleaning items when available. At each visit, about twenty volunteers unload food from the bays and organize them on tables around the truck.

Clients from the community sign in and walk around the truck to select food that best meets their family’s nutritional needs.

Each Mobile Pantry distribution visit lasts two hours and can provide

nutritious food to as many as 300 families.

Generally Mobile Food Pantry “sponsors” pay a fee that is approximately half the cost of the visit and the remainder is subsidized by the Food Bank from donations from corporations and foundations.

The Northern IL Food Bank is allowing the Byron Key Club to host without a financial sponsorship.

The Mobile Pantry program provides a dependable, efficient way to increase protein and other nutritious foods in the diets of low-income people needing food assistance.

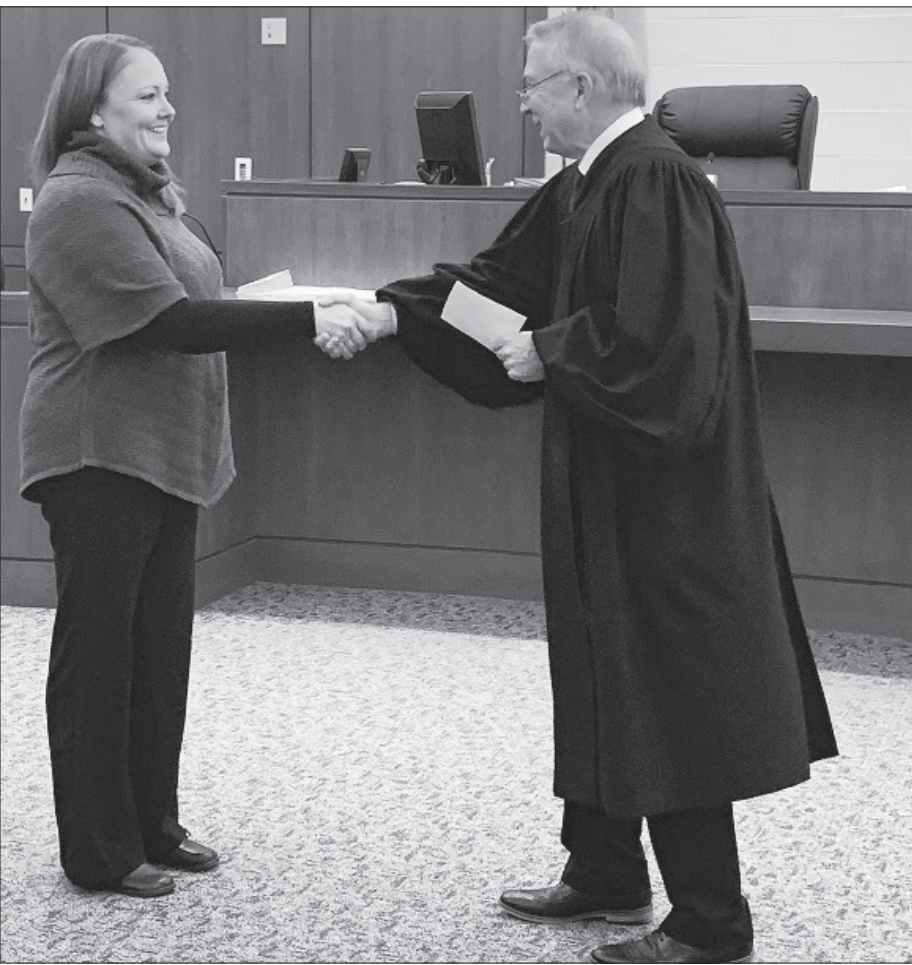

The home Deere built still stands, and the Historic Site was designated a Registered National Historic Landmark by the National Park Service, and a Historic Landmark of Agricultural Engineering by the American Society of Agricultural Engineers. In the atmosphere of a friendly 19th century prairie village, tour guides provide an entertaining and educational perspective of life on the prairie. The John Deere Historic Site is open seasonally March 1 through December 31. Gates open daily, from 9:00am – 5:00pm, Monday-Saturday. Noon-4pm Sunday. Admission is free. * On March 22, 1983, the Pentagon awards a contract worth more than \$1 billion to AM General Corp. to produce 55,000 High Mobility Multipurpose Wheeled Vehicles. Nicknamed the Humvee, the rugged vehicles were used by the U.S. military. In 1992, a civilian version, the Hummer, went on sale.

* On March 23, 1994, Wayne Gretzky scores his 802nd goal, breaking his childhood idol Gordie Howe's NHL record for most goals in a career.

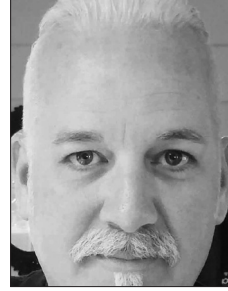

Some elected officials from local school boards

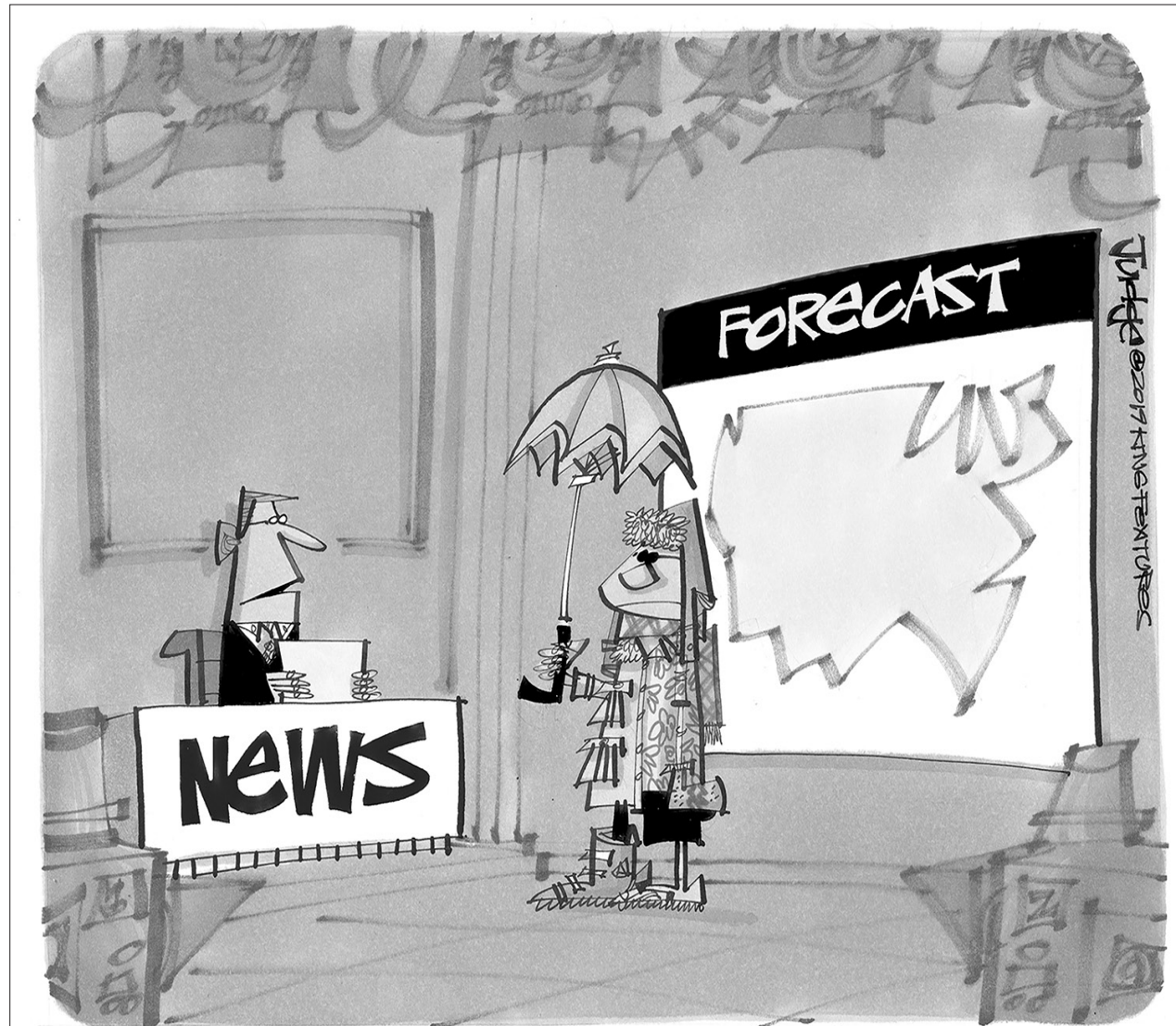
to the Congress, no matter their age, are aggressive go-getters. More power to those folks, but I would bet they are in the minority.

The illusion of truth in the age of the atom

The most important ideas in our lives are about things we cannot see or touch. It's part of the human tragedy that we believe in such things and yet can't know them completely, if at all. We use words like "love," "truth," "capitalism," "socialism," and "God," but we can't even agree on what they mean.

Nowhere is this truer than in quantum physics, the science of the atom and all things smaller – and a case study in humanity's quest for truth. That strange and mysterious universe has baffled the most knowledgeable experts. Richard Feynman, a major figure in the field, summed it up this way, "I think I can safely say that nobody understands quantum physics."

Think about it: Nobody

understands the basis of our modern electronics- and computer-driven lives, as well as the nuclear weapons that threaten our very existence. To be sure, scientists can use mathematical formulas, but they don't know what they mean. That's to say,

scientists don't know what the "stuff" that they believe to make up atoms really is, or why it acts in ways that often seem to defy logic.

Phillip Ball's recent book, *Beyond Weird*, reveals that the inaccessibly tiny quarks, electrons, and other so-called particles that scientists conjure up are certainly not, if they even exist at all, particles as we know them. Hearing those terms may help us to form a picture to go along with the equations, but, to quote physicist N. David Mermin, "...there never has been any common understanding" of what those "mathematical abstractions," might actually mean.

Niels Bohr, a founding figure in this field, responded to this predicament by insist-

ing that the equations have no meaning beyond themselves. They can help us to predict what happens, but we can't know why it happens, and it's a waste of time to try.

No matter what Bohr says, it's hard to resist the comforting illusion of understanding that the language of quantum physics creates. We non-physicists tend to fall for that same temptation in our non-quantum lives. The fallacy can be summed up in a phrase originated over eighty years ago by engineer, mathematician, and philosopher Alfred Korzybski:

"The map is not the territory."

His point is that we, like the quantum physicists, must create maps of a reality that we can't know directly. The

ideas that guide us are necessarily different from the world that they're supposed to represent. Because of the limitations of our brains and our languages, our beliefs tend to be distorted and misleading.

Daniel Kahneman in his recent book, *Thinking Fast and Slow*, reports on research that reveals how the brain creates its maps, or models of reality. It strives for "cognitive ease," a sense that everything fits together in a way that seems familiar and comfortable, and rejects or ignores new information that fails to confirm it. It acts on and clings to this "illusion of truth" until forced to change it, or to abandon it for another one.

We do of course manage

to muddle through in spite of the discrepancies between our maps and the territories they try to represent, although we make many mistakes along the way. Meanwhile, the Illusion of Truth leads us to forget that, like quantum physicists, or blind men trying to describe an elephant in the ancient Indian fable, we're prisoners of our mental limitations. It's a lesson to take to heart in our age of angry certainties about culture, morals, and politics.

Better run as a nation built on fact, not feelings

Pleased that there was a good basis in his response, pleased it was well written, and pleased that the voice of this one also resounds with my own temperament.

Mr. Harp stated there is a looming crisis over two American Institutions that have failed to evolve along with our nation and goes on to rail against the Electoral College. We have a unique nation constantly under attack, from within and without, through the weaponry of words. The formation of a national union of sovereign states has a lively background of deep debates and structured resolves to create a functional method of government that resists implosion or internal decay. What may have been forgotten is that the State Legislatures elected Senators, their representatives, directly until 1913 with the passage of the 17th amendment, which ripped the State's right of representation away and handed it to the people for popular election.

Another strong point about our man-

ner of government is being a democratic republic. We use democratic principles to continue a representative form of government. This is a screening process meant to preserve our individual rights. The Executive Branch does not solely represent the people, it also represents the unique needs of the state. Executive Offices are elected by process of the Electoral Collage and the weighted system of representation set in place to balance the power of highly populated states against sparsely populated states.

There are some people that believe the electoral collage is not fair and use the idea of winning a popular vote to prove some sort of disparity. Let's end this mistaken idea. Those that campaign for the Executive Branch do so by the rules of the electoral college. Popular vote is a non-sequitur in this argument. Nobody campaigned for the popular vote.

The comment about how Americans feel about their allegiance to State versus Nation begins an unfounded argument. We are better run as a nation based on facts than feelings. The purpose of representative government is to better present fact over feeling in our legislative process. The purpose of the electoral college is to balance the rights of states. Until an argument is offered as an improvement on our system of government, that preserves our individual rights, we may view it with suspicion. As a closing reminder, each movement towards popular vote, fueled by feelings, erodes a barrier to socialism and fulfills the purpose of the "Progressive" government movement.

"This year we will be offering a Science Siesta event just for boys on Friday, April 12 to Saturday, April 13, and Science Siesta just for girls on Friday, April 26 to Saturday, April 27 both at the Discovery Center Children's Museum in Rockford.

Both of these events are open to youth in 4th to 6th grades.

"Both events will be action-packed programs that combine hands-on science,

an opportunity to meet real scientists, to learn about a particular field of science and to spend an awesome night in a museum. This is an excellent program and we are excited to have the opportunity to offer it once again," Jennings said.

At Science Siesta the participants will interact with scientists in science career fields from throughout northern Illinois. The scientists will share information about their background and involve the youth in activities that they might complete in their work every day.

Following the face-to-face inter-

action with the scientists, youth participate in activities based on the "Wonderwise" curriculum developed by the University of Nebraska, and from experts in the field. This curriculum highlights the work of scientists and then translates their work into hands-on science based activities, which are fun and engaging. Participants may choose one of three workshop tracks for breakout sessions. Their choices for this year include activities related to Rainforest Ecologist, Space Geologist, or Technology Specialist.

Both events will begin with registra-

tion at 5 p.m. on Friday and will conclude with checkout at 8:30 a.m. on Saturday. The registration fee is \$40 per participant, which covers pizza, snack, breakfast, admission to the Discovery Center Children's Museum, a T-shirt and all hands-on activities. The University of Illinois Extension is providing this program, which is open to all boys and girls in 4th, 5th, and 6th grades. 



Kiss your worries goodbye

Worry and I used to be very close companions. We spent a lot of time together and back then, I thought that was a normal way to live. But through the years, God has helped me end my relationship with worry. And He did it with the help of my husband, Dave.

Dave and I have been married for more than 50 years now, and every time I have come to him with a problem, he has had only one thing to say: "Cast your care."

It's not very appealing to hear those words from your spouse when you're feeling frustrated and upset, but it's exactly what the Bible tells us to do.

First Peter 5:7 says to cast "all your cares [all your anxieties, all your worries, and all your concerns, once and for all] on Him, for He cares about you [with deepest affection, and watches over you carefully]" (AMP).

The word cast means "to pitch or to throw." I think that description says a lot because if you're going to end your relationship with worry, then you're going to have to get aggressive about it.

For example, we don't have to accept every thought that comes into our head. We can be selective, casting out the wrong ones and helping the right ones take root. Also, I find that my whole outlook changes as I say simple prayers: "God, I believe You're working in my life, and I'm expecting something good to happen today."

I'm not saying we should ignore our problems, wishing they'd just go away. It's good for us to look at our problems honestly, but we can't let them keep us from adopting a hopeful attitude that says, "I believe God is in control!"

Timing Is Everything, and Everything Takes Time

Typically when we have a problem, God will do one of two things: He'll either remove the problem or He'll give us the ability to get through our time of difficulty with a good attitude.

I've found that as I grow in my relationship with God, I become more comfortable leaving that choice up to Him. Because if He leads me through something I really don't want to go through, then I know for sure He has a purpose in mind.

As a child I experienced years of sexual and emotional abuse, which was absolutely tormenting. The amazing thing is, everything God has done in my life through that horrible situation—all of the healing and restoration—has prepared me to do what He's called me to do today. I didn't always understand why things were happening the way they did at the time, but I learned how to walk by faith and trust God's goodness even when my circumstances didn't make sense to me.

It's absolutely wonderful when we can

feel completely comfortable not knowing the "why" behind what's happening in our lives.

Proverbs 3:5-6 says, "Trust in and rely confidently on the Lord with all your heart and do not rely on your own insight or understanding. In all your ways know and acknowledge and recognize Him, and He will make your paths straight and smooth [removing obstacles that block your way]."

We don't always have to know what God is going to do or when He's going to do it. All we really need to know is that God has a plan and He is in control. We can rest in the truth that at the right time, God will execute His plan.

Trusting God Brings the Best Results

Maybe there's something happening in your life right now that you just don't understand, and it's causing you a lot of worry and frustration.

Wouldn't it be wonderful to just be able to say, "I don't understand this and it hurts right now, but I believe God is going to work it out"?

If you've already wasted a lot of your time with worry, I encourage you to cast your cares. Instead of giving way to anxious emotions, you can choose to rest in the truth that in time, God's good plan will be revealed.

Romans 8:28 says, "We know [with great confidence] that God [who is deeply concerned about us] causes all things to work together [as a plan] for good for those who love God, to those who are called according to His plan and purpose."

Not everything that happens is good. But it can work out for good for those who keep loving God and keep pursuing His will in their lives. There's nothing God can't turn around if you'll put your trust in Him!

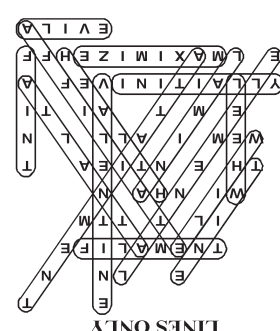

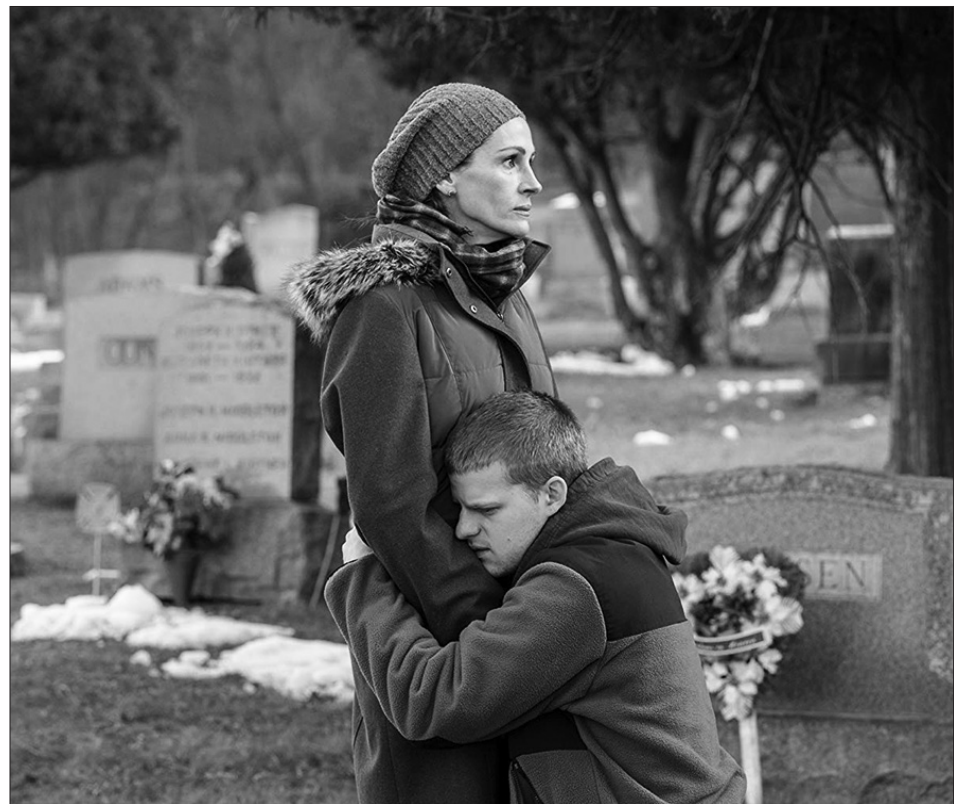
“Creed II” (PG-13) -- Adonis Creed (Michael B. Jordan) faces off against the son of Ivan Drago (Dolph Lundgren) with the help of his mentor and boxing legend Rocky Balboa (Sylvester Stallone). The “Rocky” blueprint is in full effect here, so you won’t be surprised when, say, the fighter comes into the ring too arrogant and loses, or later when a grizzled, tough trainer (in this case, Rocky) breaks the fighter down and rebuilds him in an unforgiving environment (in this case, the desert). What you also should not be surprised to see is attention to detail, themes of honor and commitment to family, and some wonderful character development. Rather than being played-out, it’s well-played -- a “Rocky IV” for the next generation.

“Ben Is Back” (R) -- The bonds of a mother and son are tested on Christmas Eve, as Ben (Lucas Hedges) unexpectedly returns from rehab and is given an iron-clad rule for remaining: He must stay within the sight of his mother (Julia Roberts) at all times. As the lure of Ben’s old life tests him time and again, the proximity reveals how addiction and drug use have distorted, marred and even taken lives in a small town. It is an understandably emotional journey for both, and Roberts and Hedges have done a lovely job of giving

insight into the small tensions and big dramatic moments alike.

“Instant Family” (PG-13) -- Rose Byrne and Mark Wahlberg play Ellie and Pete Wagner, a sweet middle-class couple who, ready to be parents (they think), enter the foster system and come out on the other side as parents of not one but THREE siblings who needed a home. Teenage Lizzy (Isabela Moner) is sarcastic and rebellious; young Juan is serious and sensitive; and little Lita is a handful. It’s an awkward and heartwarming and painful process of getting to know and trust one another, while dealing with the very real issues of these kids’ traumatic past, all done with love and humor and sincerity. Based on the real-life story of director Sean Anders.

“Vox Lux” (R) -- Natalie Portman is Celeste, an overblown icon and narcissistic celebrity on a comeback tour while attempting to manage her professional life with a smarmy manager (Jude Law) and her relationship with her daughter (Raffey Cassidy). After surviving a high-school shooting, Celeste and her sister wrote and performed a tribute song that rocketed Celeste to fame along an alcohol- and drug-fueled path. Is this a statement on the celebrity of tragedy or a cautionary tale of the instant fame of this generation? I’m still not sure. That it came out in the same flow



as “Bohemian Rhapsody” and “A Star Is Born” certainly dimmed its star. There will be no encore.
