Strumming up another award

Ukulele Station wins again, eyes expansion

OREGON – John Lindhorst is obviously doing something right.

The Oregon business he owns, Ukulele Station America, has again been named a top 100 dealer by the National Association of Music Merchants (NAMM), the global association of music products and music retailers.

“I’ve been in business four years and I’ve been in the top 100 all four years,” said Lindhorst, who opened in July 2015. “That’s kind of crazy.”

According to a release from NAMM, the award honors retail music dealers who demonstrate exceptional commitment to their stores, neighborhoods, and custom-

In that building, Lindhorst keeps 100 ukuleles, and also has about the same amount at home.

He said he hopes to expand his business by adding another building on the property. That annex would be larger and have a showroom, office, lesson area and possibly even a performance space. Lindhorst said he is just waiting on numbers from a builder.

If that happens, he said

he would be able to hire a person to do online sales – something he does not do currently.

"Hopefully I can make it work, but I'll see," he said.

In the meantime, he will be traveling to Nashville, Tenn., for the annual mid-year summer NAMM gathering on July 19 for the awards ceremony.

His business is also up for the "Innovation Award," "Best Community Retail Store," and the "Dealer of the Year" award.



County airport hosting annual July 4 breakfast

Independence Day at Ogle County Airport starts with the pop-pop swoosh, of piston powered aircraft coming in for an all-you-can-eat 4th of July breakfast.

The annual "best in the Midwest" breakfast starts at 7 a.m. and runs until 11 a.m. The breakfast includes Eichman's tasty ham and whole hog sausage, cantaloupe, scrambled eggs, hash browns and stacks of pancakes with blueberry and other toppings. This feast will be served by volunteers and pilots at the Ogle County Airport for only \$10. The breakfast is a fundraiser for the non-taxpayer-supported airport and attracts hundreds of small private airplanes from several states each year.

This is a wonderful opportunity to have the whole family enjoy the sights and sounds of airplanes at the grass strip airport located on Hwy. 64 between Mount Morris and Oregon. Each year this event brings about 1,000 people together to

enjoy a great breakfast and to mingle with friends and those interested in aviation. There is no charge to view the airplanes and parking is free.

Frequently, old military training planes will fly in and do fly-bys. Some of these planes will trail white smoke as they fly-by in an old tradition of air shows. Spraying special paraffin into the manifold produces the smoke.

The airport was recognized in 2007 by IDOT as "Airport of the Year", in part, because of the many and continuing improvements made at the airport. Flight instruction, biennial reviews, tail wheel check outs, and other aviation services are available at the airport. The airport is the home base for the Rock River Flyers flying club.

Oregon Lions learn about Granny Rose Animal Shelter

OREGON – Judy Lohse from Granny Rose Animal Shelter in Dixon was the speaker at the Oregon Lions Club regular meeting at the VFW in Oregon on May 23.

Tri-County Animal Shelter (also known as Granny Rose Animal Shelter) was formed in the late 70's and serves Lee, Ogle and Whiteside counties. It services homeless and abandoned cats and dogs.

Cats and dogs stay there for an undetermined amount of time in the hope of finding their forever home. During their stay at the facility, they are microchipped, neutered, heartworm tested and receive flea and tick treatment. After they receive these treatments they are ready for adoption. The adoption fee for a cat is \$75 and the adoption fee for a dog is \$200.

The fee for adopting a dog is higher because it includes the cost of a 6-week dog training class conducted at their dog training center.

Granny Rose Shelter has found that a well-trained dog will bond more successfully with their new owner if they understand how to follow commands.

If you are shopping in Dixon and can stop by the facility at 613 River Lane, the shelter welcomes donations of kitty litter, cat and dog treats as well as monetary donations.

He is survived by his daughter, Jennifer (Jen) Gowers (Kobi Skolnick), his stepdaughter, Amber Jor-

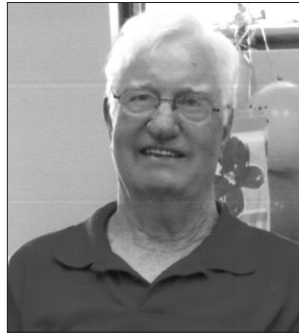

Crop marketing workshop June 19

ROCK FALLS – The Lee, Carroll, Ogle and Whiteside County Farm Bureaus along with COUNTRY Financial will host a crop marketing workshop on the evening of June 19, at the Days Inn, in Rock Falls.

We're still not back into our own space yet, and right now, we really don't have an anticipated date when we will be "back home". But we promise, we'll tell you when that day comes.

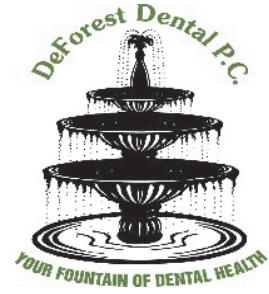

Walk participants are guaranteed to see many Bobolinks. Known for their unique bubbling song, the handsome male summer plumage is black and white and look like they are wearing backward tuxedos. These grassland birds nest in large natural prairies, uncut pastures and overgrown

fields. Bobolinks come to our area to breed during the summer and spend the winter in the southern interior of South America. These birds have one of the longest migrations in our hemisphere and will travel the equivalent of four to five times around the Earth during their lifetime.

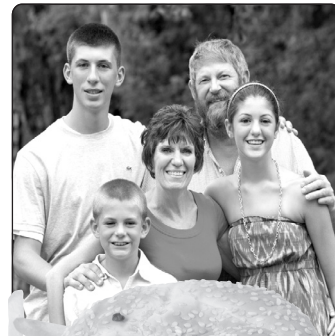

* On July 1, 1951, Cleveland Indians ace Bob Feller pitches the third no-hit game of his career to lead the Indians over the Detroit Tigers 2-1, making him the first modern pitcher ever to throw three no-hitters.

* On July 6, 1976, in Annapolis, Maryland, the United States Naval Academy admits women for the first time with the induction of 81 female midshipmen. In May 1980, Elizabeth Anne Rowe became the first woman member of the class to graduate.

* On July 3, 1985, the blockbuster action-comedy "Back to the Future" -- in which John DeLorean's iconic concept car is transformed into a time-travel device -- is released in theaters. The DeLorean featured gull-wing doors and a brushed stainless-steel body.

* On July 5, 1996, Dolly the sheep -- the first mammal to have been successfully cloned from an adult cell -- is born at the Roslin Institute in Scotland. Over the course of her short six-year life, Dolly gave birth to four lambs.

And it usually works well.

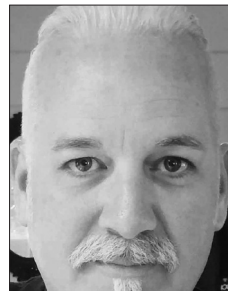
Usually.

p.m. Wednesday. Not 6 a.m. Thursday. Sure, there are occasions that deadline is changed due to a holiday, but that is rare. For new people submitting things, I try to be flexible. But deadlines are deadlines, folks.

* I can't run everything you send me. Sure, it might be important to you, but I often have to decide what will and won't run. It is nothing personal, but some things simply might not make the cut. Deciding what does and what doesn't is my job, after all.

* Please, please, please

send me submissions in the form of a press release. Please don't just drop your flyer off here and expect it to magically be turned into a story. I don't always have the time to do that. I'm sure you can find a basic press release form on the Internet. Please use it – it makes for a better news item.

* I get that fax machines were all the rage in the 1980s, but this is 2019. We prefer that news items be emailed. Even if you mail a letter, it has to be typed into the system. We are a small editorial operation (yes, just me), so email is critical to me being able to gather content for the paper. Please email me at bjennings@oglecounty.com. You can send all of your photos here as well.

* Please proof read what you send. Surprisingly, I sometimes get things that just don't make much sense. And if you mail something to me with no phone number, I can't reach out with questions. Reading something over doesn't take much time, but can ensure your item gets in the paper.

* I love getting letters to the editor. I want to publish your opinions. But they must be signed, must have a city and must have a contact number. And please remember, letters to the editor – like all content – are subject to editing. And they generally run in the order they are sent.

* I understand that sometimes people want things to run in a certain issue, with very specific wording that they don't want touched and want the item to run multiple times. We can certainly do that, but I will forward those to our advertising people. Just an FYI.

Again, I love this paper and the communities we serve. I have a great group of regular contributors and am thankful for all of them. If you have an item about a community event, please send it in. I will do my best to get it into The Life.

And please, send me your story ideas. There are many stories to be told, and I want to tell them.

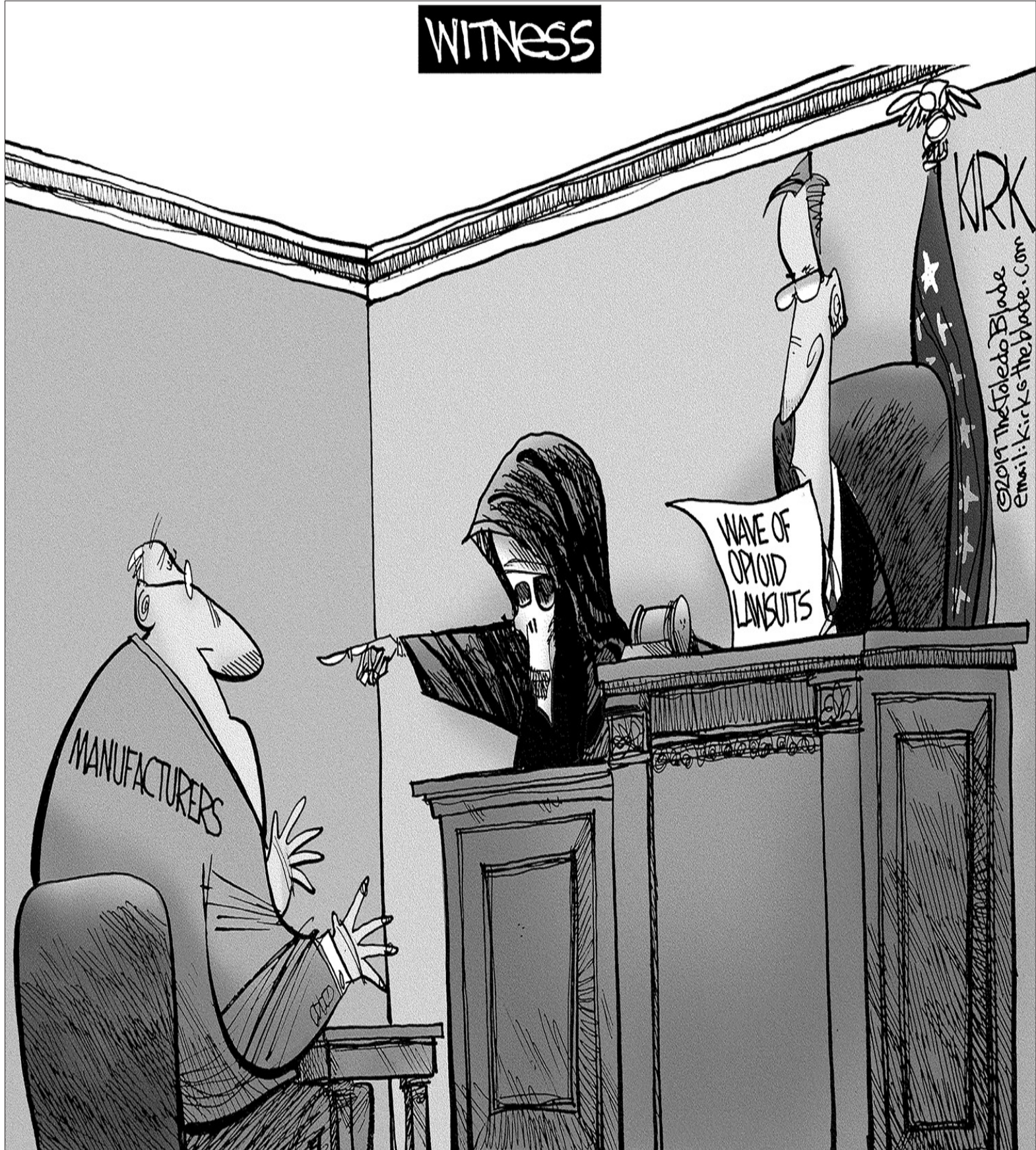

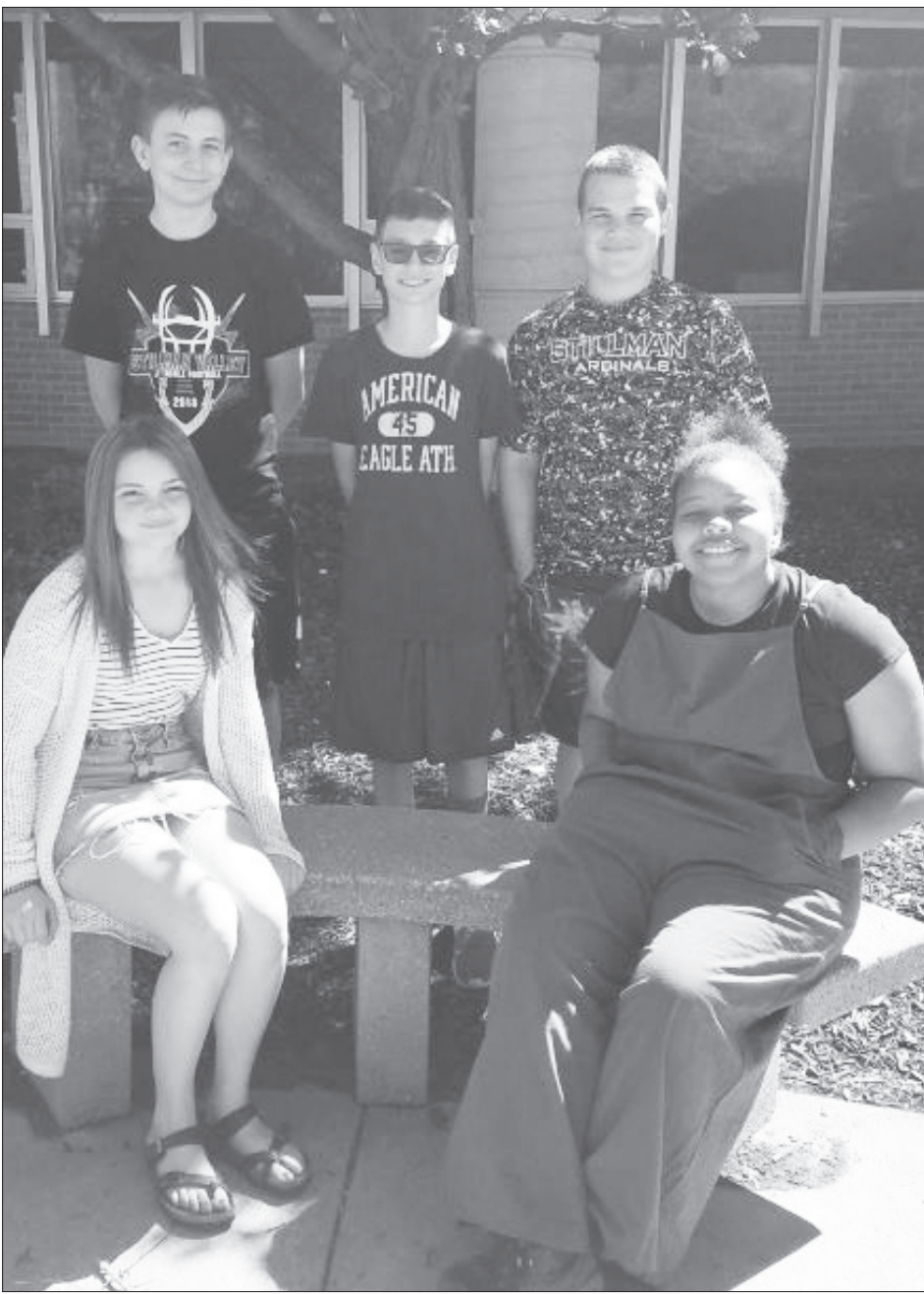



LeRoy Toms turning 95 on June 15

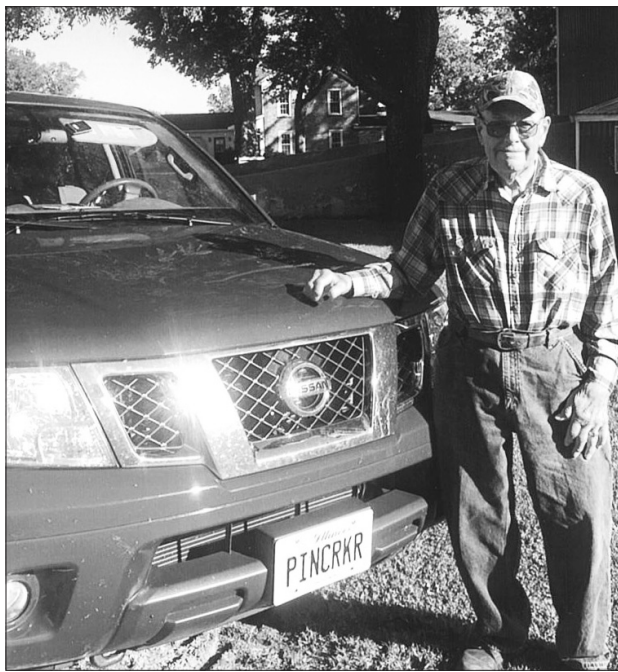
POLO – LeRoy Toms of Polo will celebrate his 95th birthday on June 19.
