


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A perfect marriage

Oregon native returns to buy Wedding Canyon

MOUNT MORRIS – On a sunny day, surrounded by the tasteful landscaping and natural beauty of what has been, until recently, the White Pines Wedding Canyon, Rebecca Jones looks at home.

Yes, she is an Oregon native, and yes, she worked here from her teen years through college. But as of April 1, Jones is the new owner of the space, now called Pine Creek Canyon.

"I had been really searching for what would be next for me," said Jones, who had lived in Arizona for a number of years after graduating from NIU. "I started to real-

ize I enjoyed being back in this area."

There will be a grand re-opening for the newly christened Pine Creek Escape on Saturday, May 25 and Sunday, May 26.

In Arizona, Jones worked as the food and beverage manager at a high-end golf resort. She was in charge of about 200 employees and said the solid experience she got working there prepared her for this next chapter in her life.

"Had I not had that experience, I think I would be freaking out a lot more with my own personal (business)," she said. "You see a lot going out at the beginning."

Coming back home was not really in the plan for

Jones, who said she enjoyed living in the West. She said Beth George, who owns White Pines Resort and also owned the Wedding Canyon and has been a mentor for her for years, asked Jones to come back in 2017 for 90 days as a consultant. That grew to 120 days. And that led to Jones coming back in 2018 to run the Canyon for

an entire season.

She returned to Phoenix after the season and actually gave away a lot of her possessions. She wanted to have a good work/life balance and realized she had that at the Canyon.

So, she called George and the two began discussions about Jones buying the Canyon. It took about eight months, but the deal was done on April 1. As part of it, Jones purchased about 10 acres, which includes the wedding venue, three acress next to the venue for future development, office space and the Pine Creek Cabins. The entire area is now Pine Creek Escape.


but she has plans to expand the services provided at the Canyon, which is currently only weddings. Last year 40 weddings were held at the six wedding spaces on the site. This year Jones said the number will be about the same. Next year the goal is about 50.

But she does plan other events for the space, including yoga, live music, graduation parties, rehearsal

dinners, engagement parties pretty much any event.

"The sky's the limit," she said. Jones, 32, said it feels good being able to give back to the community in which she was raised. She also hopes to raise a family

here herself. "It's very interesting how life can be so full circle when we get out of our own way."

This led to her work with Project Advocate, where she served as the Assistant Director of a program for students with behavior and communication challenges. She went on to

work for the DeKalb County Special Education Association where she supervised the Early Childhood and Behavior Disorder program and coordinated special education services. In 1986, she joined the Rockford School District as the Supervisor of Special Education. From there, she became an Assistant Principal at Washington Elementary, and then, the Principal for grades K-3 at White Swan Elementary, both in Rockford. He is preceded in death by his parents, brother and a daughter.



A courtroom is not a place where you expect to find scenes of celebration and tears of joy. Unless, of course, it is drug court.

During the month of May, Ogle County New Horizon's Specialty Court is joining more than 3,000 such programs nationwide in celebrating National Drug Court Month. In 2019 alone, more than 150,000 individuals nationwide who entered the justice system due to addiction will receive life-saving treatment and the chance to repair their lives, reconnect with their families and find long-term recovery. National Drug Court Month is not only a celebration of the lives restored by drug court, it also sends the powerful message that these programs must be expanded to reach more people in need.

Ogle County New Horizons Drug Court is proudly celebrating its 10th year Anniversary. Facing a prison term of 10-15 years he never expected to be offered a chance to clean up his life by pleading into Drug Court, but his public defender, Kathleen Isley, saw something in him and he was offered the

opportunity. Joe graduated from Drug Court in September of 2018. Through the process he was able to stay clean, learn coping skills and most importantly reunite with

his family and wife of 15 years. He is clean and sober and is gainfully employed. He credits his success on his willingness to change, the unwavering support of the Drug Court team and God, his higher power. He gives back by speaking openly about his journey, most recently at the Annual Awareness Dinner at Salt 251 in Rochelle.

This is just one of thousands of individual stories that demonstrate why treatment courts are so critical in the effort to address addition and related crime. But if you are looking for research, treatment courts have that, too. Numerous studies have found treatment courts reduce crime and drug use and save money. They also improve education, employment, housing, financial stability and family reunification, which reduces foster care placements.

Treatment courts represent a compassionate approach to the ravages of addiction.

This year's National Drug Court Month celebration should signal that the time has come to reap the economic and societal benefits of expanding this proven budget solution to all in need.

Colony Collection focus of Art Group program

The average homeowner may be able to trim short trees on his or her own, but if views from the second floor of a home or higher have been compromised, it's much safer to call a professional tree service. Such services have the right tools and experienced personnel necessary to safely trim high branches on tall trees.

• Tree services can help prevent future damage. Even if trees made it through a recent winter unscathed, that's no guarantee next winter or even the coming seasons of spring, summer and fall won't ultimately prove their undoing. Travelers Insurance notes that weather-related roof damage, including damage resulting from falling limbs and branches weighed down by snow during the winter months, accounted for more than half of all Travelers property loss claims between 2009 and 2016. According to BNC Insurance and Risk Advisors, homeowners may be liable if a tree they knew posed a threat falls onto a passerby or a neighbor's property and causes damage or injury. Having all trees properly trimmed each year, but especially those that can fall on your home and your neighbors' homes, may prevent future damage and legal issues.

Tree services can ensure trees maintain their awe-inspiring beauty and help homeowners protect their homes and their belongings.

Work to control problematic termites

Few things elicit fear in the minds of homeowners like termites. Termites are voracious and can turn wood to pulp wherever they take up residence. Termites have felled massive trees, but they also can bore through the wood in homes, wreaking havoc as they go.

Prevention is always preferable to having to treat termites after they are established. Termite Web, a site devoted to termite information, states that treating home foundations and surrounding soil with termite spray is often the best course of action to stop subterranean termites from taking hold. If termites are already present, drilling into the floor surrounding the building and using a termiticide may be necessary. Baiting termites outside with wood that is tainted with slow-acting insecticide can eliminate an entire colony in one to four months.

Termite control methods may need to be repeated. A multi-pronged approach using different chemicals may be necessary to kill existing insects and repel further infestations.

Mount Morris man speaks at area events about service

Hero is a word that is used so often, and so casually, anymore it's starting to lose its meaning.

That's not the case with Doug Ween.

In 1968, the Mount Morris man was serving as a Navy medic with the Marines Corp. during the infamous Tet Offensive. During one particular ferocious battle, Ween risked his own life to shield the body of a fellow soldier who had been wounded. In so doing, he was hit by shrapnel, one of two times he was hit by shrapnel.

"Some of our guys got hit and I went out and got them," he said. "It's a simple self-less thing. They were my buddies, and if they got hit you went out and got them. We never leave our wounded or dead behind."

For his actions, Ween was awarded the Silver Star,

this country's third highest military honor. He also earned two purple hearts.

When his tour of duty was over, Ween had to fly home during the middle of the night because of what he called "rowdy crowds" that were opposed to the controversial war and often took it out on returning servicemen.

"That was common," he said of the secrecy.

Ween was the main speaker at the annual Welcome Home Vietnam Veterans Day celebration on March 29 at the Roberts Armory Museum, 2090 Bush Grove Road, Rochelle.


At the celebration, which was sponsored by the Rochelle Chapter of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, special lapel pins and certificates were presented to local Vietnam veterans as a way to thank them for their service. Veterans who served in any capacity in the military during Nov. 1, 1955 and May 15, 1975 are eligible for the honor.

"It's nice to be remembered," Ween said. "A friend told me 'sacrifice means nothing without remembrance.""

"They never were truly appreciated for answering the call to the nation's service," Lydia Roberts added.

According to Roberts, co-owner of the war museum, 34 people attended the Rochelle ceremony, including 15 veterans who received the lapel. Since the museum started hosting the event in 2015, 80 Vietnam veterans have been honored.

"We were only going to do it for three years, but we enjoyed it so much, we decided to continue," she said, adding that, as members of the Vietnam War Commemoration Chapter, they are obligated to hold two events for Vietnam veterans every year.

Roberts said the museum, which specializes in World War II equipment and memorabilia, is only open a few times a year, including Memorial Day, Heritage Festival and the Sunday before Veterans Day. It is also open for very special occasions, such as Vietnam Veterans Day, the

mu- Boy Scouts, school outings

and for local veterans. Charles Roberts, who served in the military himself, said they opened the museum in 2009.

"This is kind of a new day," Ween said of the Vietnam War Veterans Day. "It keeps expanding."

For him, the day has an

even more special meaning. As he explains it, March 29 – the day officially designated by Congress for the event – is also his birthday.

Weens, who worked for the V.A. Hospital for 36 years, is next scheduled to speak for the Rochelle American Legion at the Iron Skillet on June 12.

* On June 9, 1772, colonists, angered by the British Parliament's passing of the Townshend Acts restricting colonial trade, board and set ablaze the HMS Gaspee, an armed British customs schooner that had run aground. British officials found no one willing to identify those involved, and the inquiry closed without result.

* On June 4, 1919, the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, guaranteeing women the right to vote, is passed by Congress and sent to the states for ratification. On Aug. 18, 1920, Tennessee became the 36th state to ratify the amendment, giving it the two-thirds majority necessary to make it the law of the land.

* On June 3, 1937, the duke of Windsor -- formerly King Edward VIII -- marries Wallis Warfield Simpson, the American divorcee for whom he abdicated the British throne in 1936.

* On June 5, 1942, President Franklin D. Roosevelt issues a stern statement warning Japan to stop using poison gas in its war on China. Japan continued its use of these weapons until the end of the war, managing to keep its activities secret.

* On June 8, 1966, the rival National Football League (NFL) and American Football League (AFL) announce that they will merge. The first Super Bowl between the two leagues took place at the end of the 1966 season.

* On June 6, 1971, "The Ed Sullivan Show" airs for the last time, 23 years after its 1948 premiere. Gladys Knight and the Pips were the musical guests.

* On June 7, 2002, Michael Skakel is convicted in the 1975 murder of his former neighbor, 15-year-old Martha Moxley, with a golf club. Skakel, a nephew of Ethel Kennedy, the wife of the late U.S. Senator Robert Kennedy, was sentenced to 20 years to life in prison. In 2018, the Connecticut Supreme Court vacated the conviction and ordered a new trial.

* Yes, it is shorts season.







Center indoor pool. Biking and running courses will loop through the community and surrounding areas.



people on a first come, first served basis. Unclaimed property is money or assets that have been separated from their owner for at least five years. Businesses and banks are required by law to turn over the unclaimed accounts to the state so they can be returned to their rightful owners. Often the owner doesn't know the property exists. Examples include:

* Inactive savings and checking accounts

- * Unpaid wages or commissions
- * Stocks, bonds, and mutual funds
- * Money orders and bill overpayments * Paid-up life insurance policies
- * Safe deposit box contents

Please also note not only individuals but companies, hospitals, not for profit or-

ganizations, etc. may also have monies. The Representative will have a computer and be able to see if attendees have any unclaimed funds. If they do indeed have money (1 out of 7 people do), she will help them complete the paper work.

There is a website that is open to the public Icash.illinois.gov<http://Icash.illinois.gov> however many are not aware of this.

If you think you may have some unclaimed assets or property, stop in and see Bonnie. No appointment is necessary.

MyMedicare.gov

Have you signed up to use MyMedicare.gov? If not, you may want to consider doing so. Through this web site you can access your personal Medicare related information. For example, you can:

* check to see the status of your new Medicare Card. Look for the message, "your card is in the mail"

* view information about your Medicare Part D Prescription Drug plan or your Medicare Advantage Plan enrollment.

* view a list of your prescription drugs.

* view your Medicare Summary Notice and learn about the status of your Part B deductible, whether it has been met or not.







Q: Will "Proven Innocent" be back? I really enjoyed the actors and storylines, and found it very different from the usual cops-and-lawyers programs. I also enjoy "Gone," which is only broadcast on WGN, and I wonder why other networks have not picked it up. -- S.P.

A: Unfortunately, "Proven Innocent" was canceled by FOX after just one season. It debuted on a Friday night, which isn't the best night to lure in regular viewers. I agree that it was different from other crime procedurals in that it focused on a hot topic in the news nowadays -- exonerating those imprisoned for a crime they didn't commit. Another thing that might have worked against the show was the unrecognizable names of the leads. While they're great actors, Rachelle Lefevre and Russell Hornsby aren't household names.

As for "Gone," it debuted this past February on WGN America as a 12-episode limited series starring Chris Noth ("Law & Order") and Levin Rambin ("All My Children"). As a limited series, it could return for a second season with the same cast or a new one, or not return at all. I agree it would fit in with the other crime shows on the main networks, but it's possible they passed on the show when it was originally shopped around.

Q: Is "Whiskey Cavalier" going to be back this fall? Despite its silly name, I really like the show. -- P.P.

A: I have to deliver more bad news. "Whiskey Cavalier" has been canceled after just one season. ABC Entertainment president Karey Burke said at a recent press event that they "gave it a very strong launch in spring, but we lost audience. ... We looked for other time slots but did not see a real opportunity to grow."

"Whiskey Cavalier" was heavily promoted by ABC and even premiered after the Oscars. The dramedy starred Scott Foley and Lauren Cohan as two rival investigators. The decision to cancel it reportedly came down to the wire, and the network chose to focus on a new series in its time slot this fall called "Emergence."

Warner Bros. TV, the studio behind "Whiskey Cavalier," is trying to get another network or platform like Netflix to pick it up. Canceled shows have more opportunities to be revived than ever before, so there's a good chance you'll see it again. They might tinker with it some, maybe add another big name to the cast, but I wouldn't be at all surprised if the show had a new home come next year.

the show had a new home come next year. As for its replacement on ABC, "Emergence" stars Allison Tolman ("Fargo") as a police chief who takes in a child she found at the site of an accident. The child has no recollection of the accident and then the mystery unfolds. ABC has high hopes for "Emergence" after snatching it up when NBC decided to pass on the pilot.

"How to Train Your Dragon: The Hidden World" (PG) -- Hiccup (Jay Baruchel) and Toothless return in the third of the animated series. Hiccup is now grown, and together with Astrid (America Fererra) and the rest of his pals, remains in charge of the dragon/man clan that is Berk, an island paradise that is rapidly being overrun with liberated dragons. A new threat appears, but so too does the yang to Toothless' yin -- a female Light Fury. As the goofy, superadorable black dragon explores his feelings, a plan is hatched to move the whole group to the legendary Hidden Island, a mythical place where dragons can be free. Both dragon and rider will finally have their destiny revealed, and the path is emotional -- this is the rare threequel with heart and a wonderfully fulfilling story.

"Isn't It Romantic" (PG-

13) -- Rebel Wilson plays a New York City architect, Natalie, who's got a cynical view of romance: To wit, it's nonsense and not for gals like her. After an encounter with a subway mugger leaves her unconscious, she wakes up in an imaginary world where she's the star of the PG-13 show -- musical numbers, censored curse words and all. How does she get back to the real world, and with a handsome billionaire suitor (Liam Hemsworth), does she really want to? It's refreshingly funny, and reteams Wilson with "Pitch Perfect" love interest Adam Devine, who plays Natalie's best friend Josh. Both have great comedic timing, and for all the poking fun at romantic comedies, they sure did make a cute one. Isn't it ironic?

"The Upside" (PG-13) -- Recently paroled and on the prowl for work (or trying to look like it), Dell (Kevin Hart) interviews for a position as caregiver to quadriplegic billionaire Phil (Bryan Cranston). He gets the job, and grudgingly takes it, and the two begin an unfolding friendship under the watchful eye of Phil's assistant Yvonne (Nicole Kidman). Through this friendship, both grow and influence the other. It's a story that's been told several times, most recently in

2011's French film "The In-

touchables." Although Hart and Cranston -- and in her own way Kidman -- are big personalities who can do justice to both comedy and drama, the story lacks a certain zazzle. The messages are predictable, but I think it's still worth a watch.

"Trading Paint" (R) --Father and son racers face adversity and a falling out when son Cam (Toby Sebastian) leaves dad Sam (John Travolta) to drive for a rival team headed by the slick Linsky (Michael Madsen).

So, dad climbs behind the wheel once more to grind out the gears on his legend. I promise you'd have a funner 90 minutes in a car crash -- it would probably be more exciting, and you wouldn't have to hear Travolta's Southern accent.

HOLLYWOOD - Will Smith is reportedly being paid a whopping \$35 million by Netflix for 'Bright 2" (the original "Bright," with Joel Edgerton, cost \$90 million to make). That's more than the busiest guy in movies, Dwayne Johnson, who makes \$20 million per film. Will has a cameo in "Student of the Year 2" (now in theaters), but goes big and wide as the Genie in the live-action "Aladdin" (out May 24), and the animated spy comedy "Spies in Disguise," with Tom Holland (due Sept. 13). Next he'll star in three-time Oscar-winning direc-

tor Ang Lee's sci-fi film "Gemini Man," in which Smith plays the dual role of a man and his own clone (coming Oct. 11), followed by the action comedy "Bad Boys for Life," with Martin Lawrence and Vanessa Hudgens (Jan. 17).

Ryan Reynolds, who starred in and co-produced "Deadpool" (which grossed \$783 million) and its sequel (\$785 million gross), has upped his price and star status. He is reportedly getting \$27 million from Netflix to star in "6 Underground," about a billionaire-financed vigilante squad. Meanwhile, Reynold's "The Hitman's Bodyguard," which earned \$176 million, has spawned a sequel, "The Hitman's Wife's Bodyguard," with Samuel L. Jackson and Salma Hayek (due in 2020). His latest film, the justreleased "Pokeman Detective Pikachu," is a big hit.

When "Doctor Dolittle" opened in 1967 with Oscar-winner Rex Harrison (who was a big star), it was a flop that cost \$17 million and earned only \$9 million. Twentieth Century Fox was more successful in 2001 with Eddie Murphy (which cost \$70 million and earned \$176 million). Fox sold it to Universal Pictures for "The Voyage of Doctor Dolittle" (out Jan. 17) and paid Robert

Downey Jr. \$20 million to play the man who can talk to animals.

Tom Cruise is getting \$14 million for "Top Gun: Maverick"; Jason Statham \$13 million for "The Fast and The Furious" spin-off "Hobbs & Shaw" (while Idris Elba is making only \$8 million for the same film); and Emily Blunt reportedly is going to make \$13 million for the sequel to "A Quiet Place." Leonardo Di-Caprio and Brad Pitt are earning only \$10 million each for Quentin Tarantino's "Once Upon a Time in Hollywood," the same as Gal Gadot, who received a huge pay hike for "Wonder Woman 1984."

Hollywood is well-represented in nominations for this year's Tony Awards (June 9 at Radio City Music Hall), with the musicals "Beetlejuice" (eight nomina-tions) and "Tootsie" (11 nominations). Among acting nominations are Bryan Cranston ("Network"), Jeff Daniels ("To Kill a Mockingbird"), "Star Wars" Adam Driver ("Burn This"), Annette Bening ("All My Sons") and Laurie Metcalf ("Hillary and Clinton"). As they say, "Everything old is new again" ... again!
