**First county property tax installment due June 7**

**OREGON**—Ogle County Collector Linda Beck reminds property owners that the first installment of their property tax bill is due on June 7, 2019.

Payment methods include cash or check (payable to Ogle County Collector). In person payments can be made at the Treasurer's office or at any bank in Ogle County. The Treasurer's office is in the old courthouse in Oregon, 105 S. 5<sup>th</sup> St., Ste. 114. Office hours are 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.

The mailing address is Ogle County Collector, P.O. Box 40, Oregon IL 61061. Mailed payments must be postmarked by the due date to be considered timely. Late payments will incur a fee of 1.5 percent per month or part of a month after the due date and must be remitted by mail or at the Collector's office.

The Treasurer's office is also offering the option of online credit card payments. People can get to the site by going directly to [www.oglecountytreasurer.org](http://www.oglecountytreasurer.org) or through [www.oglecounty.org](http://www.oglecounty.org) and then selecting the Treasurer's department. Choose the Online Tax Payments link and click the Pay Now button. Fill out the information as prompted. Be sure to receive a payment conformation for your records. This service carries a fee.

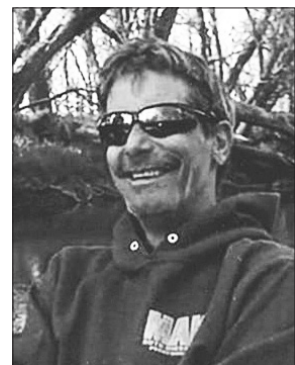

**Cryptocurrency in Divorce**

The terms “bitcoin,” “cryptocurrency,” and “blockchain” are rapidly becoming common household terms. As the use and familiarization with cryptocurrencies increase, it is important to have a basic understanding of these terms. Bitcoin is only one of many digital currencies currently in existence; others include Ethereum, Ripple, Dogecoin, and Tether. Collectively they are referred to as cryptocurrency.

These digital currencies have no physical representation, but are instead made of lines code. As such, instead of being stored in a bank or other financial institution, owners and users of cryptocurrency must create a “wallet” account in order to use or spend the cryptocurrency. Each wallet has private and public “keys” unique to it. The private key is used to sign off on transactions, whereas the public key is used for others to send cryptocurrency to the wallet. Transactions are recorded on the “blockchain,” which is a shared public ledger of all transfers of cryptocurrency. Each wallet is connected to these keys, not to an individual, thus while these transactions are not completely anonymous, tracking them can still be problematic.

Because these types of transactions involve a system very different from traditional banking and introduce many new vocabulary words, it can be easier to hide money. The IRS does not technically acknowledge cryptocurrency as currency, but treats it as property. Knowing the correct terminology can go a long way in making sure another dubious party is not concealing assets by keeping them in cryptocurrency or by making purchases with cryptocurrency that are not traceable in the traditional sense. In this new era of developing technology it is important to become knowledgeable about these new types of currencies to protect your own assets and also to make sure assets are not being hidden from you.



**Sports Gambling May Soon be Legal in Illinois**



The United States Supreme Court’s recent decision in *Murphy v. National Collegiate Athletic Association* appears to have paved the way for the legalization of sports gambling. *Murphy v. National Collegiate Athletic Ass’n*, 584 U.S. \_\_\_, 138 S. Ct. 1461 (2018). It held that the Professional and Amateur Sports Protection Act (PASPA), which made it illegal for governmental entities to operate or authorize sports-wagering schemes, was unconstitutional. This leaves the door open for Congress to enact new legislation on the topic, but unless or until it does so, States are free to act on their own.

Will Illinois then take steps to legalize sports gambling? The “odds” say probably. Multiple bills have been introduced in the Illinois legislature over the past few years, though none have been signed into effect as of yet. The potential revenue from taxes and fees associated with legalizing sport gambling are one of the motivating factors for the push for legalization. The similarities here to the impending legalization of recreational marijuana in Illinois also appear to make Illinois likely to bet on legalizing sports gambling.

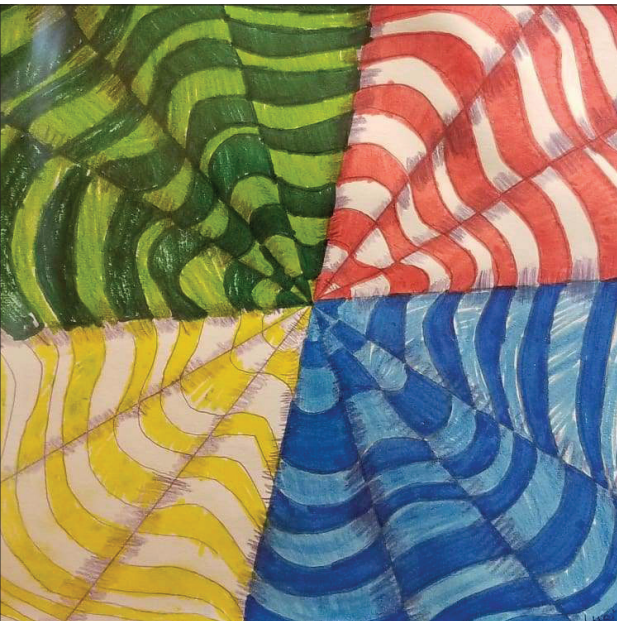

## Spring turkey numbers up from 2018

**SPRINGFIELD, Ill.** — Illinois turkey hunters harvested a preliminary statewide total of 15,189 wild turkeys during the 2019 Spring Turkey Season.

This year's total is up compared with the 2018 statewide turkey harvest of 13,494. The statewide preliminary total includes the 2019 Youth Turkey Season harvest of 1,364 birds, compared with the 2018 youth harvest of 1,143 turkeys. The statewide record total was set in 2006 when 16,569 turkeys were harvested.

In Ogle County, 165 turkeys were harvested, compared to 181 in 2018.

Spring turkey hunting was open in 100 of Illinois' 102 counties. The 2019 season dates were April 8-May 9 in the South Zone and April 15-May 16 in the North Zone. The Youth Spring Turkey Season was March 30-31 and April 6-7 statewide.

Turkey hunters this spring took a preliminary total of 6,607 wild turkeys during all season segments in the South Zone, compared with 5,507 last year in the south. The North Zone preliminary harvest total this year was 8,582 wild turkeys, compared with 7,987 in northern counties in 2018.

## Students learn about dairy

**OREGON** – Oregon third grade students recently visited a beef and dairy farm.

Thank you to Snodgrass Dairy and Nordman Feedlots for opening up their farms and sharing their farming experience with these students.

In order to prepare for their tours, the students learned more about beef and dairy cows. To find out more about dairy cows, students discovered how cheese is made. They heated milk, added rennet, and lemon juice. The acidic nature of the lemon juice caused curds to form. Along with curds there was a liquid called whey. The curds and whey were separated. The curds were put in

the refrigerator for students to try once they cooled.

This activity was used to demonstrate the practice at a cheese factory. At the factory milk is pasteurized, a starter culture and rennet is added. After the curds form, the whey is separated. The whey is shipped to other food processors and used in candy, ice cream, and bakery goods. The cheese is cut into small pieces, and put into a mixer filled with hot water. The cheese melts into a big mound. The blocks of cheese are put into forms to cool. They look like loaves of bread. Finally, they are put into a salt brine bath.

Agriculture in the Classroom is a program to help students gain a greater

awareness of the role of agriculture in the economy and society. Students learn that thousands of farm products are in the world around them – on their plate, in the clothes they wear, in the medicine that makes them well, and in earth-friendly fuels and plastics.

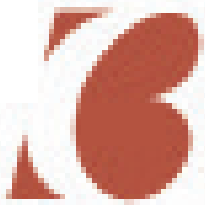

## Students discover wheat in tortillas

**STILLMAN VALLEY** – Through the Ag in the Classroom program 2nd grade students at Highland Elementary in Stillman Valley made tortillas.

The 45-minute activity showed students how to measure, mix, and flatten dough. They learned how wheat is used to make the main ingredient, flour. Thank you to Sydnee Overton and Adrienne Hall, juniors and FFA members at Stillman Valley High School for their help.

Illinois produces soft red winter wheat. Most of the wheat grown in Illinois is shipped out of country to help feed people all over the world and is also processed into flour to make cookies, crackers, and cakes. The wheat is collected from area farms at grain elevators and

then shipped to flour mills. During the milling process, white flour is produced by removing the bran and germ portions of the wheat. Most products made from white flour are enriched. Whole grain foods are made with flour that contains all three parts of the kernel. None of the wheat plant goes to waste; the stalk and leaves are baled and used for animal bedding, straw.

## Students learn all about the Tootsie Roll

**STILLMAN VALLEY** – On May 24th, Highland 1st grade students discovered what was in a tootsie roll – five different farms. The only thing not from a farm is the artificial flavorings.

Tootsie Roll's main ingredient is sugar. Students saw a picture of a John Deere combine harvesting sugar cane. The second ingredient is corn syrup. Along with corn, soybeans are also needed for their oil and for soy lecithin. The soy lecithin keeps the ingredients from separating.

Students discovered that Tootsie Rolls would not be complete without dairy farms. Cows provide the

condensed skim milk along with whey. Whey is a liquid by-product of the cheese-making process.

The final crop needed is cocoa which comes from cocoa beans. They saw pictures of the pods where the beans develop and saw what the dried unprocessed beans looked like.

At the conclusion of the program, the students made Tootsie Roll mobiles showing the five different crops found in the candy. It is amazing that something as little as a tootsie roll involves so many different farms.
