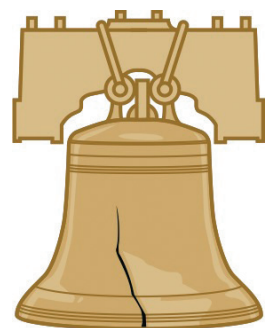

**All about girl power**

Day camp centers on affirmation, empowerment

**MOUNT MORRIS** – During an average week in June, 19 young girls attending Strong Girls 2 Women (SG2W) day camp were reminded that they are shining stars.

They ran through obstacle courses using different abilities, crafted projects unique to each of them, and sang around a campfire while dancing, swaying, and celebrating their strengths. Each day of SG2W, hosted by Trinity Lutheran Church, was also an opportunity to meet and hear from women who hold vital roles in their organizations and community.

SG2W Director Adrienne Stafford described the reason for offering this annual free day camp to

young girls in grades 4-6. "They each have so much to offer. There are so many possibilities and their capabilities are endless," she said.

Along with camp planners Holly Handschuh and Olivia Stafford, Adrienne Stafford organized for the second year a weeklong experience intended to provide a safe space for girls to be themselves and to be affirmed as they are in the world.

She recruited adult and high school youth to lead the camp, providing participants multiple generations as role models.

"I'm involved with [SG2W] because it creates healthy relationships with the youth," Handschuh



said. "It teaches them their worth and shows them they can really do anything."

For Olivia Stafford, being part of SG2W is about witnessing the growth in the campers and sharing her wisdom that these has gained from the strong women in her life, such as her mother.

"To be able to help out the number one strong woman in my life and at the same time teach young girls about what it takes to be a woman in this day and age is really cool and full circle," she said.

Centered on these themes of affirmation and empowerment, SG2W

participants accomplished several goals and activities. Broken into teams and assigned their own tents, campers worked together and cheered each other on as they completed such tasks as weaving through pool noodles, running across balance beams, passing water over their heads to each other, and throwing Cheetos at their team leaders who wore hats covered in shaving cream. All of this silliness formed relationships and gave every camper an opportunity to shine while surrounded by their peers.

## Byron Museum District is seeking its next commissioner

**BYRON** – The Byron Museum District is one of many local organizations that depends on a volunteer board and is currently seeking responsible parties with experience in accounting, law, education or have an interest in policy development and administration.

Have you wanted to get involved in local government administration but don't want to run for office? Being appointed to the board of a special purpose government is a great way to learn more about taxing bodies and their administration. Applications are now open for a five-year term on the Byron Museum District Board of Commissioners.

You must be a Byron resident, legal voter in the district and shall receive no compensation for your time. Send application and résumé to the County Clerk's Office located at 105 S. 5th St – Suite 104, Oregon.

Nominations are made by the Ogle County Board's nominating committee. The full County Board will vote to appoint the new Commissioner after an interview process in Oregon.

The newly appointed museum Commissioner will be sworn in at the following meeting of the Byron Museum District Board of Commissioners in Byron.

Applicants should be able to attend the museum's monthly board meetings held on the fourth Tuesday of each month at 6:30 p.m. in the Byron Museum of History located at 110 North Union Street in Byron. Officers will be elected at the museum's July meeting; four out of five museum commissioners serve as officers. Preferred candidates will be able to send

and receive electronic communications and have a basic understanding of financial reports.

The powers and duties of the Museum Board generally include: formulation and adoption of policies governing the museum and the procedures to be used in its operation; Museum Board members, as individuals, have no authority over museum affairs.

The Board has authority only when acting as a body duly called into session.

The Byron Museum District is governed by the Illinois Museum Act 70 ILCS 1105, available online and at any library.

District residents and the public at large are always invited to attend Museum District Board meetings or visit the museum's website [www.byronmuseum.org](http://www.byronmuseum.org) for current meeting agendas and minutes. Anyone can make a written request to obtain a copy of the museum's audited financial report or policies from the director.

If you are interested in the museum or local history but do not want to serve as a commissioner, please consider volunteering or attending the museum's Round Table sessions on Thursdays at 10 a.m. February to June and September to November.

## First mosquito with West Nile virus found in county

The Ogle County Health Department (OCHD) has confirmed the first positive mosquito pool for West Nile virus reported in Ogle County for 2019.

A pool of mosquitoes found near Polo tested positive for West Nile Virus (WNV). With this being the first positive sample, maintaining vigilance to prevent exposure is extremely important.

Monitoring for West Nile virus in Illinois includes laboratory tests for mosquito batches, dead crows, blue jays, robins and other perching birds, as well as testing humans with West Nile virus-like symptoms.

People who observe a sick or dying crow, blue jay, robin or other perching bird should contact their local health department, which will determine if the bird will be picked up for testing.

West Nile virus is transmitted through the bite of a *Culex* mosquitoes, commonly called a house mosquito, which has picked

up the virus by feeding on an infected bird. Common symptoms include fever, nausea, headache and muscle aches. Symptoms may last from a few days to a few weeks.

However, four out of five people infected with West Nile virus will not show any symptoms. In rare cases, severe illness including meningitis or encephalitis, or even death, can occur.

People older than 50 and individuals with weakened immune systems are at higher risk for severe illness from West Nile virus.

Precautions include practicing the three "R's" – reduce, repel, and report.

**Reduce** – make sure doors and windows have tight-fitting screens. Repair or replace screens that have tears or other openings. Try to keep doors and windows shut. Eliminate, or refresh each week, all sources of standing water where mosquitoes can breed, including water in bird baths, ponds, flowerpots, wading pools,

old tires, and any other containers.

**Repel** – when outdoors, wear shoes and socks, long pants and a long-sleeved shirt, and apply insect repellent that contains DEET, picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus, or IR 3535 according to label instructions. Consult a physician before using repellents on infants.

**Report** – report locations where you see water sitting stagnant for more than a week such as roadside ditches, flooded yards, and similar locations that may produce mosquitoes. The local health department or city government may be able to add larvicide to the water, which will kill any mosquito eggs.

On the last day of SG2W, with the sun out and banners flapping in the breeze on the Trinity Lutheran Church lawn, campers gathered around the fire one last time to

sing, dance, clap, and make smores. They were sent off with gift bags and one last reminder that they are powerful, strong, and wise, as well as a promise from the adult and youth leaders that they are available throughout the year as safe mentors at school and in the community.

"SG2W amazes me each year," Olivia Stafford said.

Once camp was closed, Adrienne Stafford and her team began breaking down canopies, gathering supplies, and imagining how the day camp will look in 2020.

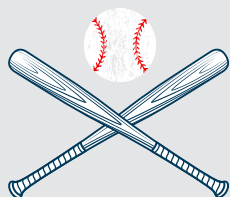

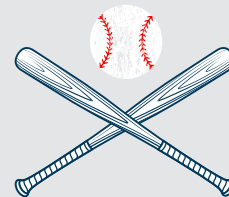

## MOMENTS IN TIME

\* On July 19, 1884, President Chester Arthur issues a proclamation that grants him and the federal government the power to quarantine persons entering the U.S. to avoid the spread of "pestilence" (tuberculosis).

\* On July 17, 1941, New York Yankees center fielder Joe DiMaggio fails to get a hit against the Cleveland Indians, bringing his historic 56-game hitting streak to an end. DiMaggio also lost the \$10,000 promised to him by Heinz ketchup for matching the number "57" featured on its labels.

\* On July 21, 1959, Elijah Jerry "Pumpsie" Green makes his Boston Red Sox debut, becoming the first African American ever to play for the Red Sox, the last team in the major leagues to integrate.

\* On July 15, 1965, the unmanned spacecraft Mariner 4 passes over Mars at an altitude of 6,000 feet and transmits the first close-up images of the red planet. The 22 pictures revealed a barren wasteland of craters, dismissing 19th-century speculations that an advanced civilization might exist there.

\* On July 20, 1972, a two-year study by the U.S. Department of Transportation concludes that 1960-63 Chevrolet Corvairs are at least as safe as comparable models of other cars. In his book "Unsafe at Any Speed," Ralph Nader had targeted the rear-engined Corvair due to its tendency to roll over.

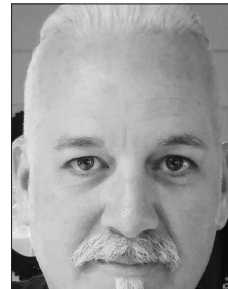

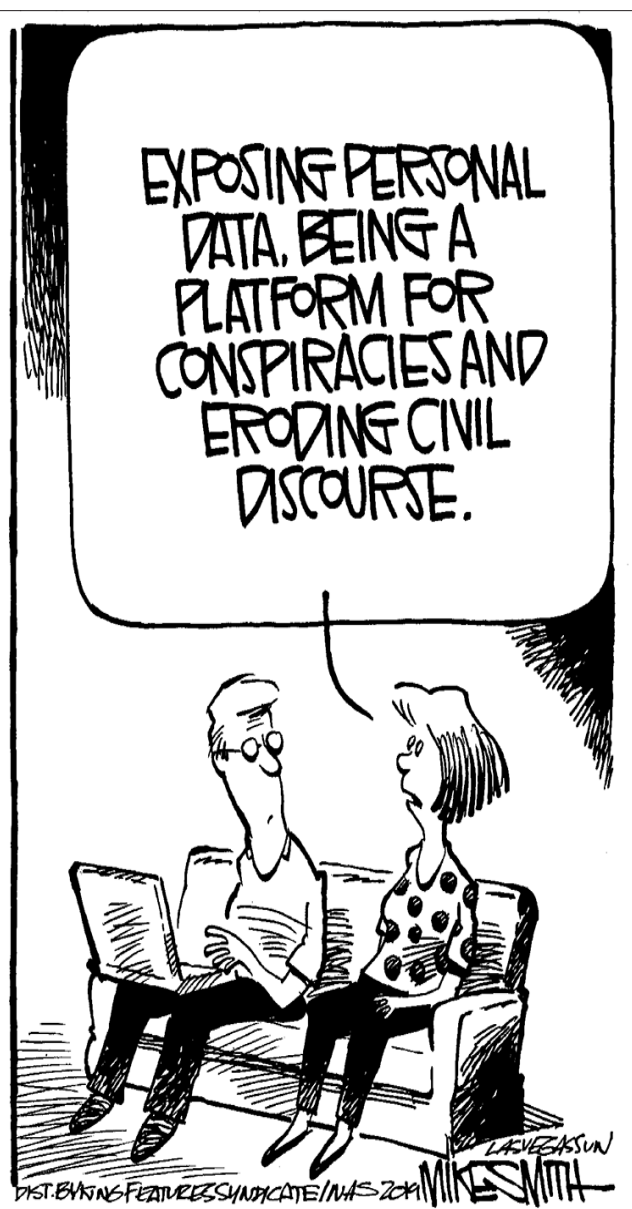
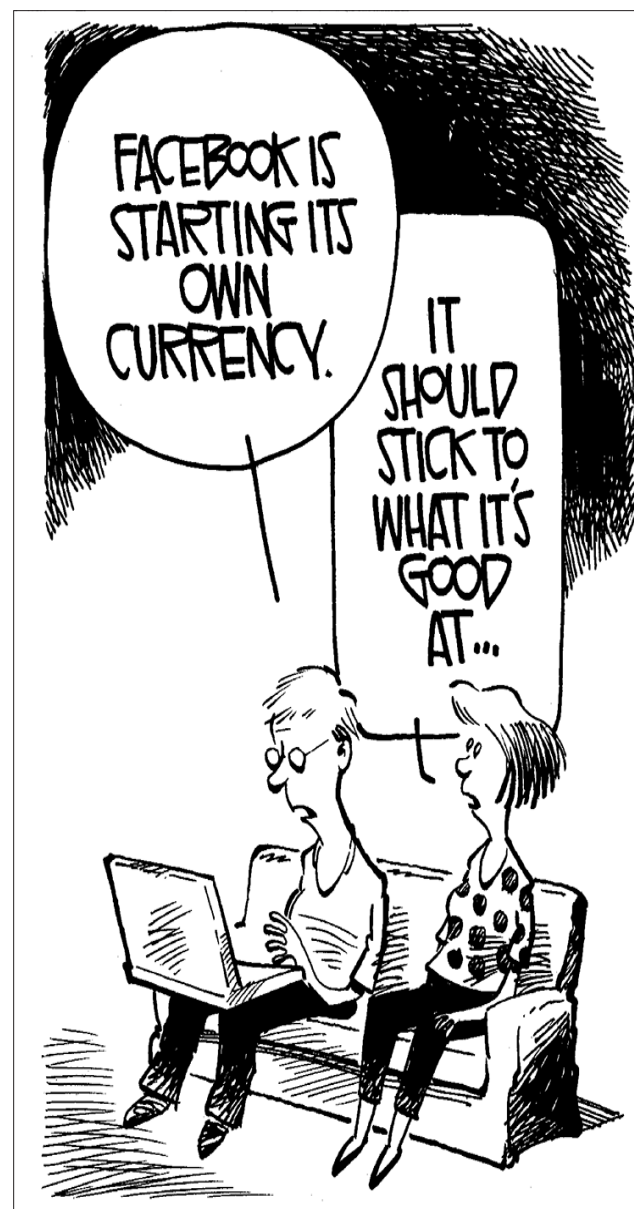
Turns out a thing meant to bring people together is great at tearing them apart – and making them very, very mad.

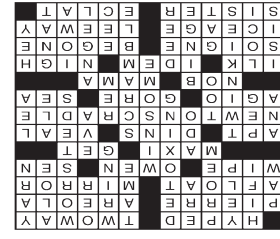

# Couch Theater

“Dumbo” (PG) -- The owner of a small circus (Danny DeVito) takes a gamble on a pregnant elephant, and when the baby is born with giant ears and debuts with a flop, he asks the children of his trick rider Holt Farrier (Colin Farrell) to raise it. They accidentally discover that the precocious pachyderm can fly, and a genuine circus act is born. When a bigtime showman (Michael Keaton) recruits the act -- and Mom is trucked off -- Farrier and the children team up with a trapeze artist and mount a rescue to reunite mother and baby. There’s no getting around the eruption of feelings when Mom is taken away. The lullaby will make you cry. But beyond heartstrings-pulling moments here and there, I couldn’t shake the feeling that, despite it being visually pleasing and well-performed, it didn’t match the enchantment and captivation of the original.

“The Hummingbird Project” (R) -- Jesse Eisenberg and Alexander Skarsgard head this business caper as cousins Vincent and Anton Zaleski, who work together to achieve their dream: run a beeline fiber optic

cable from the New York Stock Exchange direct to Kansas so that they can have trade information milliseconds ahead of the competition and effectively make beaucoup buckaroos by high frequency trading. It’s complicated, but they are very passionate about it, and so is their ex-boss, a cutthroat woman named Eva Torres (Salma Hayek) who plots to thwart and beat them at their own game -- at any price. It comes from director/writer Kim Nguyen, and is as much dark dramedy as social commentary on greed.

“Maze” (NR) -- Irish Republican Army prisoner Larry Marley (Tom Vaughan-Lawlor) is indefatigable in pursuit of freedom, even in a high-security breakout-proof prison such as the HMP Maze. For this challenge, all resources must be pursued, including fellow prisoners with a diverse array of talents and even, or most especially, the guards themselves. Marley establishes a rapport and eventual friendship with a warden, Gordon Close (Barry Ward), that leads to the largest prison escape in Europe since World War II. It’s based on the real-life 1983 mass breakout at the prison. Although it’s about a prison break, it’s not an ac-



tion movie. It’s a psychological drama, slowly building and unfolding, that is well worth watching.

“The Aftermath” (R) -- Keira Knightly and Jason Clark are Rachael and Col. Lewis Morgan, an English couple brought to Germany post-World War II during rebuilding. They take over the house of German ar-

chitect Stefan Lubert (Alexander Skarsgard), but instead of sending him and his daughter off, Col. Morgan allows them to stay. With so many lives lost, it’s inevitable that grief catches up. Given time and access, Rachel and Stefan have an affair. It’s terribly cliched, but of course, beautifully done. If you’re into gloomy period romances, this is your cup of

tea.

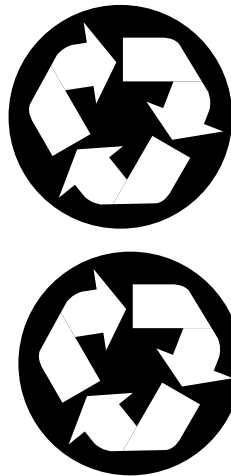
