Open house set to discuss Byron nuke plant performance

BYRON—Nuclear Regulatory Commission staff will discuss the 2018 safety performance of the Byron nuclear power station, operated by Exelon Generation Co., during an open house on May 28, in Byron.

The open house, to be held at the Jarrett Prairie Center, 7993 North River Road, will run from 6-7 p.m. NRC employees responsible for plant inspections, including the resident inspectors based full-time at the site, will be available to discuss the plant's performance.

Byron operated safely during 2018. At the end of the year, all inspection findings and performance indicators were of very low safety significance. As a result, it remains under the NRC's normal level of oversight, which entails thousands of hours of inspection each year.

The NRC Reactor Over-



sight Process uses color-coded inspection findings and indicators to measure plant performance. The colors start at green and increase to white, yellow or red, commensurate with the safety significance of the issues involved. Inspection findings or performance indicators with more than very low safety significance trigger increased NRC oversight.

Inspections are performed by two NRC resident inspectors and inspection specialists from the Region III office located in Lisle, Ill.

P.E.O. celebrates 65 years

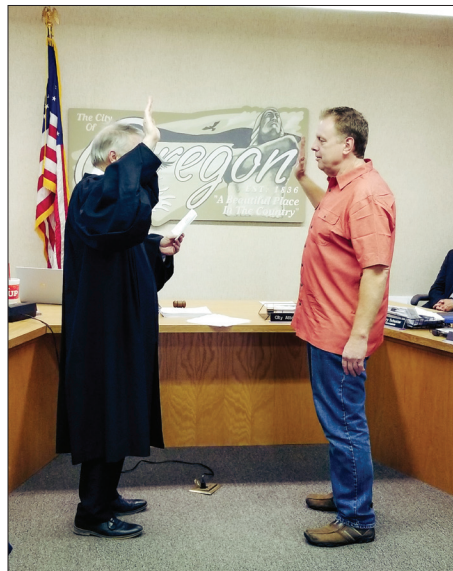
OREGON – The Oregon Chapter of P.E.O. International has celebrated its 65th Anniversary with an evening of celebration on Monday, May 13.

Illinois music scene.

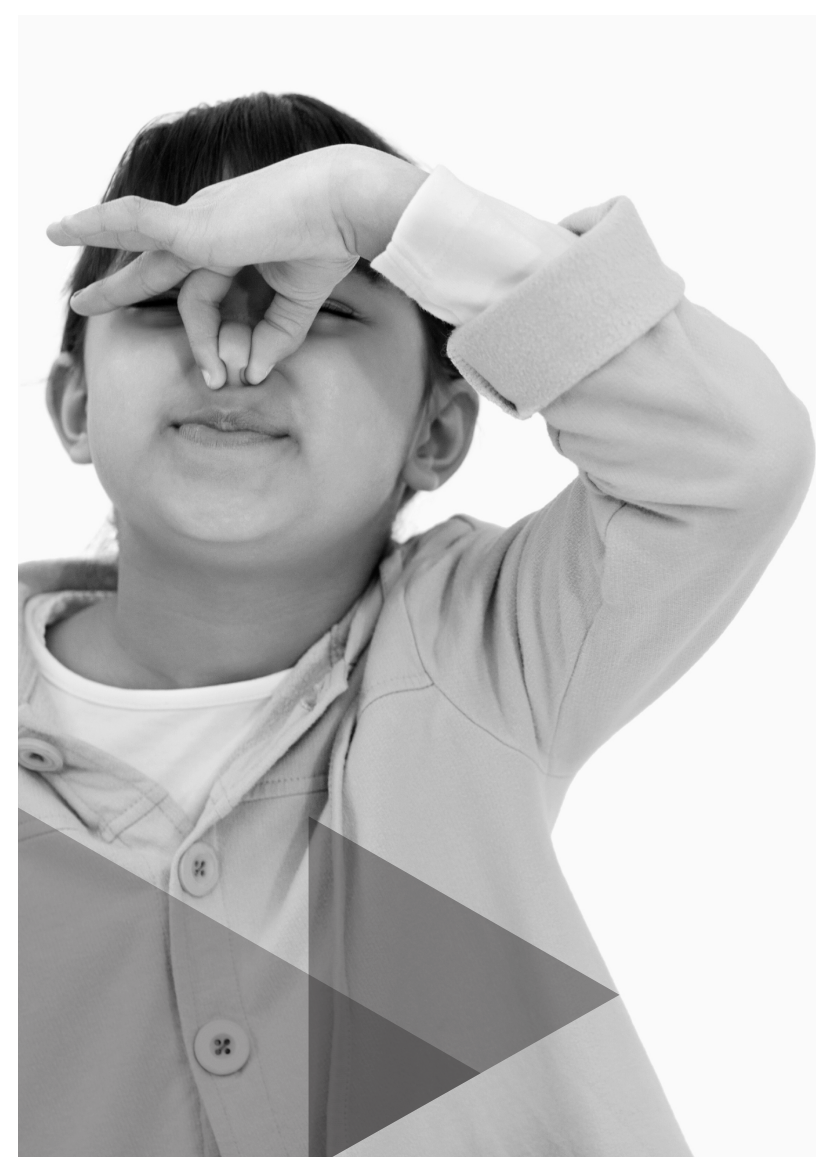

She is survived by her daughter Dixie (Terry) Hur-

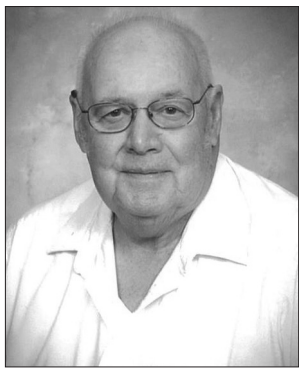

Free vision tests available

LEAF RIVER – The Leaf River Lions Club in conjunction with the Lions of Illinois Foundation will be providing for free vision screenings for children age 6 months to 6 year of age on June 1.

The Lions have collaborated with Plusoptix in order to use the Plusoptix S12C camera to perform this screening. This screening will be done by a trained Lion on how to operate and interpret the camera. The screenings will be done inside the Bertolet Memorial Library starting at 10 a.m.

Young children who may not be able to express their vision problems or who do not know they have them can end up compensating so well that their parents do not realize there is a problem. Early detection is the vital key when it comes to your vision.

Parental consent is required for the screening to occur and there will be paperwork you must fill out. The Screening will give you either a "pass" or "refer" result providing you with some indication as to whether you child needs further vision testing by an Eye Care Professional. Screenings do not take the place of an exam given by an eye care professional.

So how does this work?

* There is no physical contact with child and no eye-drops needed.
* Results are produced in seconds.
* Children are screened from approximately three feet away and only need to look at the camera for a few seconds.

What does it Screen for?
* Results are only a PASS or REFER detection
* Hyperopia (farsightedness)
* Myopia (nearsighted-

ness)
* Astigmatism (blurred vision)
* Anisometropia (unequal refractive power)
* Anisocoria (unequal pupil size)
* Strabismus (eye misalignment)
* Media opacities (e.g. cataracts or corneal scars)
* Amblyopia (lazy eye)

Again, these screenings are performed FREE and hope to provide some early detection of problems the child may be experiencing. Parents will have to sign agreement prior to the screening. The Lions do this in various communities to help diagnose eye problems with our young children. In 1925 Helen Keller challenged the Lions to be "Knights of the Blind in the Crusade Against Blindness" and it is still the Lions goal. Please consider having your child tested.

And I'm sorry, but the argument that this will keep the artist's legacy alive and allow people who never had a chance to see them live see them live just doesn't cut it.

Why? A hologram is not "live."

But I can see a day when we have dead actors starring in new movies. Digital effects have come an incredibly long way in a fairly short amount of time. So, I fully expect that to become a reality.

Also consider video games, one of the most successful forms of entertainment these days. The look of these games can be quite stunning. The days of pixelated blobs running from left to right on the screen are long over. Now, it is basically like being a character in a movie. Add to that the giant televisions with beautiful clarity we have these days and it can be an incredible, immersive experience.

But a live performance should still be live performance, in my book. I don't even like to see artists that use "triggered" sounds, which is basically something like a keyboard used to produce sounds or sound effects. For

example, one singer can sound like 50. Or hitting a snare drum might sound like a clap of thunder.

I am old school, and I will admit that, when it comes to music, I agree that it needs to grow and change, and that just because I don't prefer it doesn't mean it isn't good or valid. That is in the ear of the listener, and who am I to tell people what to like and what not to like?

But I want to see a real artist making music in the moment. Music is not a painting. Music should be created in a specific moment, in front of an audience. Sure, it can be recorded. But on the stage, it comes alive. Even if a band or artist plays the same chords and sings the same lyrics for decades, every performance is unique – a moment in time.

A hologram would be the same, every performance. To me, that does not honor the artist at all, nor the music he or she created.

What family therapy teaches us about politics

My brief and limited experiences as a mental health therapist, especially as a family therapist, have helped to shape my attitudes about politics. Families and nations are alike in an important way that centers on the word, "resistance." By the same token, I suspect that a nation can, like a troubled family, have an "identified patient," and that President Trump may at times be ours.

Those of us who feel that our Chief Executive is one of the worst ever can take some comfort in the knowledge that a nation is much more than its president, and forces are always at work to restrain a bad one. They include the protections that the founders engineered into our Constitution, but at

the most basic level it comes down to a law of nature. Biologists call it homeostasis, the tendency of all living things to resist change.

It was at work when, as revealed in the Mueller Report, White House Counsel Don McGahn disobeyed President Trump's order to

fire Mueller, and later defied the president's order to lie about it. That was one of many examples reported by David A. Graham on The Atlantic's April 19 website, with the heading, "No One Listens to the President." "Mueller's report is packed with incidents in which White House staff not only didn't do things Trump said, but never had any intention of doing them."

The conservative publication The Wall Street Journal, in an April 24 editorial titled "Thank You, Don McGahn," similarly praised McGahn as well as other White House Staff and Congressional Republicans for time and again saving the President and the nation from "destructive behavior or decisions" by refusing

to comply with them or by talking him out of them.

Donald Trump isn't the first president to confront our nation's voiceless, stubborn insistence on keeping things the same, a life force that transcends politics. Barack Obama encountered it in his attempts at health care reform and other liberal measures. Much of the instability in our political life comes from the failures of Tea Party Republicans on the right and Progressive Democrats on the left to respect our instinctive collective resistance to measures that overstep our customary political boundaries.

Mental health therapists often encounter resistance when they try to bring about changes in families. For example, as explained

by Virginia Satir in her book, "Conjoint Family Therapy," a child brought to therapy as the family's "identified patient" may be providing a distraction from other problems that the family fears to confront in the open, as well as a channel for disguised communication about it. The family and child will then knowingly or unknowingly collude against the therapist if he fails to recognize and respect the importance of the child's service to the family.

President Trump is our nation's identified patient when his public tantrums and provocations divert our attention toward him and away from the disturbing complexities of our political and social problems. A

wise citizenry, like a well-functioning family, won't allow the President to be its identified patient. A wise leader will refuse to be one.

A wise president also respects the life force that biologists call homeostasis and that family therapists call resistance. If he doesn't, he'll pay a price. Those of us who fear the future under this President, as well as those who fear a future without him, would do well to keep that in mind.

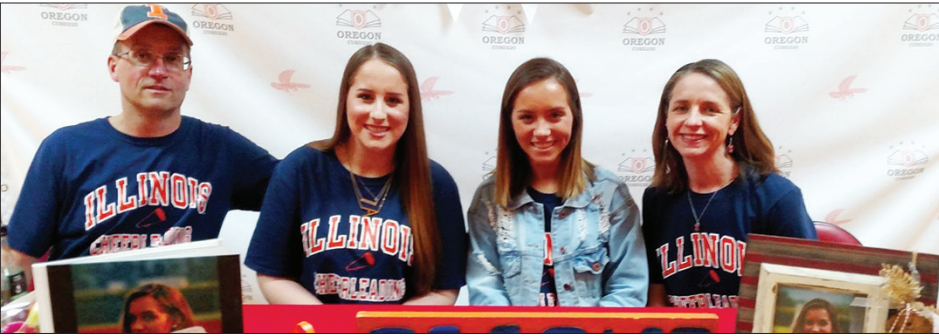

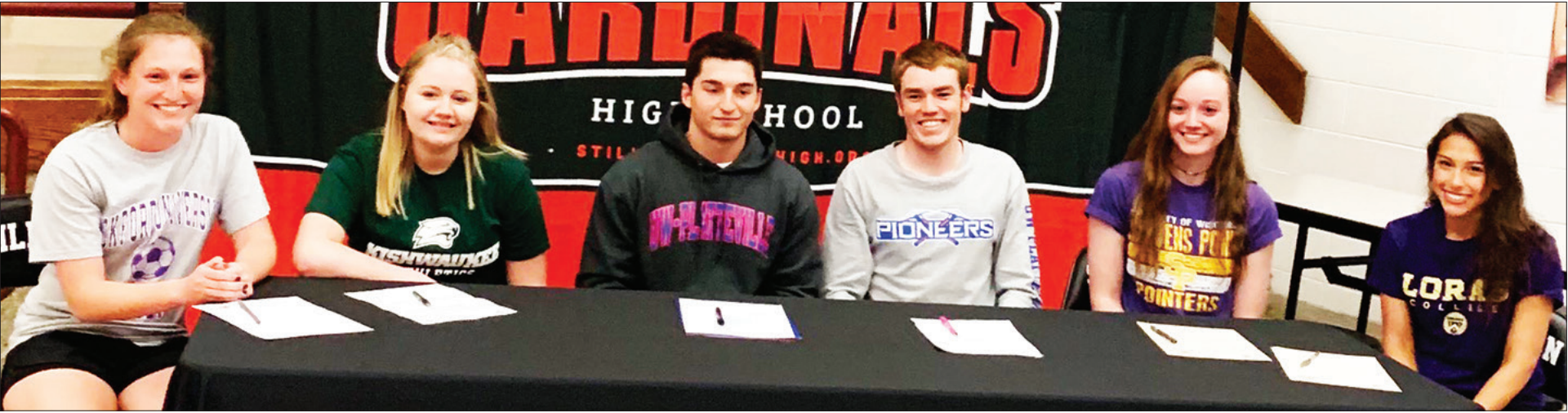

Let’s meet the band. Rick Lindy got his first bit of Rockabilly fever at the age of 11 when his sister Caren bought him his first guitar. He began writing songs around that age, usually parody songs about his 7th grade teacher Gary Tate. Always a fan of 50’s and 60’s and country music, Rick began learning tunes of his favorites like Marty Robbins, Buddy Holly, Roy Orbison, Johnny Cash and the late great Hank Williams Sr.

His late Father Richard Sr. a WWII Veteran was an accomplished Saxophone and Clarinet Player and organist. Rick was encouraged by his parents to perform for relatives and guest while visiting the family home.

In and after high school, Rick was cast as the lead in many musicals such as Bye Bye Birdie, South Pacific, 1776, The Music man, The Sound of Music, Annie Get Your Gun, How to Succeed in Business without Really Trying and many more. A graduate of the American Academy of Art in Chicago, Rick studied Illustration and Advertising and design. After graduation, Rick’s mom Dorothy saw an ad for an audition for a male singer in a travelling band. It turned out to be the Serendipity Singers, and Rick was hired for a two-year contract. He lived on a tour bus even in the dead of winter. With the “dips,” Rick toured all over the USA and Canada.

Rick left the “dips” in 1992. He entertained at The Imperial Palace in Las Vegas and the Aladdin Hotel. He found the heat intolerable so he left Vegas and started Rick Lindy and The Cyclones with Wild Ones members Todd Menke and Butch Nelson. In 1996, Rick and Butch joined Big Guitars from Memphis and began touring nationwide and abroad in Europe. He has had the pleasure of opening up for Johnny Cash in 1997, Robert Gordon in Norway 1998, and Hank Thompson in Sweden 1999. He is also

personal friends with Sun Rockabilly legend Hayden Thompson who sang on the Wild Ones first album, Wild Side of Town.

Currently Rick is also working close at hand with Scott Mackay of true Oldies 94.7FM, planning various tribute shows. Rick also has been combining talents with Anthony Smith in Guitar Street band. He will be performing various solo shows and combining talents with other musicians in the very near future.

Rick’s hobbies are collecting antiques, old movies, drawing and painting... and spending time with his beloved dogs Roxy, Petey and Yoda.

Todd Menke – Lead Guitar

The original lead guitarist of the band is Todd Menke. He began playing guitar at age 12 and caught on so quickly that older teenagers were asking him to join their bands. Todd was told about Rick Lindy’s talent in 1992 and approached Rick to come over to his house to play some music. The two hit it off and formed a band with Steve Dvorak on lead guitar, Todd jumped on the standup bass and Al Wagner on drums who was later replaced with Butch Wahx.

They formed a group called Rick Lindy and The Cyclones, a raw Rockabilly quartet, which was the launching pad for The Wild Ones.

Todd’s energetic performing style and authentic guitar riffs make him an excellent asset to Rick Lindy and The Wild Ones.

Andy Trippi – Drums
 Never skipping a beat, Andy is the one keeping the time and adding percussion to The Wild Ones. He has been entertaining for over four decades and has drummed for many successful bands in Chicagoland. Two of the bands he has most recently been a member of were The Hip-Noz Rockabilly Band and The Tony Ocean Show. Just like Rick, he is a motorcycle enthusiast and enjoys helping with promotional materials for the band.

His heart of gold and friendly warm personality is a favorite among many fans.

Greg Nash – Lead Guitar
 Greg is The Wild Ones lead guitarist and is a favorite amongst the Chicago oldies music scene. His ability to play many different styles of music has brought him down a cavalcade of paths musically. For decades Greg has

been a professional musician, he too spent many years with Johnny Star and The Meteors and has worked with Rick Lindy on various projects. Greg was on Playboy records back in the early 70s, but is a dedicated husband to Linda none the less.

He can be seen drinking tons of coffee in between sets to keep his fingers limber and agile to play the styles of guitar legends Scotty Moore, Chuck Berry and Django Reinhardt. He usually plays a Telecaster and a Gretsch

Duo Jet similar to the one Cliff Gallup used on all of the early Gene Vincent hits.

Eric Stoliker – Bass
 Originally from a small town near Detroit, Eric got his first tape recorder at the age of 8, wrote and recorded his first song at 9, got his first guitar when he was 13, and has been involved in various musical projects ever since. He was a fixture on Chicago’s north side in the 90s playing 140 solo and trio shows every year with his Martin acoustic guitar. He became a “Wild

One” in 2008 and plays a vintage 1950s American Standard upright bass with gut strings and a Fender Precision with flat-wound strings to get his unique “thump and jump” sound. Early influences include Motown, Chess, and Sun records, Buddy Holly, Crickets, Willie Dixon, Howlin’ Wolf, Elvis, Johnny Cash, Roy Orbison, and Van Morrison.

Eric studied music at Western Michigan University and has lived and performed in and around

Chicago for the last 20 years. He is an accomplished vocalist, guitarist, double bassist, music teacher and producer and has worked with several notable engineers and musicians including Dave Kresl (CRC), Alan Crane (BlueFlash Studio), The Hip-Noz, Kurt Crandall and True Story, Mike Bourne, Jawbone Shack, Goldin Winker, Nick Willett, The Nashvillians, Everett Dean, Spitfire Deluxe, The Gina Knight Orchestra, and Rick Lindy and The Wild Ones.

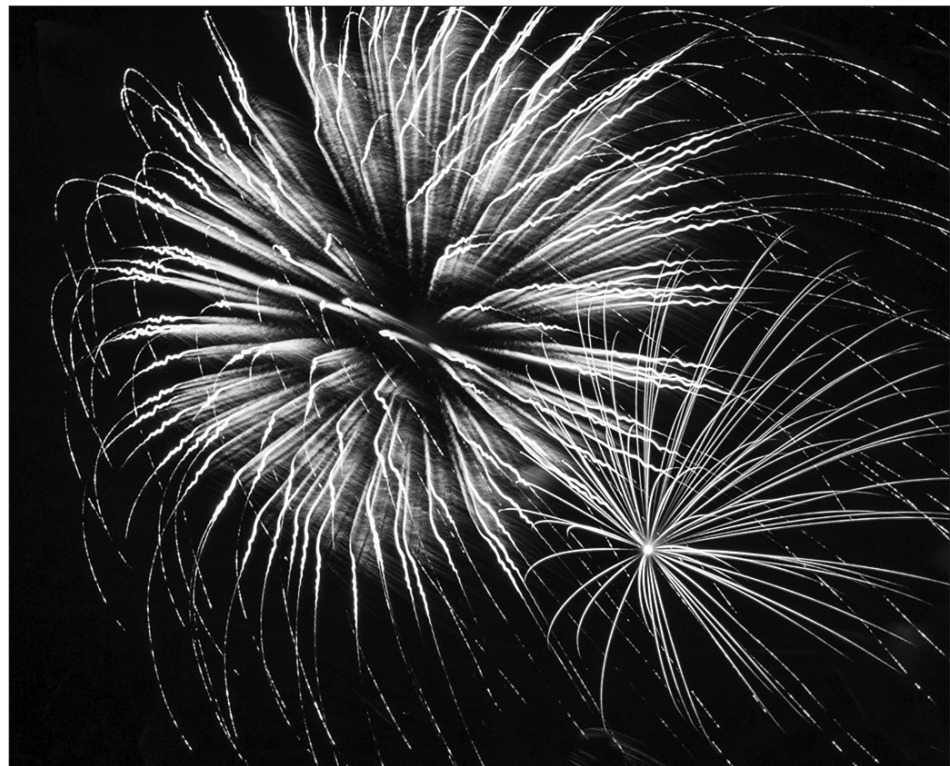

Here are some tips for hosting a great bash

Hosts with swimming pools should have pool games readily available as well.

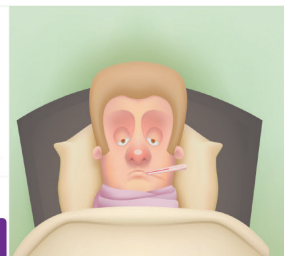
- Leave the fireworks to the professionals. Hosts should not succumb to pressure, real or perceived, to supply fireworks at their Fourth of July parties.
